COFC PROJECTS POINTED OUT AS BANQUET DATE NEARS

The Annual Banquet of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce will be held Thursday, January 25, 1951 at 7:30 p. m. at the Lions Club Hall. The guest speaker will be Joseph F. Leopold, Dallas, Texas, Southwest District Manager of the National Tax Equality Association, and was formerly the Southwest District Manager of the United States Chamber of Commerce at Dallas. Mr. Leopold is a lawyer and an experienced Chamber of Commerce man. He is an able speaker and will have a message that everyone should hear.

When a member of the membership and finance committee contacts you and extends an invitation to become a member of the Chamber of Commerce, we shall appreciate your favorable response. Your support is needed to promote and complete projects sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce for the benefit of Donley County as a whole and Clarendon in particular.

Some of the things the Chamber of Commerce has done and is undertaking to do is as follows:

1. Secured, along with the City, the taking over for maintenance, by the State Highway Department, U. S. Highway 287 and state Highway 70 through the City. During 1950, the Highway Department seal coated the black-top portions of U. S. 287 and State 70 within the city limits without cost to the City, and we are hoping that it will be possible to get a levelling up maintenance job on the brick pavement through the city during 1951.

2. Continue to regulate and minimize out of town solicitors.

3. By co-operating with Hall and Briscoe Counties, the State Highway Commission authorized the construction of 6 miles of road from the Mulberry bridge on State Highway 70 and 256 and a bridge across Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River. We sincerely hope that the State Highway Commission and the State Highway department will find a way to finance the construction of the remaining section to Turkey at the earliest possible time. The completion to Turkey will provide an all weather route for Clarendon, Memphis and the traveling public to Silvertown and to the west coast.

4. Application was filed during 1950 with the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas for the prior rights on Salt Fork of Red River in the name of the Upper Basins of the Salt Fork of Red River, Elm Creek and Buck Creek Association. Briefs containing such information necessary have been filed with the Inter Agency Committee for the Red River Basin, requesting a study by that Agency of the Upper Basin of Salt Fork for two upstream dams. No. 1, downstream from the confluence of Carroll Creek and Kelly Creek and Salt Fork, above the bridge on State Highway 70. No. 2, on Lake Creek in the vicinity of its confluence with the Salt Fork, and a reservoir dam upstream on Salt Fork in the vicinity of Donley and Collingsworth Counties. The three proposed dams probably would conserve and save most of the usable water for municipal and domestic use in Salt Fork.

5. Greater interest is being shown in the development of under-ground water for irrigation since a geological survey of the under-ground water in Donley County by the Department of the Interior was made by W. L. Broadhurst of Austin, Texas.

6. Continued to advertise Clarendon throughout Texas and Oklahoma through Manager contacts.

7. Continued the work for the designation for numbering and marking of U. S. 366 from Fort Smith, Ark. to Amarillo. We have secured the earmarking of the No. 366 by the Oklahoma Highway Commission and a favorable concurrence by the Texas High-

way Commission. U. S. 366 would then become a major link in a coast to coast route and would become one of the major tourist routes. The tourists spent in Texas during 1949 five hundred fifty million three hundred thousand dollars.

8. The Chamber of Commerce has initiated a proposed U. S. 433 route coming off U. S. 83 at Perryton and thence through Pampa, Clarendon, Turkey, Matador, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Del Rio, Eagle Pass to Carrizo Springs, Texas, connecting with U. S. 83 at Carrizo Springs, to Laredo to a connection with the Pan American Highway. This route would become another valuable tourist route for Clarendon.

9. Co-operated with the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad in securing elevator facilities by Doggett Grain Co., Dallas, Texas.

10. The Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association did not continue its efforts for 1950 rodeo, etc., on the account of an injunction forbidding the use of the school grounds for the show.

Your consideration and cooperation will help in the coordination and completion of activities to develop Donley County through a stronger Chamber of Commerce.

APPLICATIONS FOR PAYMENT

Let us remind you again that if you carried out a 1950 practice, you must sign an Application for Payment. It won't be long before all the Applications are sent in for payment, so hurry in and sign yours now, if you have had a notice.

DO YOU NEED TERRACES?

There have been a large number of approvals issued for terraces. If you need your land terraced, have your lines run and bring the lengths of the terraces to the office so that we may issue the approval. Remember that the payment rate is lower this year. Government assistance is \$68.00 per mile and the vendors are charging \$80.00 per mile.

JANUARY 31 DEADLINE FOR GRAIN LOANS

Donley County farmers still have time to take out Commodity Credit Corporation loans on their 1950 crop of Grain Sorghum. The closing date for such loans, and for purchase agreements, is January 31st.

Purchase Agreements protect the grower the same as loans since they guarantee the support price at the end of the season on that part of the crop which is delivered to the Government up to the amount covered by the agreement. The grower himself is responsible for storage on his crop, however, and the amount he receives will be based on grade and other factors.

Loan on the 1950 crop of Grain Sorghum mature on March 31, 1951 or earlier on demand. Intention to deliver to the Government under purchase agreement must be filed with the PMA County Committee during the 30-day period opening with the loan maturity date.

The parity price of cotton on December 15th was 32.36 cents per pound—this is the highest parity on record. Farm living costs continue to rise.

SOCIAL SECURITY TAX

If you have regular hired help on your farm and are not filing quarterly returns on Form 941 YOU SHOULD IMMEDIATELY fill out and mail to the Collector of Internal Revenue an application form. You may get these forms at the PMA Office.

These taxes do not apply to all farm employees. They do apply if a worker on a farm or in a farm home meets both of the following conditions:

- (1) He must have been employed by the farmer continuously (whether or not doing farm work) for a full calendar quarter. No tax is due for agricultural labor performed in this qualifying quarter, which may be the last quarter of 1950.
- (2) In the next quarter he is employed by the same farmer in agricultural labor on a full-time basis for at least 60 days and his cash wages for these services are \$50 or more.

ONLY THE CASH WAGES PAID to your employees will be considered for benefit and tax purposes. The value of room, board, etc., will not be considered.

These taxes do not apply to wages you pay to your son or daughter under 21, or to your father, mother, wife, or husband. They do apply to wages you pay to a son r daughter 21 or over, or to other relatives and in-laws if they meet the above tests.

New 1951 Car Tags Have Arrived

Tax office officials announced this week that the new 1951 license plates have arrived and will go on sale February 1st. The new tags are orange with black numerals and will start with AR-250 and run through AR-2499.

When you go to purchase your new tags it will be necessary for you to carry along your car title and old license receipt as too many plates were issued last year for the tax office personnel to look up this information and they have issued positive notice that they will not issue tags without the above information in the hands of the purchaser. They also pointed out that no special numbers will be held this year as requests in the past have risen to the point whereby it necessitated extra bookkeeping and considerable trouble in checking their list almost every time someone applied for new tags. Numerous people ask for the same number as their phone number or post office box, so this year there will be no numbers saved whatever and it will be appreciated if these requests are not made, they added.

Wildcat Well Plugged at 7110

The Lewis W. Welch R-G Ranch Wildcat well was plugged this past Saturday at a depth of 7,110 feet. No definite information could be learned in regard to the formation other than the drilling was very hard and it has been presumed that granite was encountered at that depth. This is the deepest test for Donley County so far and the well also set a record for this area on thickness of granite wash which was around two thousand feet. The rig is being dismantled this week and should be moved out by Friday, one informant stated. No other drilling prospects have been reported at this time.

COUNTAINS ATTENDING MEETING AT WACO

Dr. J. G. Stewart Building New Clinic Here

Work was started this week on a new clinic building here which is being built by Dr. J. G. Stewart. John Jones is the contractor. The location of the new structure is across the street north of the county jail. It will contain nine rooms, which will be especially designed for office space, two rooms for emergency beds and clinic equipment. It will be modern in every respect with automatic heating and air-conditioning units and will be built of cinder blocks and cement. More clinic equipment will be added soon after the building is completed, Dr. Stewart stated.

Dr. Stewart came to Clarendon in March, 1941 and has practiced medicine here since that time. "I felt that my patients needed and deserved a clinic building with more complete facilities, and if everything goes along according to plans, this new clinic will be ready to move into in around sixty to ninety days," he added.

March of Dimes Drive Now Underway

Three devastating years of the worst polio epidemics in history have wiped out patient care funds of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and left unpaid bills of \$5,000,000.

So the 1951 March of Dimes, which opened Monday, must raise \$50,000,000 nationally, and \$2,000,000 in Donley County.

This sum is essential to enable the Foundation and its local Chapters to provide financial aid, equipment and skilled workers for the thousands of children and adults who will be victims this year, and for those needing care from earlier years. Also, the Foundation must continue to pay for research in the treatment and prevention of polio, and the training of professional personnel.

"Let us meet this financial crisis, and give freely to conquer this vicious polio enemy," Donley County March of Dimes Campaign Director Keith Bain urged today.

Distribution of 1951 March of Dimes Coin Collectors, underway for the past week, now is nearing completion, Mr. Keith Bain reported.

A miniature reproduction of a respirator, or iron lung, the 1951 Coin Collector is an improved version of the initial collector of this type first used last year, he explained.

"Our Coin Collector members consisting of local Boy Scouts and volunteers have done a fine job in spotting these canisters throughout Donley County," Mr. Bain said. "I wish to thank all restaurant owners, banks, service stations, hotels, stores, and utility offices, for their wholehearted cooperation in displaying these Coin Collectors."

For counter display, the Coin Collector is equipped with an easel bearing the picture of Larry McKenzie, Jr., 1951 March of Dimes Poster Boy, both of whose arms were affected by polio. The 1951 campaign slogan: "Lend Me a Hand" appears on the container which also may be used without the easel, to take up audience collections in the theatre and at sporting and other events.

"Every time you drop a dime or quarter, or half dollar in these Collectors," Mr. Bain said, "you'll be giving a polio patient—and yourself—a real lift."

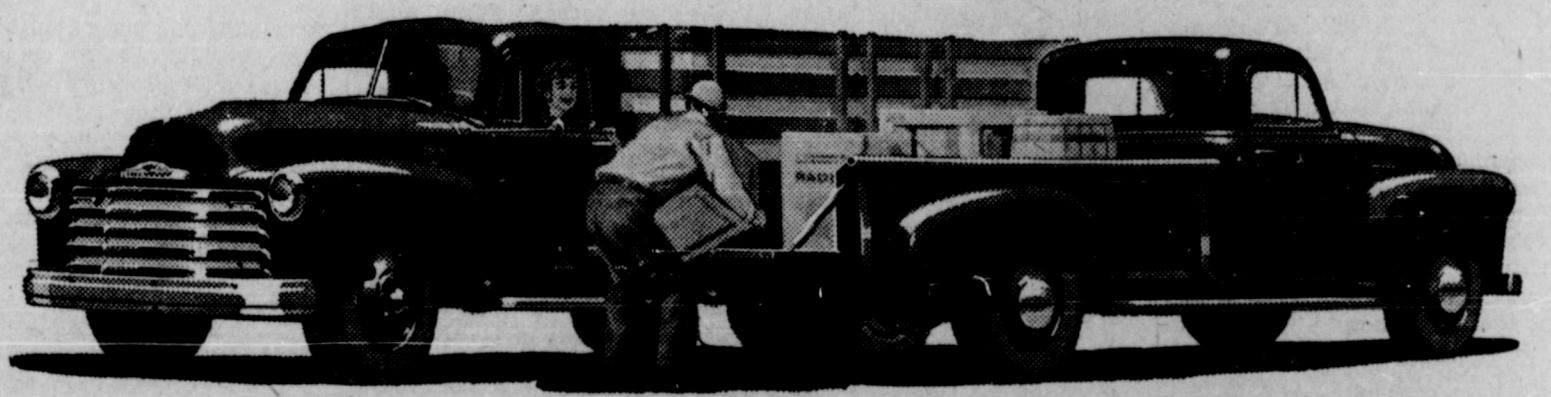

Kenneth Wilkinson led the Bluebirds point making by scoring 22 points. High point man for Lakeview was Payne with 12.

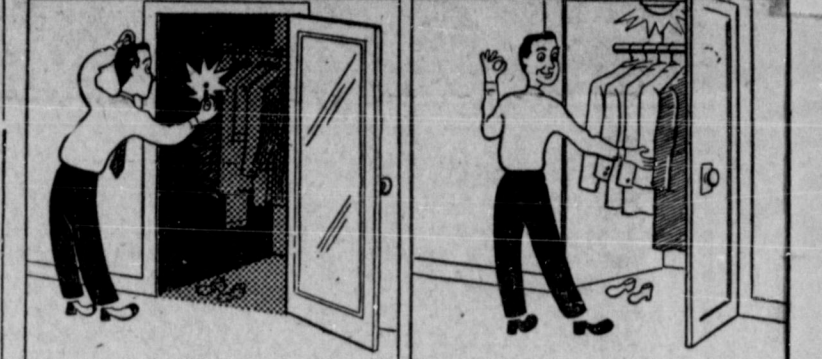

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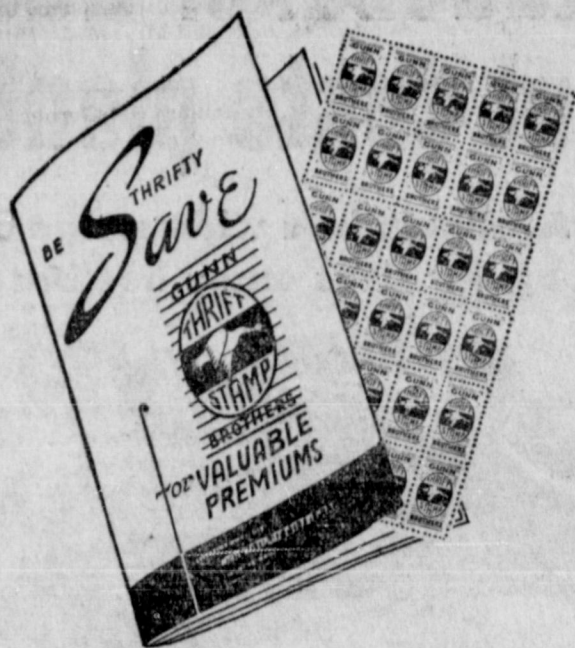

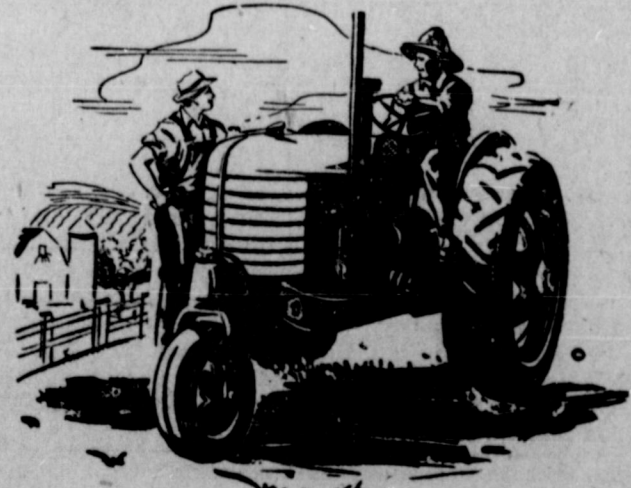

Waltari has his own way of handling the formula—double the quantities, double the results."
