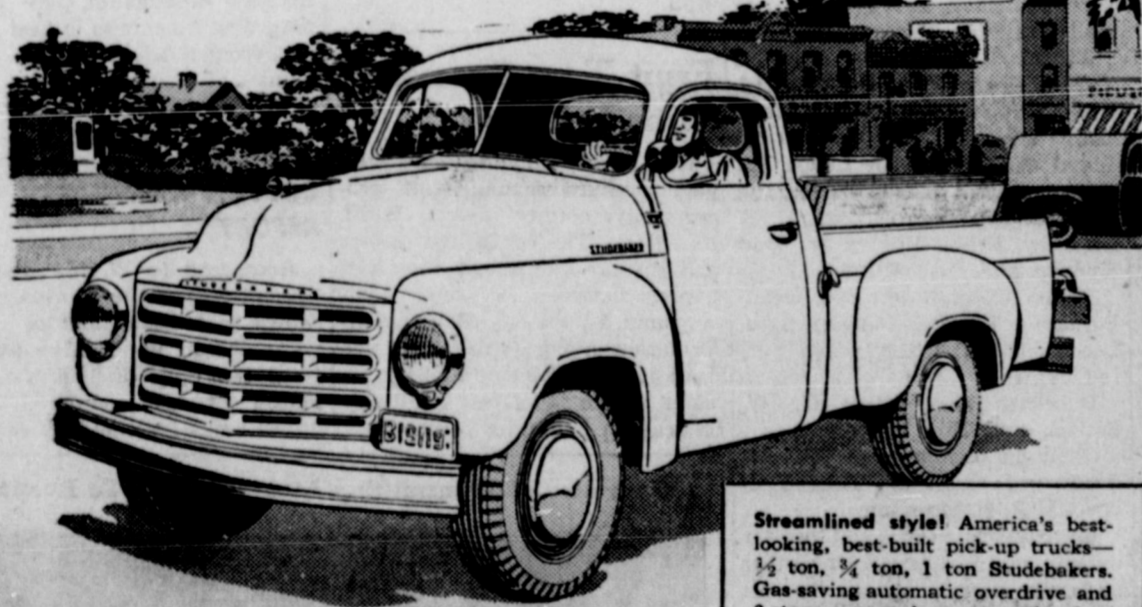

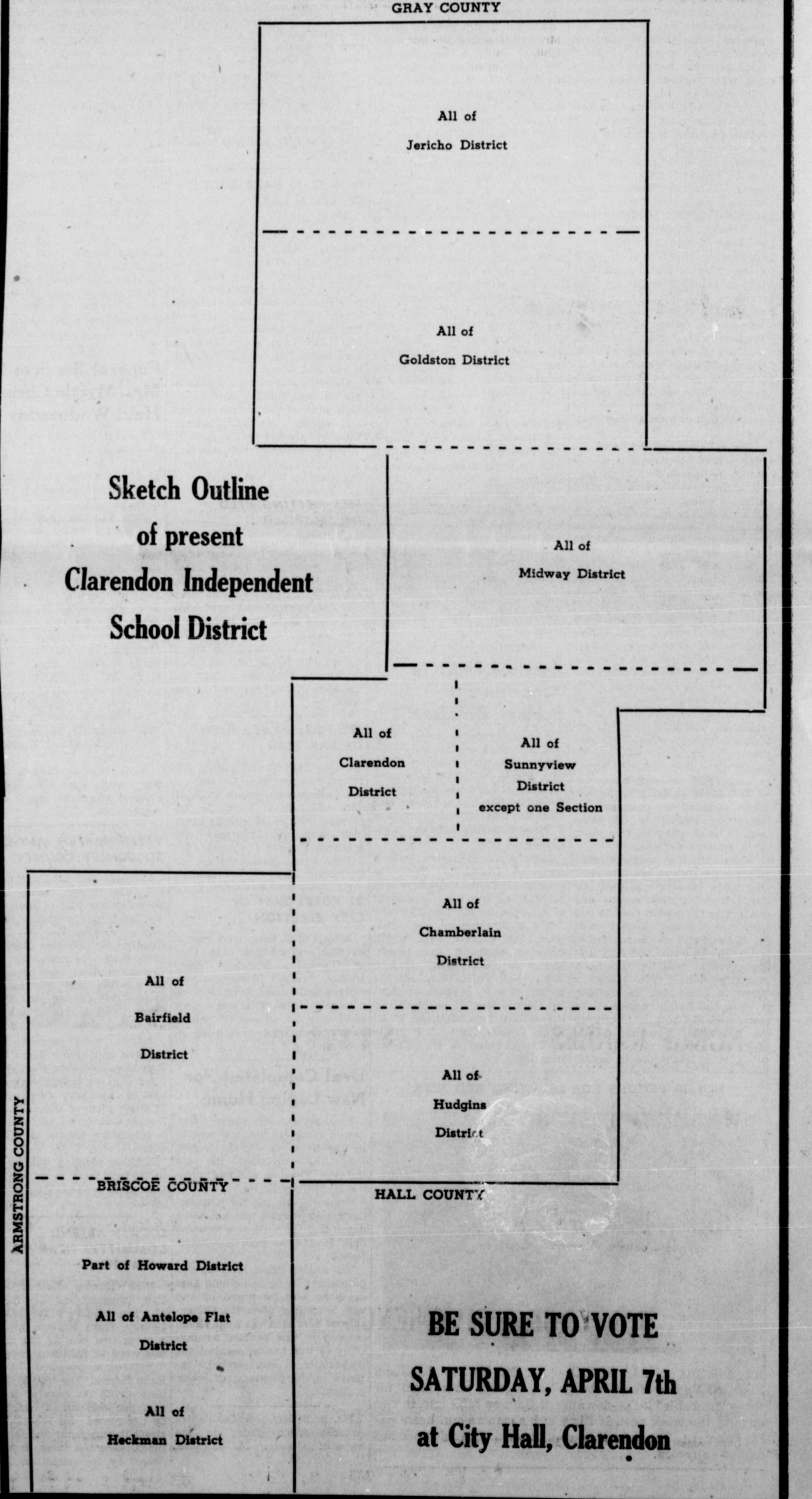

Subscribe \$116,600 In "Living Endowment"

PLAINVIEW—Friends of Wayland College here have subscribed \$116,600 in "Living Endowment" since the college's new financial drive began, according to a statement released here today by C. G. Sewell, assistant to the president of Wayland.

"Living Endowment" is accepted by accrediting agencies as the equivalent of capital endowment, Mr. Sewell said. Under this plan, an individual receives a certificate for \$1,000, for example, but does not pay the principal — he just pays the equivalent of the interest on this sum, which would be \$40 a year or four per cent of \$1,000.

Most of the amount already subscribed has been pledged by Wayland College students and faculty members. A total of \$35,700 was subscribed by 87 students; 21 faculty members subscribed \$18,200; and 32 other friends of Wayland subscribed \$62,700.

Printed certificates now in use are in the following denominations: \$300, \$500, \$1000, and \$5000. New certificates in larger amounts are now being prepared up to \$100,000.

This plan, designed to bring added income to colleges for current expenses and stabilize finances, already has proved a success at such institutions as Princeton University, Wake Forest College in North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky., Mr. Sewell said.

GUY ALDEN WRIGHT HAS CHANCE FOR FREE TRIP TO CARLSBAD CAVERNS

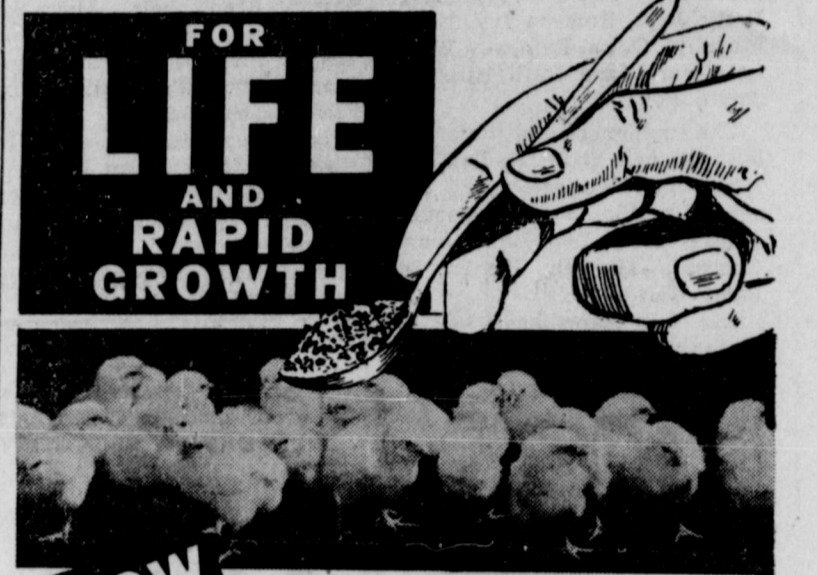

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

GOVERNMENT ECONOMY:

The uprising in the House of Representatives this past week is a mere mild reminder of what is to come. The Appropriations Committee and sub-committees are working day and night to cut every possible dollar off of the non-defense appropriations. Last week the Full House decided that the Committees had not reduced appropriations enough and pared them further. Congressman Gene Cox of Georgia told the House that this action was notice to the

bureaucrats that the "honeymoon" was over. To fully appreciate what these cuts mean, we must understand that they were reductions in the appropriations for basic departments of the Government—Treasury, Post Office, and so forth. This action of cutting these basic departments is a good indication that the many departments that have been established in the last few years can get ready for a good trimming when the appropriations bills get to the floor. One of the sub-committees is doing an excellent job of cutting down the expenses of the military, and I can assure you that the military is not going to get all they are

asking for. They had better get their shop in order to see that every dollar spent shows a full dollar's return. This is not a temporary situation. It is a definite recognition of the need for reduced Government expenditures on a permanent basis. The moving force is the solid bloc of Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats. Our weight is beginning to be felt. We are getting up a full head of steam and you can expect some drastic results.

DEFENSE CONTRACT DISCREPANCIES:

The Congress is already uncovering some bad, if not dishonest, practices in carrying out construction work under defense contracts. There could be a repetition of many things that happened during World War II. For example, on a New York project it was discovered that one man on the payroll was shown to have worked ten hours a day straight for four days, 23 hours and a half each day for the next three days, and then ten hours a day for the following days. The 23 and a half hour days are time and a half and double-time days. Anyone knows that it would be physically impossible for a human being to do this, and this Congress is going to stop that sort of dishonesty, regardless of whose head has to fall. This is just one example and there are a number of others. This sordid type of Treasury robbing is being fully investigated and will be fully aired.

SENATE CRIME INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE:

Lots of publicity—no prosecutions. If this crime investigation is going to be successfully carried out, there must be some prosecutions and some deportations, and these must come before the investigations of the Committee have been forgotten.

It is reliably rumored that some of those on the Government payroll who are conducting and helping conduct these investigations are planning on using the material gathered to write a book. This material has all been gathered at a tremendous expense to the taxpayers and

if it is used by any of these Government people for personal gain purposes, the profits should all go to the Government to help repay the taxpayers for the expense. If this information is used for private gain by the investigators, those investigators should be investigated.

CEILING PRICES:

The city-born and bred officials of the OPS appear dead set on fixing controls on raw cotton and livestock on the hoof. If they carry out these threats, they are going to find that such procedure will amount to production control, rather than price control. What this country needs is a few good sound level-headed farmers and ranchers in some of those official positions.

Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn appointed me as Speaker Pro Tempore during a part of one of the recent sessions. Needless to say, I was quite overwhelmed by the honor. It would be impossible to express in words the deep emotional feeling and the sense of responsibility one has in presiding over the greatest representative body in the history of the world.

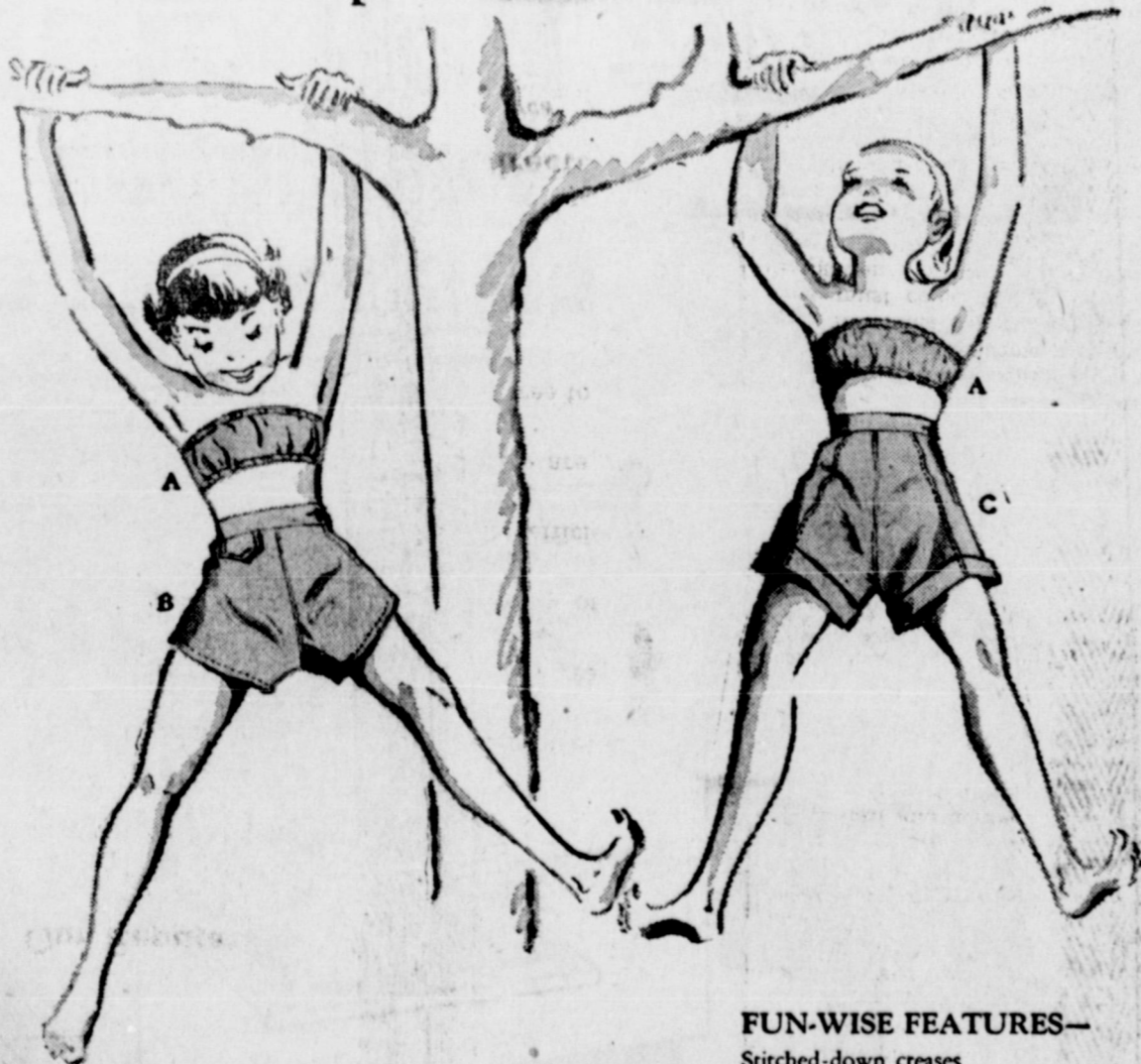
