south of Clyde, for three years. Holding a B. A. degree from Mc-Murry College and an M. A. degree from Hardin-Simmons University, he has studied at various educational institutions throughout the state. While he has been in Baird

Mr. South has taken an active part in the city's civic affairs. He is a member of the First Methodist Church, serving on the board of stewards and is superintendent of the Sunday school. He is a member of the Callahan County Club and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, as well as being affiliated with the Masonic and Odd Fellows lodges. During the past year Mr. South was a delegate from this district to the State Teachers Association, He belongs to the Oil Belt Teachers Association, the Callahan County Teachers Association, and is chairman of football district number six, of which Baird is a member.

Mr. South was chosen to be the Roscoe superintendent from a field of twenty-five candidates, and was given a three year contract. In an interview with a Star reporter, he expressed his deepest gratitude to the people of Baird and Callahan county for their wonderful support through the years. Many people of Baird and throughout the vicinity regret their going, but our loss is Roscoe's gain, and their many friends wish them well in that new field.



WAR IN THE HOLY LAND

The outbreak of host lities in the co-called Holy Land would not be surprising as Arabs and Jews organize for battle to determine their respective rights in Palestine. On the sidelines, the British maintain a considerable body of troops, most of them war veterans anxious to get back home.

One newspaper correspondent asserts that both Arabs and Jews have plenty of arms, equipment and munitions. In Palestine, the forces are somewhat even, according to this writer, but there is the chance that the Arab league will back the Arabs of Palestine. This means heavy reinforcements for the Arabs.

The question nautrally arises whether the Hebrews have any likely source of outside assistance. That millions of their racial brothers in the United States will send them money and give them whatever assistance they can seems assured. In addition, the powerful pressure groups of the organized Jews in this country will demand that the United States intervene in the struggle if the going proves tough for their brothers in Palestine.

It might be just as well for the people of the United States, and this includes every reader of this article, to understand that it is none of the business of this country to send soldiers to Palestine for the purpose of protecting Jews or Arabs. It is none of our business to expend money or lives, as a nation, for the purpose of establishing the supremacy of any race in this area.

INDONESIANS KILL CHINESE

Here's an item of news that may interest some Americans who have been greatly concerned over the demands of the Indonesians for self-government.

In the Taagerang, a stream of Chinese refuges fled to escape the depredations of an Indonesian mob, which had been slaughtering Chines and putting the torch to their villages.

The government sent a delegation from Batavia to determine whether the mob had "tired of its violence" and an air patrol reported that the burning of villages had ceased. A group of 500 Chinese refugees recently reached the lines of the Netherlands troops, having escaped in darkness. They reported that other Chinese were beseiged and fighting for their lives.

DOES HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF?

Secretary of the Treasurer Fred M. Vinson, in a commencement address, points out that "history repeats itself to the extent that it does only because man, with his limitations, acts and thinks in such manner that he repeats his mistakes."

INNOCENT WOMAN SERVES TERM

somewhat strange case comes from Connecticut, where a 54-year-old woman has been cleared of responsibility for a killing which she confessed and for which she served more than two years in prison.

Her attorney says that the woman, awaiting trial on a charge of murder, confessed to a manslaughter charge and accepted a ten-to-fifteen-year sentence in order to be sure that she would not be convicted of murder and sent to the chair.

THE DIFFERENCE

The end of the war in Europe and in Japan has produced the unusual spectacle of the victor nations putting on trial the leaders of the defeated enemy peoples.

We have pointed out before that the example is likely to be followed at the end of any other war. Regardless of what motives may impel nations to fight in the future, it can be ammused, we are afraid, that the victors will take advantage of their success to punish the defeated political, military and economic leaders.

At the trial of the German leaders at Nuremberg, a British attorney questioned Colonel-General Alfred Jodl, former German Chief of Staff, about his conscience "if Germany had not lost the war." The defendant admitted that nothing would have been heard about it but added that we would have heard of other atrocities in a similar trial."

We do not imagine that all soldiers of the Allied Armies, or that all individuals in the Army of the United States, were entirely innocent of wrong-doing in the prosecution of the recent struggle. In fact, we Los Angeles, a cousin of the Earlie Hurst. have heard some stories which do not reflect credit upon the honor of the United States.

Nevertheless, such incidents have always reflected the misbehavior of individuals, which is to be expected in any large group of men or women, and have never reflected a deliberate policy of brutality, cruelty and inhumanity on the part of the Allied Governments.

We should not overlook the difference.

should serve to correct erroneous thinking on the part of people who are inclined to accept half-truths as inevitable truth.

Mr. Vinson points out that we can control our course and that if we do not repeat there is no chance whatever of history repeating, or seeming to repeat, itself. This is very much to the point in connection with the attitude that has developed in this country in connection with problems arising from World War II.

There is no doubt, in our opinion, that the greatest menace to the peace, prosperity and welfare of the United States in the future is the apparent trend of public opinion along lines that were pursued after World War I. In that course lies the inevitable seed of future conflicts, the beginning of a tremendous inflation and the certainty of an inflationary explosion which will produce a depression unequalled in the past.

NO PEACE IN EUROPE

The British Foreign Secretary has added his voice to those trying to explain the perilous position in which the victors over Germany find themselves today, as the Soviet Union follows a strictly unilateral course, seemingly negative in results unless the other nation accept the Moscow thesis.

Mr. Bevin pointed out that Russian ideas of democracy and security constitute a great obstacle to peace. The Communists assume, he said, that the Russian method alone represents democracy and that Russian security depends upon the adoption of the Soviet system by all other countries. Bluntly, the Labor minister warns that

his country will not accept the rule of one party or of one nation that "we shall never get peace if that goes on." He appealed to Soviet leaders to reconsider rejection of the American plan for a four-power pact to control German armaments, saying it was a great opportunity and that "if you value peace above all else, do not miss it: it may never come again." The British spokesman denied that there was any Anglo-American bloc but insisted that the state of war cannot go on forever

and announced that unless progress on peace treaties can be made at the conference of leaders this month his government would insist upon submitting the disputed

CAN TIPPING BE ABOLISHED?

The Pere Marquette Railway has announced that tipping has been banned on its dining cars and that the management has arranged to compensate waiters for any financial loss.

President R. J. Bowman says that this tyranny of custom is already too deeprooted" and expressed the hope that the experiment of his Company will "lead to trend that will result in much larger relief for the harrassed traveler.'

The abolition of tipping is, no doubt, a desirable goal and the railroad manage-ment is to be congratulated on its willingness to provide compensation for waiters to protect them from any loss due to the abolition of the custom. Nevertheless, we are inclined to believe that many of the travelers may continue to tip surreptitiously, in order to secure, or because they think they will secure, an advantage over the other passengers.

In certain of the service trades, the custom of tipping has become almost a part of the price, with the result that a nontipping customer gets poor service and a compliment of dirty looks. This is an undesirable condition but we are inclined to believe that it will continue as long as those engaged in performing service for the public hold the palm open for gratuities. There will always be customers ready to put out the extra money.
