



THE RIGHT TO ELECT

The people of the United States have exercised the perogative of the free by casting their ballots for the election of public officials. They have made changes in their representation and, in many instancs, have replaced officials by the power of their sufferage. A general acceptance of the results by victorious and defeated candidates and their supporters, is something to be thankful for.

The average American apparently takes for granted the right to participate in the choosing of representatives and officials. In fact, we seem to take it for granted that the ballot box is a cure-all for our ills, social, economic and political. We cheerfully assume that the public interest has been protected and that everything is well because everybody had the right to vote, regardless of whether the votes were cast or

We should realize that the efficacy of the ballot depends upon the interest of the average American and, more than interest, upon the fidelity of the average American, in casting his vote, to the principles of selfgovernment, upon which this Republic was founded. While there are many instances where this is not apparent, the results accomplished by our election machinery in the decades that have passed indicate that the people get about the government that they deserve.

It should be observed that the development of political parties in the United States and the course of political campaigns has tended to accentuate the selfish interests of voters. Whether this factor has increased in the country remains to be set-tled. The opinion that it has may rest largely upon our inability to adequately compare present-day elections with those that were

held in the past. Weighing the American system of elections in the scales of fair judgment, one is bound to conclude that it seems to be equal to any now operating on the earth. That it will be more responsive to the ideals and principles that stir average Americans is one of the certainties of the future. What the ideals and principles may be, however, is a matter of considerable speculation.

ARMISTICE DAY THOUGHTS

On November 11th, the people of the United States will celebrate Armistice Day, the official holiday set up to commemorate the end of the first World War.

The struggle which began when the armies of the Kaiser marched into Berlin was not considered an American affair at the beginning. Gradually, the significance of the great struggle dawned upon the people of this country, and, despite a considerable minority of dissenters, the nation took up the gage of battle and sent millions of young men to the continent of Europe.

Since the end of the first World War, the people of the United States have gradually realized that the interests of this country are affected by any struggle or such a nature. The developments of industry and science have immeasurably decreased the size of the globe and, regardless of past isolationism, there are few Americans who do not realize that the fate of the United States, as a free nation, can be decided by the outcome of a conflict on other contin-


