## REV. COCKERELL TO PARTICIPATE IN STATE-WIDE CAMPAIGN

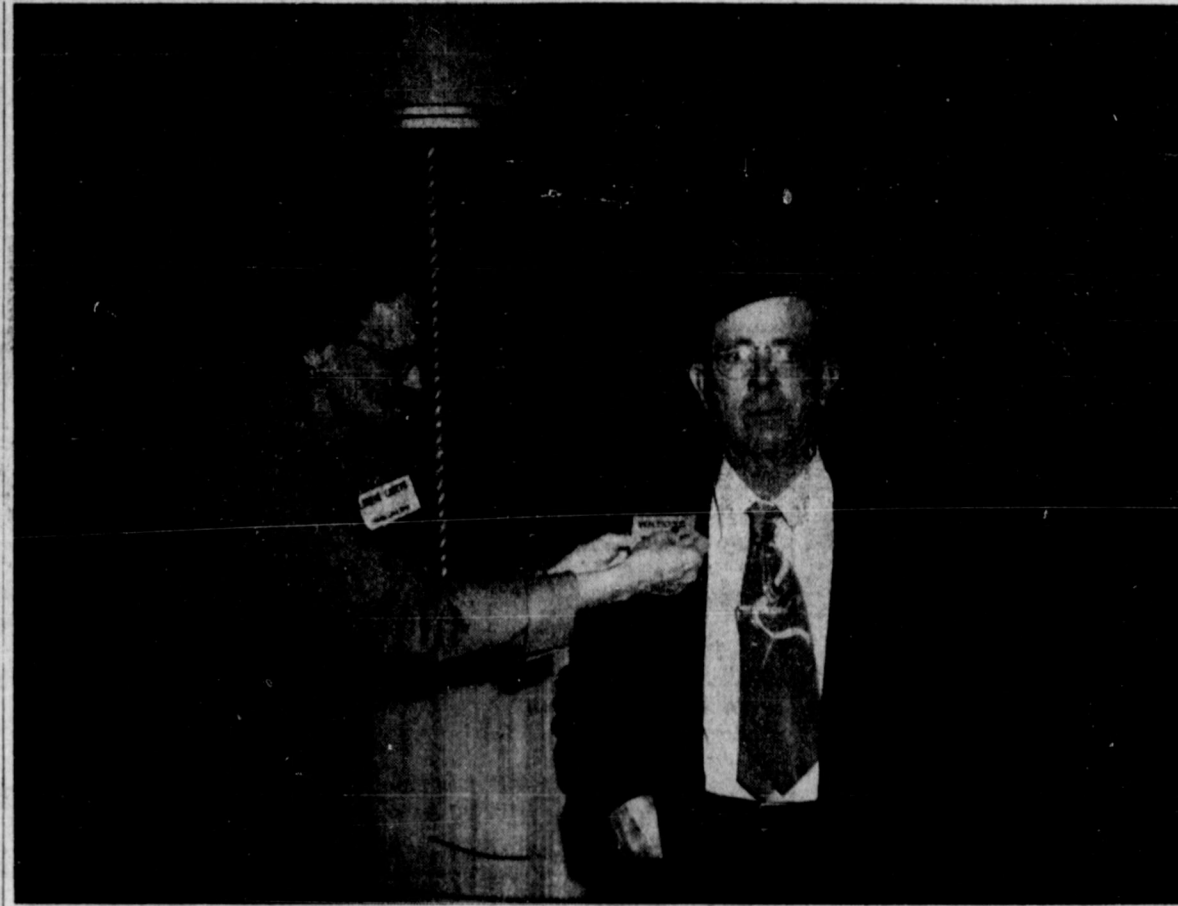

The young bulls alone were valued at from \$500 to \$1000 each.

## Federal Land Bank of Houston Holds Eighth Annual Stockholders' Meeting Feb. 19-20

Mr. W. H. Moss of Hedley, Texas, Vice-President of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association, has recently returned from Houston. He was the official representative of this association to the Eighth Annual Stockholders' Meeting of The Federal Land Bank of Houston held on February 19 and 20, 1953. He reported that the bank made the largest volume of farm mortgage loans to Texas farmers and ranchers in 1952 than any year since its organization in 1917, with one exception. This exception was in 1934 during the depression period. Officers of the bank stated during the meeting that the 1953 volume of loans promises to exceed that of 1952 if the first six weeks of this year can be used as a guide. It is also anticipated that many loans will be made during the year for the purpose of financing the restocking of ranches and stock farms with livestock. The increased demand for loans has been brought about, according to Mr. Moss, for several reasons. The primary reason apparently is the fact that the average net cost of Land Bank loans is probably lower than that of any other mortgage lender in the State. Also many short-term loans, created by reason of the drought throughout much of Texas, are now being refinanced on a long-term basis on account of the opportunity of reducing the rate of interest on these loans which can be repaid at any time without penalty. The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by the 141 Texas national farm loan associations. The associations, which are owned by local farmers and ranchers, in turn own all of the capital stock of the bank. Mr. Moss feels that inasmuch as the loan services of the bank are handled in the field by these associations, it is having a marked influence on this increase in volume of business. Under such a plan, local people do business with homefolks who understand local conditions and personally know the people with whom they are doing business. The local association is located in the Mulkey Theatre Building in Clarendon. The officers and directors of the association are as follows: J. R. Gillham, President; W. H. Moss, Vice-President; C. B. Morris, Director; F. J. Hommel, Director; Alva T. Simmons, Director; Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary-Treasurer; and Mrs. Juanita Phelps, Office Assistant.

## Two Announce For School Board

An election will be held at the City Hall, Clarendon, Texas, on the first Saturday in April, same date being April 4, 1953, for the purpose of electing three trustees for the Clarendon Ind. School District to serve a term of 3 years. The three members of the Board whose term of office expires this April are George Thompson Jr., present Vice-President of the Board; Walter B. Knorrp, present Secretary of the Board, and J. Alfred McMurtry. Knorrp's name has been petitioned in to seek re-election and he has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election to the Board. McMurtry has also announced that he will seek re-election. Thompson, who has recently been elected to the office as Chief Rabban of Khiva Temple, states that he will not be a candidate. Thompson was appointed to the Board in January of 1949 to fill an unexpired term of office until April, 1950, and was then elected to the Board for a term of three years. Both Knorrp and McMurtry have served on the School Board since elected to the position in April of 1950. Deadline for filing for names to be placed on the ballot is ten days prior to the date of election. Announcements for school trustee candidate can be made through the School Business Office.

**Enrollment "Bulge" From World War II Births Now Entering Junior High Schools**

AUSTIN—The enrollment "bulge" resulting from a booming World War II birthrate which has had Texas elementary schools bursting at the seams is now moving into the junior high schools. It will soon hit the high schools and by 1960 will be the most serious problem faced by the colleges and universities of the state, according to a study just completed by the Council of College Presidents of State-Supported Colleges and Universities.

Eight years from now the college freshman crop will include the tremendous baby crop of 1942, and college presidents in Texas are beginning to worry about how this problem can be met without "short-changing" these young Texans on the quality of their college education.

Texas colleges have just completed the digestion of a comparatively minor bulge created by the veterans of World War II and have some basis on which to anticipate the problems that lie ahead. Now a much more serious enrollment boom is obviously on

its way. It is based on the tremendously increased Texas birthrate, starting in 1942, which provided the increase in our public school enrollment in the past few years and will inevitably provide huge numbers of high school graduates in 1959 and 1960.

This year the number of entering freshmen in Texas colleges and universities increased by more than 3 per cent. Each year hereafter, on the basis of the rising birthrate 18 years before, it may be expected to increase steadily, until 1960, when it will jump out of all proportion. It is conservatively estimated that by 1963 the number of students clamoring at the gates of Texas' institutions of higher learning will be nearly 40 per cent higher than the number who entered this year.

With this certainty facing them Texas college administrators are taking a long hard look at their facilities and staffs to determine what must be done to meet this influx of students. The legislature in 1947 provided for expansion of facilities in the Texas system of state-supported institutions of higher education, with the exception of Texas Southern University, Lamar Technical College and the medical and dental units of the University of Texas, through a constitutional amendment submitted to the people and approved that year.

Maintenance of present plants and of staffs needed to instruct these mounting numbers is another matter. During the hectic period of the veteran boom and in the money-short days since present buildings have suffered seriously as repairs have been neglected. The state institutions have estimated that it will require \$4,000,000 for improvement and repairs of present buildings to

put their campuses in first class condition. In addition, their expanding physical plants must be maintained. Texas now has \$80,000,000 invested in its state college and university buildings and improvements, not counting such self-sustaining structures as dormitories. At the accepted cost of 2% a year for maintenance, this will require another \$1,600,000 a year. Breaking down the cost of bringing the plants into condition over a five-year period and adding the cost of maintenance would require \$2,400,000 a year for the next five years.

Physical facilities must be matched with competent and adequate staffs. In the current low of enrollments teaching staffs have been reduced as low as they can without seriously affecting the efficiency of instruction. These staffs must be maintained as a nucleus around which larger staffs can be built as the enrollments increase, the college administrators point out. Salaries must be adjusted to stop the loss of top faculty members to industry and to schools of other states and must be sufficiently attractive to secure the services of competent teachers as additions are required to meet enrollment increases.

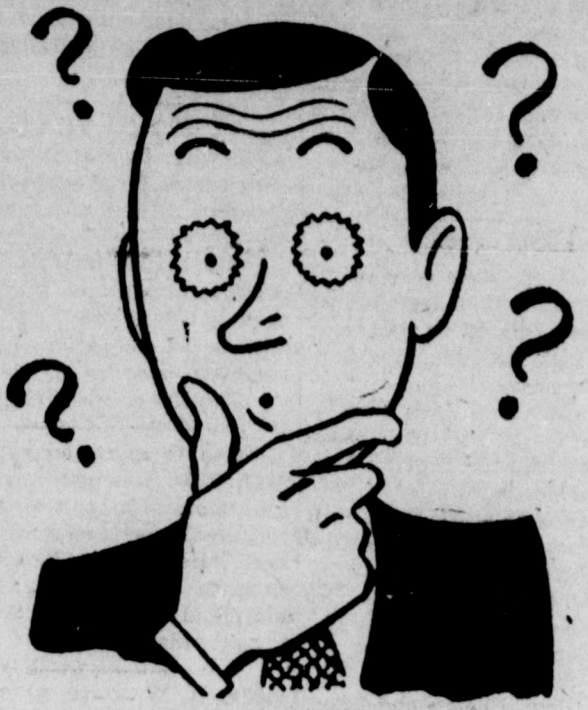

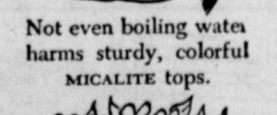

### Texas Farm Bureau Will Sponsor Queen Contest

The Texas Farm Bureau will give recognition to the beauty, charm and vivaciousness of farm and ranch girls this year by sponsoring a state-wide Queen Contest, according to President J. Walter Hammond.

Top prize for the winner who will be selected in November at the annual convention in Mineral Wells is an all-expense paid trip to the national convention in December in Chicago. The Farm Bureau will also pay the expenses of a matron escort.

The board announced that the contest will be an "honest-to-goodness" Queen Contest and not just a bathing beauty competition. The entrants will be judged on three main points: (1) appearance, (2) poise and (3) personality.

The purpose of the contest is to give the young ranch and farm girls and other young people an opportunity to become better acquainted with the principles of the Farm Bureau organization.

After County Farm Bureau Queens are chosen they will compete in district eliminations. One girl from each district will compete at the state convention for state beauty crown.

Here are the rules as approved by a special Queen Contest committee: To be eligible a girl must be: (1) daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member, (2) single, the right to buy farms under the 1, 1953, and not over 22 on Sept. 1, 1953. Counties must have over 25 Farm Bureau members, and must sponsor a contest before a girl from the county can enter the district eliminations.

Daughters of state directors, employees, county officers and county directors are not eligible to enter this contest.

District winners will receive beautiful watches and an expense-paid trip for the girl and attendant to the state convention. The state Queen and her matron escort will be allowed \$500.00 expenses to attend the national convention.

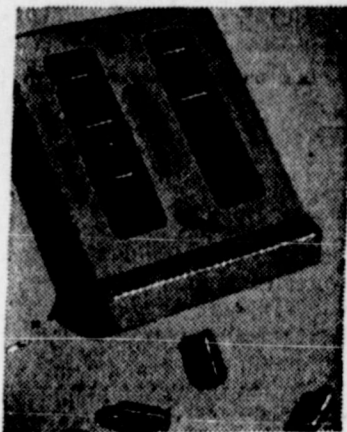

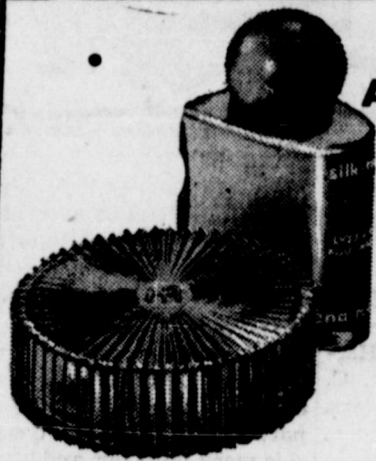

"All hay except for a few late orders has been shipped by the counties not later than March 6th. This is a notice we received from the State Office in Monday's mail. All of you producers who have not been notified that your hay is here or will be here this week, should come to the County Office and ask for refund of your deposit if you have put up a deposit for hay that you have not received.

PRACTICE 32, "Turning under

or leaving on the land a satisfactory stand and growth of rye seeded in the fall of 1953." \$2.00 per acre.

**SPECIFICATIONS:**  
This practice is applicable only to irrigated land or to land that the county committee determines is subject to wind erosion.

Rye should be seeded at the rate of not less than 60 pounds per acre. A stand and growth that would justify harvesting as a feed crop must be obtained. The crop must be left on the land or turned under. Volunteer crops and acreages harvested for hay or grain will not qualify.

**SECRETARY BENSON URGES COTTON FARMERS TO AVOID OVER-PRODUCTION IN 1953**

Reminding cotton farmers that too big a crop this year would result in production and marketing controls for 1954, as well as a depressing effect on prices. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson issued a statement regarding the cotton situation.

"The good cotton crops of the past two years have supplied the needs for domestic consumption and exports," said the Secretary, "and they have also rebuilt reserve supplies. Export demand has also been falling off from the levels of recent years. It will therefore not be necessary, or desirable, for farmers to produce as big a crop this year. A production of 12 to 12.5 million bales now appears to be desirable in 1953.

The interests of cotton farmers—individually and collectively—call for sensible adjustments in 1953 plantings. Too much cotton would simply pile up stock which

would not be needed, even for carry-over reserve, and would depress the market.

About one third of Donley County's quota in the annual fund raising campaign for the American Red Cross was contributed by downtown merchants in the first few hours of the drive, it was announced today by Kelly Chamberlain, county chairman of the fund drive.

Robert Copeland, and Bill Riney have contacted almost every business firm since the start of the drive on Monday. Letters requesting donations have been mailed to residents not represented in the downtown area. Since there will be no house-to-house canvassing in the residential district this year, those receiving the letters are urged by Mr. Chamberlain to make use of the enclosed envelopes at their earliest convenience so that the drive can be closed with dispatch.

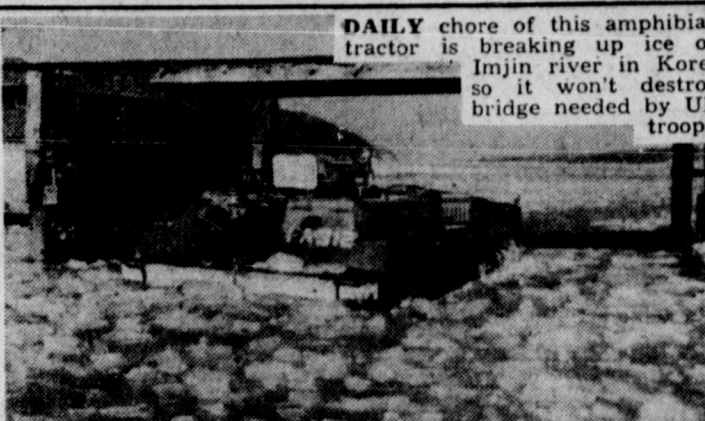

**Seniors To Operate Two Service Stations Here Saturday**

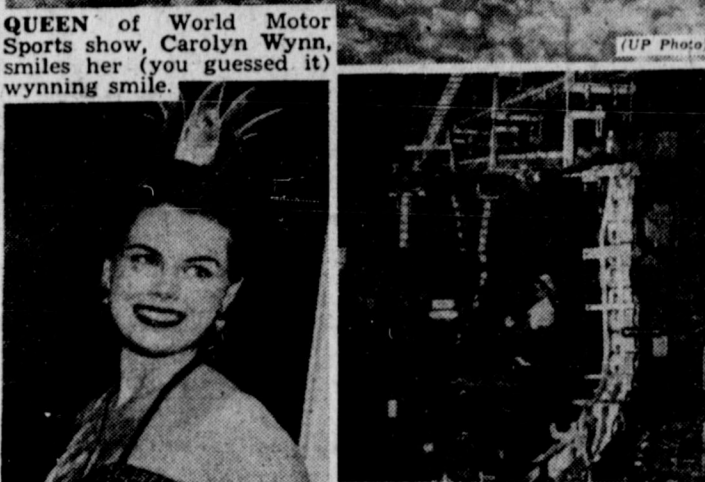

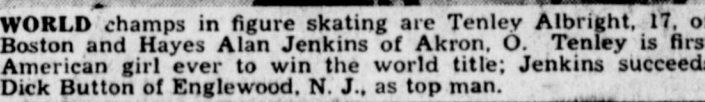

Senate Bill No. 164

A BILL  
TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT requiring the preparation and publication of an annual financial statement for each school district, junior college district, soil conservation district, road district, or any district organized under Section 52 of Article III or Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas; repealing conflicting laws; and declaring an emergency.  
BE IT ENACTED BY THE

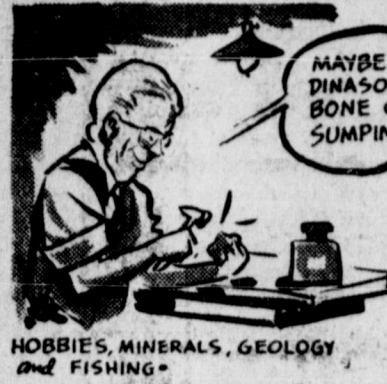
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The governing body of each school district, junior college district, road district, soil conservation district, water improvement district, water control and improvement district, fresh water supply district, drainage district, navigation district, river authority, conservation and reclamation district, or any other kind of district organized under Section 52 of Article III or Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas shall cause to be prepared an annual financial statement showing the total receipts of each fund subject to its orders during the fiscal year, itemized according to source, such as taxes, assessments, service charges, grants of State money, gifts, or any other general source from which such funds are derived; showing total disbursements of such funds, itemized according to the nature of the expenditure; and showing the balance on hand in each fund at the close of the fiscal year. The presiding officer of such governing body shall cause such financial statement to be published in some newspaper in each county in which the district or any part thereof is located, once each week for three successive weeks, and the publication shall be made within two months after the close of the fiscal year. If there is no newspaper published in the county, then the publication shall be made in a newspaper in an adjoining county.

SEC. 2. All laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SEC. 3. The fact that the citizens residing in the various districts are entitled to know how the public funds are being spent creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each house be suspended, and said rule is hereby suspended, and that this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

### Internal Revenue Information

Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., said today that numerous married persons in his district are erroneously using "Head of Household" rates in preparing their 1952 individual income tax returns.

The "Head of Household" tax rate, Director Campbell explained, is available only to unmarried persons under those circumstances described in the Form 1040 Instructions, and provides for tax benefits approximating

one-half those received by a married couple filing jointly and taking advantage of the split-income computation. Unmarried persons qualify for the "Head of Household" tax rate when they meet the statutory requirements as outlined on page 4 of the official Instructions accompanying Form 1040.

Taxpayers claiming the benefit of "Head of Household" status should not use Form 1040A but should file on Form 1040.

The use of the special rates by taxpayers not entitled to the status of "Heads of Household"

results in errors entailing costly correction procedures, Director Campbell said.

# DONLEY COUNTY CONSUMERS

The House of Representatives is fast approaching the time when each of us will be putting in longer hours here on the floor, and all committee hearings that have been held in the afternoons will be moved up for night hearings. The chief problem facing us will be time for thorough study of bills that have to be decided on by vote in the House each day; also, there is the item of getting enough sleep. There are some very vital issues facing us and we feel that it is our duty and desire to solve them in a way that will be for the best interest of my district. With this in mind I want to point out several bills that will confront us within a very few days.

House Bills 19 by Sellers, 20 by Hall, 78 by Burkett, and 179 by Zivley, all call for repealing the Vehicle Inspection Law. House Bill 39 by Buchanan calls for amending the Vehicle Inspection Law. Correspondence from my district in regard to these bills has been very light and a check made of the attitude shows the same percentage for as against. There has not been sufficient request which I could use as a mandate from the people, thus far. This also is true in regard to House Bill 210 by Chambers, which calls for repealing the Driver's Financial Responsibility Law.

House Bill 261 by Abington and

Smith is a long bill with many provisions. The most important and controversial provisions are as follows: The Bill would abolish the present Industrial Accident Board and substitute an agency known as 'Workmen's Compensation Board. The Board's findings will be final as regards facts, and these findings will not be reviewable by a court so long as there is substantial evidence to support the findings. This would eliminate all jury trials. The effect of this is to put considerably more authority in the Board than it now has, and prevents the jury and the courts from investigating the facts surrounding the injured and the estimate of injury. The court will be bound by the facts that were presented at the time of the hearing before the Board. This bill was referred to the committee on State Affairs.

I introduced House Concurrent Resolution No. 25, which sets up a committee with powers and instructions to make its report at least 30 days before the next Legislature convenes in 1955. This committee will be charged with the responsibility of re-codifying all of the existing statutes, pertaining to the public free school system of Texas, eliminating conflicts, ambiguities and inconsistencies. It is also to eliminate repeats and obsolete enactments. This re-write job of the school laws in my mind is long overdue and will be welcomed by the school people of this state as well as those who are called upon to interpret the law for them. This committee will be composed of seven members with a modest appropriation of \$25,000 to do the job. Comments from school people are really coming

to my desk highly favorable to this piece of legislation. Another bill which I expect to introduce next Monday will be given in next week's column. The people in our area will be interested in it also.

Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, is gaining in support for his race as Speaker of the House for the next session of the Legislature which convenes in 1955. Mr. Carr comes from our area in West Texas, and has the background, training and definite understanding of West Texas problems. West Texas will be fortunate indeed, to have a man of his type as Speaker of the House. A fellow West Texan has not been so honored.

## Internal Revenue Information

Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., has some advice for small businessmen who are currently experiencing difficulty in computing their Federal income tax because they have not kept adequate permanent records. The task of preparing tax returns, Director Campbell says, is especially burdensome for those businessmen who do not keep adequate records, and his office receives many inquiries each year from small businessmen, professional men, and farmers, asking what kind of records should be maintained by them.

Internal Revenue regulations do not prescribe in detail the type of records to be kept, the Director points out. What is important, he says, is that a systematic record be maintained—one that is sufficient to establish the amount of the gross income and the deduc-

tions, credits, and other matters required to be shown in any return.

To know his business income, the taxpayer must know what sales or receipts he has had, and what costs and expenses he has incurred. Any system of records or books, then, that contains information about all receipts and expenses is considered adequate the Director says.

Many small merchants and professional men have found a simple method of record keeping. They use a column-lined sheet of paper and head the columns with the classification of expenses used in tax Schedule C. "Profit or Loss from Business or Profession," a form they are required to

file annually. Many farmers prepare a similar set of records by using the classifications shown on Form 1040F, "Schedule of Farm Income and Expenses," which they are required to file.

A good practice is to summarize these sheets each month, so that at the end of the taxable year, the taxpayer has only to add the 12 monthly totals and enter the resulting totals on his tax return.

The advantage of this system is that such a record, together with the supporting vouchers, cancelled checks, etc., is easily checked if an audit of the return is made.

Some people get the point too soon and therefore never learn anything.

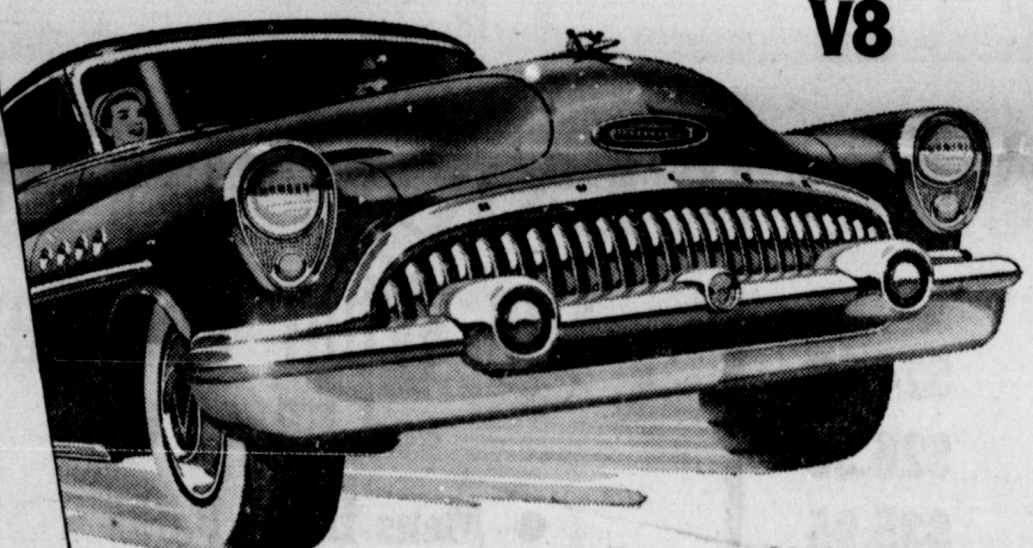

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Abolishing gasoline tax refunds would provide for a perpetual farm-to-market highway fund and give \$4 million a year more for schools.

Chairman E. H. Thornton Jr. of the Texas Highway Commission made that assertion as he prepared an analysis of the state's

road situation for presentation to the Legislature.

Gasoline tax refunds go to those using the fuel for non-highway purposes. Last year refunds amounted to \$15,367,000 of \$120,244,000 collected. Most of the refunds go to farmers who use gasoline for farm vehicles and machines.

Thornton is asking for an additional \$100 million per year to

bring Texas highways up to the highest standard and maintain them for the next 10 years.

The highway commission has a new member, former Senator Marshall Formby of Hereford, who succeeds Fred Wemple of Midland. The third member is R. J. Potts of Harlingen.

The highway problem is a fore most one in the Legislature, and many proposals have been made to solve it. Governor Allan Shivers has asked the Legislature to add at least one cent a gallon to the gasoline tax to furnish additional money.

One cent per gallon would bring the state \$25 million per year.

Another plan was put forward by Representative Charles Murphy of Houston, sponsor of a constitutional amendment requiring all highway user taxes to go for road building, maintenance, and policing.

Should the amendment be passed by the Legislature and ratified by the voters, the schools would lose their share of the gasoline tax revenue. They now get one-fourth of it.

Both Houses of the Legislature struggled with the highly controversial auto inspection law—the one that requires you to have that little yellow sticker on the windshield of your car.

Senator Carlos Ashley of

Llano typified opponents of the law who want it repealed. Ashley thinks the law is discriminatory in that it works a hardship on lower income bracket people who cannot afford extensive repairs on their cars.

Accidents, Ashley contends, are caused, not by defective automobiles primarily, but by drunk drivers and speeders.

The senator argued that poor people in his native hill country make a living hauling cedar posts in slow-moving trucks that wouldn't pass inspection in a junk yard.

"Why should they have to pass a windshield wiper inspection when they don't have windshields?" Ashley wanted to know. Senator John Bell of Cuero, on the other hand, worked to retain the bill and modify it so that the safety sticker would not be a requisite to purchase of an automobile license.

Bell also would specify what particular parts of the car would have to be examined to get the inspection tag. Bell and others believe that the law, if retained, will cut down on highway deaths.

The chances that horse racing

will return to Texas seem slight. Representative Ed Sheridan of San Antonio introduced a bill to legalize pari-mutuel betting, but when the time came for a committee hearing on the measure, Sheridan said he was willing to postpone the whole thing.

Stout opposition to the bill had been gathering, and Sheridan said he wanted to "let it cool." Observers here doubted it would cool enough to let the bill pass.

Quick action was needed, Governor Shivers said, to provide for 900 tuberculosis patients who are now being treated at Weaver H. Baker Hospital at Mission.

The Air Force will take over the hospital on July 1.

Bills to provide for the patients passed the Senate, but moved slowly in the House.

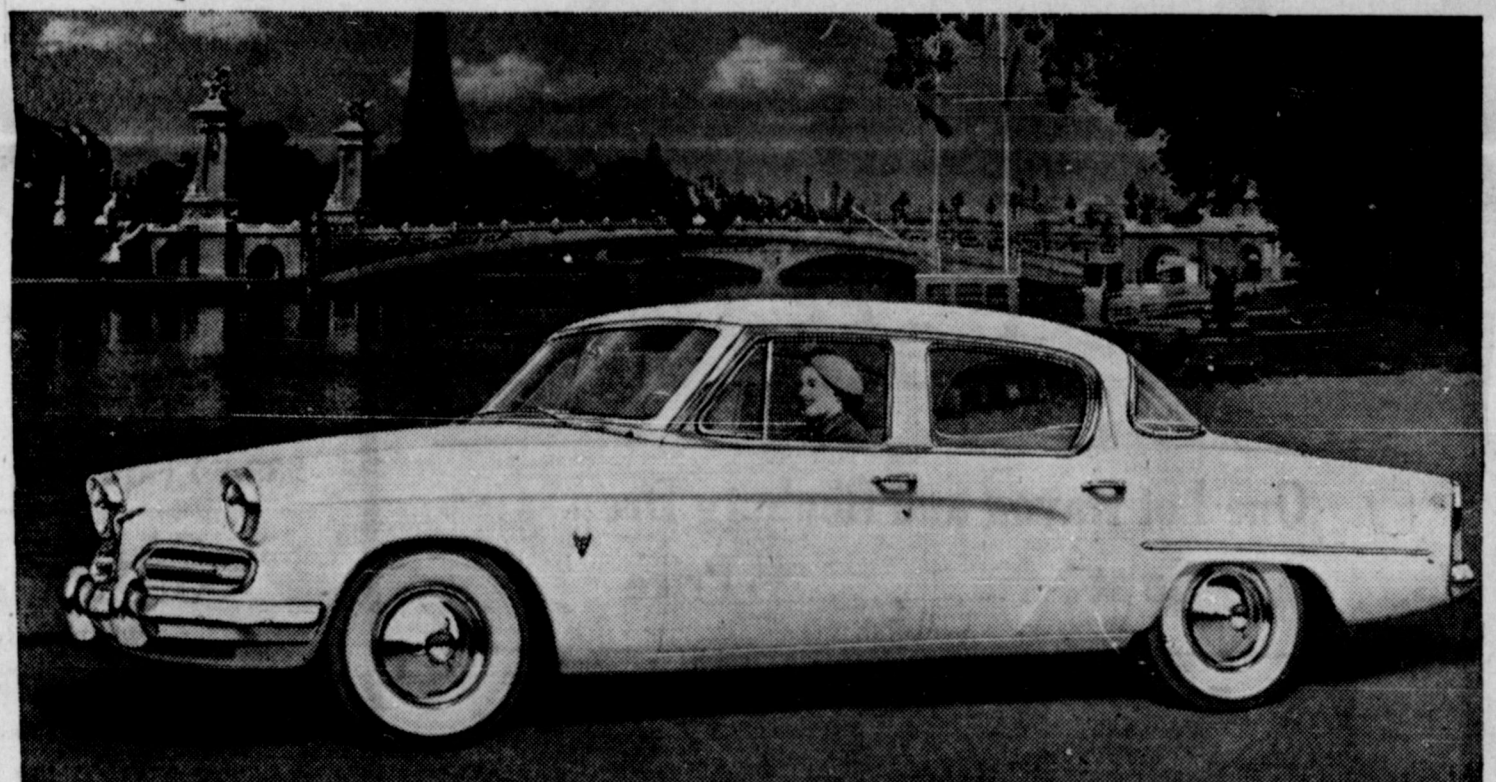

Andy Rogers Sez!

This past week has been a great one for "the little man." It is doubtful if the present legislature will do anything for him, but some mighty nice things were said about him.

In the House of Representatives, dignified, silver-haired (and silver-tongued) Representative Tom Cheatham of Cuero led

the old-fashioned oratory. During past sessions this veteran legislator has been presented by his colleagues with a quaint little doll figure symbolizing "the little man," whom Cheatham so vigorously defends.

This time Cheatham was incensed over a bill that would prohibit hunting deer with a .22 caliber rifle.

"Poor people like to eat deer meat just like the big boys," the rancher-Representative said. "The big boys can go out with whiskey and cigars and get them a deer with their big cannons. The little fellows can't afford to hunt with cannons."

The author of the bill claims many deer are crippled by low-caliber rifles and wander off to die and are wasted.

The "little mans friend" won the bill suffered a 63-32 defeat.

Then, to show that argument costs money, Representative John Crosthwait of Dallas, an accountant, jumped up and told fellow House members that the time used arguing over .22 rifles had cost the State \$750 in legislative

salaries and expenses.

Many House members were elected with the single-plank platform of repeal of the auto inspection law. This was their first opportunity to howl.

Among other things heard was the cry that the "sticker law" was keeping Pa and Ma from taking their eggs and butter to town.

Both the Senate and the House committees have now acted on this controversial compulsory inspection law. Members are presented with a choice: a bill to repeal the law outright and one to amend it. Actual voting will be held soon.

Also up for committee study was a proposal to enable cities to pay firemen and policemen higher salaries.

In the Senate, a bill to put banks on a five-day week is all but dead. The opposition again cited the case of the average citizen who must work all week and do his banking on Saturday. Several lawyers arguing against this bill claim banks already have authority to close when they want to. And, lawyer-like, others argued this was not so.

Mail carriers told their story this week to the committee considering efforts to make the dog-owner responsible for damages if his dog attacks a mail carrier. Also, this would allow the courts to fine the dog owner \$25 to \$100.

The Presidential Primary bill sponsored by Senator Jimmie Phillips and your Senator received committee approval last week. As soon as possible, we will bring this before the whole Senate for a vote. We will make some need-

ed changes of the bill's present form.

We know the fever is not as high as it was after the sickening and disgraceful conventions last year, but we believe the people still want to make their own choice for president.

The opposition to our bill seems to think the people do not have enough intelligence to make such decisions by themselves.

The Senate seems ready to okay the \$600 pay raise for teachers, but Speaker of the House Reuben Senterfitt has called this

an Appropriation rather than an Education bill. As such, under House rules, it would have to wait until late in the session to be considered. There may be no monies left then.

It would take 100 votes from the 150 members of the House to over-rule their Speaker.

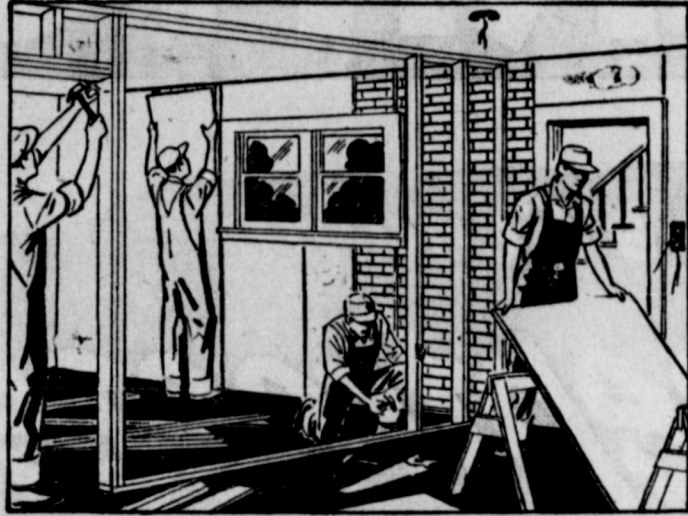

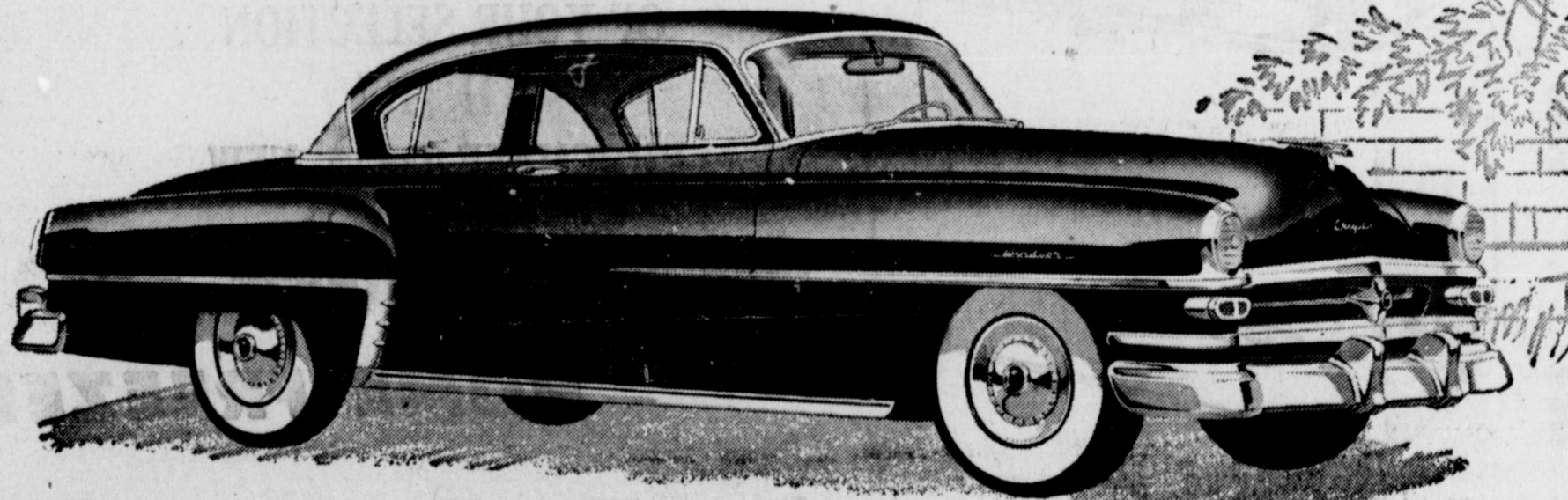

#### NO MAJOR BREAK BETWEEN EISENHOWER AND THE CONGRESS

Despite many predictions to the contrary, I do not look for any major break between the executive and the legislative branches of the government. It is true that there will be many differences in the future, as there have been several already. Those heretofore occurring have been settled without disturbing repercussions. Those occurring in the future can and should be settled in the same manner. There is little doubt that President Eisenhower does not want a running fight with either the House or the Senate. The same is true with a majority of both of the Houses of Congress. The President knows that the Congress will back him all the way in maintaining the defense of this country and in sound economy measures. This is especially true of the Southern bloc. This bloc has not changed its principles in the slightest degree. It makes little difference to the members from the South who or what party might be in control, as this bloc intends to continue in the future, as it has in the past, to vote on the issues as they are presented and to base those votes on sound and basic principles dedicated to the best interests of this nation. President Eisenhower knows this as well as any man who ever served as President.

#### RESTORATION OF THE VALUE OF THE DOLLAR:

Much has been said and written about restoring the value of the dollar. All of this talk sounds good until you begin to analyze the problems involved. Do not expect a speedy increase in the value of the dollar. Such action by any administration under the present circumstances could well prove economically disastrous. The major task at the present time is to stabilize the present value of the dollar and prevent it from sinking lower. When this is done, action can then be begun for a gradual upward trend in its value. This upward trend must consume several years. An immediate increase of 30 to 40 per cent in the value of money would mean bankruptcy to many small business concerns, municipalities, and individuals, to say nothing of the increase in the already back-breaking burden of the national debt. The debts that are presently owed by business concerns, municipalities, individuals and the Federal Government are fixed amounts that were incurred the same value as at present. A drastic and immediate increase in the value of the dollar would simply mean a corresponding increase in outstanding indebtedness percentage-wise. It would also mean a corresponding decline in the value of goods and of course wages. The President has placed in his Cabinet a number of outstanding business men who have full knowledge and understanding of the problems involv-

ed, and I do not think that they are going to take any steps that could result in a major recession and a possible depression.

#### STATEHOOD FOR HAWAII:

The Interior and Insular Affairs Subcommittee on Territories and Insular Possessions, of which I am a member, is presently studying the Hawaii statehood bill. This will be a hot issue in this Congress. Alaska and Puerto Rico were both disturbed because Hawaii was singled out for statehood in the President's State of the Union message. The hearings on this bill are most interesting and will produce many interesting facts, which I will try to give you from time to time. Statistics as of July 1, 1948, reflect Hawaii's population at 540,500, of which 10,000 are Hawaiian, 70,000 part Hawaiian, 117,000 Caucasian, 144,000 Japanese, 28,000 Chinese, 18,000 Filipino, 9,000 Puerto Rican, 5,000 Korean, and 1,500 others. Alaska's population at that date was 100,000, approximately evenly divided between Caucasians, on the one hand, and Eskimos, Aleuts and Indians, on the other hand. Puerto Rico had 2,113,053, 76.5% being Caucasian and 23.5% being Negro. Space will not permit me to include other interesting facts concerning businesses, health conditions, land uses, labor matters, taxation, and other subjects in this letter.

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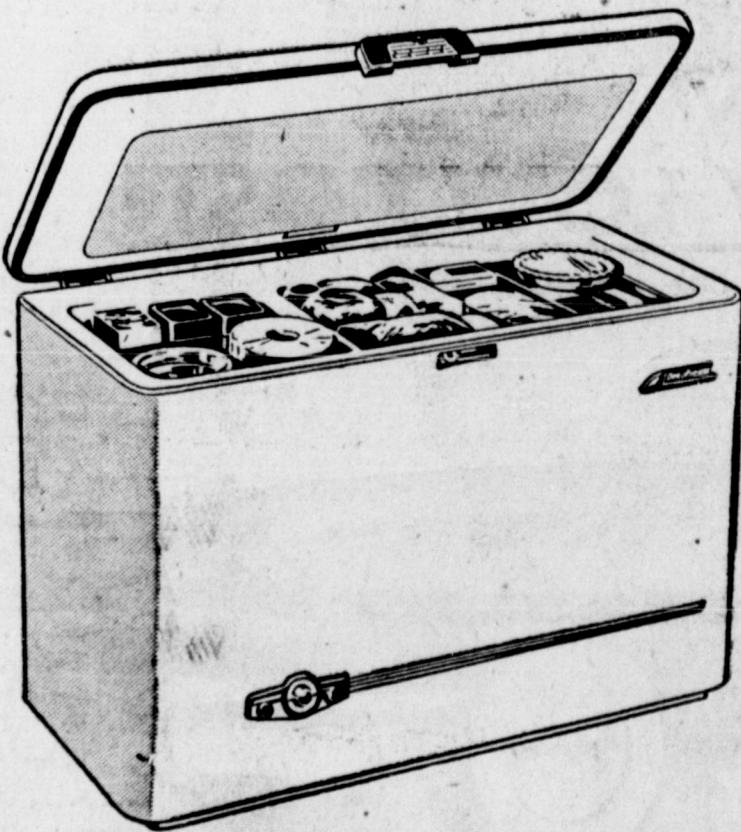
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
