Mr. Patrick was born March 14, 1865, near Staunton, Ill. When he was 10 years old his parents moved to Staunton and he attended schools there. 

He was also President of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society.

He was an energetic and competant civic worker. He has given numerous interesting, unassuming and informative talks before school students, clubs and associations with untiring zeal. He was a life member of the Masonic Lodge, which he joined in 1903.
