

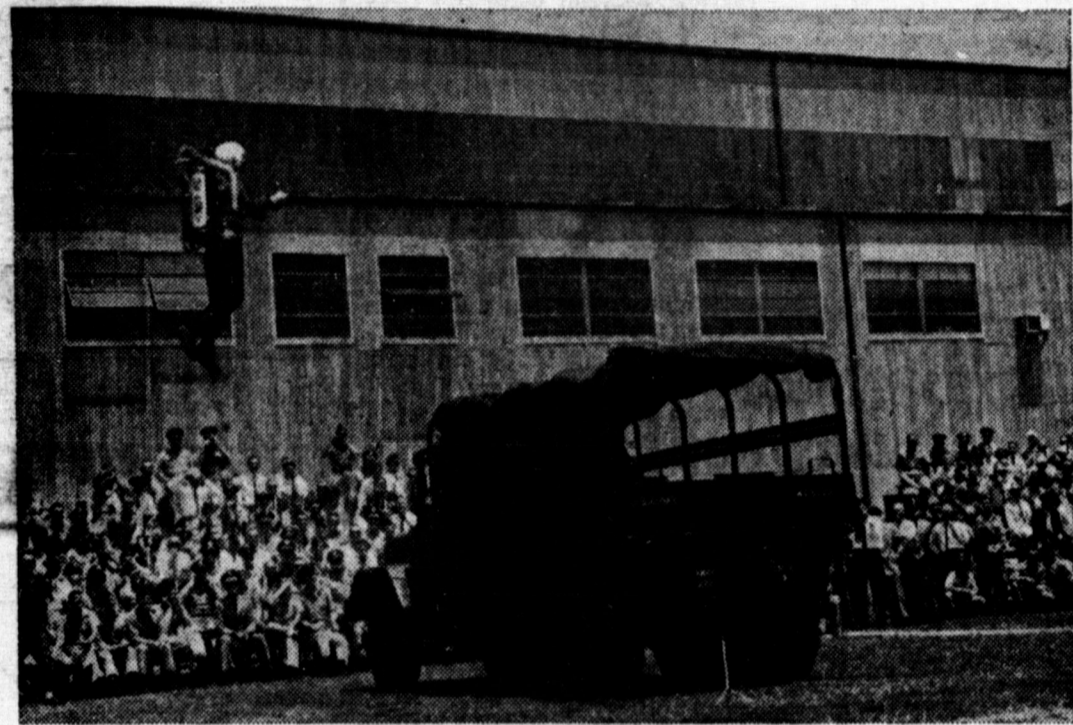

DEMONSTRATING THE "FLYING BELT." Eustis, Va. In previous tests, the experimental "flying belt," developed by Bell Aerosystems Co., Buffalo, N. Y. for the U. S. Army Transportation Research Command, has flown at a speed of 20 mph and has made lateral flights of up to 360 feet.

Bank Deposits Show Increase Over 1960

According to financial statements of the two local banks being published in this issue of the Leader, bank deposits are up nearly one million dollars over the same period of time a year ago.

Total deposits in the two local banks as of June 30, 1961 amounted to \$6,763,987.82 which was an increase of 895,542.40 over the 1960 figure of 5,868,445.42. This report is in keeping with bank figures over most of the state and especially the larger cities.

For the same period of time, the total loans have increased also but in less proportion to the increase in deposits. Total loans at the same time in 1960 was \$3,348,094.18 which was 259,032.30 less than the total of June 30, 1961 which was \$3,607,126.48.

County Agent Issues Insect Warning

Now is the time to be on the lookout for cotton insects, says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. The recent rains have set up ideal conditions for insects in cotton.

Some farmers in various parts of the county have already begun to poison for aphids and other insects. Grasshoppers in some sections are causing damage to cotton along the fence rows.

Breedlove says that it is important not to spray cotton in over a ten mile per hour wind and not to spray when a dew is on the cotton. Usually around forty-five pounds of pressure is enough for spraying cotton and as the cotton gets larger it is wise to use three spray nozzles per row.

Toxaphene-DDT in a mix of two parts of Toxaphene and one part of DDT is good for fleahoppers, grasshoppers, thrips, bollworms, leaf worms and lygus bugs. For aphids or lice it is best to use malathion. For any information on your insect problems call by Breedlove's office.

Donley County, along with the major portion of the Panhandle, has been on the receiving end of beneficial moisture the past week end with more rain in prospect for the next few days.

Some farmers would like to see the rainy weather let up for a while and others who have not received the larger quantities, are hoping it will continue. Cotton and grain crops are looking mighty good at present. In driving over portions of the county, it was noted that some cotton was just acquiring the first few leaves while other fields showed cotton loaded down with young bolls. We also noted some feed that was heading out while others in the dryer area were just coming up.

An area from Clarendon extending southwest has received less rain than the majority of the county. Here in Clarendon, our official weather observer has measured .88 inch so far this month with .35 inch being recorded Tuesday night. The Ashtola area received from one to four inches Saturday night and another good rain Tuesday night. This wet strip extended across the Goldston community.

County Agent Flip Breedlove reports crops the best in years with a very good prospect of a bumper crop. This bumper crop will depend on insect infestation and control and just how well the weather acts during the month of August. A hot August with no moisture can change the picture rapidly.

As a whole, the weather has treated us kindly this year. We have received minimum moisture, very little hail and only two days so far that has reached the 100 degree mark. One of those days was recorded in June and the other was recorded last Thursday, July 6.

Mangum Man Dies In Pickup Accident

A Hereford woman remained in fair condition Wednesday at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo following a one-vehicle accident Monday which claimed the life of a Mangum, Okla. man.

Mrs. Hubert Crockford received fractures of both arms and was admitted to Adair Hospital here and later moved to Amarillo. Her husband was treated and released. They were injured in the pickup truck accident which took the life of Delma Gerwin Gable, 48, of Mangum. The accident occurred at 8 a.m. Monday near Ashtola. Gable died en route to an Amarillo hospital.

According to investigating Patrolman John Lowry, the pickup hit a guard post on the highway, sped on down the road and then overturned. All three persons were thrown from the vehicle. Lowry said the Crockfords told him Gable had been driving.

Gable's body was carried overland to the Greer Funeral Home in Mangum by Murphy Funeral Home.

Rep. Will Ehrle Blasts Governor's Tax Proposals

State Representative Will Ehrle blasted Governor Daniel's Tax Proposals Tuesday submitted to the special session of the Texas Legislature that met in special session this week.

"Governor Daniel has asked us to take 30 million dollars from our priority Farm-to-Market road funds and place this money in the general highway fund. He also requested that we tax college students an extra 20 million dollars through increased tuition," Ehrle stated.

"This is sheer and blatant fiscal irresponsibility. I shall fight these proposals by Governor Daniel. I cannot be a party to the destruction of our great Farm-to-Market road program, nor will I vote for this head tax on our students who are trying to educate and prepare themselves for better citizenship," he added.

"I will, however, support and work for his recommended increases in or beer and liquor taxes," he concluded.

WEBB WORMS HIT TREES IN LOCAL AREA

Web worms have begun to appear in shade trees all over town and many people have begun a control program says county agent H. M. Breedlove.

The county agent advises that toxaphene is one of the best poisons to use for control. Toxaphene used as a spray mixed with water will get the job done. If it rains then you will have to spray again but keep a close watch on the web worms and you can tell by the live worms in the web when it is time to spray again. Breedlove says not to just spray the web but spray the entire tree for control.

Fruit trees, with fruit that will ripen in the next few weeks should not be sprayed and this is true with vegetables in the garden. All insecticides are toxic and should be treated as such. Be sure to wash your hands after handling and try not to get the spray on you. If you do, then use soap and water and wash it off.

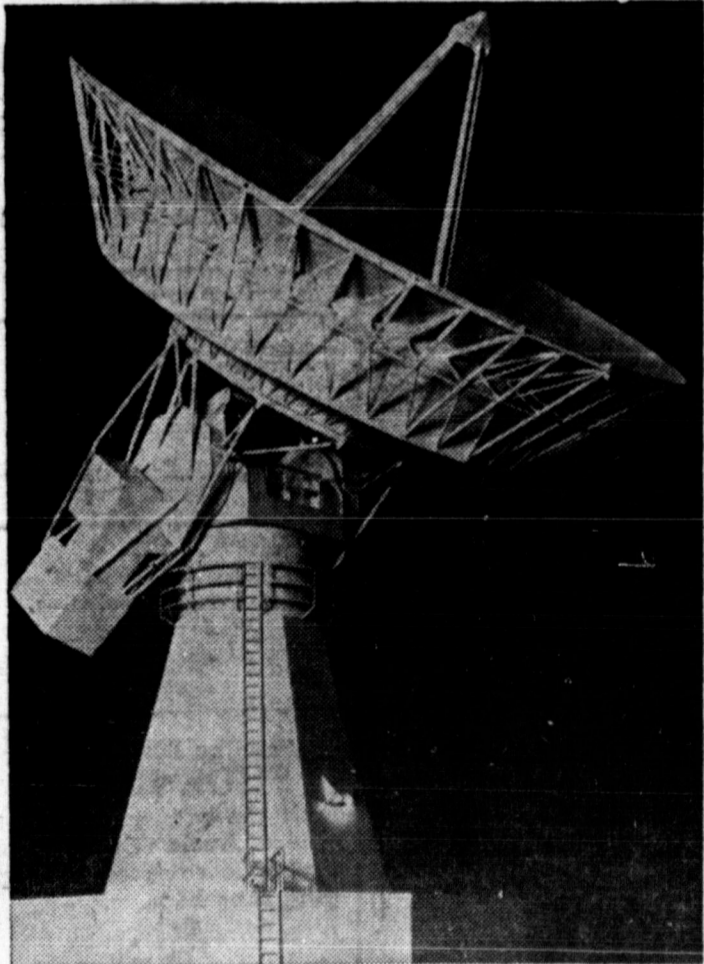

SMUT MAJOR THREAT TO GRAIN SORGHUM

Head smut disease of grain sorghum occurs in all areas of Texas. Losses are likely to range from 0 to 25 per cent, and in recent years losses of 5 to 10 per cent are not uncommon. Moreover the value of badly smut-infested land is lowered.

Close examination of the stalk near harvest is necessary to determine disease loss. With many infected varieties the head is sterile. In such cases, the blackish powdery smut is found by pushing the leaves and checking lower on the stalk. On other varieties and hybrids, the main head will be smutted and destroyed.

In harvesting a badly-infested field, smut comes from a combine in a black cloud. When the smut ball first appears, it is covered by a whitish membrane. The membrane soon breaks and allows the black dust (spores) to be scattered by the wind and rain.

The fungus disease overwinters as spores in old plant trash or in the soil. The following spring and summer the spores germinate and produce smaller spores of another type, which in turn, infect the sorghum plants through the roots.

The fungus grows up through the roots and stalk to complete its life cycle. Infection of the root may occur at any time during the growth of the sorghum.

MOSQUITOES HAVE PREFERENCES

Do you often wonder why mosquitoes seem to prefer you to someone else? If you do, you are not alone. Research entomologists in more than one country are trying to find the answer to why mosquitoes and other insects are attracted to man and animals.

If scientists can find precise causes of insect attraction, more effective repellents that would mask the attraction might be developed. Attraction retarding materials might be combined with insecticides. This would result in fewer insects bothering treated individuals, and the more persistent pests would be killed by the insecticides.

Experiments by entomologists at USDA's insect laboratory at Orlando, Florida, illustrate the

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complexity of such research, however. They dressed a man in a lightweight diving suit that kept water vapor, carbon dioxide and other gases from escaping to the surrounding environment. He was placed in a small observation room with three man-size dummies and 300 mosquitoes. The subject's breath was drawn outside the room through a hose.

Mosquitoes showed no preference between the man and the dummies. When carbon dioxide was discharged above the man's head, however, he attracted more mosquitoes. The pests also were attracted when a cloth suit was put over the man's diving suit—regardless of the presence or absence of carbon dioxide.

Researchers exposed the man's face — no increased attraction.

But when his hands were uncovered, the mosquitoes were attracted. These mosquitoes prefer the body, but another species showed marked preference for the face.

This shows that different types of mosquitoes aren't necessarily attracted to man and animals for the same reasons. Other insects don't respond alike either. For instance, one study showed that horse flies preferred red cattle to white ones. Perhaps scientists will find the answer some day, but until they do, the hum of mosquitoes will continue to mean discomfort for many people.

COTTON

Adjustment Credit shall be given only for areas of regular shape with not more than four sides. position area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundary when row crops are destroyed in a square, rectangular, or trapezoidal pattern. The restrictions may be disregarded when the crop in an entire field or subdivision is destroyed in disposing of excess acreage, or when disposition of excess is made between adjacent terraces or between the field boundary and a terrace within that field or subdivision provided the within field perimeter of the area is parallel to such terrace.

The cost of disposition will be \$4.00 for the first plot plus \$2.00 for each additional plot. This applies also to feed grain disposition.

FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

The acreage which a farmer agreed to divert from the production of corn or grain sorghum this year must be devoted to an approved conservation use and it must not be harvested during 1961 or grazed from May 31, 1961 through December 31, 1961.

A grower who does not live up to all the terms of the feed grain program can receive a reduction in the total payment to be earned under the program, or he might have to refund a part of all of the advance payment he has already received. Furthermore, if at least 20 per cent of the farm's corn and grain sorghum base is not diverted, none of the feed grains on that farm this year would be eligible for price support. This will apply to corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley and rye.

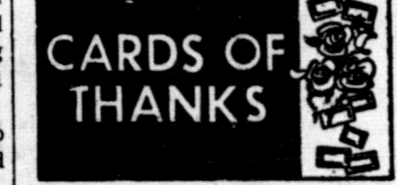

Our idea of a real vacation is some spot where one can be comfortably lazy. It seems that we can become lazier here in the mountains of northern New Mexico than any place we know about. The only trouble with this line of thinking is that we have to work so hard getting things ready for the trip. This time the yard and all looked so nice as we drove away that we were almost tempted just to spend our vacation at home. It seemed such a shame to clean everything up so nice and then load up and drive away.

The true markings of a tourist is said to be a sun-burned left arm. We can qualify. I don't remember the name of the motel along the way but their ad was for the rest of your life.

Little Joe Montoya, political sage and representative from New Mexico sizes up the Castro

blackmail attempt as follows: "Morally, acceptance is wrong because human beings are not chattels which can be bartered for tractors. "I certainly do young man," said the owner, who proceeded to give him a supply of printed circulars and wound up by including a colored post card of his business.

"Thank you, Sir, and could I have just one more of these cards to mail to my grandparents."

"You surely may have all you want," replied the owner.

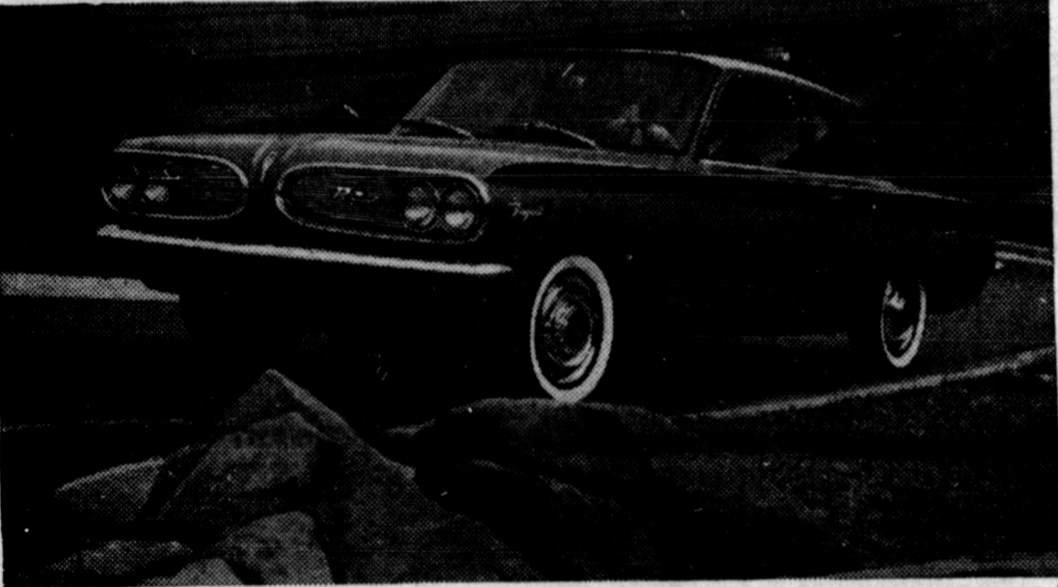

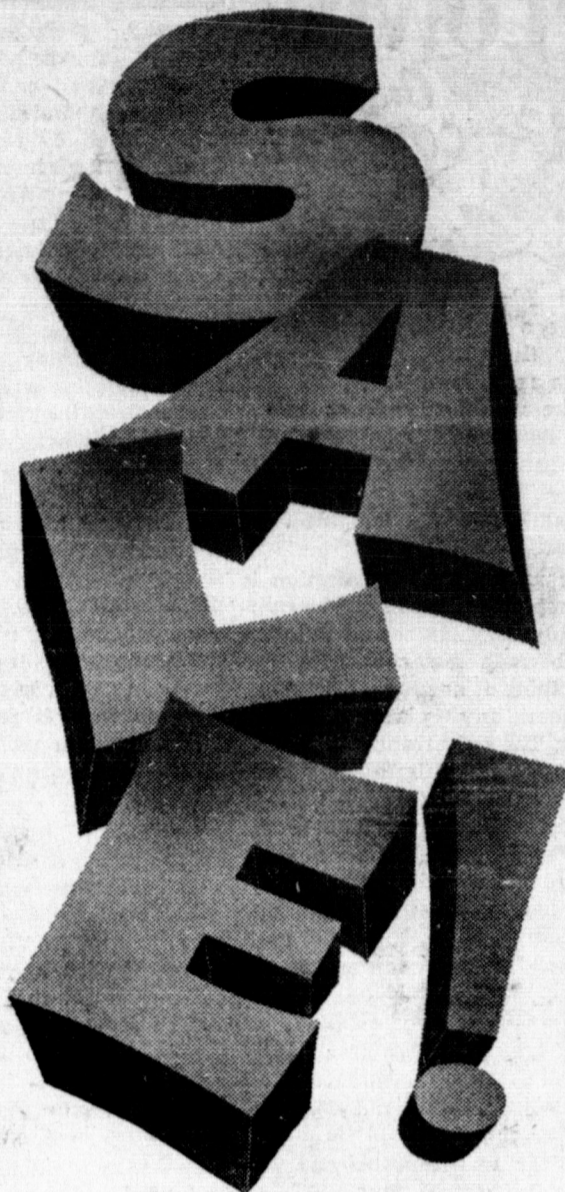
