Tickets are \$10 per person. Seating is limited, so tickets should be purchased in advance at the Burton Memorial Library, from any chamber of commerce board member, or by calling 874-2421.

### Filing for local offices continues this week

Sign up for the May 7 elections continues this week for citizens wishing to serve on any one of six local boards.

The City of Clarendon will hold an election to choose two aldermen and the mayor.

The City of Howardwick will also elect a mayor and two aldermen.

Hedley's election will select four members of the board of aldermen, three for two-year terms and one for one year.

Two positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees are up this year, and Hedley ISD also has two trustee positions open this year.

The Donley County Hospital District will select three positions on its Board of Directors.

All local boards are elected at-large, but candidates for hospital board must sign up for a specific place. Sign up continues through March 7, 2005.

## City's new paving plan takes shape

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen last week set the goal of paving as many as 50 city blocks in a \$1.1 million project that could be accomplished this year.

"This is a workable plan that we can all live with," Alderman Michael Tibbets said during the February 8 meeting.

The plan would take money the city has on hand in its improvement fund, borrow an additional \$800,000 through tax anticipation notes, and pay the project off in seven years utilizing only fee increases that have

already been enacted by the board.

Between 40 and 50 blocks would be paved and curbed, and several already-paved streets would be receive seal coats to prevent them from deteriorating.

Aldermen reacted with joy as they settled on a plan after months of discussions.

"How about that?" Mayor Tex Selvidge said. "We made a decision!"

"Let's all get on the table and go 'Yea! Yea! Yea!'" Alderman Janice Knorpp said.

Issuance of the tax notes would be handled by the Lubbock based First Southwest Company whose vice president, Vince Viaille, attended Tuesday's meeting and presented the aldermen with a proposed debt schedule.

"Tax notes have no publication procedures to follow, and there's no petition procedures," Viaille said. "I propose that we go to local banks to issue the notes at 3.5 percent interest or less, and there would be a cost of issuance in the amount of \$15,000 to \$20,000."

Viaille said tax notes in the amount of \$800,000 could be repaid in seven years with an annual debt service of approximately \$132,000.

City officials reacted positively to Viaille's presentation.

"I think this is the best possible plan we're going to come up with," Mayor Tex Selvidge said.

Aldermen directed Viaille to return to the board's February 22 meeting and bring with him all the necessary forms the city would need to start the process of issuing tax notes.

The board reviewed maps with city engineer Che Shadle and prioritized streets to be paved. Shadle will work up a plan that fits within the allocated budget.

In other city business, Mayor Selvidge ordered an election to be held May 7 for the purpose of electing a mayor and two aldermen. City Secretary Linda Smith will serve as election clerk, and City Clerk LeAnn Marcum will be deputy clerk.

The second and final reading was held for Ordinance 354, which See 'City' on page 8.

## Thornberry supports border security bill

Washington D.C. - U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted for H.R. 418, the "REAL ID Act," when it was approved by the U.S. House of Representatives by a vote of 261-161.

A co-sponsor of the border security bill, Rep. Thornberry described H.R. 418 as "an important step in making our nation safer from the threat of terrorism."

Under the REAL ID Act, applicants for driver licenses would be required to provide proof that they are in the United States legally. The bill also closes asylum loopholes and strengthens deportation laws.

"It is frightening to see how easy it is for terrorists to fraudulently obtain identification documents in this country. It is equally troubling to see how difficult it is for our authori-

ties to deport people even when there is clear evidence of ties to terrorist organizations and activities," said Thornberry. "This bill will help reduce those vulnerabilities."

Thornberry also noted that last week's approval of H.R. 418 fulfills a promise by the House leadership that border security reforms would be acted upon early in the first session of the 109th Congress.

## Jackson resigns job as treasurer County seeking applicants

Donley County is looking for a new treasurer after commissioners accepted the resignation of Rebecca Jackson during their regular session Monday.

County Judge Jack Hall said Jackson was taking a position as a top accountant for Cactus Feeders in Canyon.

"She's leaving for three main reasons," Hall said. "She doubles her salary, gets full health insurance for her and her husband, and in six years will be vested in their retirement plan."

The county began advertising this week for applicants to be considered for the remainder of Jackson's term, which expires in 2006. Hall said the treasurer's job is a big one and one that Jackson did well.

"Becky Jackson is a very competent person, and she has done an excellent job as treasurer of Donley County."

Jackson was appointed in 1997 after the resignation of Wanda Smith. She was elected to a full term in 1998 and reelected in 2002. Her resignation becomes effective February 25.

Hall said the commissioners' court hopes to make an appointment during a called session on March 1.

Jackson could not be reached for comment Tuesday morning.

In other county business, commissioners heard from Martin Smith of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) regarding

plans to replace the bridge over Buck Creek on County Road 28 in two years. Donley County will provide a ten percent in-kind match for the project.

Commissioners also heard from Sandra Hatcher of TxDOT, who discussed the state's plans to replace the Hwy. 70 bridge over the Salt Fork of Red River below the Greenbelt Dam some time in the next three years. The bridge will be widened and the curves approaching the bridge will be straightened, Hall said. The county will offer assistance in acquiring easements.

The court approved the audit for the fiscal year 2003-2004 as presented by Gordon Maddox.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn reported on a movement in Austin to require county jails to have to persons on duty at all times.

The Donley County Jail just keeps one person on staff, and the sheriff will go to Austin to try to keep it that way.

Commissioners approved Justice Ann Kennedy's request to install an AMA•TechTel wireless Internet connection in her office and also approved Justice Jimmy Johnson's request to purchase a new photocopier.

The court considered and approved plans to install a sidewalk from the Courthouse to the Jail and to install up lighting for the north and east faces of the Courthouse.

## Local sales tax rebates fall despite state's gain

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn last week reported that state sales tax collections rose for the 17th consecutive month in January. The state collected \$1.39 billion in sales tax revenue, up 6.1 percent compared to January 2004.

But the report wasn't good news for three Donley County cities where collections are down this year.

The City of Clarendon's sales tax rebate dropped 8.19 percent from this time last year to \$25,414.25. Howardwick was down 29.3 percent to \$798.44, and Hedley fell 11.6 percent to \$557.97.

Statewide, Strayhorn returned

\$502.8 million in local sales tax to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 5.2 percent compared to sales tax distributions to local governments in February 2004.

"These numbers indicate that Texas' recovering economy had a positive impact on holiday season sales," Strayhorn said.

January state sales tax collections and February's local sales tax allocations primarily represent sales made in December but also include some earlier sales by businesses that report sales tax to the state comptroller's office on a quarterly or annual basis.

## Duncan authors proposal to increase salaries of state judges

AUSTIN - State Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock) has filed legislation to bring state judges' salaries into parity with their counterparts in other states in the nation.

Texas' judicial pay ranks 39th in the country, which is often the reason that fair, effective jurists leave the bench to join the private sector. Duncan filed Senate Bill 368 to stop

the potential depletion of our state's best and brightest on the bench.

"Judges are resigning from the bench at a higher rate than in previous years, and it can have a detrimental impact on the quality of justice done," Duncan said. "We risk losing the institutional knowledge that can make all the difference in fair administration of justice. Raising

their pay to a competitive level with other states is critical to maintaining a strong bench."

Other states of comparable caseload and population offer much higher compensation to their judiciary. While the proposed bill doesn't make Texas judicial salaries equal to all other pay scales, Duncan believes this is a significant step in the right

direction.

Texas district judges presently earn \$101,000 annually while district judges in California and Florida earn \$144,000 and \$133,000 respectively. Under Duncan's bill, district judges would receive \$125,000, and appellate and high court justices would also receive significant raises.

To pay for the higher salaries,

Duncan proposes raising criminal case filing fees by \$2 and increasing civil case filing fees by \$35. This will raise an estimated \$50 million, which is enough to cover the increases.

The legislation will also remove provisions for counties to offer supplemental salary funding; however, no judge's salary will be less than it is today.

## Senate needs quick action on nominees

President Bush this week nominated several men and women for federal judgeships, and now the senate should act quickly to give these jurists a proper hearing and vote.

Ordinarily, this would not be a subject of an editorial because the senate historically has taken its constitutional duties seriously and given nominees whose candidacy survives the committee process an up or down vote. But life is different for the presidency of George W. Bush.

Stung by the close election of 2000 and enraged by what they consider an illegitimate president, senate Democrats did the unthinkable. They started filibustering judicial nominees — a process by which one senator talks about an issue *ad infinitum* and doesn't shut up until a supermajority of the senate (60 votes) tells him to.

Such a thing used to be unprecedented, but in the last four years it became commonplace. Now, the Dems appear poised to continue to obstruct progress and deny the president his constitutional right to have his nominees voted on by the full senate.

On Tuesday, Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) refused to rule out continuing the use of the filibuster to block judicial appointments.

"Well, I don't know, unless something's changed, and I don't think a thing in the world has changed," Reid told the Associated Press. "The background of these men and women that he brought forward, the 10 that we turned down, should have been turned down, and we'll turn them down again."

Actually, Democrats didn't even give the nominees in question a chance to be "turned down." Being turned down would indicate that there had been some kind of vote on the person. Maybe Reid should use the term "stiff-armed" or "clothes-lined," which would more closely resemble the kind of dirty pool the minority party employed to deny a nominee a chance to be heard.

Democrats have never taken well to being in the minority. The party has struggled with it since it was swept from Congressional power in 1994, and it still hasn't come to terms with it. They just go from one election to the next certain in the belief that the public will finally see it their way and return them to their "rightful" role as the majority party.

Of course in five elections now, that hasn't happened. Americans have kept the Republicans in power in Congress. And to add to that political legitimacy, last November Bush captured the largest number of popular votes a president has ever received. Democrats need to wise up and realize the tide of public opinion is not in their favor at the present.

Blame for this situation doesn't rest solely with the Democrats, however. The majority party never should have let it get this bad. Ten years is long enough to learn the ropes, and the Republicans need to start exercising real power. GOP leaders in the House of Representatives seem to know how to play power politics, but the same cannot be said for senate leaders.

Since the Democrats started filibustering judicial candidates, the Republicans have been threatening to use the so-called "nuclear option" — a tool they can use to change the senate rules with a simple majority vote (51 senators). They could, quite simply, make the filibuster a moot point and get on with business. But they haven't.

Threats don't mean much unless you're actually willing to follow through with them. Sadly, the Republicans haven't been willing to do that, caving instead to the Democrats again and again when they counter threaten. "Do that and you'll be sorry."

"If they want to carry that through, it's a short-term victory for them, because they're not going to be in the majority forever," Reid said this week. "We're going to be in the majority. That's the way history is. And I think that they would rue the day they did that."

Yeah, yeah, but you're not in the majority today, and it could be another 30 or 40 years before the pendulum swings your way again. The current majority "leader" ought to throw down the gauntlet and go nuclear the next time a judicial nominee filibuster occurs.

At the very least, the Republicans ought to make the Democrats put on a full-blown filibuster rather than a boring procedural filibuster. Let's see a senator actually have to stand for hours and hours on end and keep talking until he either loses his voice (a true blessing), passes out from exhaustion, or suffers from a bladder that explodes while C-SPAN cameras pick up every embarrassing detail.

Sure it's drastic, but the Democrats would have brought it upon themselves.

These little things are tests of political power. If Bush and his party can't get the little things going their way, how will they ever pass the big issues like Social Security and major tax reforms?

Bush has earned the right to make these nominations, and the Constitution requires the senate to act. The time has come for Republicans to start actually running the senate rather than just being repeatedly run over by the minority party. They must get these men and women the up or down vote they deserve, and they must do so expeditiously.

## Budget encourages nation to prioritize

Our country, like most households, operates on a budget which seeks to balance our spending with our income. Budgets are a time for serious discussions weighing needs and wants with the available resources. In Congress it is a difficult process which can take a great deal of time.

The tone of the budget debate is usually set by the President's recommendations for spending. The two separate houses of Congress then work on their versions of a budget, which becomes the blueprint for the appropriations process.

I was encouraged by President Bush's overall proposal of a \$2.7 trillion budget because the announcement means we will have a serious effort to reduce our budget deficit after several years of higher spending to fight the war on terrorism.

As a fiscal conservative, I greeted increased expenditures over the recent past as painful necessities to protect the American people. Several years ago, our national economy was buffeted by several extraordinary events. The economy entered a recession after the internet bubble burst and a wave of corporate scandals rocked the markets. In the midst of this adjustment, the 9-11 attacks took place, killing thousands and paralyzing our economy. Since that time, we have gone to war in Iraq and Afghanistan to upend terror-sponsoring regimes and free millions of people. While we have been victorious, the effort has been, and will remain, expensive. But for a safer and more secure homeland, that cost is a relative bargain.

As our nation dealt with these challenges, Congress and President Bush passed bipartisan tax relief which jump-started the economy and led to strong job creation and lower unemployment. This year, with our economy on the upswing, and after initial expenses to bolster homeland security, we are in the best position yet to begin reducing the deficit.

President Bush's budget envisions increasing defense spending by 4.8 percent. Spending on the Department of Homeland Security would rise by 7 percent. The proposed budget would scale back increases of discretionary programs to

2.1 percent, which is less than the rate of inflation.

The budget for the 2006 fiscal year beginning in October plans to reduce the budget deficit by 8.6 percent in the first year alone, excluding costs involved in Iraq and Afghanistan. Economists say the most important measure of spending is the ratio of debt to the size of a nation's economy, or Gross Domestic Product (GDP). The President's budget projects a budget deficit amounting to 3 percent of GDP for 2006, down from 3.5 percent this year.

If we follow this roadmap, we can cut the budget deficit by half to 1.5 percent of GDP by 2009, according to White House budget officials.

The President's budget marks a desire to adopt a more conservative fiscal philosophy on government spending. It is a good starting point, and I share his commitment to discipline. However, it is Congress which has the ultimate responsibility under the Constitution to set spending levels and allocate resources. Within the framework of a conservative budget, I will

fight to increase some programs critical to Texas which have been shortchanged in the President's budget, and I will work to find savings in other areas. The state and Criminal Alien Assistance program, which reimburses states for the costs involved with illegal aliens, is one example of a program which appears underfunded. NASA's traditional science programs and Amtrak are others. We must assure our farmers all have the help necessary to keep making healthy food for our country and for export. Holding the overall line on expenditures will be often difficult, but we know we have an ally in the White House as we rein in spending.

In times of tighter budgets, as you may guess, it is sometimes hard to secure funding for projects in our home states. The level of scrutiny always increases when funding is more restricted, but I remain optimistic. I have always approached budgeting as a serious matter and have presented my colleagues with the best evidence available that particular projects are good, not only for Texas, but for our nation. If I continue using that yardstick, I believe we will gain what is right for the Lone Star State and stick to conservative fiscal principles which will make our nation and economy stronger in the long run.

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



Melville Mills fell at home last Thursday and has been hospitalized since with bruising, infections, and pneumonia. We need to put this family on our prayer list.



The twinkle in her eye combined with a friendly wink as she advised, "Well, that's fine, but while you're practicing Theology, don't forget to use some KNEE-ology!"



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## Parents can encourage good behavior

You may not define the issues your child is facing today in terms of morality, but you cannot deny the fact that your child will face moral dilemmas - dilemmas our children are facing at increasingly younger ages.

Charles Smith, professor and extension specialist in the School of Family Studies and Human Services at Kansas State University, defines conscience as an internal voice that obliges us to act in an honorable, caring, and responsible manner and to make things right when we do not. Smith believes that each element of his definition emerges during the first years of childhood and that by the time a child begins first grade, she can have a conscience appropriate for her age. Barbara Stilwell, lead author of the book, *Right vs. Wrong: Raising a Child with a Conscience*, writes that a child's moral sense surfaces even "before the child has acquired much in the way of language."

More research is needed to understand the links between the parent-child relationship and conscience, however foundational to the development of a healthy conscience is a close relationship with at least one person who by their care, love and attention communicates what it means to love and be loved. Philosopher and theologian Paul Tillich once said, "Morality is not a subject; it is a life put to the test in dozens of moments." For our children, those moments begin sooner than most of us imagine. It is never too early to nurture the development of your child's conscience and together embrace life to the fullest!

Smith, in his parent education course, *Nurturing Conscience in Children*, identifies the following skills for parents to practice.

Use victim-centered reasoning with your child. "Look Chloe, see the tears in Pam's eyes? You were upset with her and decided to pinch

her. That pinch really hurt her..." Victim-centered reasoning confronts children with how their behavior affects others.

Make pro-social attributions to your child's behavior. "Maggie, that was a kind thing to do. You are growing up to be a person who really cares about others. See the smile you put on your brother's face?" Relating kind behavior, for example, to what they think of themselves nurtures a belief in their own kindness.

Hold your child accountable for their actions. Children need to understand that they made a choice that had harmful consequences and that it is important to do their best to make up for this wrong.

Show pride in your child's courageous choices. Celebrating your child's thoughtful and courageous choices strengthens character. Every child needs a champion.

Affirm self-worth when focusing on misbehavior. Express sadness

and disappointment with your child's choice while avoiding judgment about his worth as a person.

Be an example of integrity and courage. Honorable parents nurture honorable children.

Make your children a priority. All children need to experience unconditional bonds of affection.

Be in tune with your child emotionally. Being in synch with your child's emotions communicates understanding.

Encourage thinking during strong emotions. Strong emotions can shut down thinking, yet you can help your child calm himself and think when feeling angry. Children can learn to SAT (Stop And Think) then ACT (Accept, Choose, Take responsibility) by the time they are five-years-old. This early fundamental learning will become more advanced with age. For this foundation to be built, parents have to gently encourage.

Stephen Howard placed second in Number Sense, fifth in Science, and fourth in Math leading the Number Sense team to a third place finish and the Science Team to a fourth place finish among 15 1A-3A schools. Will Wallendorf placed sixth in Science, while in age group Science awards Sam Lovely and Brayden Bennett won second place medals, and Stormie Garrison came away with a fifth place ribbon. Windbreaks, when properly designed, offer nesting, roosting, loafing, food, and escape cover for a variety of wildlife. To attract wildlife, plantings don't necessarily need to be in windbreaks, but can be placed in draws, arroyos, or other "unused" areas of the property. To be of great value to wildlife, a tree planting should include a variety of trees and shrubs. Evergreens are especially good winter cover; shrubs provide food and dense cover; and deciduous

trees provide nesting sites and some food. Certain trees and shrubs are better than others for wildlife.

Those species beneficial to wildlife that are sold by the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District are Evergreens, Red Oak, Catalpa Little Walnut, Hackberry, Osage Orange, Honey Locust, Russian Olive, Flaming Sumac, Caragana, Lilac, Bush Honeysuckle, Cotoneaster, Plum, Sumac, Nanking Cherry, and Sand Cherry.

The District also offers wildlife packets that include a variety of trees selected to attract a particular type of wildlife. Each packet includes 100 trees (25 each of four different kinds). They have packets for quail and pheasant, squirrel, turkey, and deer.

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
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


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## Dickey Library plans program honoring Black History Month

amends the Livestock Ordinance to cover poultry. Master bantam exhibitor Allen Estlack addressed the board and lodged a complaint about the \$20 annual fee the ordinance imposes.

"We will, of course, comply with the ordinance, but I wonder what I'm getting for my \$20," Estlack said, noting that the state inspects his chickens for diseases annually for free.

Alderman Tibbets said the city had to have equal protection for all types of livestock owners, and Estlack said he thinks the ordinance is overkill.

"It was overkill on the horses, too," Tibbets said, "but I don't want to reopen that can of worms."

"The alternative is that no one can have any animals in the city limits," Alderman Knorpp said.

The board approved Ordinance 354.

Aldermen also approved a motion designating that money raised from the three-cent per \$100 valuation tax increase passed last year will be used for street improvements. This had been the intention of the board at the time, but they had never formally voted on the matter.

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
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




**Heart healthy**

"The girls played hard the entire season," Myatt said. "We graduated six seniors, and we wish them the best, and we are looking forward to what next season has for us as well."




