District Attorney gives report on '04 activities

District Attorney Stuart Messer prosecuted 350 felony cases involving 294 defendants in 2004, according to the DA's annual report released this week.

District Judge David McCoy assessed fines in these cases totaling \$520,254 and ordered court costs of \$101,291. The DA's office also reported that Judge McCoy ordered restitution to be paid to a variety of victims in the amount of \$483,044.

In addition to fines and restitution, 68 people were sent to prison for a total term of imprisonment of 881 years.

"This past year was very busy and successful for law enforcement in the district," Messer said. "Without all the hard work every law enforcement official gives this district, we could not have successfully solved and prosecuted such a large number of cases."

In Donley County, 82 felony cases were resolved in 2004, resulting in the incarceration of 14 criminals for a total of 99 years. Fines and court costs assessed totaled \$130,502; and \$58,094 was ordered to be repaid as restitution to several victims of crimes.

CC dedicates Dickey Library

The transfer from the old facility is complete, and all the books are on the shelves of Clarendon College's new Vera Dial Dickey Library.

CC held a formal opening and dedication of the building February 3, and Library Director Jewel Houston called it a dream come true.

"We want this to be your library," Houston told the crowd. "We want to help you any way we can."

Students, faculty, administrators, alumni, and community members all gathered at the event which culminated with a human chain being formed from the old library at the west end of the Administration Building to

the new facility situated west of the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center. The last 25 books were passed from one pair of hands to another to find their final destination on the shelves of the Dickey Library.

"We've had lots of compliments and nice comments," CC President Myles Shelton said. "Everyone thought it was a fitting tribute to Mrs. Dickey."

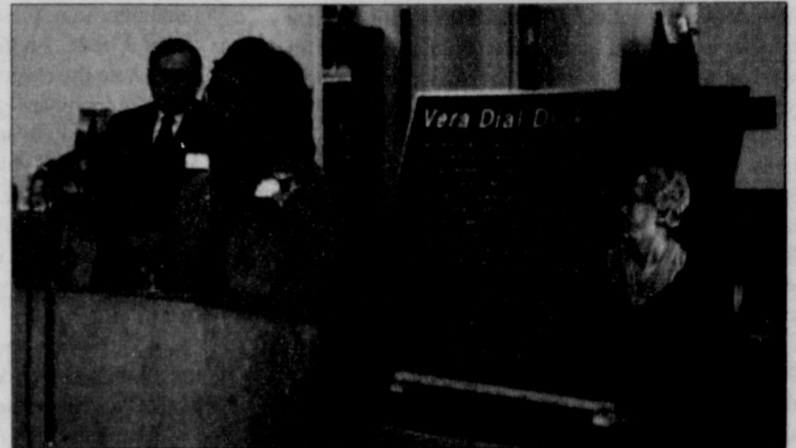
The \$1.3 million library is named for the late Vera Dial Dickey, a resident of Memphis, who had a passion for education and who left a generous gift to CC after her death. Executors of her estate and several citizens of Memphis attended the

dedication.

Also joining the celebration was CC President Emeritus Kenneth Vaughn and former CC President Jerry Stockton. Representatives from Frank Phillips College and Vernon College attended as well.

At 10,500 square feet, the new library is more than twice the size of its predecessor. It features amenities such as a computer lab with 45 computers, three study/reading areas, improved office and workspaces, and special display cases for items such as the Texas Collection.

Fields of Unity

Community leaders wanted it. Kids wanted it. Parents wanted it. But no one group could do it alone.

Now through a spirit of cooperation, the dream of making Clarendon's ball fields suitable for use by high school teams and turning them into something people can be proud of is being accomplished with the city, the school, the Little League, and the kids themselves joining forces to turn an idea into a reality.

"We finally got enough people to sit down and talk about it," Clarendon Junior High Principal Marvin Elam said. "We got people... actually making plans and implementing them."

"No one group has the money to do it alone," he said. "This is an instance where the school, Little League, and city have come together, come up with a vision, and are working to achieve it."

That vision was to build an entirely new softball field and substantially renovate McClelland Field by erecting new fences, adding new lighting, and constructing new dugouts.

"The school has had a need to improve the parks for our teams," Clarendon School Superintendent Monty Hysinger said. "We knew since the city and school both own the fields, and the Little League uses them, we needed to work together."

"We have a lot of booster parents that were very interested in it and were ready to get something done."

Hysinger said the support of the community has been tremendous.

"It's been neat to see everyone coming together to get things done. The three organizations realized that things are tight, and we're all trying to pitch in."

"We talked about it and realized if everyone pitches in we can accomplish anything for our community. When you work together you can make your dollar stretch farther."

City Administrator Sean Pate said he would like to think the organizations have set a precedent for others to follow.

"These three organizations have joined and worked together. It goes to show what can happen when you get people together and really want to accomplish something."

Elam thinks the cooperation on this project is the only way it could be achieved.

"If you get people working together with a vested interest, anything can be done. I think this project is proof we can do more than just sit back and expect things to happen."

"It's proof that when you work together and share talents,

anything in the community can get done," he said. "I hope this will show people we can overcome any problem in town, like the streets."

Elam believes the project will give the kids and community an object of pride and the kids agree.

"I think the new fields are going to give us pride in our teams and town," said high school junior Quentin West, who plays baseball for the Broncos.

Junior softball player Kaitlyn Howard agrees with West and likes the cooperation on the project.

"I like seeing people come together and work. It gets me

Work on ball fields could lead to park enhancements

The current work at Clarendon's ball fields is what city officials hope will be just the first step toward improving the entire area around City Park.

The improvements are the beginnings of a master plan for the park and will help the city in the process of obtaining a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department grant to fund the plan.

"The board of aldermen created a park committee to make recommendations to develop and implement a master plan," City Administrator Sean Pate said. "It's in

the planning stages and has to be in place before the July 31 deadline for the grant application."

A survey to be included in the application was sent out through the school and is included in this week's ENTERPRISE.

"We are seeking input from the community on what people would like to see happen. We would like to see what everyone, not just the kids, would like."

Pate said the committee needs the surveys back to City Hall by February 18 so engineers can draw up the master plan, which will be used as a guide for what will

likely be an ongoing project.

Pate said the grant could cover things such as new park equipment, restrooms, a concession area, and better lighting.

"It would take areas and help develop them further and fund new equipment like a playground or a splash pad. I would like to see something for everyone from toddlers to adults."

Pate said after the grant application is reviewed, it could take about four or five months to know if it's accepted; and then it may be January before any work will be able to begin.

Candidates can sign up for offices

Sign up began Monday for citizens wishing to serve on any one of six local boards.

The City of Clarendon will hold an election to choose two aldermen and the mayor for two-year terms. Those positions are currently held by Aldermen Bobbie Kidd and Michael Tibbets and Mayor Tex Selvidge.

The City of Howardwick will also elect a mayor and two aldermen. Mayor Nancy Davis has announced that she will not seek reelection due to her daughter's ongoing battle with cancer. The terms of Aldermen Marvin Elam and Bill Barton are expiring. They are serving out the terms of Mike Rowland and Dewey Linley respectively. The mayor and aldermen each serve two-year terms.

Hedley's election will select four members of the board of aldermen, three for two-year terms and one for one year. Seats held by Aldermen Bruce Howard, Pam Casteel, Tangela Copelin, and Ricki Baker are all up this year. Baker is serving the unexpired term of Terry Stevens.

Two positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees are up this year. Those seats are currently held by Weldon Sears and Lance Thornberry and are three-year terms.

Hedley ISD also has two trustee positions open this year. The three-year terms of Anthony Knowles and Rhonda Shaw are expiring.

The Donley County Hospital District will select three positions on its board. The two-year terms of Don Thornberry (Place 1), Alan Fletcher (Place 2), and Melinda McAnear (Place 3) are expiring. McAnear is finishing the term of Andy Wheatly.

Sign up continues through March 7, 2005; and the election will be held May 7.

Reward set up for '86 murder

A new reward has been established in the unsolved 1986 murder of Clarendon woman.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn's office says that \$5,000 is being offered for information leading to an arrest and conviction in the murder of Margaret Felicia Haar.

On June 28, 1986, Haar, age 24, was found dead at 7:20 p.m. in her residence at 206 E. Fifth. An autopsy conducted that year gave the cause of death as smothering, and the case was ruled a homicide. The sheriff's department has kept the case open.

Haar's mother, Carmen Haar of New Mexico, recently advised the sheriff that the Carole Sund/Carrington Memorial Reward Foundation is posting the reward in an effort to bring somebody forward.

The reward is only for a limited time. Anyone with information about this case is urged to contact Sheriff Blackburn or Chief Deputy Randy Bond at 806/874-3533.

excited about softball. It's not only beneficial to just us, but to the whole community. It's nice that the community is taking an interest in the youth."

While the school has put up some money towards the project, much of the improvements have been made with donated materials and volunteer labor.

As work is nearing completion on McClelland Field and a new softball field is arising out of a formerly weed-covered lot south of Hart-Moore Field, Hysinger is pleased with the progress that is being made.

"I think that when we're through, both fields will look tremendously better," he said. "We're getting some really nice fields that cost less than they could have with-

out help."

Hysinger said he encourages people to drive by and see the work that is being done.

"Get out and help if you would like," he said. "We want to do this right where everyone will be proud of it, and we want these improvements to be nice in order to enhance the park area and add to future improvements."

Elam says this project is a good investment into the community.

"We're trying to make it something the kids and the community can be proud of. Whether people like it or don't, this has proven there's enough talent in Clarendon; and when you work together, you can get a lot done."

Pate says for anything in a com-

munity to be truly successful the community should get involved.

"It all comes down to people taking pride in their community and unifying to make a change for the better.

"If we work together, we can accomplish things like better streets, nicer community areas, and a lot more. A lot of people will say things need be done, but we need to come together and get it done."

Pate also said the community needs to be willing to donate time and support one another.

"Now is a time to be unified. The most detrimental thing in a community is to not unify. It's up to us to better ourselves and make a change for the better."



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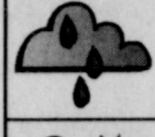

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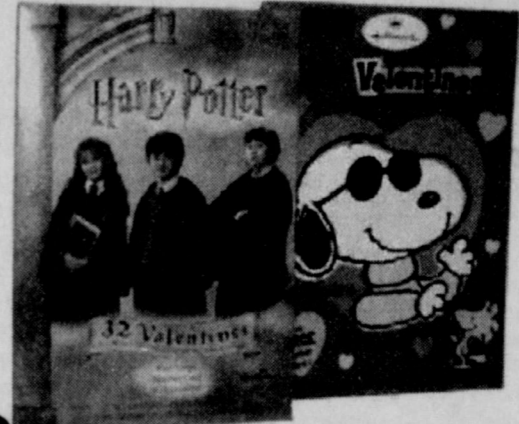
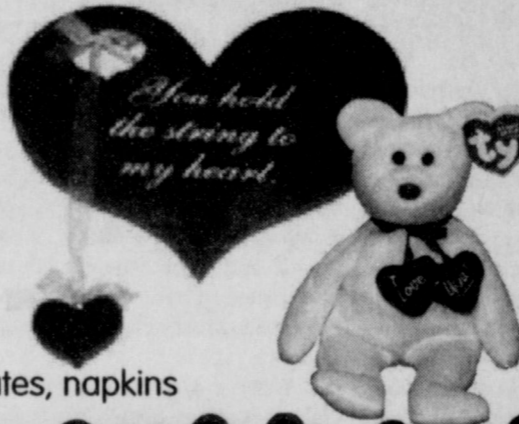
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2004 busy year for members of Clarendon Fire Department

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department had a busy year in 2004. Along with 110 fire and wreck calls, the 34-member department was active in training, public education activities, and upkeep of fire equipment.

Fire department members received a total of 521 training hours in 2004 with firefighters attending classes not only "in house" but at training schools offered by Lubbock Fire Department, Texas A&M University, Floydada Fire Department, Canyon Fire Department, and Mineral Wells Fire Department. Department training personnel hope to almost double training hours this year to help firefighters attain basic certification through the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association. Last spring, firefighters hosted two EMS classes for patient handling/extrication training day. EMS and fire personnel worked together to solve problems such as removing patients from confined areas in homes and wrecked automobiles.

The fire department also had one member certify as an Emergency Care Attendant (ECA), one certify as an Emergency Medical Technician-Basic (EMT-B), and two firefighters advance to Emergency Medical Technician-Intermediate (EMT-I) through the Associated Ambulance Authority. This cross training makes the emergency services of Donley County a more efficient and capable group.

During Fire Prevention Week (in October), firefighters visited Clarendon Elementary School students from Head Start to third grade. In our presentation to the children,

we discussed the dangers of fire, who to call in case of emergency, and what to do in the event of a house fire. In a new program the department distributed over 50 smoke detectors to students who did not have detectors at home. The department also hosted an Open House in association with Fire Prevention Week, where kids could come and see the fire station and enjoy refreshments and fire truck rides. Some members gave tours of the firehouse and fire trucks to Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts during 2004.

Fire personnel will be better able to respond to calls thanks to the addition of a new quick-attack/brass fire truck - the Ford 1 1/4 ton was funded largely by a grant from the Texas Forestry Service - and a pumper truck previously owned by the Oklahoma City Fire Department. These trucks as well as the others in the department's inventory have been set-up and maintained by the members.

It's a fact that most firefighter deaths in the United States are attributed to cardiac arrest. New guidelines set forth by the National Fire Protection Academy recommend medical evaluations, and physical fitness programs are priorities for departments.

As a volunteer organization, the Clarendon Fire Department is not required to follow these suggestions. However, for the benefit of the members, the department is looking into having exercise equipment available for a physical fitness program.

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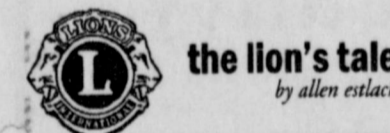

There being no further business, we were adjourned.

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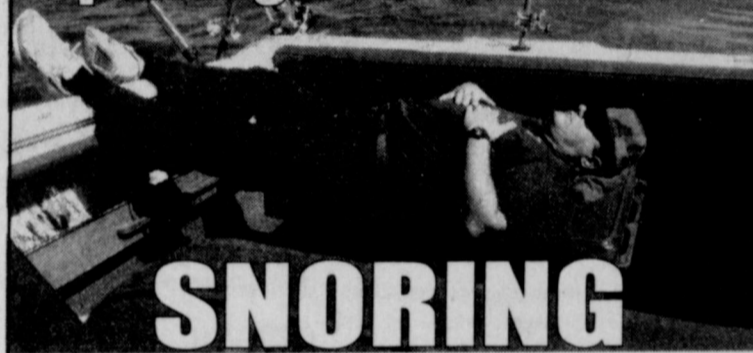

CC Regents hold regular monthly meeting

The Clarendon College Board of Regents met in regular session January 20 in the VIP Room of the Bairfield Activity Center.

Roger Estlack addressed the board concerning the site for the 2006 summer convention of the West Texas Press Association. Regents approved a request to allow the WTPA to host its hospitality room and banquet at the Bairfield Activity Center if Clarendon is chosen as the convention site.

The board received an update on the upcoming re-accreditation visit by the Southern Association of Colleges & Schools (SACS). A compliance report is due March 15 and will be audited in May, a quality enhancement plan is due in August, and an on-site visit will be held the last week in October.

The board also discussed having a called joint meeting with the board of the CC Pampa Center Foundation in Pampa following the regular board meeting on February 17.

An update was given regarding the ongoing lawsuit with Reynosa Construction, which oversaw the construction of Regents Hall. Motions have been heard in district court, but no progress has been made toward a settlement.

The board hired Jonea Rima to be the new volleyball coach and PE instructor and accepted the resignations of financial aid director Toni Bryant and assistant volleyball coach Justin Maness.

In other reports, the board was told that the latest nursing class achieved a 94.4 percent pass rate on the state exam.

Aldermen also approved a motion to order an election be held on May 7, 2005, for the purpose of election four members to the board.

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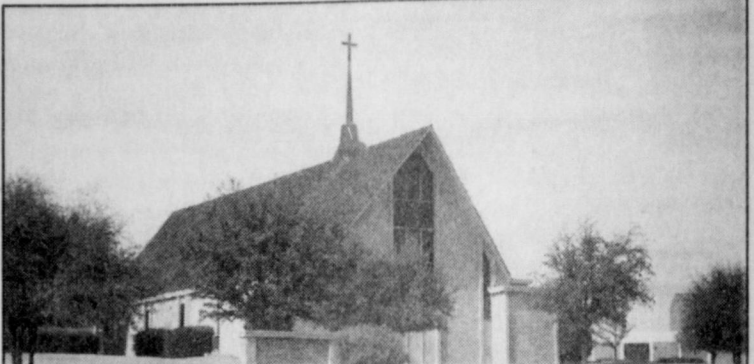
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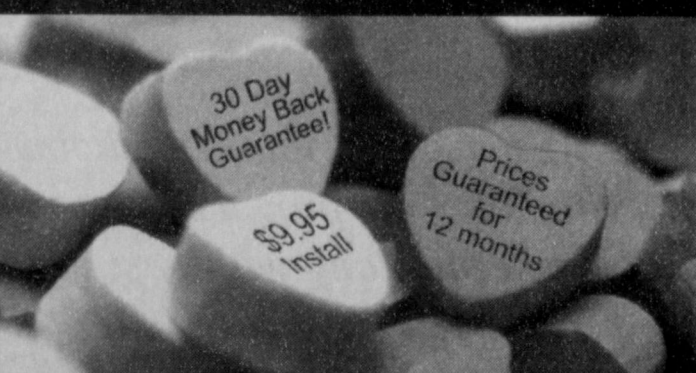
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Broncos win title as district champs

The Broncos hosted Memphis to end the week and stopped them 83-65.

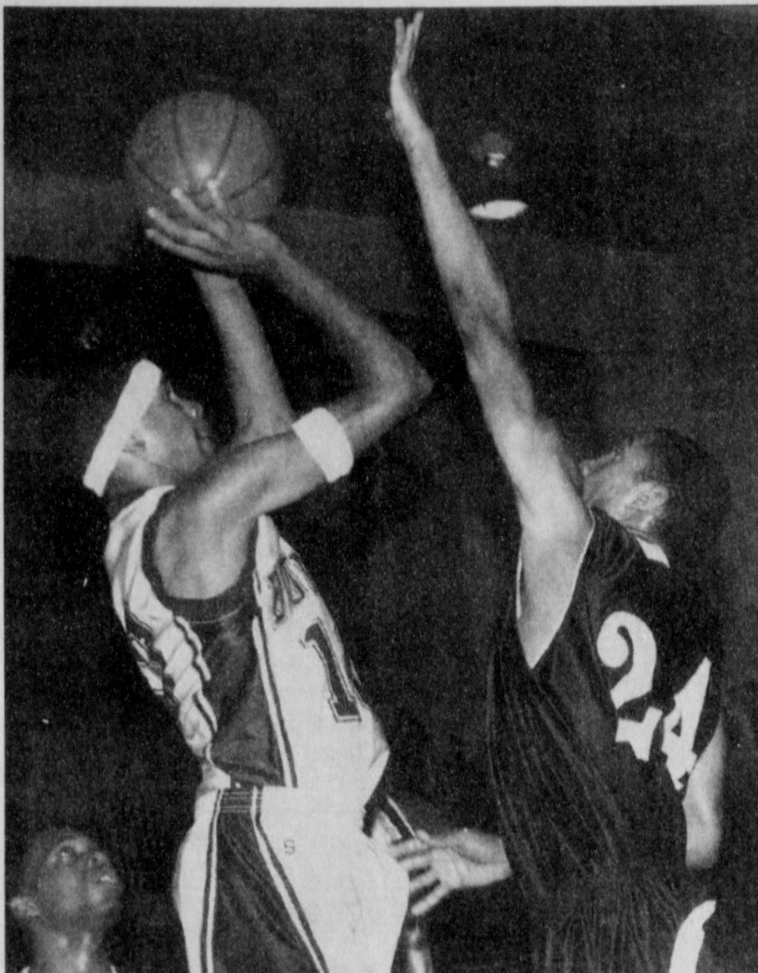
Solid play by the Broncos aided them in their win over the Cyclones. The game opened up for the Broncos in the second period as they took a 47-31 lead into the locker room.

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Area watershed eligible for CSP

The Conservation Security Program (CSP), authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill and administered by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), rewards farmers and ranchers who implement conservation on America's working lands. CSP, now in its second year, is a voluntary program based on conservation accomplishments that recognizes the contributions of the best land stewards and encourages them to do more.

The Upper Salt Fork Red Watershed is located in portions of Donley, Gray, Carson and Armstrong counties in Texas. This watershed is one of the 202 watersheds nationally selected to offer the CSP in 2005. Of the 202 watersheds, 18 watersheds were chosen for CSP in Texas. The Upper Salt Fork Red Watershed was selected because of a history of good land stewardship, excellent conservation partnership efforts, high-priority natural resource issues, and the availability of the necessary technical tools to implement the program.

According to Dr. Larry Butler, Texas State Conservationist, "USDA intends to offer a sign up for CSP in February of 2005."

The NRCS in the Upper Salt Fork Red Watershed will hold informational meetings for farmers and ranchers in the watershed to review eligibility requirements and the self-assessment tool that producers use to determine their eligibility prior to scheduling office visits with NRCS. The meetings will be held in March in various locations throughout the watershed.

For a meeting schedule, visit the NRCS Texas website at www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov/csp or contact your local USDA Service Center for meeting dates, times and locations.

"Texas is fortunate to have the Upper Salt Fork Red Watershed selected for participation in the CSP," says Butler. "Our producers, with the assistance of NRCS staff, will have an opportunity to get this program implemented within the watershed."

Producers will compete nationally for funding against the nation's best conservationists. Documentation of conservation activities, such as conservation plans and records or pest and nutrient management, will be required to support the application. Producers within the Upper Salt Fork Red Watershed are encouraged to attend the watershed informational meetings to learn if they meet the necessary eligibility requirements.
