Worley held a total of 30,359 votes to 22,845 for Wells.

Worley led in 22 of the 28 counties, carrying all but Collings-Judge James P. Alexander of Waco polled 438,893 votes to Deaf Smith, and Sherman. Wells polled his big vote in his home county, Collingsworth, receiving 2.289 there to Worley's 571. In Wheeler county, Worley's home, the winner received 2,169 and

Wells got 1,069. In Potter county (Amarillo), Worley polled 4,608 and Wells

Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo won the 31st district state senate seat over Max Boyer of Perryton with a total of 26,060 votes to 23,511 for his opponent, a majority of 2,549.

Boyer carried 13 and Hazlewood 13 counties in the district, but Hazlewood received 4,788 votes in Potter county to 2,082 for his opponent, furnishing him with the winning margin.
