

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Gov.rnor: bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to Each House.
"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.' "Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session." Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51s of Ar-ticle III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51s-1. 
