Thirty-Seven Candidates For Broncho Football Team Now Working Out

Coaches Tom Jinks and Roy Young opened fall football workouts last Monday with a total of 37 boys reporting. The coaches are running the boys through two workouts daily this week and will workout once each day next week in preparation for their first football opponent, the always powerful Stinnett Rattlers who will come to town on Friday night, Sept. 5, for the first game for both schools.

Nine returning lettermen from last year's team greeted the coaches on Monday morning of this week. They include seniors John Morrow, John Richerson, Ted Weatherly, Milton Mann, Monty Mann, and Darrell Lefew. Weatherly and Lefew played tackle and guard respectively last year but are being switched to the backfield this year. Morrow played halfback last year but may be moved to the quarterback position this year. Monty Mann is a tackle, Milton Mann a guard and Richerson a center. These nine lettermen are being depended upon to carry the major load this year in the team's play in District 2-A title race.

Other lettermen include juniors Dewey Wilson, halfback; Wayne Mann, end, and Dennis Bradshaw, guard.

Eleven other members of last year's squad are returning. These include juniors Bob Schull, tackle; Lynn Spier, tackle; James McAnear, tackle; George Mays, guard; Charles Percival, guard, and Don Hudgins, halfback. Sophomore squadmen include Ronny Tyra, center; Neal Carter, quarterback; James Kay, halfback; Tommy Messer, end, and Jerry Gray, tackle.

New members of the squad who look good are sophomore Philip Abel and juniors Jerry Allen, Larry Hopkins, Butch Emmons, Cloyce Karnes, Steve Mills and Sandy Skelton.

Freshmen students working out this week are Bobby Hutton, Jerry Bones, Billy Spier, Eddie Tipton, Leon Gibbs, Bill and Frank Hermesmeier, Kenny Schull, Pete Durham and Lucky Thompson.

Coach Jinks stated that all the boys are working hard and are progressing as well as could be expected.

FUTURE BULLDOGS' FORTUNES COULD BE FABULOUS

The Clarendon Junior College Bulldog Coach, Buddy Travis, is by nature endowed with a broad smile for all occasions, but during the summer it has become noticeable that the natural smile has broadened until it now reaches from ear to ear. This change has not come from an inheritance or chance luck that Coach Travis has experienced but from the fruits of his diligence in seeking out new students for Clarendon Jr. College who possessed two important traits; the ability and "knowhow" on the hardwood plus towering height.

Take a look at these statistics that have been extracted from the Coach's files. Returning to the Bulldog Kennel from last season's squad, which played the toughest teams in Kansas and Texas, and emerging with a 14 win and 11 lost record, defeating every team in the Junior College Conference, at least one game, are the following: Bub Eldridge, Captain of the next years squad, 6' 1" a full game scrapper, excellent defensive boy, rugged, all district selection from McAdoo High School and a regular post man on last season's

squad. Co-captain Dennis Love 6' 3 1/2" All-District and honorable mention All-State from Tulia High School. Regular forward on last seasons squad and second high scorer for the team with a 13.3 point average for the season, less than 4 points behind the number one man Steve Jarnigan who averaged 17 points per game his sophomore year. Dennis was chosen on the all-tournament team at McMurry early in his freshman year of competition and chosen at the end of the season on the All-Conference team. He is the type of boy who is capable of continued improvement and probably will carry a veterans load of responsibility during the coming season. Co-Captain Lloyd Stephens 6' 1" not only won a starting berth on the Bulldog team early in his Freshman year but won the hearts of the fans with his smooth, airtight defense and aggressiveness enough to average more than 12 points per game firing from outside. Lloyd is a native of Borger, Texas but came to Clarendon Junior College after being chosen an All-District

Teaching Assignments Completed For Public Schools And College

According to announcements by W. W. Pinkerton, beginning his fourth year as Superintendent of Schools and President of the Junior College, the teacher assignments for the coming school year, with the exception of a commercial teacher in high school, have been completed for all schools.

Mr. Oliver J. Abel, who has taught commercial subjects in the high school and college the past three years, will begin his first year as Dean of the College, replacing Mr. R. E. Drennan, present County Judge who retired at the end of last school term. Mr. Abel will teach accounting, shorthand and business mathematics in the college. Completing the college faculty will be Mrs. Lucile Naylor, history and art; Mrs. Annie Ruth Thomas, English and (See Assignments, page 5)

Several New Teachers To Greet Students

When school opens this year students of the Clarendon schools will be greeted by several new teachers.

Mrs. Wilma Batson, who holds the masters degree and has been teaching at Lelia Lake for several years, will teach one section of the first grade. The first grade will have three sections this year. Mrs. Margaret Jean Williams, wife of the junior high school coach, J. R. Williams, will replace Mrs. Bobby Seago in the third grade.

In the high school and college, Mrs. Nelson Seago, a long time teacher at Lelia Lake who also holds the masters degree, will teach education and geography in the college. Geography is a new subject being added to the college curriculum this year. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Dean Bier will teach in the high school. Mrs. Bier will teach sophomore English and speech and Mr. Bier will teach algebra II, plane geometry in the high school and the organic chemistry in college. Charles C. Ladd, holder of the masters degree, will teach general math and algebra I in high school and typewriting in the college. Miss Betty Sue Walker, masters degree teacher from Lubbock, will teach English I and Spanish in the high school. Miss Walker has 57 semester hours credit in Spanish, 30 semester hours in French and also can speak Portuguese and German. Mrs. Sue Shields will assist Mrs. Bourland in the vocational homemaking department and Jerry Hawkins will assist Mr. Gillham in the vocational agriculture department.

The school also has a new librarian in the person of Miss Dorothy McCown. Miss McCown has the masters degree in library science.

At this time one position remains open, that of commercial teacher in high school.

Local Vote High In Second Primary Election Saturday

The total vote cast in precinct No. 2 in last Saturday's second primary election was considered exceptionally large considering the fact that there was but only one other race to be decided than our local commissioner race.

A total vote of 627 for the boxes at the court house and the City Hall showed that residents of Precinct 2 were really interested. H. L. Riley, prominent farmer who lives in the northeast corner of the precinct, was the winner with a total of 323 votes, a 19 vote margin over Edd Mooring who received 304 votes.

A total of 868 votes were cast in this race at the first primary when there were six candidates pulling the votes. Only 241 of those voters failed to return to the polls Saturday.

The total votes cast in the county was only 715 which showed that the local race carried all the interest.

In the state race for Associate Justice of Supreme Court, Place 1, Robert W. Hamilton received 502 votes and J. Edwin Smith received 97. Hamilton won the seat in the state-wide poll.

W. J. Greene New Head Entertainment Association

High School Students To Register Friday

High School Principal, Kenneth Vaughan, has announced that all students who will enroll in Clarendon High School should be present for registration on Friday, August 29. Senior students will begin registering at 9:00 A. M., juniors at 9:45, sophomores at 10:30 and freshmen at 11:15. Registration should be completed by noon Friday.

Students will register, be issued textbooks and lockers on Friday and classes will begin on Monday, Sept. 1. Classes will only be in session until noon on Monday. Each of the six periods will meet for one half hour on Monday for the purpose of getting assignments, meeting teachers, etc. Junior high and elementary students will register on Monday. School buses will not operate on Friday but will make their regular routes on Monday and return students at noon. The school cafeteria will start serving lunch on Tuesday, Sept. 2nd.

High school students will have a variety of subjects to choose from this year. All students may enroll for five subjects if they so desire, but four subjects is the minimum. Freshmen and sophomore students will have to complete 18 credits for graduation and juniors and seniors will come under the old standard of 16 credits for graduation.

The complete curriculum this year consists of four years of English, one year of speech, two years of Spanish, three years of social studies, four years of mathematics, four years of science, four years of commercial subjects, three years of vocational homemaking, four years of vocational agriculture, band and choral.

Freshmen students will be required to enroll in English I, either algebra I or general mathematics and world history. Sophomores will be required to take English II, either algebra II or plane geometry, and biology. Juniors will enroll in English III and civics, and seniors will be required English IV and American History. Each class will have a long list of electives in which to complete their academic load.

Sox Win Little League Series Friday Night

The Clarendon Little League World Series came to an end last Friday night after going the full seven games. The Sox were victorious over the Cubs 19-11.

This was the fourth win for the Sox which crowned them the Little League Champs in Clarendon for the current year.

The details of the boys swine show will be worked out at a later date as it will be held at a separate date after the county fair.

The big fair barn in Clarendon now has an asphalt floor in it and things will be much nicer for the showing of the county fair.

Catalogues are now available at the county agents office and will be distributed as soon as possible. All details and instructions for all departments are shown in the catalogue. All departments will be set up on the 18th of September so that they will be ready for the opening of the fair on the 19th.

This will afford the community a chance to welcome the teachers and school officials to their tasks for this school year. A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend this meeting.

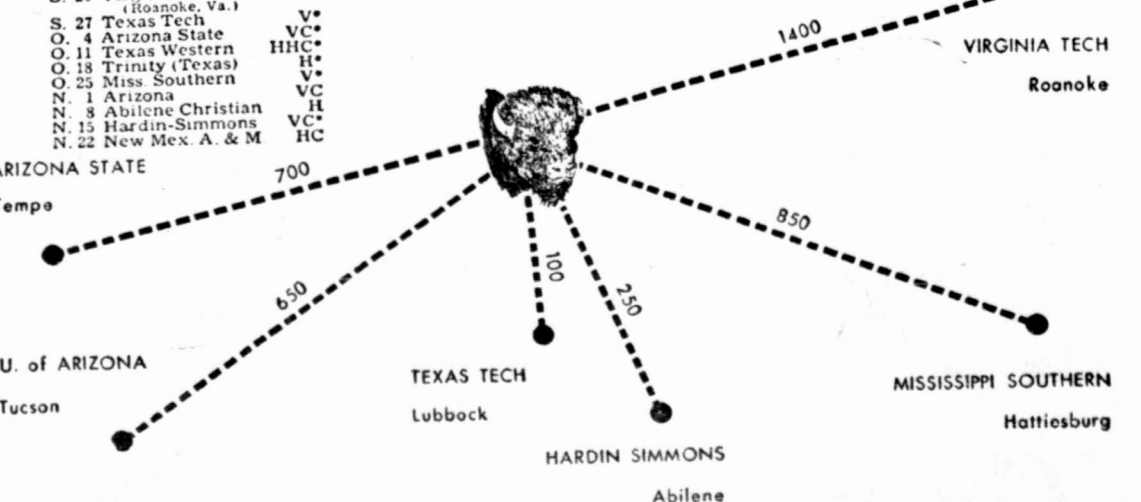

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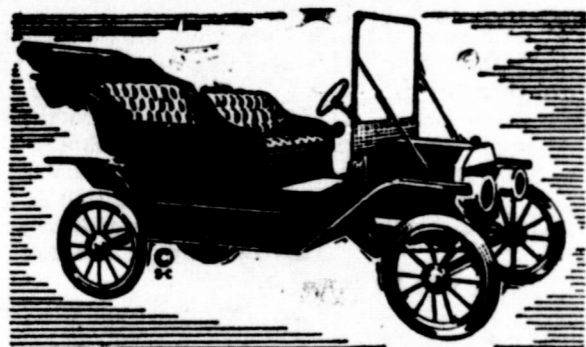

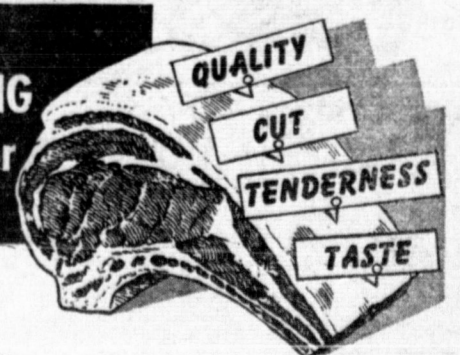

The Texian Editor's Frontier News Flashes

Department of Journalism & Graphic Arts University of Houston

August 24-30, 1958

Our town was thrown into the highest excitement on the morning of the 4th inst., in consequence of a shooting affair which took place in the street near the public square. Winston Banks was shot as he was walking in the street from the Court House to his residence, the ball taking effect near the spine, above the hip passing out on the right side. The wound, it is supposed, will not produce death.

The great Houston demonstration, given by the admirers of "Sam", came off at this place on Thursday last. A procession was formed, consisting of about 80 men and boys, and 10 buggies and carriages. Gen. Houston bringing up the rear. Arriving at the stand, a reception and laudatory address was delivered by James Willie, Esq., when the General lumbered forth his same old stereotyped speech, praising himself and denouncing others.

(The "Washington Ranger") Col. A. M. Lewis, agent of the Railroad, now being graded from Brenham to Washington, is in town, and he puts us in possession of the following facts:

The grading of the eight and one-half miles from Hemstead across the Brazos River, to the edge at the bottom will cost \$13,233.00. This includes trussel work across the river. The total cost of this eight and one-half miles is estimated at \$155,842. The estimated cost of the bridge is \$62,000. The total distance from Brenham to Hemstead is 19 7/8 of a mile, and the total cost will be nearly \$400,000—at least this is our estimate, judging by the first eight miles, and the usual cost. Twenty thousand dollars per mile, in Texas, is about a safe estimate.

The people of Washington county find the work too heavy for their means, within any reasonable time. They have therefore determined to make an appeal to the citizens of Travis and the intervening country to assist the enterprise by taking a portion of the stock.

Gov. Price Daniel, U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, National Committeeman Byron Skelton, and Speaker Sam Rayburn—all say they want harmony.

Even National Committeewoman Mrs. R. D. Randolph, who has tirelessly needed Governor Daniel and the state committee for two years, more or less joined in by predicting "a spirit of good will" among delegates.

Despite the expressions of good intent, harmony among Texas Democrats is hard to come by. Like a huge household of relatives and in-laws, the party always has many clashing personalities and viewpoints under one roof. In the past, there've been rump conventions and separate rival delegations to the national convention.

It is the hope of avoiding this in 1960 that lies behind the cementing efforts. Many leaders contend that a unified Texas delegation could have a key role in naming the next presidential nominee.

All the above-mentioned leaders are presently agreed on one issue—support of the party nominees. Point on which they part is whether the governor should have a veto over the state committee members selected by vote of district delegations.

Governor Daniel, following the practice of past governors, bumped some of the district-selected committee members in 1956 and

submitted people more in line with his program.

Mrs. Randolph and Senator Yarborough, now joined by Rayburn, insist the governor has no right to do this.

But Governor Daniel has not promised he wouldn't. He said he felt no district should propose a committee member who is "dedicated to the sabotage of a duly elected officers of the party." This almost certainly refers to members of the Democrats of Texas (DOT), an ultra-liberal group that has heckled and hindered the governor and other official party leaders at every turn for the past two years.

Delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts are allowed two state committee members—a man and a woman. It is estimated that perhaps six of these districts may be controlled by anti-Daniel forces. Therein lies the possibility for discord. If any of these districts proposes a DOTer for the state committee, the governor is not likely to "harmonize."

HIGH HOPES

Mr. Wilson went to Washington, his saddlebags full of multi-million-dollar hopes for Texas school children.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson personally delivered the Texas brief in the upcoming U. S. Supreme court case on Texas tidelands. At issue is whether the state or federal government owns submerged lands between the points 3 miles out and 10.5 miles out.

Wilson carried the arguments for Texas ownership in 40-year old saddlebags that belonged to a heroic Texas Ranger. He declares optimistically that the case is jinxed—in Texas' favor—because the brief is dated Aug. 13, trial is set for Oct. 13, oral arguments will last 13 hours and 13 people worked on the research.

More seriously, he noted that Texas had spent "a big sum of money" marshalling its facts, that a bevy of top-notch legal minds from over the state, nation and two foreign countries had spent some 2,000 hours on the 400-page brief.

"We feel like we have an overwhelming case," he said. "We feel like we will win it."

DISTRICT NEWS

Cover crop planting time is just about here in the Donley County Soil Conservation District. Cover crops are an important part of a conservation cropping system.

The planting of crops for cover will provide a lot of protection to the soil against wind and water erosion. Other benefits from cover crops may be received in the form of soil improvement as well as the addition of organic matter. The sandier types of soil in the area are especially in need of some type of cover to hold it in place during the winter and spring months.

Several operators in the area are planning to use the inter-row seeding equipment that the District has made available. This equipment can be rented for a nominal fee per acre. Inter-row seeding equipment allows the operator to seed the middles of a growing crop such as cotton or milo just after the last cultivation. Winter peas, rye, vetch, or a mixture can be seeded in either two or four drills per middle. The seeders will carry three middles and can be drawn by any type of farm tractor.

For additional information on inter-row seeding of cover crops, contact your District Supervisor or one of the local Soil Conservation Service Technicians.

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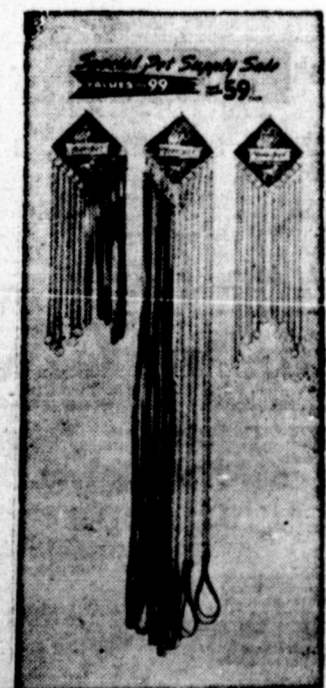
