# Lake Creek Watershed Field Review Report Tonight (Thurs.)

A field review began September 9 on the proposed Lake Jack Brumley Rites Creek Watershed and a final report is to be given in a Thursday In Hedley Monday night meeting (tonight). Members of the review team

are L. H. Barnes, State Soil and Water Conservation Board Engineer; W. W. Snyder, Economist for the Soil Conservation Service; and H. N. McGill, Hydrologist for the Soil Conservation Service. Others assisting with the field

review are Douglas Cunningham, Soil Conservation Service area conservationist and Monty Sowers, Soil Conservation district conservationist. The field review will be completed today, Thurs-

The function of the review team is to determine if the watershed project is economically feasible. To determine this information a study is made of the amount of damage done to cropland, rangeland, public and private roads, bridges, and other facilities by Lake Creek and its tributaries. Other information used by the team to arrive at their decision will be the amount of conservation practices already applied such as terraces, waterways, ponds, diversions, and brush control. This information has previously been gathered by the Soil Conservation Service and Soil and Water Conservation District.

A meeting will be held tonight, Thursday, September 11, at 8 p. m. at the Lelia Lake Community Center to discuss the team's findings and to answer any questions concerning the watershed. All interested people in the area are encouraged to attend.






