County Agent Pat C. Garner says growers should plant when conditions are most favorable for fast germination and emergence. Seed should be planted as shallow as possible so that



High quality seed treated with a thiram type seed protectant such as Arasas 75 should be planted, suggests Garner. This, along with shallow planting when conditions are favorable for germination and emergence, will result in reduced losses due







Swine Course Opens Monday A swine short course will be

held at the Clyde Vocational Agriculture building beginning at 8 p.m. Monday.

The course is designed for adult farmers of the area and will be taught by Joe Tocquigny, swine specialist of the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

The course will include such topics as selection and breeding, diseases and parasites, feeds and feeding, housing and equipment, general management problems and marketing.

If enough interest is shown demonstrations can be held in probing, selection, estimating carcass value, carcass evaluation and others. Farm visits will be made upon invitation and as party Monday evening in the time permits.




