


## NUMBER OF BUSINESS FIRMS PLAN TO CLOSE SATURDAY AFTERNOON

### Bulldogs Play Close Games In Oklahoma Holiday Tournament

The Clarendon College Bulldogs were up and down all weekend, as they participated in the Murray State Invitational Basketball Tournament during the Thanksgiving holidays.

The Bulldogs slipped into the semi-finals by defeating the Southeastern State College freshmen, 76-75. The Bulldogs met the homestanding Aggies of Murray State in the semi-finals and took it on the chin, 71-53. Then on Saturday night Conners State College edged the Dogs for 3rd place, 76-74.

In the opening game at Tishomingo, Oklahoma, the Clarendon College basketball team had to hang on for their lives as the Savages of Durant, Oklahoma, rallied in the closing minutes to within one point of the Bulldogs. The Bulldogs were enjoying a 16-point lead when the Savages made their bid for victory.

The Bulldogs went to the dressing room at halftime all knotted up at 37-37. The aroused Bulldogs played superb defense for the first ten minutes of the second half and threatened to run away with the contest as they owned a 62-48 lead. Then the roof fell in as the Savages outscored the Dogs 25-14 before time ran out. The Bulldogs had four men in double figures with Jackie Thrasher of Canyon leading the way with 18. Rene Ornes and Tony Moya added 14 a piece while Jerry Howard chipped in 12.

The Bulldogs couldn't get rolling against the Murray State Aggies in the second round of the tournament, and the quintet of Clarendon College found themselves on the short end of a 41-21 score at half.

The Bulldogs made a gallant effort the second half against Murray, fourth place finisher in the national tournament last year, but could cut the lead to only nine with eight minutes to go. When the Dogs finally had to go after the ball in the closing minutes, the Aggies kept their

poise and moved on to an 18-point win.

Almost the entire Bulldog team got into the scoring act, but all scored under ten points. Howard and Ornes paced the Dogs with 8 points each.

The Bulldogs wound up play in the tournament by playing Conners State College of Warner, Oklahoma, for third place. The game was played on even terms throughout the contest, with neither team holding over a six point lead at any time.

With two minutes to go, Conners held a six-point lead and had the ball. Two quick turnovers were made by the Bulldogs who capitalized on both occasions bringing them to within two. A bad pass with eight seconds to go gave the ball back to the Bulldogs for a chance to tie the game. The Bulldogs called time out with six seconds to go in the game. When play was resumed, the Bulldogs made a play for a shot from in close, but a traveling violation was called, and the attempt to tie the game was thwarted. The clock ran out with the Bulldogs going down to the tune of 76-74.



**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court in a major will contest held that 22-year-old Army Sgt. Albert Buckman Wharton III is sole heir to the \$45 million oil-ranching estate of Electra Waggoner (for whom the town of Electra was named).

High Court set arguments for December 17 in a case which will determine if private clubs in dry areas can hire agents to buy liquor for "locker system" pools. Four months ago the Third Court of Civil Appeals holding against the State Liquor Control Board, said such a procedure is legal.

Sixteen-year sentence of a 17-year-old Dallas youth for possession of marijuana was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals on grounds that there was no evidence the boy was ever in the room where burned marijuana was found.

San Antonio discount stores have filed a motion for reconsideration of a split Supreme Court decision on upholding Saturday — Sunday closing law's constitutionality.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS** — A Court order stating that a person with a suspended driver's license can drive under certain conditions with an "occupational license" must set out the actual hours of the day that driving is permitted, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin altered an earlier opinion to reflect that those seeking "occupational licenses" need only a court order and proof of insurance (or its equivalent) under the Texas' Safety Responsibility Law.

The Attorney General is warning Texans to be on the lookout for lottery punchboards currently being mailed into the state. Letters accompanying the boards attempt to induce people to sell chances on the punchboards to win merchandise. Martin pointed out that while selling chances on the punchboards is a violation of the state lottery law.

**AUTO INSPECTIONS DOWN** — Auto inspections are 30 per cent behind the number last year, according to Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of Texas Department of Public Safety.

Unless things pick up, forecasts Speir, car owners are going to be waiting in some mighty long lines at garages and service stations around the April 15 deadline.


During the state fiscal year which ended August 31, 6.3 million vehicles were inspected. Since September 1, only 538,990 have gone through the required check. All inspection stickers issued after September 1 will expire 12 months from date of issue. All new stickers must be displayed before April 15, however. Stickers this year will go on driver's side of windshield.

**VALLEY VISTAS YANKED** — James W. Griffith, new Southwest Regional Office of Economic Opportunity boss, announced withdrawal and reassignment of 15 VISTA anti-poverty workers in Cameron and Willacy counties.

Griffith charged that Volunteers in Service to America were made "scapegoats of local political disputes" and subjected to "harassment, uncertainty and threats." He said the VISTA group in the two counties were responsible people and there was no evidence of improper action on their part. Griffith lashed Cameron County commissioners for again requesting the governor to remove them after a 90-day truce period had been agreed on for reassessing VISTA work. There is, Griffith concluded, a shortage of such workers, and they will be sent where they are needed and wanted.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED** — Gov. Preston Smith named the members of the new Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists, then changed his mind about qualifications of three of the six, pending a more specific definition of "accredited" Colleges — a "recruited" of appointees.

Their survey concluded that 4,700 more nurses, aides and orderlies are needed. Also listed as "desperately needed" are medical technologists and technicians, x-ray technologists, social work-inhalation therapists, pharmacists, speech pathologists and physical and occupation therapists.

### WORKER PROTECTION

**NEW YORK** — Most American workers today are covered by workmen's compensation insurance, notes the Insurance Information Institute. Employers in 1968 paid \$2.875 billion in premiums for this protection, designed to provide for the cost of medical care and weekly payments to injured employees or to dependents of persons killed in work-connected accidents.





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### NEWS FROM

#### Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

Dear Friends:

House action was limited last week due to the Veterans Day Holiday. This gave me the opportunity to return to the Panhandle for a brief visit.

The Senate Finance Committee has completed its deliberations on the Tax Reform Measure passed earlier by the House. The full Senate is expected to begin debate on the measure in the near future. Some of the House provisions changed by the Committee include:

**Tax-exempt bonds** — The Committee deleted House-passed provisions to tax a portion of the interest on municipal bonds;

**Minimum tax** — This provision was rewritten by the Committee and provides that everyone pay some tax;

**Oil depletion** — As I reported previously the Senate committee lowered the depletion allowance from 27.5 percent to 23 percent. This is 3 percent higher than the 20 percent approved by the House. Because of the close vote by which the Senate committee defeated efforts to keep the allowance at 27.5 percent I am still hopeful that it will be restored on the Senate floor.

**Financial institution** — The committee softened House provisions which would have increased bank taxes from 23 percent to 30 percent and savings and loans

taxes from 15 percent to 29 percent. The committee set bank taxes at 25 percent and savings and loans taxes at 19 percent.

**Capital gains** — The House-approved provisions to extend the capital gains holding period from six months to one year was removed by the Senate committee.

**Administration programs** — The problems encountered by President Nixon in dealing with a Democrat-controlled Congress are highlighted in a report last week by House Republican Leader Gerald Ford. The President has recommended 48 major legislative proposals this year. The Democrat leadership has allowed Congress to act on only seven of them.

**Major Administration Reform proposals** which have not completed the legislative process include: Tax reform; organized crime and illegal gambling legislation; drug reform; postal reform; revenue sharing; and many others.

I am hopeful that the optimism expressed by President Nixon at a White House breakfast I attended last week is warranted and that Democratic leadership will soon begin to move forward with these much needed reforms.



### Social Security News

Q.—I have employed a maid in my home for many years. I pay her \$25 a week wages. I just learned I had to report her wages for social security. How far back do I go?

A.—All the way back to 1951, if she has been with you that long. Sometimes reported wages are not uncovered until the worker claims social security or dies, and employers often face a big delinquent tax bill.

Q.—Are retirement payments based in just the last five years' work prior to retirement?

A.—No. Generally, payments are based on the best earning years during a person's working life. The number of years used depends on the year you reach retirement age.

Q.—I just broke my leg and my doctor says I will be off work about 5 months. Can I receive disability insurance payments?

A.—Probably not. To receive disability insurance payments you must have a physical or mental impairment which will prevent you from doing any substantial gainful work for at least 12 full months. No payment can be made for the first 6 months of your disability.

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
