## Co. Hospital Project Hits Snag Temporarily Halting Progress

The Donley County Hospital Board received a blow this week in the form of a letter which has halted progress of actual construction getting underway within the very near future. The letter disapproving the hospital site by the Donley County Health Officer is included in Hospital Board minutes reprinted below.

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District met in a called meeting January 5th, 1971 at 7:00 o'clock p.m. at the City Hall with the following Directors present: O. C. Watson, John Jones, Lloyd Risley, Ernest Barbee and Jane Bownds.

The President called the meeting to order for the purpose of considering the letter written by Dr. George W. Smith, Donley County Health Officer, to Mr. J. W. Hornsburg, Director, Division of Nursing Homes, Texas State Department of Health, disapproving the hospital site. The letter was mailed to Mr. Hornsburg and copies mailed to nine Directors of Medical Services within the State.

Motion was made by John Jones that the letter written by the Donley County Health Officer be made a part of these minutes. Motion was seconded by Ernest Barbee. Motion unanimously carried.

The Board of Directors agreed to meet with the Donley County Commissioner's Court at 1:00 o'clock p.m. Monday, January 11th.

The President read a letter from Dr. Brame. The Board of Directors agreed to meet with Mr. Kinney at 7:00 o'clock p.m. Tuesday, January 12th, 1971.

Motion was made by Ernest Barbee that this meeting be recessed. Motion was seconded by Jane Bownds. Motion carried.

Dear Sir:  
Acting in accordance with guidelines and specifications promulgated and published by the Texas State Department of Health, the undersigned hereby signifies his disapproval of the state selected for construction of combination nursing home — acute hospital by the Donley County Hospital District.

The proposed site, east of Highway 70, and near the intersection of Highways 287 and 70, just within the north city limits of Clarendon, Texas, is not favorably considered because of various factors, including the following:

1. Location is such that patients (building plans include out patient clinics) and visitors, the majority in older age groups, will be required to make use of two major highways, both very heavily travelled and involving a difficult intersection of the two, to have access to the property.

2. Excessive noise near the site is a real problem. The site is adjacent to the main line of the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, and the tremendous roar and horns of the freight trains, together with the heavy traffic on U. S. Highway 287 just South, create an unfavorable environment for patients. The highway is on a marked incline, causing loud braking and accelerating by the constant heavy truck traffic.

3. The views from the site particularly to the East, leave much to be desired.

4. One road bounding the property does not have a dust free surface (dirt road). Also there are plowed fields, with a real dust factor, in two directions.

Regarding actual plans and specifications for the building, I believe I approve in principle, but I have not been furnished complete plans, not even a complete floor plan or site plan. Therefore, I withhold an expression until I can be further advised. In this connection, from a health officer's viewpoint, I am particularly interested in engineer's plans for bringing approved water supply, approved sewage disposal, and adequate water supply for fire hydrants, none of which are presently available in the part of Clarendon under consideration. It is further requested that your office advise the undersigned, as to whether building and equipment specifications of the nursing home portion of the building are such that they would meet the Social Security Administration's conditions for participation as an extended care facility, as it was represented to the voters in the bond election that the facility would qualify under said federal program.

To try to be sure that I was not using personal prejudice in disapproving the site location, I sought individual advice from the president and secretary of the regional Medical Society, from officers of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and the Donley County Industrial Foundation, and from the two newly elected Donley County Commissioners, in whose precincts most of Clarendon's population resides. These individuals all concur in the feeling that it would be a serious mistake to locate the facility as planned. Land acquisition in Clarendon is not a problem — it is inexpensive and it is available in all parts of the city.

I will be glad to confer with representatives of the State Health Department regarding this project and will cooperate in any way possible.

Members of the Hospital Board met with the County Commissioners Monday, January 11 and presented a letter asking the approval of the Court of the hospital site.

The minutes of that meeting read in part as follows: Motion by H. C. Reynolds and seconded by Jr. Hill to take action this date on the request presented by the local hospital board. Reynolds and Hill voted for the motion; Jess Finley and John W. Swinney voted against the motion. Judge W. R. Christal voted against the motion only after the commissioners agreed to meet in a special recessed session Tuesday, January 19 to discuss the matter further.

The minutes of the Hospital Board, in full text, covering previous meetings are on file in the Leader office.

Some Board Members feel sure that approval of the site to satisfy construction of the extended care portion of the hospital can be secured through state officials, but it will take time just when the board was within only a short time of securing bids for actual construction. As far as the acute portion of the hospital is concerned, a letter of approval would not be necessary but members of the board feel that the Nursing Home or Extended Care Unit is badly needed for our elderly population here and should still be included in the hospital plans.

According to Board minutes dated Dec. 18 a motion was made by Delbert Robertson that the Board authorize R. A. Underwood and Jack Morris to advertise bonds for sale and bids from buyers to be considered here January 27. The motion was seconded by Lloyd Risley and carried unanimously.

O. C. Watson, president, reported that Donald Goss, Architect, stated that he would have completed plans ready by the same date, January 27, and that advertisements for bids could be made any time thereafter to get actual construction underway.

Mr. Watson also pointed out that the site chosen by the local board was the first choice of the Architect and that three different location drawings were submitted to Hill-Burton in Austin and the same site was their first choice which was a big factor in the local board's purchasing this location.

Mr. Watson also reported that the City Council had placed in their minutes several weeks ago that the city would provide ample water for hospital use and fire protection and all necessary sewage lines and assist the Hospital Board in any other manner feasible.

## Farm News

from County ASCS Com.

### Cotton Yields

The County Committee has set January 18, 1971, as the final date for producers to bring in cotton production records for 1970. Whatever your production was, or even if you did not harvest any cotton, we need to be notified. The County Committee can make adjustments on a low yield because of abnormal weather conditions, but if you do not come in at all, your record will show a zero for 1970.

### Set-Aside Acreage

Land which is under contract prohibiting the production of a crop will not be eligible for set-aside acreage.

### Wool and Unshorn Lamb

The marketing year for sale of wool and unshorn lambs ended December 31, 1970. The final date to file sales receipts for incentive payments is February 1, 1971.

### CCC Loans

Extended warehouse - storage loans are authorized for the 1970 crop grain sorghum, wheat, oats, and barley. Extended warehouse loans are not authorized for the 1970 crop corn or soybeans.

This will require settlement of all 1968 and 1969 crops in extended warehouse - storage loans.

### Sale or Lease of Cotton

Sale or lease of cotton allotments is extended by the new program. The date for selling or leasing cotton allotments is extended to May 3, 1971.

### Clarendon College Enrollment Jan. 18

Enrollment for the spring semester at Clarendon College will begin January 18 at 8 a.m. Classes will begin January 19.

All students enrolling at Clarendon College for the first time are encouraged to visit the office of the Registrar, Leonard "Tex" Selvidge for pre-enrollment counseling.

Dorms open at 1 p.m. January 17 and the Cafeteria will serve breakfast the morning of January 18.

A record enrollment is expected as indicated by the number of new students that have already contacted school administrators.

### Register Now To Be Eligible To Vote

Area residents are reminded that now is the time to REGISTER to be eligible to vote. Every person must register to vote whether you are 65 or older or 18 years of age. Eighteen year olds are eligible to vote in Federal elections only but must register to fill this requirement.

## COUNTY BANKS SHOW INCREASE NO DECREASE

Our figures got mixed up last week in a report of the financial condition of our three county banks with the difference in figures being a two year period of time and not just at which time we showed a decrease in deposits.

According to the figures of December 31, 1969 and Dec. 31, 1970, there was an increase of \$208,049.59 in deposits instead of \$88,920.08 decrease.

In the loan department there was a decrease of \$1,401,025.47 in loans over the same period of time instead of \$1,226,899.62. This is all an even better report considering the weather conditions that hampered our farmers and ranchers last year.

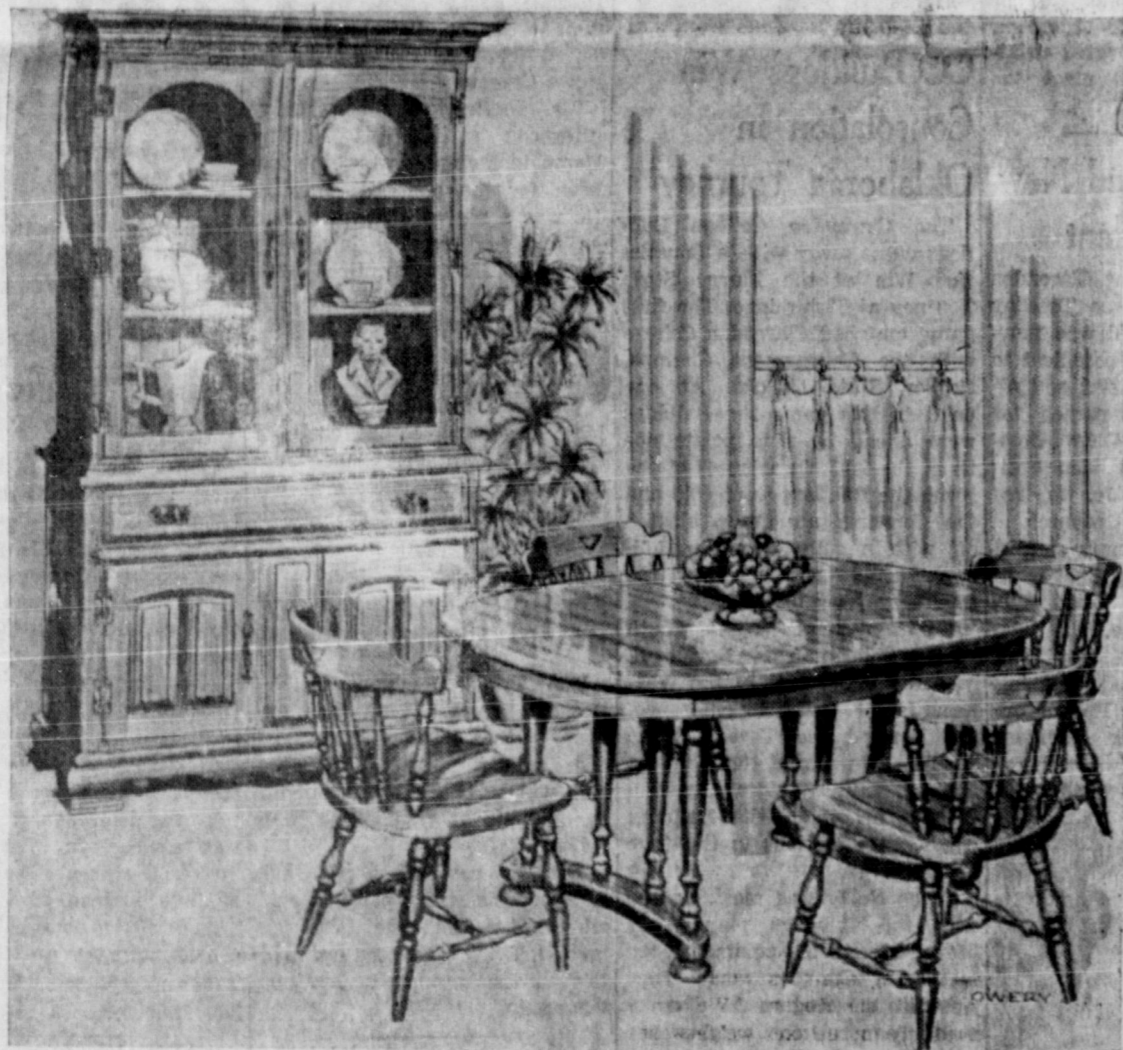
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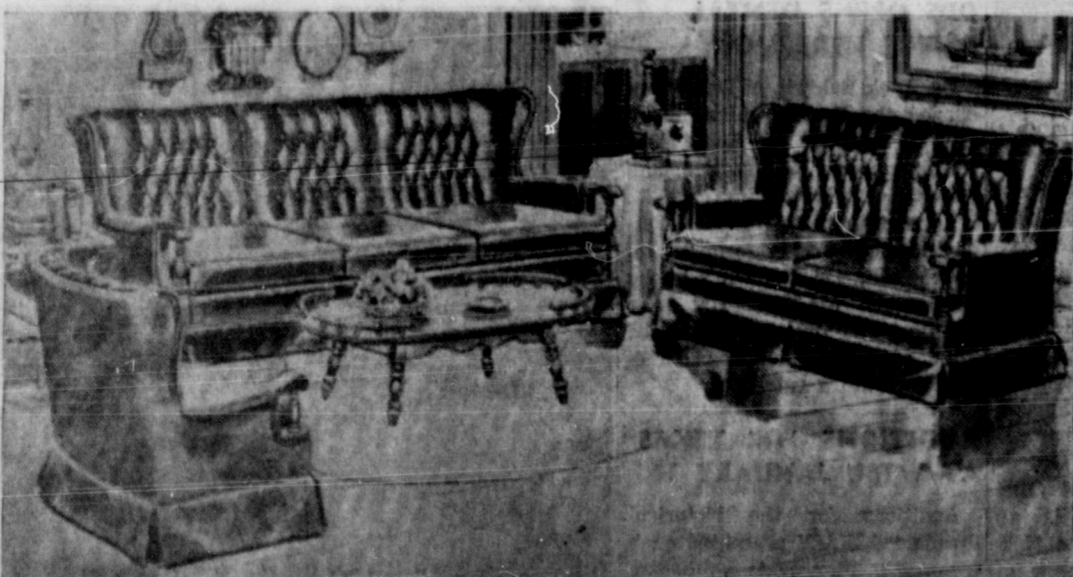

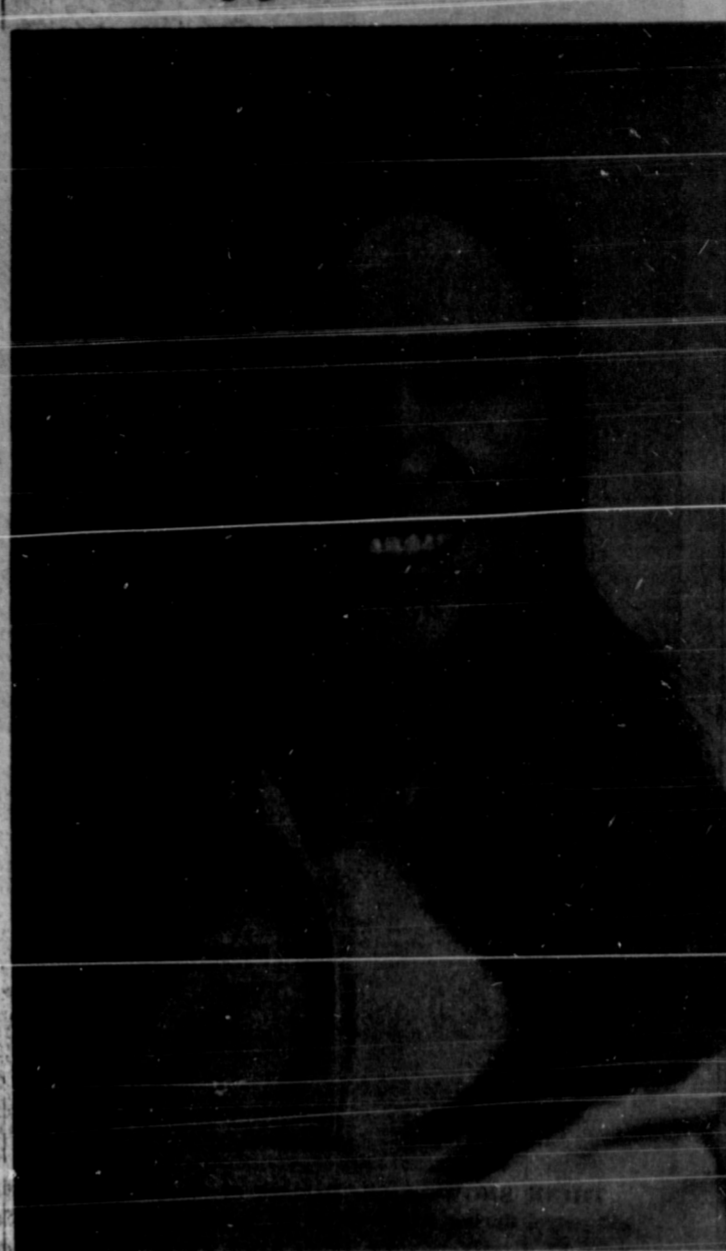

## Medicare Beneficiaries Urged To Check Benefit Payments

"If you are a Medicare ben- efi- ciary, please examine the ex- planations of benefits you receive showing payments for medical services," urged Wayman E. Re- gister, Social Security Regional Commissioner in Dallas, Texas. "Any discrepancy noted should be reported to the nearest social security office. Most mistakes are just honest errors but oc- casionally there is an attempt to collect for services not per- formed," Register said.

The alert eye of a Medicare beneficiary in Oklahoma recently led to the apprehension of an ambulance company operator who had submitted bills for four ambulance trips when only one took place, Register said.

Following a plea of guilty, the former operator of the Osage Ambulance Company of Paw- huska, Robert M. Williams, was convicted and placed on three years probation by the U. S. Dis- trict Court in Tulsa.

Since supplies of any medical services covered by Medicare may be reimbursed direct for services rendered, Register ex- plained, it is extremely im- portant that all people covered by Medicare check the explanation of benefits paid which they re- ceive, thereby insuring that only valid claims are honored and that anyone attempting to falsify claims is brought to justice.

## Social Security News

Q—I would like to file my ap- plication by calling the social se- curity office as some of my neigh- bors have done, but I feel that my case poses too many un- usual and complex problems. Should I phone the office or come in person?

A—The chances are that every- thing about your application can be handled by telephone. If ne- cessary the social security office can call you back later in order to complete some unusual or complex part of your claim. Only in rare instances would it be ne- cessary for you to have to meet a social security representative in person. Handling all social se- curity matters by telephone if possible is our latest way of speeding up service to the pub- lic. We call it "teleservice."

Q—I'll be 65 years old three months from now. I'm still work- ing regularly but I plan to retire on my 65th birthday. If I have to go to the social security of- fice to file my claim for month- ly benefits and Medicare, I'll lose one-half day's pay. Can I furnish enough information over the phone to keep from having to go to the office?

A—Yes. All necessary infor- mation can usually be obtained by telephone in just a few min- utes. The social security office will then mail the completed form to you to sign. After you have signed the form you will return it along with other docu- ments we may request in the self-addressed envelope we will furnish you.

Q—My mother has misplaced her social security check and doesn't know what to do about it. She doesn't think it was sto-

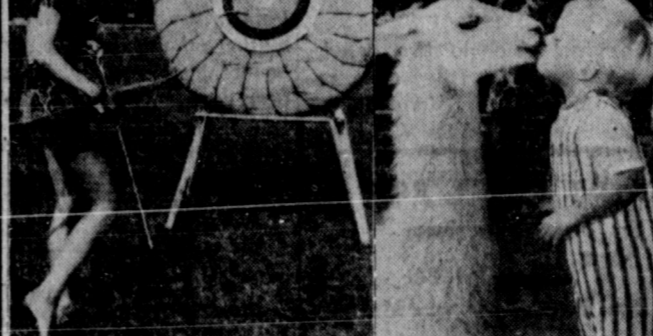

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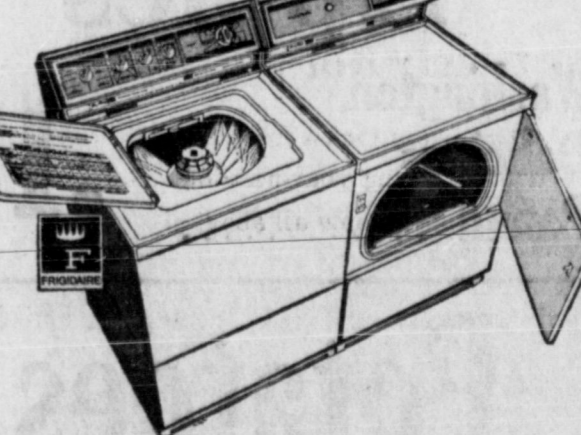
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**Pictures of British Isles To Be Shown Sunday, January 17**

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1970 gross income from farming should file their 1970 declaration of estimated federal income tax by January 15, 1971, using Form 1040-ES (F).

However, farmers do not have to file an estimate if they file their 1971 return and pay all the tax due by Monday, March 1, 1971, according to Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas.

**Cotton Classing Office Is Closed at Memphis Friday, January 8**

The USDA, Consumer Marketing Service Memphis, Texas Cotton Classing Office closed Friday, January 8, 1971. "Cotton harvested after this date will be classed in Altus, Oklahoma," said W. E. Cain, Officer-in-Charge.

The Memphis office classed 96,600 samples this past season, the lowest total since the office opened 12 years ago. Another 3,600 samples were classed in Altus before this office opened, bringing the season total to 100,200 samples from the Memphis, Texas territory.

The drought affected the quantity more than the quality of Greenbelt cotton this year. The grades staple, and micronaire held up well through the season.

As this office closes, the demand is still strong and very few bales of cotton remain in growers hands as they have taken advantage of favorable prices.

Average prices received this week by farmers on the most active qualities traded were Mid Lt Sp 15/16, 20.90; Mid Lt Sp 31/32, 21.25; SLM Lt Sp 15/16, 20.50; and SLM Lt Sp 31/32, 20.90.

Average price paid for cottonseed has remained steady at \$39.00.

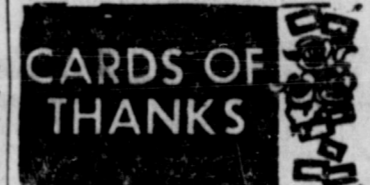
