

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q-My job requires me to keep n fairly close touch with some of my customers. To do this I must use my own car. Are my car costs deductible if I'm not reimbursed for them?

A-The use of your car on company business is a deductible expense to the extent that you are not reimbursed by your company. Driving back and fourth from home to work, however, is a personal expense and not de-

Many taxpayers find that the standard mileage rate of 12c per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 9c a mile thereafter, is a convenient way to figure this deduction. It only requires a reading of your speedometer at the start and end of your business driving. Parking fees and tolls may be added to the mileage

If you prefer, you may deduct the actual expenses of operating your car. Include depreciation, insurance and similar costs but be sure to prorate them between the business and personal use

Q-For some years I've provided a home for my father. If he moves to a nursing home because of ill health will we still be able to claim him as a de-

A-A close relative does not have to be a member of your household to qualify as a dependent. In the situation you describe, as long as the other dependency tests are met you may continue to claim your father as a depend-

Furthermore, if your father is in a nursing home primarily because of the medical care provided there, the entire cost of his maintenance is considered a medical expense. If personal or family reasons promoted the decision for him to enter the home, only those expenses specifically for medical care will be considered deductible medical expenses. Turkey Vulture An Exercise in Tolerance

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Despite a multitude of traits which man might find loatsome in the turkey vulture, biologists tell us this scavenger earns, if not our respect, at least our tol-

As unappealing as the vulture may seem, he is preferable from a health point of view to the mess on which he feeds.

The ecosystem, it seems, is blind to what we might consider the vulture's faults. Whatever works is fine, and the vulture performs his function of cleaning up nature's leavings with both efficiency and gusto,

His digestive system is geared to destroy, and therefore keep from spreading bacteria which would make other creatures deathly ill, and it has been suggested the vulture might have within its digestive system a secret serum that could cure many of the infectious maladies of

Turkey vultures are classic examples of natural adaptation. Their naked heads are free of feathers so the purifying rays of the sun can kill bacteria clinging

As further protection against infection, the turkey vulture's excrement has an antiseptic quality, and his inability to expel it past his legs aids in killing bacteria he might harbor there.

Being comparatively weak birds whose hooked beaks lack even the strength to tear flesh from a freshly dead animal, turkey vultures must resort to other means of defense. When frightened away from a carcass, they disgorge the contents of their stomachs to lighten their load so





Makes Suggestions That Teach For Weed Control

Next year's cotton yields can ment and weed control practices ths. Timely land preparation, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist, is the first step for a successful weed control pro-

Uncontrolled winter weeds, he idds, are moisture and plant food obbers, both vital to top production. In addition to regular land preparation, Elliott lists as major weed control methods those that can be carried out with machinery or through the use of chemicals The mechanical methods in

clude bedding and rebedding, bed shaping, Roll N' Cultivator, row disk, hippin' ridger, do-all and in West Texas the bed knifing tool does an excellent job. Elliott says cotton producers have a wide choice of materials available for chemical weed control. Two are soil incorporated herbicides, Planavin and Treflan Many growers, he adds, look with considerable favor on these materials and they can be applied beginning in late November or in December in South Texas. A popular method of application is with the roto-tiller or rotovator. They may also be incorporated into the soil by broad-

Under high moisture condi tions, he adds, it is often necessary to treat again just before planting for the control of early Johnsongrass. DSMA alone or in combination with a material such as Karmek is excellent.

For those who do not wish to use soil incorporated herbicides, mechanical methods are recommended.

Elliott offers these cautions if fall applied incorporated herbicides are used. If lower amounts of water are used, calibrations are very important. Application equipment should be checked daily for nozzle wear and accuracy of pressure gauges. Excellent thus doing two jobs at the same

Clothes that teach as well as adorn have been introduced for Thurber, Extension clothing consumer education specialist at Neal Pratt, Extension agrono- County Agent Ronald Gooch, T Texas A&M University.

The clothes include word-letter association groups. Denim pants sets are labeled with the letter "D" and a picture of a dog. Other outfits have letter appliques that teach the alphabet. The letters are upside down

Some of the garments in the group have red and green "stop" and "go" signals to help teach fundamentals of traffic safety. The clothes also have a manipulation group, with big zippers, buttons, buckles and snaps to
