## THREE CADIDATES IN RACE FOR TRUSTEE

## Farm News

### 1971 Rural Environmental Assistance Program

Applications for cost-share assistance to seed permanent grass and construct earthen dams are being accepted by the County Committee now. These are the only two practices approved for early applications. The specifications and regulations are the same as for 1970 and the cost-share rate is basically 50% of the actual cost. If you are planning to carry out these practices and intend to apply for cost-share assistance, be sure to make application before any work is started. It is anticipated the balance of the practices offered by the 1971 REAP will be announced soon.

### Wheat Destroyed by Drought

In order for a producer to receive wheat certificates and history credit on wheat which has been destroyed by drought, he must file a Request for Acreage Credit and pay the fee for a farm inspection. This must be done before evidence of the crop is destroyed.

### Set-Aside Acreages

Set-aside percentages for the 1971 programs have been announced at 20 percent of the cotton base allotment and total feed grain base and 75 percent of the domestic wheat allotment.

Preliminary payment rates will be 15c per pound for cotton and 25c per bushel for grain sorghum.

### 4,755 BALES COTTON GINNED IN 1970

According to the latest report from the U. S. Department of Commerce, a total of 4,755 bales of cotton, not including linters, were ginned from the 1970 crop prior to January 16, 1971.

This figure shows a decrease of 1,257 from the 1969 crop of 6,012 bales. The overall yield was better than first anticipated due to the drouthy weather.

### CITY DADS ALL SIGN UP FOR RE-ELECTION

According to City Administrator Walter B. Knorpp the slate is full at City Hall. H. M. Breedlove has announced for re-election as Mayor and Glenn Wallace and Dr. Chas. E. Dayhle have announced for re-election as Aldermen.

Anyone desiring to run for any of the above positions may do so signing up by March 3rd at the City Hall.

## Howardwick Election Day Set For April 3

At its regularly scheduled town meeting on Saturday morning, the citizens of Howardwick named April 3, 1971 as city election date. Polling hours will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at a site located just off Highway 70 near the entrance of Sherwood Shores and the Clarendon Country Club.

Election judges designated were John Ivy, Sheriff of Oldham County, and Howardwick, Betty Moore of Howardwick, and Dr. Milton Adams of Hereford and Howardwick. Former Amarillo City Judge, Attorney Joseph "Buddy" Schley, of Amarillo and Howardwick has been invited to supervise and validate election results. Attorney L. L. Bruhle, Doctor of Jurisprudence, will handle the election end in the State Capital.

All matters relating to the election will be in accord with rules set forth by the TEXAS MUNICIPAL LEAGUE OF CITIES.

Fifty-five resident-families were represented at the meeting in person and by proxy, and decisions rendered during the session were unanimous.

Meets and Bounds placing the perimeter of the city will be ratified by the voters, as well as the type government. As the Mayor-Alderman genre of government has already been adopted informally by the citizens, it is expected this will be the form confirmed. Mayor and Alderman nominees will also be on the ballot, with March 20 as the final day of nominations.

The citizens further voted that following the certification of the election; that recreation and traffic-control committees be appointed. Also, that the official population be established and the highway department notified so appropriate signs may be erected. Caution lights on busy highway intersections were also discussed.

Regarding population count, recent interpretations in New-City elections have given precedent to the recognition of dual-residency. The interpretations have become necessary, and have been motivated, by the swing in recent years to the second home. Many families have more investment tied up in their alternate home, today, than in their principal place of work and habitat, and are paying full taxes. Therefore current rulings now convey rights-to-the-resident that allow him to participate in matters of LOCAL GOVERNMENT as pertain to each of his residences.

With this development becoming a reality following elections, the present 137 mobile homes and 72 cabin-homes will generate a population of about 775 persons. At the present rate of growth, Howardwick will go over the 1000 population mark in early summer. Incorporation will follow shortly afterward, and the people of Howardwick will at last have achieved the goal they have worked so hard to gain, they will have seen their dream come true: a wholesome, model, country community.

## Engineers Seals Required For All New Hospitals

The construction of all hospitals and nursing homes in the State of Texas, beginning immediately, will be authorized only after the plans and specifications bear the professional seals of registered engineers. This new requirement resulted from a legal opinion rendered on February 4, 1971, by Attorney General Crawford C. Martin.

This new policy, resulting from the cooperative efforts of the State Board of Health and the Board of Registration for Professional Engineers is designed to further insure the safety of all buildings which will house hospital patients and nursing home tenants. The Engineer Board administers the Texas Engineering Practice Act, which has provisions applying to construction of buildings of many types, while the licensing divisions of the State Health Department are concerned particularly with the functional and safety features of health care institutions under their statutory jurisdiction. In December, 1970, the two professional Boards held a joint meeting in Austin at which the State Health Board adopted this new safety regulation subject to approval of the regulation's legality by the State Attorney General.

The legal opinion announced by the Attorney General stated that under provisions of the licensing statutes covering hospitals and nursing homes, the Department of Health has the authority to require "the seal of licensed, professional engineer on plans, designs or specifications (of such institutions) which involve structural, mechanical, electrical or sanitary engineering submitted to the State Department of Health."

Officials of the State Engineer Board reported they were offering their cooperative assistance to the Department of Health at Austin in helping to establish administrative procedures for implementing this new policy. They pointed out state law requires professional engineers to place their seals on all engineering plans filed with any public authority, a legislative requirement which places legal responsibility on such engineers. The Engineer Board has been receiving reports of hospitals and nursing homes being designed by sub-professionals not under control of either the Board of Architectural Examiners or the State Engineer Board. They stressed that no building should be considered a bargain if costs were cut by shortcuts which jeopardized the lives of occupants, and noted that disasters had occurred in other states involving nursing homes.

### PENNY MAXEY RECEIVES BETTY CROCKER AWARD

Penny Maxey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. T. Maxey and a student at Clarendon High School, has been named the 1971 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Clarendon High School. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a December 1 written examination for which 650,000 senior girls throughout the country were enrolled.

From General Mills, sponsor of the annual education program, she will receive a specially designed award, and will be eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 scholarships totaling \$110,000.

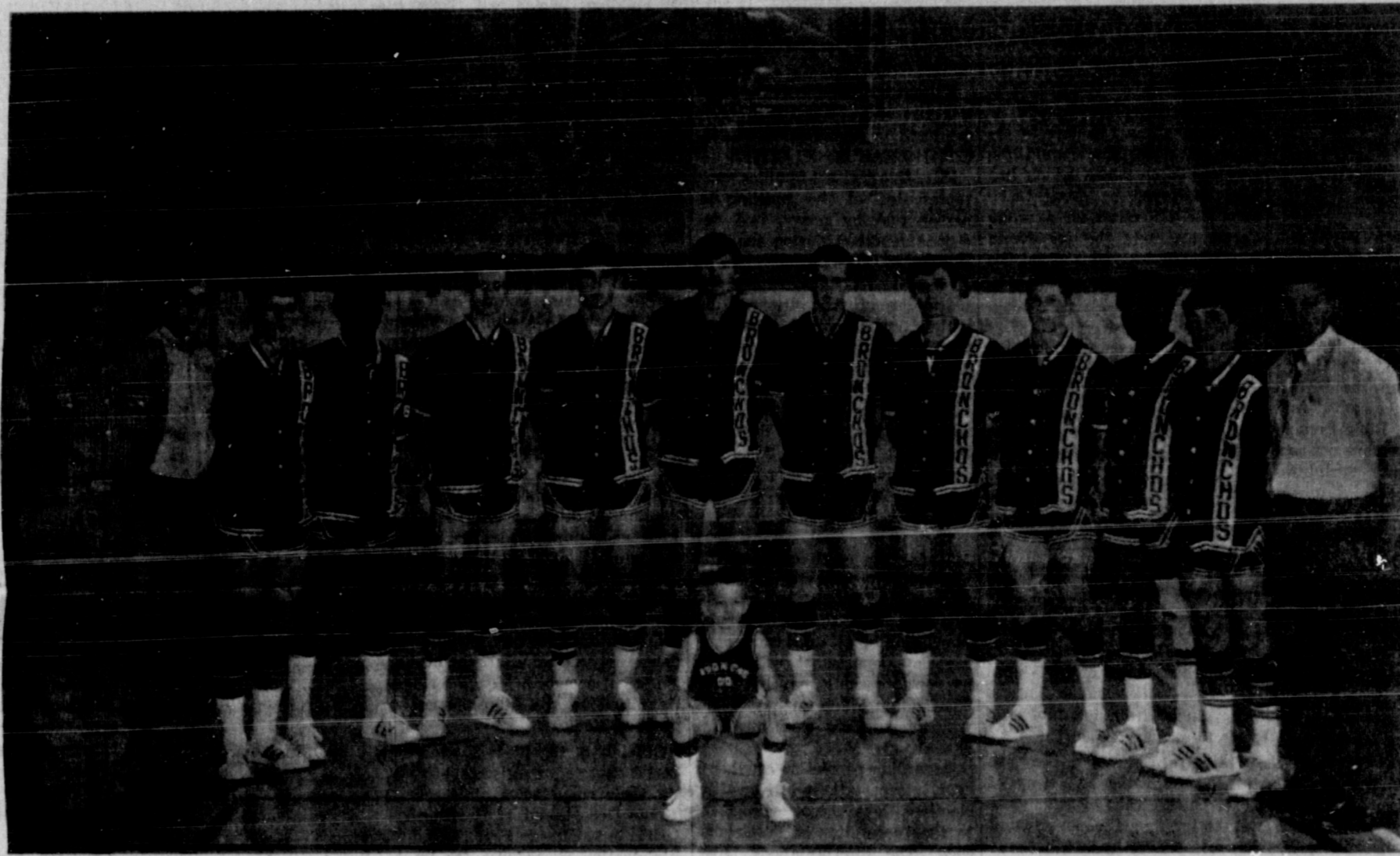

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: 'Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVII, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law. (c) The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: 'The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.'

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: 'The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum.'

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: 'Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or are amended hereafter by amendment, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. 'The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. 'The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. 'Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching assistance will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. 'Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon, under the laws of this State. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: 'The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.'

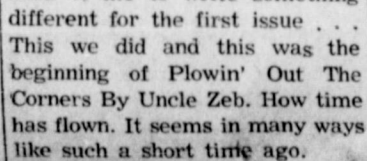

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: 'Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published one week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature. 'All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses. (8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney. (9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session. (10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: 'The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvement and economy in the legislative process.'

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: 'Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission. The commission shall be appointed no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session. (2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years. (3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. (4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution. (5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission, or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information. (6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics. Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary. (7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State. (a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless the

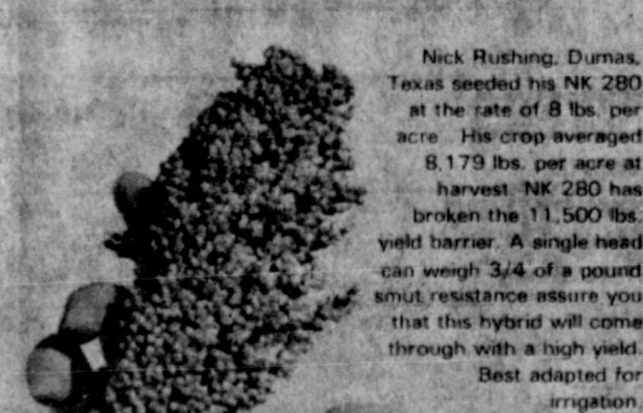

**HOUSE BILL 43**

Bill increasing out-of-state tuition. This bill was sponsored by Rep. Harold Davis of Austin and myself.

Classification of the bill: Relating to the tuition fee charged non-resident students enrolled in state-supported institutions of higher education and to the classification of certain students as resident and non-resident. This bill passed the House of Representatives 124-21.

The principle idea is that we believe the taxpayer of Texas should not have to subsidize non-resident students with tax money at the rate of \$700 a semester per student. Therefore raising the out-of-state tuition to \$700 is a break-even proposition similar to those in effect in other states where students from Texas are enrolled.

The bill was amended to apply to foreign students on the basis that much of their tuition is paid by their governments. It was pointed out in floor debate how inappropriate it would be to exempt students who may represent a less friendly nation.

People who read the bill closely will also note that this does not affect graduate students employed by the University. They receive resident status under previous regulations.

Yet, we have received a great deal of adverse publicity from the DAILY TEXAN, the student newspaper at the University of Texas at Austin. The TEXAN has attacked the bill through letters to the editor and through its editorial pages.

I feel this is a good, deserving piece of legislation. However, we are concerned by some of the comments from the Senate that label this bill as harsh. Sen. Herring of Travis County proposes freezing out-of-state fees at \$400 a semester which would still leave the taxpayer with a \$300 deficit.

Seven bills regarding the job of County School Superintendent have been introduced thus far. This does not mean it is open season on county superintendents, but seems to reflect a growth and consolidation factor which results in the retaining of an official with no schools to supervise.

My bill, H. B. 446, will abolish the office of County School Superintendent in certain counties and relieve the taxpayers of paying a salary for a job that no longer is necessary.

**TEXAS STOCKS OF GRAIN**

January 1 stocks of grain in all positions were estimated at 382 million bushels. Stocks of sorghum, corn and oats were above a year ago while stocks of wheat, barley, rye and soybeans were below a year ago, reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.
