





### HOUSE BILL 43

Bill increasing out-of-state tui tion. This bill was sponsored by Rep. Harold Davis of Austin and

Classification of the bill: Relating to the tuition fee charged non-resident students enrolled in state - supported institutions of higher education and to the classification of certain students as resident and non-resident. This bill passed the House of Representatives 124-21.

The principle idea is that we believe the taxpayer of Texas should not have to subsidize nonresident students with tax mon ey at the rate of \$700 a semester per student. Therefore raising the out-of-state tuition to \$700 is a break-even proposition similar to those in effect in other states where students from Texas are enrolled.

The bill was amended to apply to foreign students on the basis that much of their tuition is paid by their governments. It was pointed out in floor debate how inappropriate it would be to exempt students who may re

People who read the bill closely will also note that this does not affect graduate students employed by the University. They receive resident status under pre

Yet, we have received a great deal of adverse publicity from the DAILY TEXAN, the student newspaper at the University of Texas at Austin. The TEXAN has attacked the bill through letters to the editor and through its editorial pages.

I feel this is a good, deserving piece of legislation. However, we are concerned by some of the comments from the Senate that label this bill as harsh. Sen. Herring of Travis County proposes freezing out-of-state fees at \$400 a semester which would still leave the taxpayer with a \$300 deficit.

Seven bills regarding the job of County School Superintendent Dlynn and Kimberly of Dover, have been introduced thus far. This does not mean it is open season on county superintendents, but seems to reflect a growth and consolidation factor which results in the retaining of an official with no schools to super-
