Local Area Paralyzed By Blowing Snow and Deep Drifts Sunday

Residents of this area had been praying for moisture in any form and those prayers were answered Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night but came in a disagreeable manner . . . a snow-storm pushed by winds up to 50 miles an hour.

The storm moved into the area Saturday night with lots of lightning and thunder, then came the snow and wind. Conditions became worse as the day progressed Sunday with many people being stranded in snowdrifts on the highways. Many here in town were unable to get their vehicles home after getting stuck and walked the remainder of the distance. Some cars were almost covered by Monday morning and drifts lay across rural roads as deep as ten or more feet.

The employees of the Texas Highway Department went on duty late Saturday night and fought the snow on major highways throughout the blizzard, many with only 3 to 4 hours sleep between that time and Tuesday morning and they were still on the job clearing secondary highways and driveway entrances here in town along the FM routes. The deepest drifts on FM roads were the curve near Murphy Castle and west of the water tower.

No lives were reported lost in this area but numerous farmers and ranchers reported heavy losses in hogs, pigs and young calves. Heavy losses to older animals were reported from the Jericho - Groom area.

At the height of the storm Sunday afternoon a son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Hewitt at the Greenbelt Clinic. Mrs. Hewitt was scheduled to go to Hall County Hospital but Police Chief Gary Gerdes, who was summoned for help, was only able to deliver Mrs. Hewitt to the local clinic after becoming stuck in drifts twice. In the meantime Postmaster Mike McCully made his way to the home of Dr. and Mrs. John Werner and took them to the Clinic. The youngster, Jeffrey Glenn was born one hour after arrival at the Clinic.

Monday morning another emergency call came in when our good friend G. W. Gresham suffered a heart attack at his farm between north of the highway between Martin and Ashtola. Dr. Werner and Billy Ray Johnston,

with oxygen, were met at the highway by L. A. Watson on his tractor. The three rode the tractor through blinding snow to the Gresham home. After summoning help from the Civil Defense, a military helicopter picked Mr. Gresham up and took him to Groom Memorial Hospital where his condition was described as doing as well as could be expected Tuesday.

Sheriff Clyde James reported that another Civil Defense cotter made a check of mobile homes etc. along the south and southwest side of Greenbelt Lake Tuesday morning. Residents that were trapped by the snow made their way out after a path was cut through by heavy equipment.

George Howard and a crew of men dug snow Monday morning from storm cellars at Sherwood Shores to free occupants who had been trapped by the drifting snow. The snow had drifted so deep that the cellar doors could not be raised and the snow also covered the vents so oxygen was getting to a critical stage when the residents were freed.

There was no mail service in or out of Clarendon Sunday and only limited Monday. It will probably be days before rural routes are back anything like normal as county machinery is limited and not of the heavy type to knock out big drifts. Farmers and ranchers are picking their way to get to stock on their tractors to feed and also to make their way to town for needed supplies.

The city crew, as well as the Texas Highway Department crew, has done a fine job of removing snow from main street highways and FM Roads, and opening streets over town. One of the biggest helpers was the warm sun that appeared Monday and especially Tuesday to start the snow melting.

Our official weather observer measured out 1.30 moisture from the snow which was estimated at between 13 and 15 inches. The low temperature Tuesday night was 11 degrees.

Wm. J. Lowe Accepts Post At Howardwick

Having earlier extended to Mr. Bill Lowe an invitation to fill the City Attorney's position at Howardwick, the City Aldermen opened the reply at the Saturday morning Town Hall meeting and found that Lowe had accepted.

Lowe's statement said: "I have watched with interest the formation of your city government, and have noted the intelligence and care to details and legal propriety exercised.

"You are now, of course, entering the delicate procedure of city incorporation, over the next three months, and I shall extend every effort to see that documents and petitions are properly prepared, qualified, and executed, applying the same carefulness heretofore noted.

"As most city incorporations, and the subsequent authoring of a charter, are completed amid an atmosphere of controversy and emotional storm, I look forward to undertaking one openly so that matters pertaining to the lawful and tranquil incorporation of a township can be a matter of public record, and historical interest.

"Thank you for your confidence."

Other affairs covered at the alderman's meeting were the appointments and swearing in of George Howard as the Town Marshal, and Corky Wilson as Deputy Marshal. Howard will receive a salary of one dollar a year, an expense account, and certain other considerations. Howard was authorized to purchase a Cadillac for patrol purposes and for use in the administration of the city government. Wilson will receive a monthly salary, and a gasoline and arms' allowance. Howard's office is an elected office; he is expected to run without opposition on the April ballot.

Wilson was quoted as saying: "These appointments will stop the nonsense out here this year before it can start. I aim to personally see to that."

Law enforcement gear was ordered for the officers, and will be arriving well before the summer.

Both Howard and Wilson have been invited by the Law Enforcement Department of Clarendon to attend the upcoming F.B.I. seminar on firearms. Howard and Wilson have accepted gratefully, and with thanks.

Bulldogs In Three Way Tie For 1st

The Clarendon College Bulldogs are presently in a three way tie for first place honors in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference. This Conference is composed of eight teams, Clarendon College, Amarillo College, Frank Phillips College, South Plains College, Howard County College, Odessa College, New Mexico Junior College, and New Mexico Military Institute.

The three top teams include Clarendon, Amarillo, and South Plains, each standing 8 wins and three losses in Conference Play. Clarendon College Bulldogs stand 17 wins and 9 losses for the season.

Tony Moya of the Bulldogs is second in the Conference in total scoring with an average of 22.8 points per game for the season. Jessie King is second in the conference in rebounds with an average of 12 rebounds per game for the year.

Paducah will play Lorenzo at 8 a.m. and the winners of these two games will play Friday night. Public Schools will be dismissed Friday so everyone will be free to attend if they so desire.

This is the fifth consecutive year that Coach Irlbeck and the Bronchos have played in Regional and the past two years have advanced to state.

The Bronchos played a fine team when they challenged the White Deer Bucks at Claude Tuesday night. All of the boys did a good job on the floor. Elroy King played a good game under pressure, his first real test, and all gained much in experience which will help them as they advance further.

The game was a thriller from start to finish with only a few points difference at any time. The Bronchos were down 7 points once in the third quarter and 5 again before the game ended.

By quarters the score stood Clarendon 15, White Deer 11; 24-27 at halftime, and 35-36 at the end of the third period. The final score was 49-44. High for the Bronchos was Kenny Bacon with 28 points. Ronnie Hill tallied 12, Wayne Carter 10, Jeff Howard 5, and Mack Tomlinson 4. Ricky Haskins was tops for White Deer with 15 points.

White Deer hit 16 out of 37 for a 43% field shots and hit 12 out of 17 free throws for 71% missing only 1 and 1 free throws. Clarendon hit 20 out of 57 field shots for 35% and 9 out of 17 free throws for 56%.

In a warm-up game here Friday night, the Bronchos were defeated by Childress 51-61. Quarter tallies were 10-17, 28-33, 40-47. Bacon and Carter each hit for 15, and Ronnie Hill dropped in 10. High for Childress was David Lane with 17.

All who can be invited to attend the Regional Tournament Friday at Lubbock. Remember game time is 9:30 a.m. It looks good Bronchos; keep your cool and play ball. Everyone is behind you!

Come to see us, stay for lunch if you wish. "Together we help a Child."

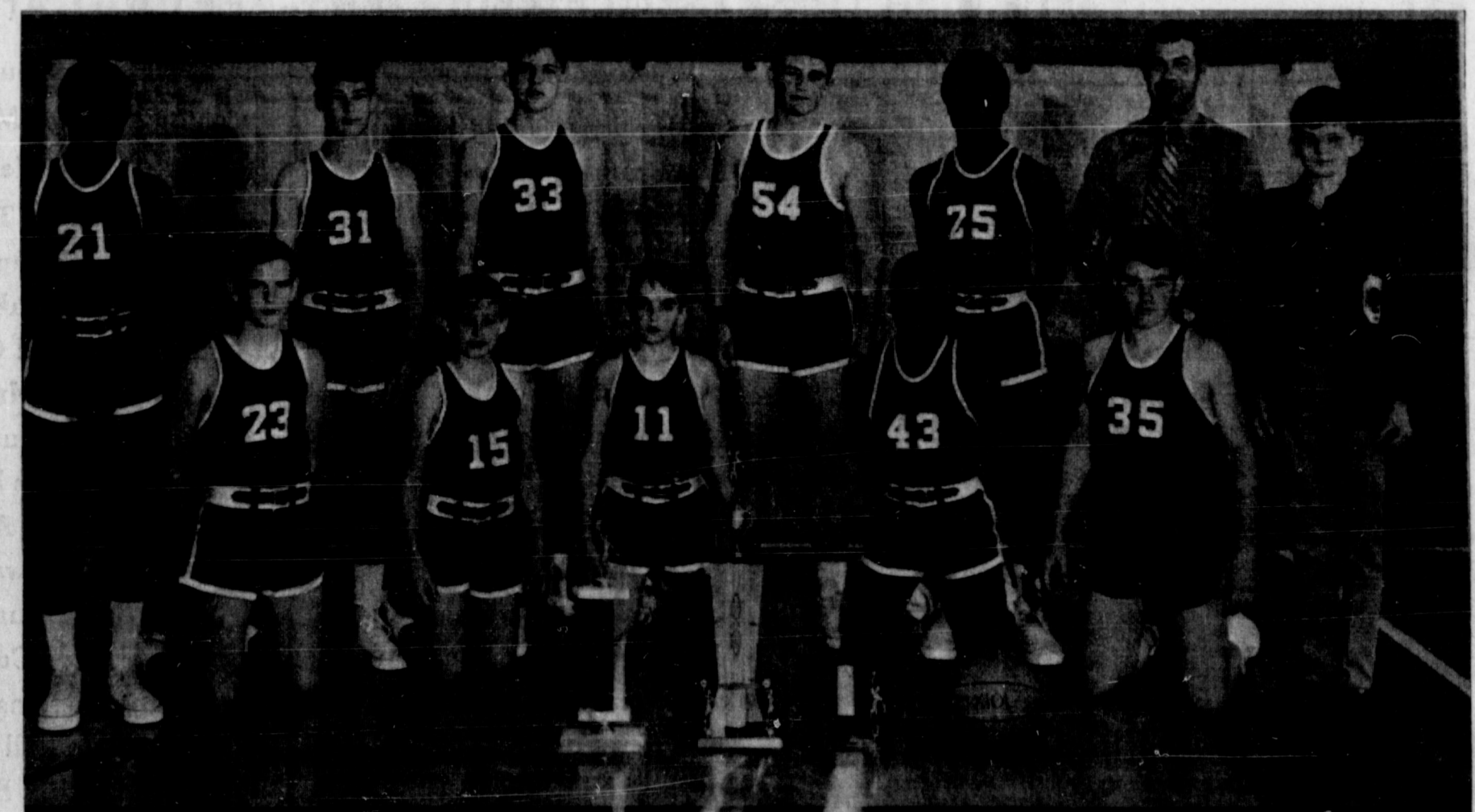

We wish to congratulate these fine young people on this nomination and election to one of the highest honors a Junior College Student can receive.

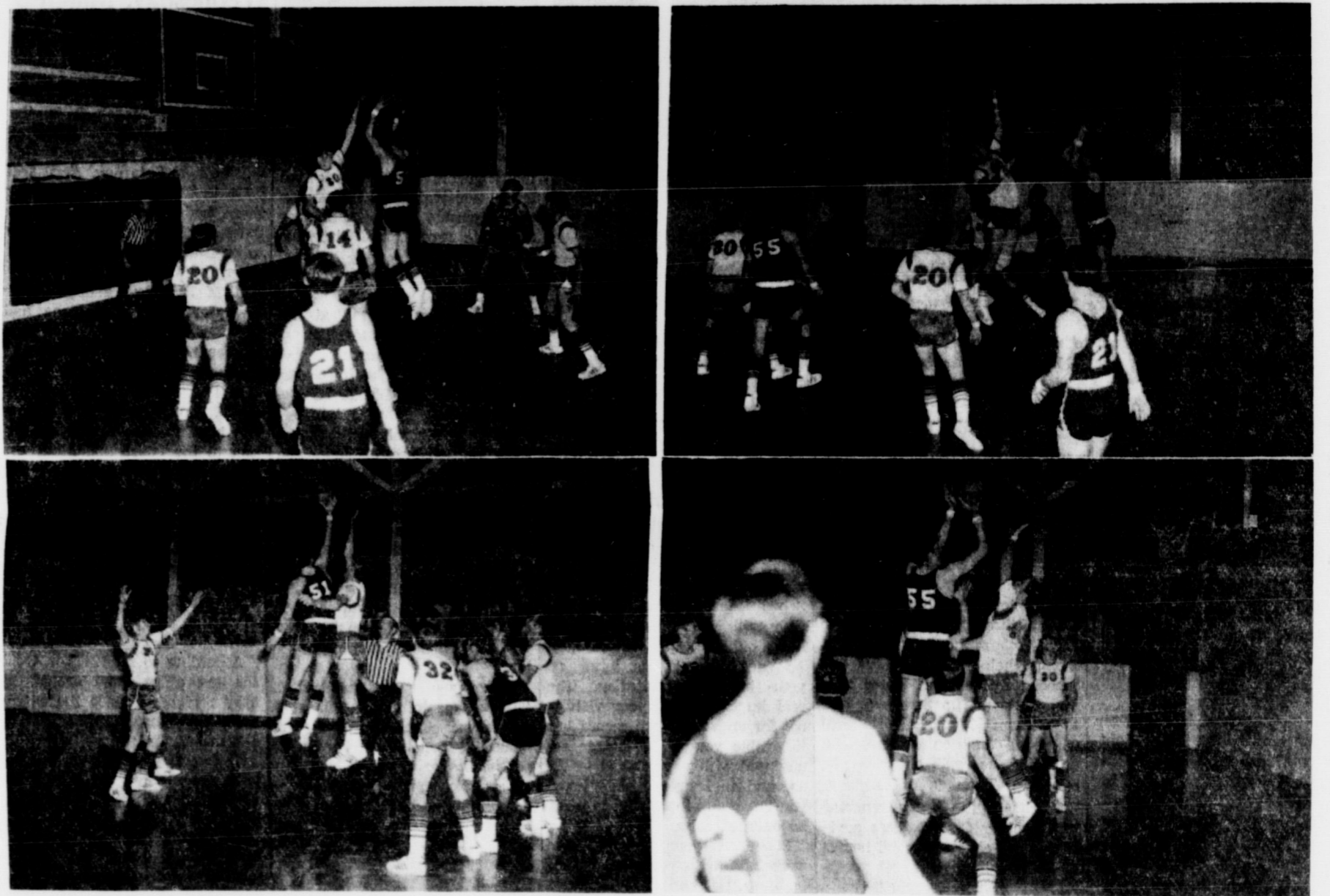

Inside The Legislature with

Rep. Tom Christian

Things have been moving more slowly this week.

Probably the most controversial moment came when a resolution by Rep. Neil Caldwell, which would ask those whose names have been connected with the SEC probe to make statements to the House, was forced to the floor for a vote.

I did not vote to force this resolution to the floor. My feeling being that it would be premature judgment with the current Federal investigation underway. About the only thing we could expect to find out are things which are already matters of public knowledge.

HOUSE BILL 518

This bill by Delwin Jones of Lubbock affects the cattle feeding industry and has been refer-

red to the Agriculture Committee in the House.

It provides the Commissioner of Agriculture with the power to investigate the feeding and handling of livestock, including the inspection of feed lots and all property and records pertaining thereto; to determine whether feed lots for which licenses are applied for or have been issued to require such reports as may be determined as necessary . . . to require a licensed operator to terminate feeding and handling agreements upon revocation of his license; to prescribe all forms of receipts, bonds and application for licenses; and to promulgate all necessary rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of the Act.

It also gives the commissioner the power to conduct hearings, cause to be examined under oath any person, or cause to be examined, books and records of any license; to hear testimony and take proof material for his information in the discharge of his

duties under this Act; to administer or cause to be administered oaths; and for any such purpose to issue subpoenas, to require the attendance of witnesses and the production of books which shall be effective in any part of this state; and any district or county court, of any judge thereof, . . . may by order require attendance.

The Commissioner would also be allowed to appoint and fix the salaries and duties of inspectors necessary to the enforcement of the Act.

I think the aforementioned H. B. 518 by Jones of Lubbock is severe and uncalled for.

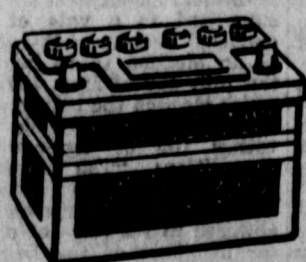

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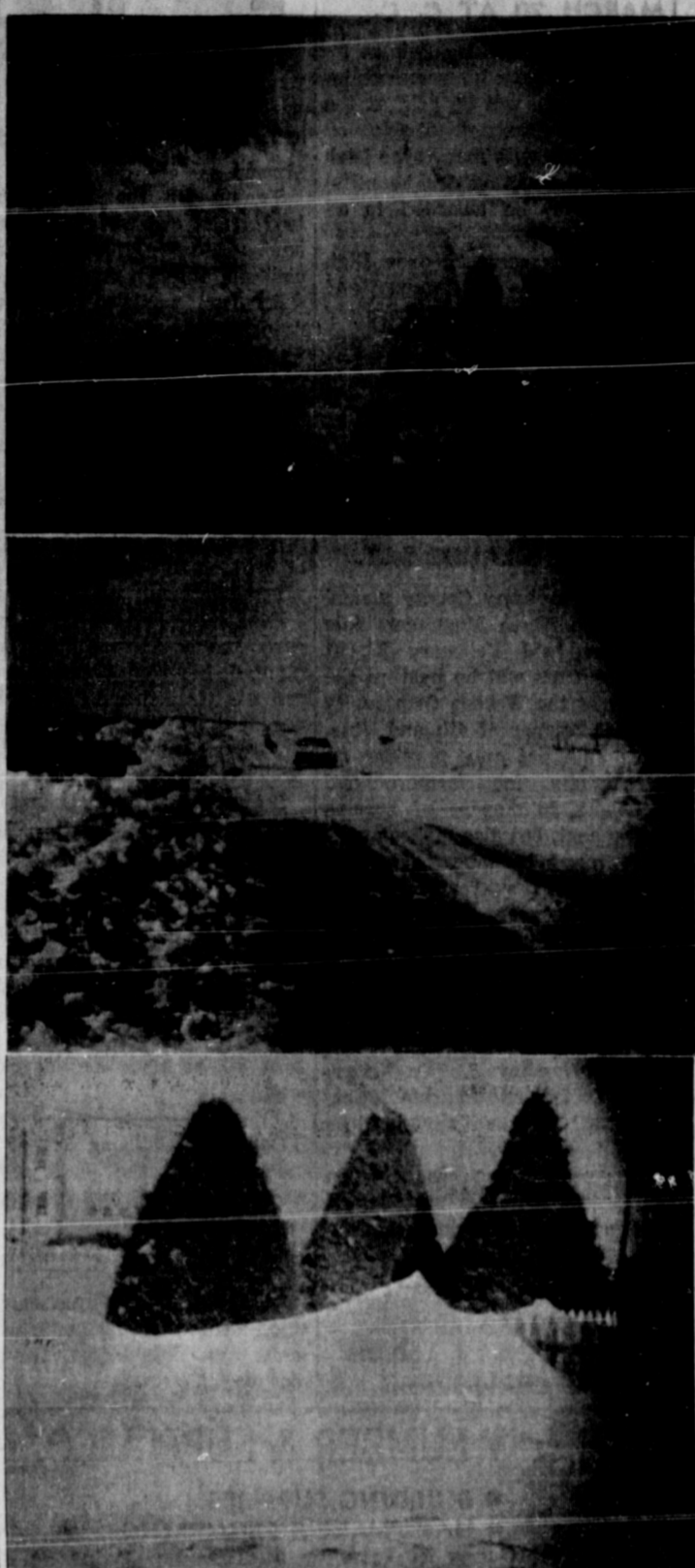

IRS Warns Against Scare Advertising

North Texas taxpayers were warned today against misleading newspaper, radio, and TV ads conveying the impression that the tax law greatly complicates their 1970 returns.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said the ads placed by some commercial preparers of tax returns also picture the Form 1040 as extremely complex so as to discourage taxpayers from attempting to fill out their own returns.

Mr. Campbell said the IRS has tried to make improvements in the form and in filing procedures in response to numerous suggestions from taxpayers, lawyers, accountants, and others. In addition, the IRS has this year offered to figure the income tax and retirement income credit for up to 30 million taxpayers filing 1970 returns.

Having IRS figure the tax could reduce the largest single type of error made by taxpayers, selection of the wrong tax table or rate schedule, as well as help elderly persons with retirement income credit calculations, Mr. Campbell said.

Other changes made in the 1970 forms and schedules have resulted in a smaller tax package for most taxpayers. Mr. Campbell explained. The basic package sent to 50 million people contains 24 pages, compared to 32 pages last year. In addition, the instructions will not appear on the backs of the various schedules but will be printed in a numbered and indexed booklet located in the center of the tax form package.

Taxpayers should be careful of "guarantees" offered by some commercial preparers of returns that make it appear that they will represent the taxpayer in any subsequent audit. Mr. Campbell said. Generally, only attorneys, CPA's and those who, by demonstrating their qualifications, are enrolled for practice, can represent a taxpayer before the IRS. Taxpayers should be sure of just what is meant by a "guarantee" offered by a preparer.

Mr. Campbell said that if a taxpayer employs a commercial preparer to fill out his return, he should select a reputable one. Regardless of who fills in the form, the taxpayer is responsible for the accuracy of the return.

Sign-up for the 1971 cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs begins Monday, March 1, and continue through April 9.

Program participation is voluntary and is not automatic. You must come by the ASCS Office and file an "Intention to Participate and Payment Application" form.

Feed Grain-Wheat
The feed grain and wheat notices have now been mailed to producers. The set-aside required will be 20% of the domestic wheat allotment.

Feed grain and/or wheat may earn payments without being planted; however, if these crops are not planted and payment is accepted the farm will lose part of its wheat allotment and/or feed base for the following year.

Set-aside is a requirement for participation in the program. Also, concerning base acreages must be met.

Alternate Crops
Guar and castor beans, along with a few other alternate crops, may be planted and harvested on set-aside acreages. A flat payment reduction of \$10.00 per acre will be made for this privilege.

South Texas Bankers Visit Howardwick

A group of directors representing an existing National Bank in South Texas were in Howardwick this past week completing an evaluation. They had in hand a market analysis made by a firm in Fort Worth, which analysis predicted a favorable climate for banking services in the Lake area during the next thirty years. The growth projection reflected a steady flow of population gain as opposed to a boom and then a fall off.

Also included in the report was the building and construction forecast. This further emphasized a steady growth line, with no apparent tenure.

The president of the board was impressed with the long-range planning already in effect in the area, and spoke of the trend of population and spending to the resort areas during the decades ahead. He added "It won't be too long until we have a double-shift each week in this country, when people will be working three days and off four. This will throw the spending of both money and time toward the recreation areas."

Our present bank is located in a declining market, said the president, and we hope to relocate in a growing market where a National Bank does not presently service the region.

Obviously, added the president, we can't make a public announcement of our plans, as it would create havoc with our customers. We've had enough of that lately in banking in Texas.

Farmers Income Tax Deadline Is March 1st

March 1, reminds County Agent Ronald Gooch, is the deadline for farmers to file their 1970 income tax return. This date was extended from February 15 to March 1 by the 1969 income tax law.

To qualify for reporting as a farmer, two-thirds of your gross farm income must be from the sale of agricultural products. If farm income is less than two-

thirds of the gross income, a taxpayer may be required to declare estimated tax and make quarterly payments. Statutory penalties are assessed for failure to file required declarations of estimated tax.

The county agent adds that many taxpayers will not be required to file a return due to a new low income allowance. As an example, for 1970 returns, married persons filing a joint return would not be required to pay any tax if their incomes were less than \$2,300. However,

farmers may be required to file an income tax return in order to report self employment tax if their net income exceeds \$400 for 1970.

Additional information regarding farm income tax reporting regulations can be found in the 1971 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide which is available from your county agricultural agent or the Internal Revenue Service.
