Town Of Howardwick Is Officially On Map

By a tally of 194 to 20, the adult population of Howardwick voted itself a town on Saturday, April 3rd and will shortly decide on incorporation.

County Judge W. R. Christal will establish the election date, and it is hoped by the Howardwick citizens that the date can be arranged on the anniversary date of the tornado as they feel this would be most fitting.

VanArsdale 160, Lynn Cherry 161; Town Marshall, Will Howard 187; To Set Up Local Government, For 194, Against 20; Liquor Control by Zoning, For 182, Against 15.

Following the validation of the election results by judges Dr. Milton Adams, Sheriff Ivy and Betty Moore, an election party was held with cookies and coffee served. More than 170 persons attended the party.

Clarendon College Ex-Student Reunion Here Apr. 30, May 1-2

Ex-Students from the area are invited to attend the first combined Ex-Student Association Reunion to be held on the new Clarendon College campus here April 30, May 1 and 2.

A search is being made for ex-students of Clarendon College dating back to 1898 when the college was first organized. Clarendon College is located in the rolling plains at the eastern edge of the Texas Panhandle, a stone's throw from the new Greenbelt Lake and an hour's drive from Amarillo.

The college was organized and operated by Texas Methodists until 1923 when the church moved its facilities to Abilene to form McMurray University. The Clarendon College property was purchased by the people of Clarendon and continued to operate as a locally-supported school until recent years when it obtained additional support with a brand-new campus as a Texas junior college.

One of the highlights of the reunion will be the presentation of the famed musical "Oklahoma" by the college drama department Friday night, April 30 following registration and visitation during the day.

Saturday, May 1 will be for late registrants with coffee and visitation at the cafeteria while the first official meeting will be held at 10 a.m. The afternoon schedule calls for art and craft shows, golf tournaments, tea sessions, tours of the new Clarendon campus and nearby Greenbelt Lake and Country Club. The annual banquet and dance will conclude festivities Saturday night while visitors will be invited to attend the church of their choice Sunday morning and enjoy a noon luncheon at the college cafeteria. An excess of 500 people are expected to attend.

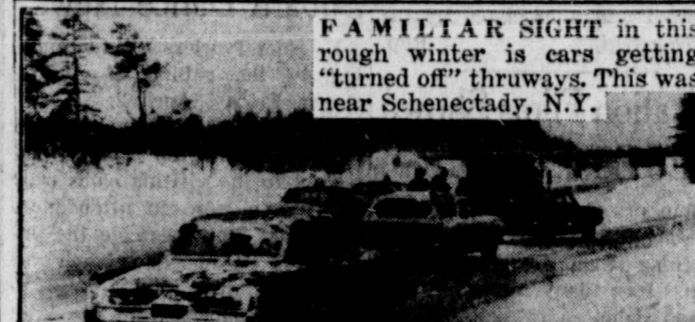

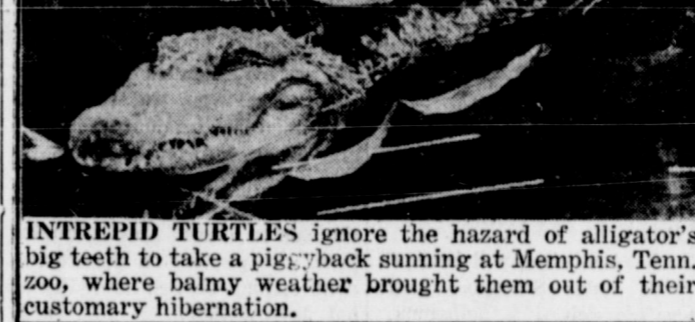

Accent On Health

A quick and simple laboratory technique, called "thin layer chromatography", may soon open doors to effective control of many drug abuse problems.

As a screening aid, thin layer chromatography — or TLC — tests can provide information revealing all the components present in a sample of blood or urine.

In the clinical lab, TLC now being used for the rapid analysis of poisons in blood or urine samples. But now scientists have been able to adapt the test to detect more than 1,000 different drugs, ranging from pep pills to heroin.

TLC can be useful in screening for possible presence or absence of certain classes of drugs, Amphetamines, barbiturates and the opiates can be determined in a TLC test.

What that means to drug abuse control in Texas, and across the nation, is very clear. A doctor treating a patient whom he suspects of abusing some drug could send a urine sample to a central laboratory equipped to handle such tests in mass quantities. After receiving the results within three days, the doctor would be better able to deal with his patient's problem.

The Texas State Department of Health may soon be able to offer such a program with federal grants are now being studied. The proposal is unique because a statewide laboratory service of this type, administered by a public health agency as an aid to all physician treating drug abusers, does not now exist in this country.

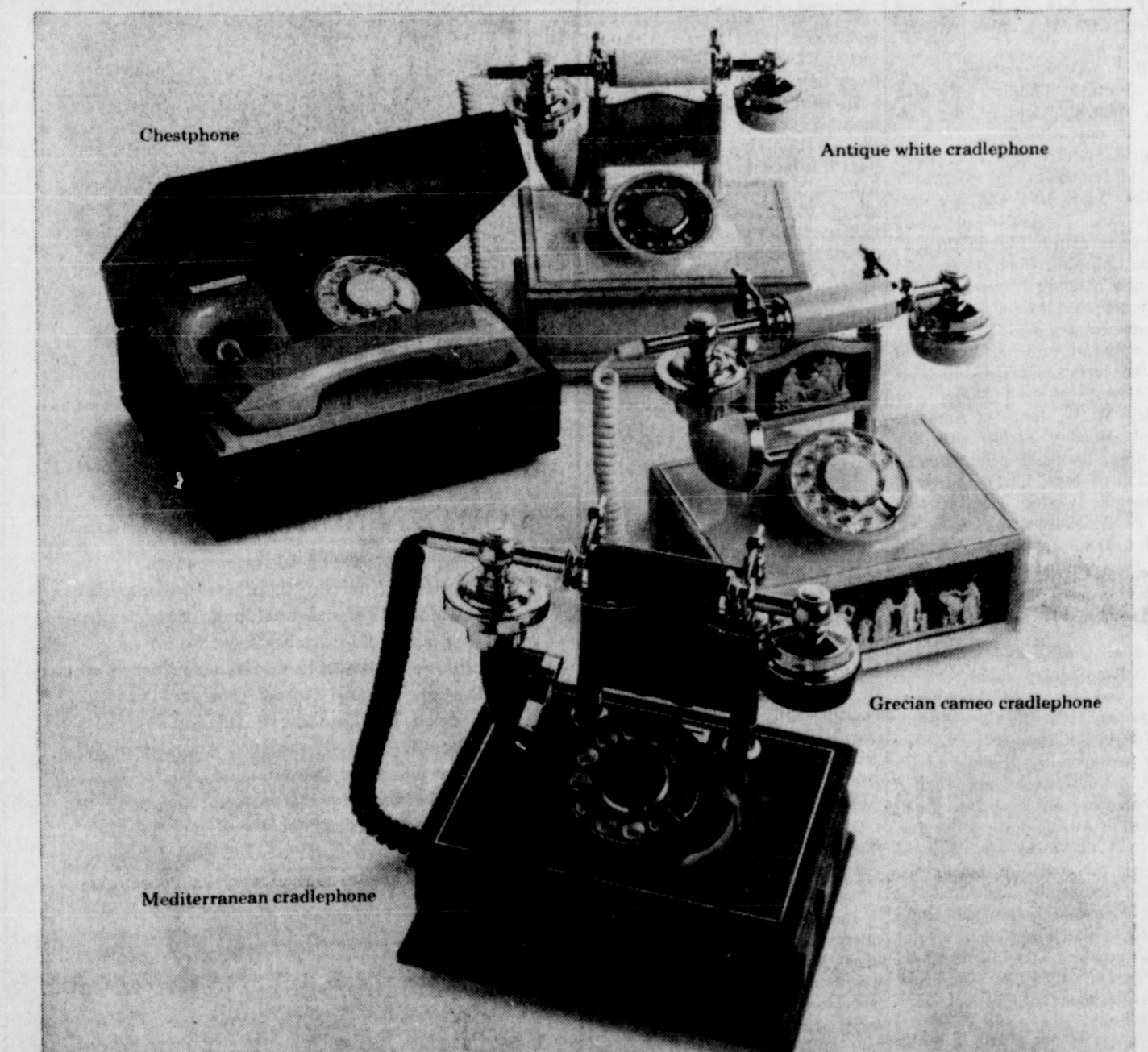
TLC is regarded by some as an ideal tool for mass screening tests. Drugs are absorbed from the urine on a piece of sensitized paper. The paper would then be mailed to the state laboratory. After treatment with a series of solvents, discolorations on the paper would tell an experienced lab technician whether drugs have been used and, if so, which drug.

The availability of thin layer chromatography services would be an inducement for more physicians to participate in the care of drug abusers. And, greater numbers of drug users could be reached before their misuse or abuse of drugs became a health problem or a concern to law enforcement agencies.

HSR 266 BY PARKER

This resolution by Carl Parker of Port Arthur would create an investigating committee to check into the stock dealings of state officials and activities relating to the Sharpstown Bank and National Bankers Life. This resolution had the blessings of Speaker Mutschers.

Prior to the vote taken on this resolution, I was deeply shocked to be approached by a member of the railroad lobby who asked that I vote "with the team." Or in other words support the Parker resolution unamended which would allow the Speaker to appoint his own investigating committee.

Apparently I was not the only legislator approached by the lobby. In addition to much arm-twisting by several members of the railroad lobby, the Chemical Council, Nursing Home group, the beer lobby and lobbyist for a natural gas company managed to get in on the act. Also standing by as members filed into the House was the representative of the Texas Manufacturer's Association.

When I asked the reason for this stand I was told that it would be better to go ahead with things as they were until the end of the session.

According to Sam Kinch, Jr., of the Dallas Morning News, the lobby explanation to him followed the lines "that failure might jeopardize Mutschers' control of the House. And if Mutschers' control fell apart it would jeopardize their legislation or allow legislation unfavorable to their industry to pass."

Granted the lobby is here to protect the interest of the industry they represent, that is expected. But to get involved in the inner workings of government is not part of the lobby function. I would assume that someone asked their involvement. I would hope they did not include themselves in the legislative process of their own accord.

MUTSCHER SPEECH

Thursday's speech by House Speaker Gus Mutschers involving his connection with the stock scandal did not bring to light any new information and came about two and one-half months late.

Mutschers' strongest defense in his own behalf was the statement, "There has been no profit in my case."

To me, whether or not he made money on the deal is not the question that needs answering. The question that still goes without clarification is how a group of seven state officials managed to at one time purchase unlisted stock without proper security for the necessary loans.

Another question that needs answering is how the state managed to deposit millions of dollars of state money in non-interest bearing accounts in the Sharpstown bank at a time when this Legislature faced turning over every stone to find enough funds just to finance the operation of the state government without adding burdensome new taxes.

The taxpayers of this state have the right to know of the alleged misconduct on the part of state officials.

Much has been said to discredit the shouting by the Press and the "Dirty Thirty", a coalition of liberals and Republicans. However, the day they quit shouting is the day this thing will get swept under the rug.

ABORTION

Our mail concerning the abortion issue has been on the increase.

The reason for consideration of such legislation has been made necessary because of a lower court ruling that declared the Texas law unconstitutional. Therefore, we will have to come forth with some legislation on this subject before the session is over.

SCREWORM ALERT — The first 1971 screwworm case in the southwest has been confirmed. It was found in Hidalgo County on Feb. 8. Stockmen are advised to keep a close check on their livestock and collect samples when worms are found in wounds. Samples should be sent immediately to the Mission Lab for identification. Warmer weather has increased fly activities in areas just south of the Rio Grande River.

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q—This year I will be itemizing my deductions for the first time. What are some of the taxes that I may deduct?

A—Generally, you may deduct real estate taxes, State and local gasoline taxes, general sales taxes, State and local income taxes, and personal property taxes.

There are a number of taxes not deductible. Among these are Federal income, estate and gift taxes, as well as alcohol, tobacco and other excise taxes. You should check the instructions that came with your Form 1040 to make sure you deduct the proper taxes.

Q—I understand the IRS has a booklet that is helpful to the small businessman. Where can I get a copy?

A—A copy of the 1971 Tax Guide for Small Business, Publication 334, can be purchased for 75 cents at IRS offices and from the U. S. Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C. and its country.

Q—Is it true that there is a penalty for filing your income tax return late?

A—Yes, a penalty of five percent of the taxes due and unpaid on the date the return was filed will be imposed for each month, or part of a month, the return is late. The total delinquent filing penalty is limited to 25 percent.

Under unusual circumstances, a taxpayer may be granted an extension of time to file a return. Extensions are not granted as a matter of course, and reasons for your request must be substantial. Your request for an extension must be made before the due date of the return.

Q—Does it make any difference if I use a red, white and blue or a black and white Form 1040 for my Federal income tax?

A—No difference at all. Actually the tax packages mailed to taxpayers contained the red, white and blue Form 1040 while the 1970's available at banks, post offices, and some office buildings are black and white. The IRS, however, urges taxpayers to use the multi-colored form whenever possible, since the red lettering on the form highlights areas where errors are most commonly made. Be sure to use the peel-off label that came on the tax package you received in the mail. Using the pre-addressed label will speed any refund due and eliminate possible errors. Simply peel off the label from the front of the tax package and affix it to the Form 1040 you send to the IRS.

Q—Can I make the arithmetic a bit easier on my tax return by rounding of some of the figures?


A—Yes, you can. Money items appearing on your tax return may be rounded off to whole dollars. This means that amounts under 50 cents are eliminated and amounts from 50 to 99 cents are increased to the next dollar.

Q—Last year my husband won \$50 in a photography contest. Must he report this as income on his tax return?

A—Yes, if you win a prize in any contest, such as a raffle, beauty contest, door prize, and the like, the prize is taxable. Taxpayers should also remember that prizes and awards given in goods or services must be included in income at their fair market value. Of course, if you refuse to accept a prize, it is not included in your income. An award or bonus given employees for their achievements in work or for adopted suggestions is also taxable.

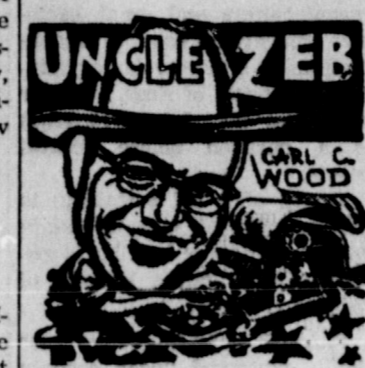

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. Preston Smith has called on President Nixon to declare 60 Texas counties eligible for drought disaster relief and requested initial allocation of \$5 million in federal aid.

All the counties, said Smith, received less than 1.5 inches of accumulated rainfall in the past six months, creating a critical drought condition which adversely affects ranches, farms, dairies, businesses and employment throughout the entire state.

Smith said he would not call for emergency disaster legislation from the state legislature because of the "extremely critical" state financial problem. State and local health, employment, agriculture and welfare agencies, the Governor stated, are performing emergency disaster duties as required.

Governor asked an initial allocation of \$5 million. In addition, he urged that the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Department of Labor, Health, Education and Welfare and Small Business Administration representatives be assigned to counties to collaborate with state and local officials inspections, cost estimates and technical guidance.

Texas counties included in the request (others may be added), ranging from the tip of South Texas to the top of the Panhandle, are:

Armstrong, Aransas, Atascosa, Bandera, Bee, Bexar, Blanco, Brooks, Burnet, Caldwell, Cameron, Carson, Childress, Coke, Comal, Cottle, DeWitt, Dickens, Duval, Uvalde, El Paso, Frio, Garza, Gillespie;

Goliad, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Hidalgo, Hutchinson, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Karnes, Kendall, Kennedy, Kent, Kerr, Kimble, King, Kleberg, Dimmit, LaSalle, Lipscomb, Live Oak, McMullen, Medina, Nueces, Oldham, Potter; Refugio, San Patricio, Schleicher, Starr, Stonewall, Swisher, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy, Wilson, Zapata and Zavala.

WELFARE CUT AVERTED? — Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced a way has been found to prevent the sharp cut on May 1 in aid to needy families with dependent children.

Legislation has been introduced to permit the Welfare Department to transfer and spend for AFDC necessary sums not to exceed \$6.8 million for the rest of this fiscal year ending August 31.

Barnes said about \$5 million is available in a contingency fund of the Welfare Department, and an additional \$1 million or more will come from federal matching money.

A comptroller's office representative said there is no question but what funds can be used to avert the scheduled AFDC reduction. Welfare Board on March 22 ordered the May cut which would bring the average AFDC family grant down from \$118 a month to \$80 and eliminate some 4,500 families from the rolls entirely.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named T. Louis Austin Jr. of Dallas to Texas Board of Corrections, succeeding Walter Pfluger of San Angelo on the key agency which supervises the state prison system policy.

Smith reappointed Reagan Houston III of San Antonio as a member of the Board of Regents of Texas Woman's University and also named John Shivers of Austin and Mrs. Marcella Perry of Houston as new members of the TWU Board.

Douglas Bergman and Walter C. Todd of Dallas were reappointed to the Stephen F. Austin State University Board, and Robert C. Gray of Austin was added.

H. J. Shands Sr. of Lufkin will replace Arthur Temple Jr. of Diboll on the Board of Directors of the Neches River Conservation District.

COURTS SPEAK—Third Court of Civil Appeals here ruled that welfare applicants who are turned down by the Welfare Department for aid have no right to appeal to state courts since assistance is not a "vested property right."

Court of Criminal Appeals in a Corvell County case held that a district judge has no power to credit a prisoner's time in county jail while he is appealing his conviction toward his eventual prison sentence.

State Supreme Court concluded that a man who built a cabin on an otherwise unoccupied island in Galveston Bay and camped there off-and-on for 10 years did not gain title to it by adverse possession. Court said possession must continue through a 10-year period to take title under adverse possession.

AG OPINIONS — A compact of water districts and river authorities may act for the state in getting \$40 million in federal funds which the state might otherwise lose for 1970-71, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

An independent school district may solicit bids from class ring manufacturers and grant exclusive privilege to one such manufacturer to service voluntary student purchases of rings. Whether grant can extend for five years is a question before federal courts.

Section of a bill pertaining to abandonment of mineral estate without notice or hearing is unconstitutional, but a balance of legislation is not.

TRAFFIC TOLL — Governor Smith expressed "deep concern and disappointment" over the 1970 Texas traffic toll.

Smith noted an increase of nine in fatalities — a rise to 3560 in 1970 — over 1969 and an economic loss toll over \$1 billion.

Governor said his only encouragement is that, with nearly 500,000 more drivers and a billion more miles traveled over the preceding year, the official death rate per-mile-traveled remained the same as 1969.

Smith pledged aid through news campaign and called for public support of legislation, police concentration on traffic offenses and forceful treatment of violators by judges.

SCHOOL SANCTIONS URGED

—Texas Classroom Teachers Association's professional rights and responsibilities commission will recommend to the TCTA executive board that sanctions be invoked against Crystal City Independent School District.

If sanctions are ordered, state and national accrediting agencies will be notified of unsatisfactory conditions for both students and teachers in the district. Teach-

ers will be encouraged not to accept employment in the school system. Some eight or nine teachers will not be rehired there, according to a TCTA attorney after an investigation.

TRAVEL GUIDE OUT — Texas looks better than ever, boasts the new "Texas, Land of Contrast," travel guide just released by the Texas Highway Department.

Combining tourist information about 371 cities and towns, the 200-page publication also lists state parks, major lakes, national forests, national recreation areas, Big Bend National Park, Padre Island, National Seashore, campground guide and basic hunting and fishing facts.

Book will be distributed at highway department tourist bureau and by mail in response to out-of-town inquiries. It contains nearly 4,000 items of tourist and travel information and 400 color photographs.

AG OPINIONS — A special district judge elected during one term of court who continues to serve without objection during the next term without being re-elected by members of the Bar should be paid for all his services, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

Bill to allow counties to collect either a county registration fee of \$5 per vehicle or personal property taxes on the vehicle is unconstitutional.

State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers does not have authority to make and enforce a rule requiring every applicant for a professional engineer's license to take a written examination.

Bill authorizing state-supported colleges and universities to close a street or alley running through the campus would be valid and a constitutional law.

A barber school teacher may be employed in more than one school.

Commissioners Court has authority to sell unmatured U. S. government bonds belonging to the permanent school fund of the county for their present market value if the value is now in excess of the price paid for the bonds yet less than par value.

Farm News

from County ASCS Com.

Signup

Friday, April 9, is the last day for farm operators to sign up to participate in the 1971 farm programs. Participation is not automatic. You must sign up to be eligible for program payments or other benefits.

Cotton Release and Reapportionment

We are now accepting applications for release of unused cotton and requests for additional cotton acreage from that release. Applications must be filed by May 3.

Set-Aside

Set-aside acreages may not be grazed during the five month period from May 1 to October 1.

No crops may be harvested from set-aside acres, except for that planted to permitted alternate crops. These are guar, sunflower, sesame, castor beans, mustard seed, safflower, cranberry, and plantago ovata. If any of these eight allowable crops are planted on set-aside acreage, a \$10 reduction for each acre planted will be made in the farm program payment.

Reap Signup

Sign-up periods for the 1971 Rural Environmental Assistance Program have been set. This will be a 15 day period beginning the first day of each quarter. Sign-up for the second quarter is now in progress and all requests filed during this period will be considered on April 15. If you intend to complete one of the practices offered in the County

Handbook by June 30, you will need to make an application during this sign-up period. Applications will not be considered on a "first-come, first-serve" basis, but will be considered on a priority basis. The practices selected according to priority in order are: (1) Pollution Abatement Practices, (2) Permanent practices such as dams, terraces, and waterways, (3) Permanent vegetative cover practices and deep plowing, (4) Underground irrigation pipe, and (5) Brush control practices and stockwater wells. To be eligible for cost-shares a producer must make application for the practice before work is started. The total amount of funds under this program to any person with respect to farms or ranching units in Donley County for approval practices shall not exceed \$750.00.
