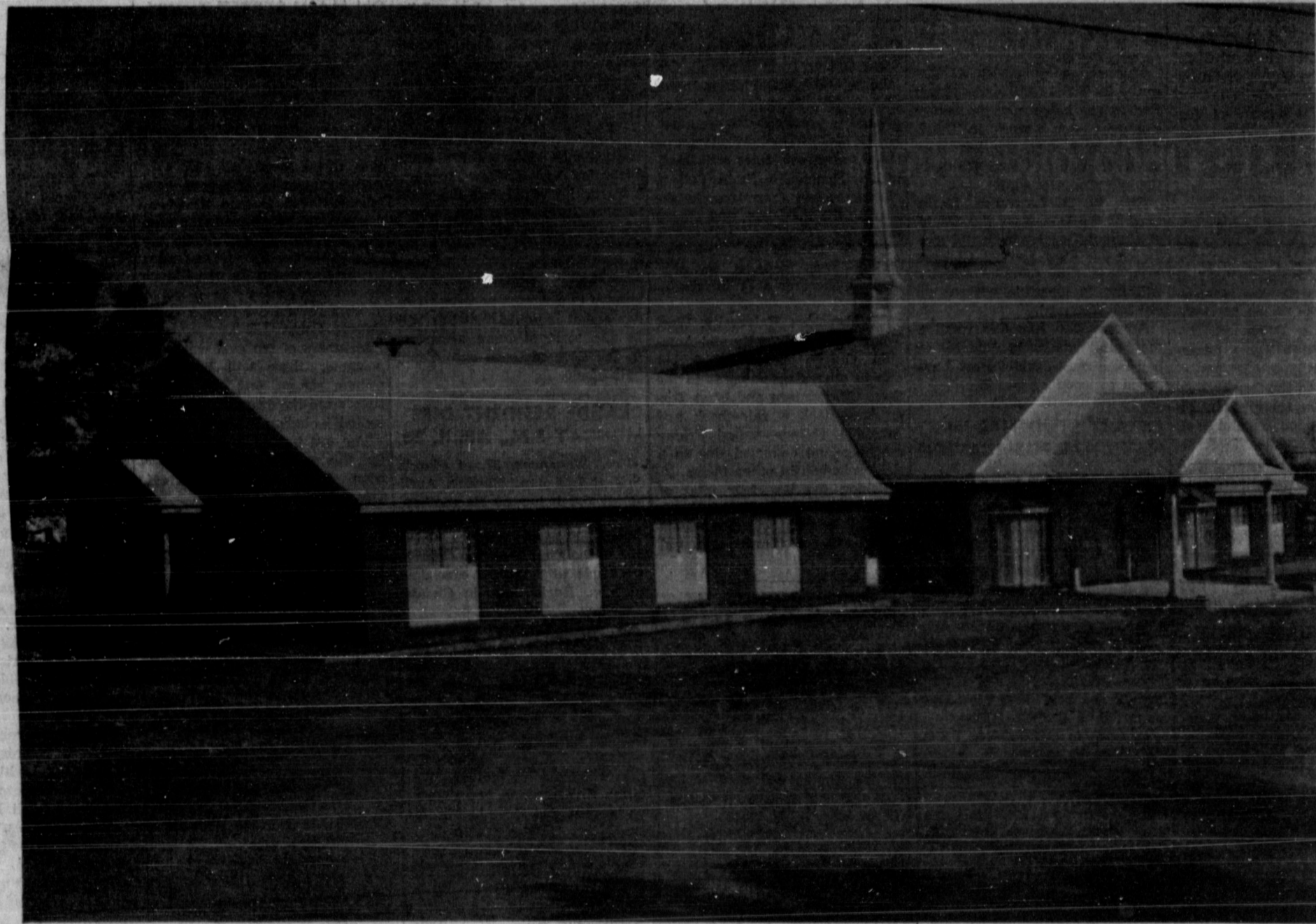

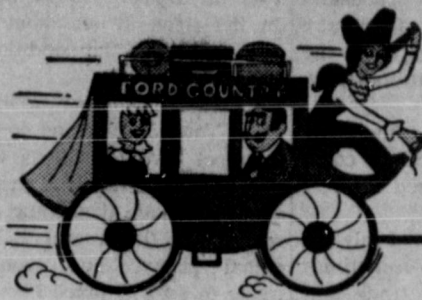

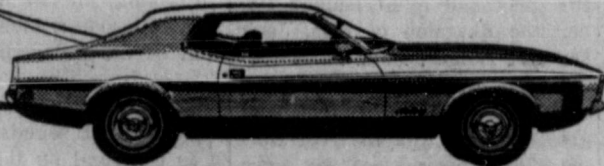

Probably one of the most unpopular modern inventions could well be the radar speed trap.

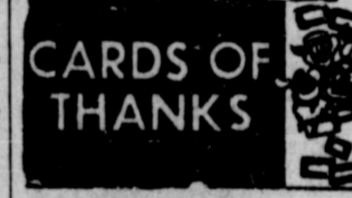
Disappointment is not always as bad as it sounds—sometimes it is the sand on the track that keeps us from going into a spin.

Tornado Watch And Warning Signals

In the event a Tornado Watch is placed in effect for our area and our weather is threatening Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at one hour intervals as long as the condition prevails.

Should the weather deteriorate and a Tornado Warning be placed in effect Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at more frequent intervals depending on the severity of the weather. On this signal preparations should be made to seek a place of safety.

In the event an actual tornado is sighted or reported moving in the direction of the city the siren will be sounded continually until the danger is past. On this signal a place of safety should be found immediately.

The members of the Fire Department have purchased and installed a CB Radio System consisting of a Base Station and a Mobile Unit in order to better coordinate their efforts with other agencies involved in Storm Watches and other emergencies.

Clip this article of information and place it where it can be easily found for immediate reference. The above mentioned warning signals, if properly understood, could mean the saving of your life and that of others.

Final Dates

Some important deadlines which must be met are very near. The first of these is May 1. Cattle must be taken off set-aside land by May 1. Grazing must be withheld until after October 1.

Small grain cover crops on set-aside acreages must be disposed of by May 1 unless written request to leave this cover on the land is filed with the county office by May 3rd.

May 3rd is the final date to certify wheat. This day is almost here and there are many who need to come in and file their wheat reports. For those enrolled in the wheat program only, set-aside acreages must be designated at this time.

The final day to transfer cotton due to sale or lease is May 3rd. This is also the last day to release or request extra cotton.

Emergency Haying and Grazing
The Donley County ASCS Committee has received authorization to permit seasonal grazing and harvesting of hay on land retired from production under the annual set-aside programs and the long-range Cropland Adjustment Program. This authorization is for a limited time only and will expire June 30, 1971.

Regardless of reports you may have read or heard, grazing or harvesting this acreage without prior approval of the ASCS County Committee is a violation of program regulations. If prior approval is not obtained, the regular program penalties apply.

If you believe you or some other person should be permitted to graze or harvest forage on this land on your farm because of local unfavorable weather conditions, please notify us immediately. If this permission is granted, a charge for the value of the grazing or forage harvested will be collected or deducted from your program payments.

Session Moves Into Final Round
As we rapidly approach the last month of this legislative session, the House has moved into a five-day week and on occasion, 12½ hour days . . . in addition to regularly scheduled meetings of committees, subcommittees and public hearings on bills.

The 12-hour plus consideration of the Appropriations Bill on Thursday was the longest single session of the House in the past 14 years.

H.S.R. 52 By Christian and Davis of Travis
This resolution which provides for the establishment of an Interim Study Committee on the problem of pornography in Texas is the first attempt to provide protective legislation based on adequate research. Previous bills to curtail the activities of the pornography pushers have been introduced on the basis of emotional reaction to this menace.

Rep. Harold Davis and I have been working on this legislation since the 61st Session of the Legislature. The rulings of the Supreme Court in the past few years make it almost impossible to draw a bill that will comply with Federal law. This Resolution provides for consultation by the Committee with federal officials, congressmen, senators and the federal judiciary before recommendations are drawn up. Perhaps through this cooperative effort, we can come up with legislation which will protect the environment in which we raise our children.

H. B. 446 Passes House
My bill to abolish the office of County School Superintendent in Randall County (H.B. 446) passed the House on voice vote. This bill now goes to the Senate for approval.

Purpose of the bill is to do away with a job which is now obsolete. The schools in Randall County are either part of the Canyon or Amarillo Independent School Districts. Any remaining duties connected with the office will be handled by Randall County Judge Woody Pond.

Liquor By The Drink
The liquor bill passed the House virtually unamended and with few of the so-called enforcement safeguards that had been proposed. As of now, it is not going to raise funds anticipated by its proponents.

An interesting thing about this legislation is that two years ago we received an enormous amount of mail both for and against. As this issue came before the House this Session, we have had one letter and one wire . . . one for and one against.

The passage of the liquor referendum seemed to give the question an air of inevitability. The shouting came last Session, the voting on local option will come May 18.

News bemoaned the fact that what this country needs is people who know more about government, not less. This was in reference to Rep. Richard Slack's proposed H. B. 829 which would do away with the six-hour government requirement for college degrees.

I couldn't agree more. Perhaps we are just two old school teachers beating a dead horse, but the fact remains, we are going to be passing legislation for an 18-year-old vote and this new voter needs the insight that is provided in those two semesters of government.

I would like to keep the requirement that teachers who move to this state and become a part of our educational system take those six hours plus six hours of Texas History if they are in the field of social studies.

Comparative Negligence (H.B. 556)
H.B. 556 By Hale, et al, passed the House last week after much debate.

After weighing the merits of the comparative negligence bill, I voted against it. I feel that it will only lead to an increase in plaintiffs attorneys and an increase in auto insurance rates.

New Legislation To Protect Consumer

Two new consumer protection laws have recently been passed by Congress, effective on April 25, reports Mrs. Doris Myers, Extension specialist in home management at Texas A&M University.

One new law states that an individual will not be liable for any loss from unauthorized use of his credit card after he has reported its disappearance to the issuer. The other law, titled the "Fair Credit Reporting Act," gives consumers some rights against the use of erroneous data in the files of credit bureaus.

According to the law affecting lost credit cards, an individual may report the loss by telephone or by letter to the issuer. Most companies will cancel use of the card once they have been notified. If the notice is by letter, cancellation is effective the day

the letter is postmarked. For losses occurring before notification, liability is limited to \$50.

The \$50 liability applies separately to each card that is lost. So, if a billfold or purse containing five credit cards is misplaced, the potential maximum liability is a total of \$250. If a husband and wife lose their cards on a joint account, however, the total liability is limited to \$50.

The new law also prohibits banks and other firms from mailing unrequested credit cards. Companies must inform the user of his rights and potential liabilities plus they must assume the legal burden of paying for liabilities the card holder may suffer.

The Fair Credit Reporting Act, the second new law protecting consumers, generally forbids bureaus to send out adverse information that is more than seven years old. The exceptions include bankruptcy, which may be reported up to 14 years; and information in reports on those applying for a loan or life insurance policy of \$50,000 or more, and those applying for a job with an annual salary of \$20,000 or more, both situations having no time limit.

Once informed that a credit bureau has hampered your credit, insurance or employment status, you have the right to obtain from that bureau all information in your file. The exception is medical information.

If the file contains false, incomplete or inaccurate information about you, the material may be re-investigated by the credit bureau, and the findings sent at your request to all who have received your report within the past six months or within the last two years, if the file was sent for employment purposes.

If the credit bureau's investigation doesn't settle the dispute, you are entitled to insert a personal statement of 100 words in your file. Your side of the story, then, will be included in any future report, and it also may be sent to those who have already received the disputed information.

Texas Highway Patrol Investigate Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1971 shows a total of ten accidents resulting in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1971 shows a total of 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured, as compared to March, 1970 with 543 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 275 persons injured.

The 20 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1971 occurred in the following counties: Palo Pinto, 3; Armstrong and Cottle, 2 each; Archer, Lamb, Lubbock, Montague, Parker, Stonewall, Wichita, Wise, Young, Collingsworth, Gray, Moore, and Randall with one each.
