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

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



May 3rd is the final date to certify wheat. This day is almost here and there are many who need to come in and file their wheat reports. For those enrolled in the wheat program only, setaside acreages must be designated at this time.

The final day to transfer coiton due to sale or lease is May 3rd. This is also the last day to release or request extra cotton. **Emergency Haying and Grazing**

The Donley County ASC Committee has received authorization to permit seasonal grazing and harvesting of hay on land retired from production under the annual set-aside programs and the long-range Cropland Adjustment Program.
