Tornado Watch And Warning Signals

In the event a Tornado Watch is placed in effect for our area and our weather is threatening Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at one hour intervals as long as the condition prevails.

Should the weather deteriorate and a Tornado Warning be placed in effect Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at more frequent intervals depending on the severity of the weather. On this signal preparations should be made to seek a place of safety.

In the event an actual tornado is sighted or reported moving in the direction of the city the siren will be sounded continually until the danger is past. On this signal a place of safety should be found immediately.

The local Fire Department is asking everyone NOT to call the Fire Station and tie up their phone as it is badly needed to stay in contact with storm watchers etc. A rash of calls tied up the Fire phones following the alert at 3:45 Sunday morning. It will be appreciated if you do not phone unless in a case of acute emergency. The alert was sounded Sunday morning after the Fire Department was advised by the Amarillo Weather Bureau of the impending danger at that time.

Clip this article of information and place it where it can be easily found for immediate reference. The above mentioned warning signals, if properly understood, could mean the saving of your life and that of others.

Clarendon College Summer Terms Set

Do You Dare To Vote May 18? What Amendments? Do You Know?

Citizens of the area along with other Texans will be going to the polls to vote Tuesday, May 18, in a special election called to vote upon four proposed Constitutional Amendments.

It is hoped that people over the entire state will take more interest and turn out to cast their ballots, for or against, these Amendments. As in all legislation it is your tax dollars that are involved and every proposition to be considered in some way will affect your pocket-book.

Following is a brief recap of the four proposed Amendments giving points for and against, each as given by the Texas Legislative Council. Much material has been sent out by various lobby groups and organizations. Sit down and give these proposed Amendments some thought and consideration before you go to the polls to vote.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1 would create a State Ethics Commission consisting of 9 members; three to be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the consent of the court's associate justices; three to be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission; and three to be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Term of office would be for 6 years; reimbursement of members of the State Ethics Commission would be made for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties, and among other considerations require the commission to recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the legislature, promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, officers and all office holders, appointive or elective, and all bodies established under the Constitution of the State of Texas.

For: This amendment would serve as a tool for the accounting of members of the Texas Legislature, as servants of the citizens of Texas, and regulate public confidence in state officials. It would govern the conflict of interest problem. The expense of calling special elections changing specific salaries set by the Texas Constitution would be eliminated, it would create an impartial body free of politics. It would tend to cut down on the outside subsidization legislators sometimes are forced to consider in view of their present salary.

Against: It has been suggested that this legislation is a subterfuge to bring about a legislative pay raise without voter approval. Texas voters themselves can best judge the conduct and ethics of members of the legislature. An increase in compensation which the State Ethics Commission might recommend would increase the costs of state government. The matter of Ethics and standards of conduct for members of the legislature can be handled under the existing statute and would not prevent the imposition of a constitutional ceiling on salaries at a later election. Since the proposed Amendment would provide for financial disclosure as privileged information, the people of Texas would still have no way of identifying sources of income. Decisions could not be made binding as they are subject to the approval of the legislature.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT 2 would provide that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature.

For: Situations arise frequently

Inside The Legislature with

Rep. Tom Christian

This Thursday, May 6 to 9 a.m. the fate of Gov. Preston Smith's appointee to the State Banking Board, Dr. Elmer Baum, will be decided by the Senate Nominations Committee.

Baum, along with Gov. Smith, Speaker Mutschler, Rep. Bill Heatley, Rep. Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Frank Sharp of Houston, John Osorio (a former partner of Sharps), and Waggoner Carr, former Speaker of the Texas House, have been implicated in the stock scandals being investigated by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

These men claim to have purchased stock in National Banker's Life, a Sharp enterprise, each on his own, without inside information on the stock which was unlisted at the time of purchase last fall, each selling the stock before the price of the stock collapsed... a peculiar coincidence. Let us look at some other peculiar coincidences relating to this case:

During the 61st Regular Session of the Legislature H.S.R. 337 by Rep. Tommy Shannon was introduced on April 29, 1969. This resolution created an Interim Committee to study banks and banking within the State. The bill was referred to the Committee on Interim Activities.

Line 21 of H.S.R. 337: RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 61st Legislature create a special Banking Committee to make a complete study of Texas banks and banking, for the purpose of determining (1) methods of encouraging Texas banks to invest in local enterprises as opposed to making out-of-state investments; (2) practices of the State Depository Board with regard to (a) demand versus time deposits, and (3) a possible state insurance program to supplement the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation; (4) any other matters relating to banks and banking which may affect the Texas economy either advantageously or adversely; and, be it further...

(This resolution further provided for the Interim Study Committee to report to the 62nd Session of the Legislature, January 1971)

On May 1, 1969, H.S.R. 337 was reported out of Committee favorably and members of the 5-man Interim Study Committee appointed by Speaker Mutschler were Rep. Tommy Shannon, Chairman, Rep. W. S. "Bill" Heatley, Rep. Neal Solomon, Rep. DeWitt Hall and Rep. Lindon Williams.

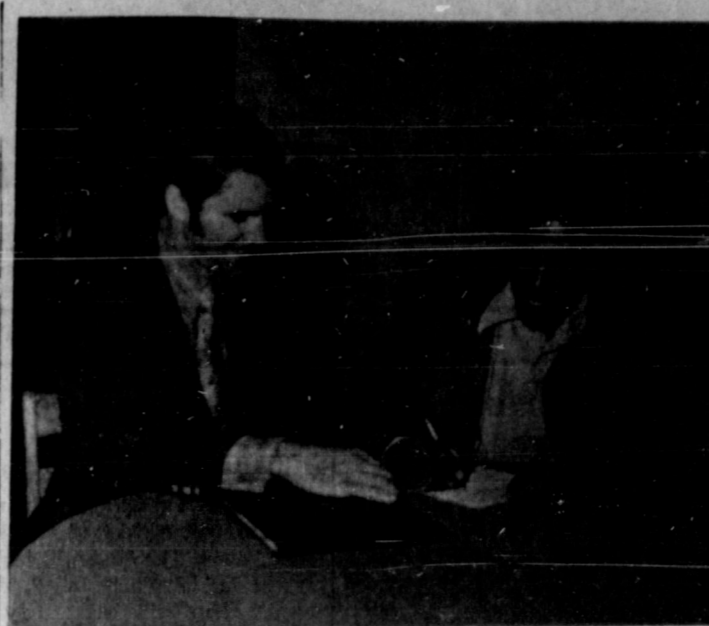
A budget for the committee was prepared and presented to Rep. Shannon for approval as Chairman of the House Administration Committee. Approved expenditure, \$2929.

Four meetings were held by the Committee (Nov. 17-18, 1969; Jan. 19-20, 1970; Feb. 9-10, 1970; Mar. 23-24, 1970). Actual expenditure by the Committee for travel, food, lodging, etc. came to \$1214.70 according to records in Contingency Expense.

As of May 4, 1971, no report has been published by this Committee, according to Rep. Shannon's office.

A second point of interest in this case is the introduction of H.B. 52 and H.B. 53 by Rep. Shannon during the first Special Session of the 61st Legislature. H.B. 52, the Texas Depositor Protection Act, was referred to the Committee on Banks and Banking, of which Shannon was a member.

H.B. 53 by Shannon, amended the Texas Non-Profit Corp. Act, to allow incorporation of a corporation whose purpose is to insure deposits for the benefit of bank depositors; and declaring

an emergency. During a special session, only legislation that is approved by the Governor may be brought up for discussion. These bills did not get a signal to move and apparently died in Committee.

A second attempt to push this legislation through came in the Second Special Session of the 61st Legislature when Rep. Shannon introduced them as H.B. 72 and H.B. 73.

H.B. 52 and 73 both establish the Texas Depositor Protection Act. However, this time H.B. 73 had been altered to place the new corporation under the jurisdiction of the State Banking Board rather than under the Banking Commission. Each reference to "Commission" is changed to read "Board."

The Banking Board, which is made up of State Banking Commissioner Robert Stewart, State Treasurer Jesse James, and appointee Baum, primarily functions to approve state banking charters. In fact 48 state banks have been approved by this trio since Baum's appointment in October 1969. The Board does not have the facilities for this new task.

This was remedied by inserting Sec. 3 (a) in H.B. 73: "The Board shall appoint special examiners for the purpose of examining any deposit protection corporation duly registered or seeking registration with the Board under the provisions of this Act. Each examiner shall receive such com-

pensation and shall have such qualifications as shall be fixed by the Board."

H.B. 73-Sec. 2 (5) (d) states "Insured deposit" or "deposits" means the net amount due to any depositor for deposits in a member bank (after deducting offsets), but such term shall not mean there shall be no insurance of deposits to the extent that same are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and provided further that the insured deposit of a single depositor in a member bank shall not exceed \$100,000 or one-half of the bank's capital, whichever shall be less."

This section would tend to confirm the opinion of a State Senator from the Dallas - Fort Worth area that "Frank Sharp was in trouble with the FDIC and about to lose the insurance on deposits up to \$15,000. The second bill (H.B. 73) would provide insurance over and above the FDIC and would also allow those without FDIC insurance to be covered. The bank (Sharpstown) was the center of his (Sharp's) financial empire. He would only have one government agency to deal with. The FDIC had been pretty hard on him. That State Banking Board would not - these were his friends, Jesse James, Elmer Baum... The bill provides a structure to administer (the corporation) under the Banking Board, not the Banking Department, although it is not equipped to do anything

but issue charters." It must be noted here that Capitol Press men regard the State Banking Department as a state agency that functions well under the guidance of Banking Commissioner Robert Stewart. It seems odd that the only man to be called before the Senate Investigating Committee to testify is Stewart.

These bills (H.B. 52, 53, 72, 73) are alleged to have been drawn by an associate of John Osorio, Sharp's former business partner. It is alleged that Osorio asked Shannon to carry the bills. Waggoner Carr has admitted that he contacted members of the Legislature to obtain a favorable vote.

With this much interest shown in protecting the depositors of the state, in past three meetings of the Legislature, you would expect a continuing boom in this type of legislation. With the advent of the SEC investigation, things have been noticeably quiet in this direction in this 62nd Session.

Special Lawn Care In Droughty Periods

Good management, including fertilizing, mowing and watering, will be even more important in the weeks ahead so far as the home lawn is concerned. Under the current weather conditions, low moisture and climbing temperatures, the job ahead could be a real toughy, explains County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Turf requires adequate amounts of plant food if it is to stay green and maintain growth under drought conditions. Water requirements necessarily will have

to be increased to take care of the lack of rainfall. And, he adds, underwatering should be avoided if at all possible. Soak the soil to a depth of several inches at each watering; thus maintaining a good turf. In the long run, the amount of water used will be no more and may be less than when light sprinkling of the lawn is practiced.

Lawns should receive an application of a complete fertilizer in the spring about the time growth begins and another in the fall a month ahead of the first frost, says the county agent. During the summer, an application of nitrogen every 30 to 40 days will keep the lawn green and growing and the ground covered. Ground cover is important during periods of high temperature, he adds.

Nitrogen is the key element in turf production. It produces vegetative growth and gives the plant a deep green color. Phosphorus stimulates development of a good root system and potassium affects the physiological processes of the plant.

A deficiency of nitrogen causes stunted plant growth and the condition often referred to as "firing." Slow growth results from the lack of phosphorus and a shortage of potassium causes the entire plant to 'dry up' and take on a brownish color.

The lack of water can cause many of the same symptoms and when coupled with deficient plant nutrients, the stand of lawn grass may be lost, warns the county agent. He advises against mowing too short. A longer turf is insulation against heat and gives protection against possible damage from the sun, he says.

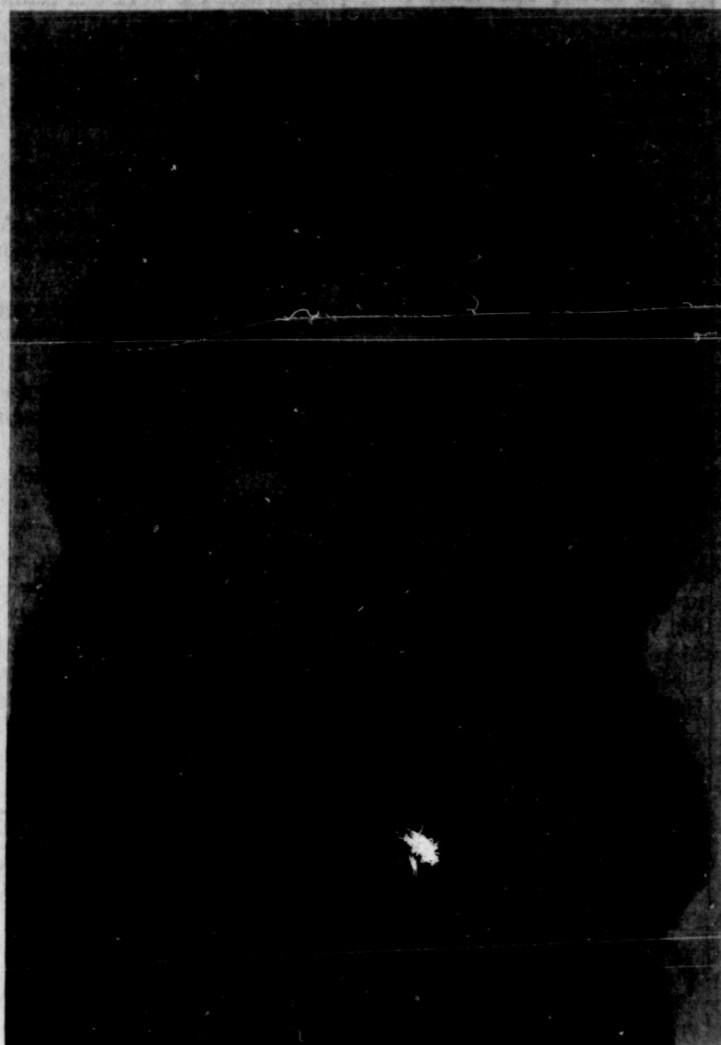

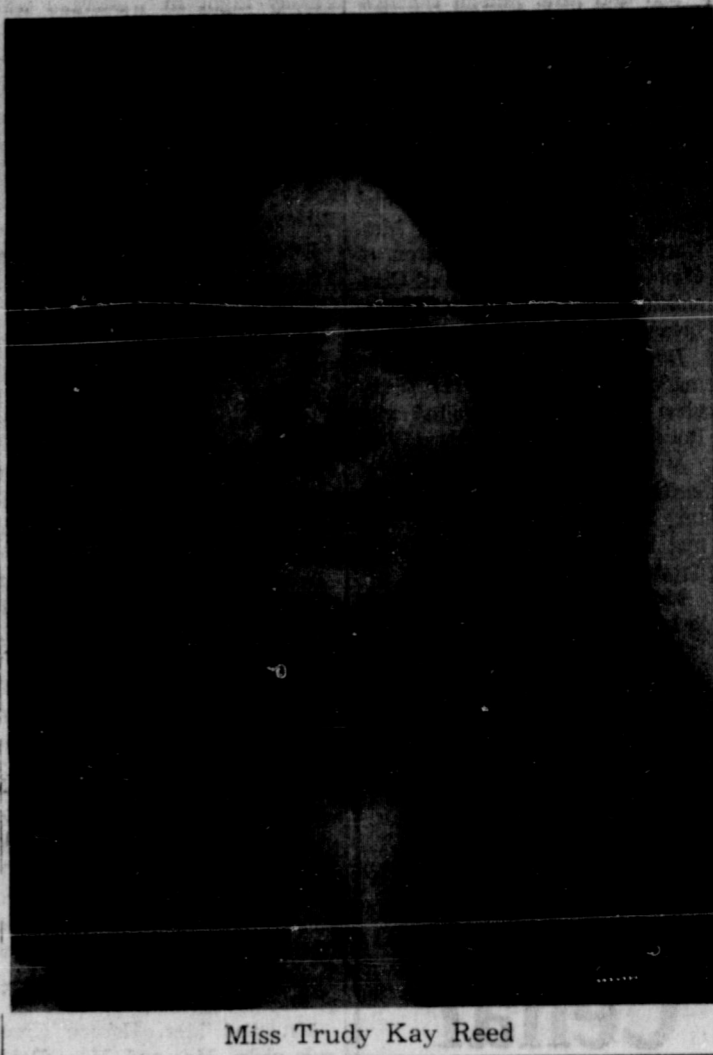
