Commencement exercises for 42 Clarendon High School seniors will be held Friday evening, May 23, in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center at Clarendon College. The program is slated to begin at 8 p.m.

Baccalaureate for the senior class will be held Sunday, May 18, at the same location, also at 8 p.m.

Kim Horton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Horton of Clarendon, has been named Valedictorian for the 1975 graduating class. During the past four years, Kim has averaged 95.53 in all her school work.

Named as the Salutatorian was Wayne Hardin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Hardin. Hardin has averaged 94.76 throughout his high school career.

Also named as honor graduates, each averaging at least 90.00 on all grades for the past four years include Jeanie Barbee, 92.98; Jake Hightower, 91.54; Danny Monroe, 90.68; Carolyn Shaw, 90.66; and David Butler 90.07.

Final exams for Clarendon High School are slated for Thursday and Friday, May 22 and 23. School will dismiss for the summer at the end of final exams.

Students will pick up report cards on May 28, between 9 and 10 a.m.

Ninth grade Junior High School students will be honored on an awards day exercise to be held at the school auditorium on Friday, May 23, at 1 p.m. where outstanding students will be recognized for their school work.

Amtrack Service Sought

A delegation from Clarendon will be flying to Ft. Worth on May 15 to join other interested citizens from neighboring towns located on the Burlington North Railroad lines in an effort to secure Amtrack service between Dallas and Denver. ICC hearings will begin on that date to decide on the routing of Amtrack service to either Denver or El Paso. The Clarendon delegation has been allotted 15 minutes on the matter to state reasons why service to this area would be advantageous.

According to the proposed route from Dallas to Denver, railroad passenger service would be established in intermediate points all along the route, including Clarendon, for a trial period of six months. At the end of the trial period, passenger boardings would be analyzed and a determination made by Amtrack for continued service to each town involved.

The move is being headed by Walt Knorpp, president of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce. Other board members of the Chamber will also attend the hearings as a part of the official delegation appearing in favor of the Dallas-Denver routing.

Other cities which will also appear at the hearings include Wichita Falls, Childress, Memphis and Amarillo, plus numerous other smaller towns, all advocating the establishment of the Dallas to Denver route.

Any interested citizen who would like to appear at the ICC hearing should contact Knorpp. Arrangements are being made for three airplanes to make the one-day trip.

Chief of Police Submits Letter Of Resignation Tuesday Night

In a surprising move Tuesday night, Chief of Police Gary Gerdes presented the Board of City Aldermen with a letter of resignation, asking that it be made effective Sunday, May 20.

Gerdes said he will be accepting the duties as juvenile and misdemeanor probation officer for Swisher and Castro Counties effective May 20, and although he will miss working with law enforcement directly, will still have connections with law enforcement agencies in the Panhandle area.

Gerdes has been police chief in Clarendon for the past 10 years, coming here from Canyon where he was with the security department of West Texas State University. Prior to his association with the WTU security department, Gerdes had been deputy sheriff for Swisher County on two different occasions, totalling four years service.

In his letter of resignation to the Board of Aldermen, Gerdes states "I respectfully submit and ask for your acceptance my resignation as Chief of Police, effective May 20, 1975.

"My reasons are few, but I feel that I will have more spare time, other fringe benefits such as retirement pay and an increase in salary.

"I will be accepting the duties of being probation officer for the counties of Swisher and Castro. The decision did not come easily. I have given ten years of service to the City of Clarendon, wanting only in return the best for the department, city and you (the Board of Aldermen). It has been my honor to have served you and the people of

Clarendon. I shall remember it as one of the greatest and rewarding experiences of my life."

In a statement for The Press, City Administrator Bud Knorpp said that he was sorry that Gerdes was leaving but that he felt it was in every way a promotion for Gerdes and that it would not be right to try to hold him.

"Gerdes gave us 10 years of good, solid police work and a whole lot of loyalty. This he will leave with us, and we are much better off for his having passed this way. We all wish him the best," Knorpp said.

Following the acceptance of Gerdes' resignation, Aldermen agreed to begin accepting applications for a replacement, recommending that the person hired should have a minimum of five years in law enforcement work, be a certified law enforcement officer and hold at least an intermediate certificate.

The city has hired a new patrolman for the police department to help with the manpower shortage which has now developed. Steve Rogers Jr., 24 year old Clarendon native, began work for the department Monday, May 5.

Rogers has already attended the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, at his own expense, and completed the required 240 hours of basic training as a law enforcement officer.

He has served three years in the United States Army and is presently working on his associate degree in law enforcement at Clarendon College.

In other board matters, aldermen voiced approval for enforcement of present zoning regulations pertaining to the location of mobile homes in the R-1 zones. Present regulations prohibit the location of mobile homes anywhere within the boundaries south of Third Street from Jefferson Street west to the city limits. Trailers may be put in any other part of town with this exception according to the present ordinances.

Also brought up along the same lines was the discussion of allowing the erection of a steel building in the downtown fire zone area and aldermen agreed that present ordinances provided against such construction.

City employees also reported that the city sewer plant is getting a great deal of used motor oil injected into the sewer lines about twice a week from a local source and killing away enzymes at the city sewer treatment plant.

Homer Holman said this additional cost of enzymes is about \$65 per week each time this happens. The City of Clarendon presently pays \$3.95 per pound for these necessary bacteria to treat sewage and six to eight pounds must be added to the treatment tanks when oil is

found.

In addition, Holman said, employees have to scoop the oil and muck out with shovels in order to get the plant back in operation. Aldermen agreed that this additional cost to the city will have to be stopped at once.

Aldermen backed the proposal that city employees begin a search for the source of the oil by checking all service stations and garage grease traps and inspection of all systems for signs of oil overflow into the city's sewer systems.

In the event this should fail, the city will call in the State Health Department for further assistance and strict enforcement of health department laws.

Pot Fine Levied to Amarillo Man

Julian Lee Burns, 27, of Amarillo, was fined \$150 plus \$47 court costs by County Judge Billie Christal over the weekend. Burns was stopped by Police Chief Gary Gerdes on a routine traffic check and a search of a vehicle being driven by Burns revealed a small quantity of marijuana.

Burns was charged with possession of less than two ounces of the weed and arrested for the offense.

Paul Hermesmeyer Is Star Farmer

Paul Hermesmeyer, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Hermesmeyer of Clarendon has been awarded the Star Chapter Farmer degree in both local and district FFA competition with other outstanding FFA students.

Hermesmeyer will compete on the area level for further honors, and possibly later in state competition.

The title Star Chapter Farmer covers a wide span of FFA work, both with home projects and classwork. Both come under close supervision of ag instructors as well as parents, and generally is accorded to the highest individual in the class with the best performance.

Paul is the youngest of four brothers, with two older brothers, Frank and John, currently teaching agriculture classes at Wall and Dumas. Another brother, Henry, works for Santa Fe Railroad in Woodward, Oklahoma. A younger sister, Mary Jo, is a student at Clarendon Junior High.

Paul's interest in farming and ranching activities had an early beginning when he joined the Donley County 4-H Club seven years ago at the minimum age of nine.

He began raising cattle and hogs to show in livestock shows locally and at Amarillo, Fort Worth and Houston.

During the past seven years, he has shown animals at between 100 and 200 shows, winning a fair share of prizes with various animals.

During his freshman year of school (last year) he began his FFA work by raising Hereford cattle to show and market at different livestock shows throughout the state.

While attending the Houston Fat Stock Show in March, 1974, he received a certi-

cate to purchase a Shorthorn heifer in the calf scramble and began a transition to switching breeds of animals.

Paul exhibited his first Shorthorn in March of this year at Houston, winning second in his class. He has added to his stable of Shorthorns since getting the first heifer provided by Pipe Distributors, Inc., of Houston in addition to returning a heifer calf to the calf scramble this year.

He now owns two heifers and a Shorthorn bull purchased from Ronnie Gooch recently.

In addition to working with his animals, Paul also helps his father during the summer and after school on their 112 acre stock farm where they raise hay for stock cattle.

Paul says his ambition is to continue studying agriculture throughout high school and college, and perhaps become a teacher after finishing college.

Nobody's Perfect But...

Back at the first of the year, the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce at its first official meeting, set forth some goals that were more than ambitious for the small budget which the Chamber had allotted itself in serving the businesses of Donley County.

One of the principal areas of work for the 1975 year was in tourism and the exploitation of Donley County's recreational resources. We feel it is proper to dwell at some length on what has been accomplished in this area, with still more than half the year to work.

While working the Chamber's partnership golf tournament this past weekend, we heard a few criticisms of the two day affair. Most of these were directed toward the lack of local participation in the tournament.

When plans for the tournament were being formulated, the Chamber encouraged local participation, but directed plans for the tournament toward the higher classed out-of-town golfers who would patronize not only the Clarendon Country Club, but also the motels, service stations, restaurants and other businesses.

The Chamber cannot account for the amount of money spent locally with downtown businesses during the weekend, but more than \$3,000 was spent locally on Saturday and Sunday alone by the 84 people who entered and played in the tournament

These dollars were not in circulation here last Friday, and members of the board of directors feel that this is an accomplishment and will help in a small way to stimulate our economy.

tournament is held again, that will enhance the chances of making it better.

We heard lots of good comments about the meals served the contestants Saturday and Sunday, and none of the golfers seemed the least bit shy about partaking of goodies at the three refreshment stands set up at points along the course.

As a matter of fact, we can't recall hearing any criticism from anyone except local people who were not entered in the tournament.

At any rate, the participants were all a cut above the average in all four flights, and the number of entries, although short of the original goal, was adequate. We noticed that Clarendon's tournament drew more entries than the Borger partnership tournament held the same weekend, and was about equal to a similar event being held over the weekend at Guyton, Oklahoma.

Another area of work which has drawn attention from the Chamber of Commerce is Greenbelt Lake. Although the Chamber cannot take credit for the large number of people which visit the lake each week, there is some promotion going on in this area.

The fishing rodeo which began April 1 and will continue through July 5, is a project currently being underwritten by the organization, and has distributed a total of \$125 in prize funds thus far. It has drawn entries from Amarillo, Pampa and other outlying areas and we do know that these people are not just one-time visitors to the lake.

No story travels faster than a good fish story and the directors know that fishermen go where the fish are—and spend a great deal of money doing it. This is the number one priority of the Chamber of Commerce...drawing outside money into our economy for circulation here.

There are several other projects currently in the mill including rolling out the red carpet for visitors during the Miss Texas Teen-Ager contest to be held here the last weekend in May. Although the Chamber has no official function for this contest, the national headquarters of the pageant has been contacted by the Chamber and word is being passed along to the parents of the more than 60 entrants that Clarendon has an excellent golf course and a lake brimming full of fish if their interests lie in these directions.

Other attractions will help entertain parents during their brief stay in downtown Clarendon, plus numerous people have been kind enough to donate their time to providing information centers for visitors.

The Chamber is also working to secure Amtrak service for Clarendon. This item is covered in another story appearing on the front page of today's paper.

There are still other projects which are in the planning stages and will be announced later. As a footnote, we would like to add that all of the above, and more, is being done with a budget of only \$5,671 for the entire year.

Getting back to the Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant, we received a telephone call from the national director, Mrs. Sybil Shaffer, last week and garnered some more tid-bits to pass along to our readers.

First and foremost, Mrs. Shaffer said, she had spent part of the day Monday (April 28) visiting in the White House with President Ford. Although the visit was short and more of a courtesy than anything else, Mrs. Shaffer said President Ford had just recently spoken with the head of the United States Chamber of Commerce, a most powerful and persuasive organization in Washington.

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce has become infatuated with the theme of the Miss National Teen-Ager Pageant and has adopted it for use during the Bicentennial year. The theme, of course, is "What's Right About America".

We informed Mrs. Shaffer that we are in the process of adopting the theme ourselves for a special edition due to be printed about the middle of May and distributed to more than 35,000 high school students and other readers throughout the Panhandle area.

The edition will be in tabloid form, using the colors of the pageant (red, white and blue) and will be distributed through high schools which go from near Lubbock north to the Oklahoma border, and from the New Mexico border east as far as Vernon.

This is an ambitious undertaking on our part and has blossomed from a bud of an idea. The edition will contain pictures and stories on outstanding students from most high schools throughout the Panhandle, as well as pictures and stories of all the contestants in the Miss Texas Teen-Ager Pageant.

We have received calls from as far away as Oklahoma City for placement of advertising in this issue and we are very gratified at the reception so far.

Never before have so many birds been killed with one stone. It was originally designed to recognize the pageant. Then we wanted to add the recognition of outstanding students...and decided to make this an observance of the Bicentennial kick-off as well.

Distribution will begin in Panhandle high schools on May 19, and additional copies will be inserted in this paper on May 22.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—Major legislation bearing on property tax values throughout the State has been passed by the House and sent to the Senate.

Representatives approved two separate measures which some contend provide for "the first major overhaul of the property tax structure in Texas this century."

HB 637 by Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso establishes a legislative tax board which will conduct an \$8 million statewide audit of taxable property during the next two years.

HB 1463 by Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange would direct all property tax appraisals to be made by countywide offices. Local taxing authorities would still establish their own tax rates and assessment ratios under the legislation.

The State Comptroller's office would develop standards and procedures for the county tax appraisers.

Both bills are regarded as important to school finance reform. Many of the school measures would base allocation of state aid on market value of district property.

VOTE BILLS ADVANCED

Bills important to the legislative process cleared the House in a busy week.

HB 4 revises the 1973 campaign reporting and disclosure act, and establishes a bipartisan commission to en-

force it. SB 300, with a controversial party purity amendment attached, provides for a computer-policed permanent voter registration system. The measure returns to the Senate, which previously has rejected the "purity" provision requiring voters to register by party preference.

Other major bills passed by the House last week would provide for establishment of Health Maintenance Organizations (SB 180) and encourage rape victims (HB 284) to report crimes and aid prosecutors in getting convictions. The HMO bill went back to the Senate with a minor amendment and is expected soon to be signed into law.

LAWYERS CURBED

A State Bar of Texas Committee on Professional Ethics has held city councilmen and mayors who are lawyers should not practice in municipal courts or represent clients in cases initiated by city police officers.

Morris Hassell of Rusk, committee chairman, said some of the same reasoning used in the opinion could be applied to legislators practicing before state agencies.

COURTS SPEAK

A State Supreme Court decision cast doubts on

cities' rights to regulate telephone rates for "extended metropolitan area service." The high court upheld an intermediate House court finding that a city has no inherent power to regulate utility rates, but only that granted by the legislature.

The Supreme Court also affirmed a \$139,194 damage judgment against a Houston finance firm following the death of a man from a heart attack after efforts to collect a \$158 debt.

In another case, the high court found no usury in a Dallas savings association's \$24,985 profit from arranging a \$150,000 loan for a development firm.

AG OPINIONS

The legislature has authority to require public utilities to refund to customers excessive rates, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, the Attorney General concluded:

• A commissioners court is not required to call an election for purpose of invalidating previously authorized road bonds on presentation of a petition.

• The legislature may alter the method of selecting members of public service boards so long as the agencies' economic obligations are not impaired.

• A commissioners court's mere refusal to ratify a prior action allegedly taken in violation of the open meetings act does not of itself have the effect of invalidating the earlier action.

APPOINTMENTS

R. Paul Teague Sr. of Texas City was named by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to the College Coordinating Board, succeeding Loren Bryce Meaders of Dallas who resigned.

Briscoe appointed Michael P. Metcalf of Dumas district judge of the 69th district (Deaf Smith, Oldham, Moore, Hartley, Sherman and Dallam counties).

He named Barry E. Blackwell of Dalhart to succeed Metcalf as 69th district attorney.

Tom Cole of Houston is new deputy general counsel for the Republican Party of Texas.

Roy M. Talley of Austin will serve on the legal committee of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission for Texas.

SHORT SNORTS

The Governor entered into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Labor allowing unemployed Texans to receive an extension of up to 13 weeks in unemployment benefits.

School Land Board announced bids will be received for a large oil and gas lease sale June 3. Another sale is scheduled at the same time for Texas Youth Council, Parks and Wildlife Department and Department of Corrections lands.

The Senate passed a bill

to require coverage of alcoholism in health and accident insurance policies.

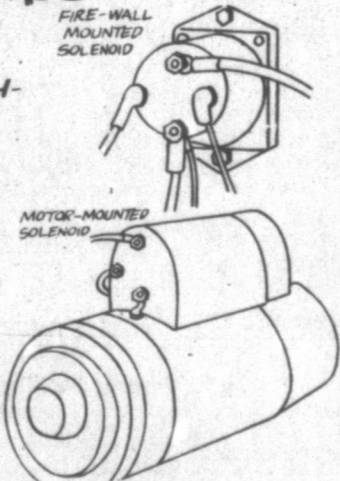

Religious Thoughts

Visiting the sick is the personal task of every member of society. There comes a time in everyon's life when it becomes his personal responsibility to pay a visit to a sick loved one, friend, or neighbor. One of the things mentioned by Jesus which will be brought out on the Judgment Day is the visiting of the sick. Jesus said: "...I was sick and ye visited me..." (Matt. 25:36).

It is especially the Christian duty to visit the sick. The church member has a responsibility toward another person. The Bible indicates one of the times that we are to take advantage to do our Christian duty is when another person becomes ill.

The question arises: How do we visit the sick? How are we supposed to do it? What are we to say? How long are we to stay? Following are some simple guidelines in following:

Realize that a sick person faces more than physical weakness and pain. They are away from their home. Life has changed for them. The emotional trauma is often more serious than the physical problem.

Check at the Nurses' station; introduce yourself; inquire of the condition of the person; ask if visitors are permitted. The idea of a visit to a sick person in the hospital is to help the individual not to hurt him. If he is not to have visitors, then this request of the doctor needs to be heard.

In the hospital room, do not neglect others in the same room with the person you went to see even if you are not acquainted with them. Be friendly with the others while concentrating upon the person whom you went to see.

It is good to knock at the door of a hospital room before entering. Do not enter when the doctor is with the patient. The consultation is a private concern.

Once you are with the person you wish to visit, take his hand if it is extended. If he does not extend his hand, it may be that he is too weak to do so. Don't insist. Be Chatty. Don't be gloom. The person in the bed has enough of this while he is in the hospital. If you are all tearful, you visit doesn't help. Be joyful. Be prayerful. It wouldn't hurt for you to pray for the individual. The person will appreciate. Don't stay all day.

If the person you go to see is unconscious, don't talk of his death; or say, "He is on his way out;" or "That's too bad;" and etc. Even though the individual is unconscious, he can hear you. We are told that the hearing of an individual even if he is unconscious is very acute.

Don't neglect your personal responsibility to say to a friend, neighbor, or loved one when ill that you appreciate them. Show them that you do. Go visit with them.
