## 'Lefors Week' Proclaimed, Cash Donations Are Asked

"Please don't send any more clothing or food!"

"Our facilities to store these articles are confined to only a few buildings which are already filled with more than we can possibly use in the near future." These were comments of people in Lefors Monday afternoon who were busy trying to clean up the debris left by an early morning tornado which almost completely wiped the small town off the map last Thursday morning.

People of the Panhandle responded to the emergency situation almost immediately after the first reports came out Thursday. At the present time, the Lefors School has been converted to an emergency center for those people who lost almost all of their personal possessions to the storm.

The gym has been filled to capacity with clothing which has been donated and shipped to the community of some 800 persons. Food, too, has inundated the community.

Mrs. Charles Lizenby, one of the few people whose home received only light damage, told The Press Monday afternoon that so much food had been shipped into Lefors that they were having a problem storing it all. She said she and other women had been keeping the school lunchroom open 24 hours a day since last Thursday morning, feeding anyone who came in. Sunday alone, more than 1,000 people ate at the school facilities.

Mrs. Lizenby said many clubs and organizations from outlying areas had made the trip to Lefors to cook meals and donate the foods used in preparing them. "We have an extremely good supply of canned foods and frozen beef on hand at the present time," she said.

### NEED FUNDS

The only thing lacking right now in Lefors is the funds with which to begin rebuilding homes and businesses. "Many of the residents are elderly living on small incomes. These people either had little or no insurance whatsoever on their homes and possessions," Rev. Rick Wadley, pastor of the First Baptist Church said.

## Lawmen Stand Duty At Lefors

Units from the Clarendon Police Department, Texas Game and Fish Commission, Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol responded to emergency duty at Lefors during the latter part of last week.

Police Chief Gary Gerdes, along with Daniel Archuleta and Homer Holman were the first Donley County lawmen called to duty, going to Lefors immediately following the tornado which almost completely destroyed the town of about 800 residents. Gary Hunt, game officer for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, was also at the scene during the early morning hours Thursday. The officers helped Lefors law officers organize searches for victims of the storm and directed traffic away from the town.

Sheriff Frank Lindsey and Chief Deputy Clyde James aided in the emergency situation all day Thursday with other law enforcement officers.

Texas Highway Patrol State Troopers Duane Nickols and Ray Burch also were called out, taking a 12 hour shift from about 8 p.m. Thursday until 8 a.m. Friday morning.

The Clarendon College Board of regents will meet Tuesday, April 8, at 7:30 p.m. in the college board room.

"There are many people here who have absolutely nothing left. Much of the debris has been sifted for miles around and only parts of people's furniture has been found," Rev. Wadley said.

In an effort to help the residents of Lefors, a fund drive has been established in Clarendon at the Farmers State Bank and Trust Company. Some \$125 has already been donated but more money is needed to aid in the estimated \$4 million disaster.

The week of April 13 through April 19 has been declared "Lefors Week" in Clarendon, along with most other towns and cities in the Panhandle. Donations are being accepted also at Osburn Furniture Company in downtown Clarendon and at the First Baptist Church.

An independent committee has been set up to help disburse the funds from any money raised locally. Those serving on the committee include Dr. James Brandon, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Clarendon; Rev. James Gillespie, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Groom; Charles Uzzie of the Follett First Baptist Church; Roy Canada of the Sunray First Baptist Church; David Campbell of the Wheeler

First Baptist Church; James Connors of the Kelton First Baptist Church, and George Warren, Red Cross representative.

Dr. Brandon pointed out Tuesday that the funds secured in this drive will not be issued to the American Red Cross, but will be used according to priority needs of the people. All funds will be used in Lefors.

Although most of the people serving on the committee are affiliated with the area Baptist Churches, there will be no requirement of any sort that the funds will be used to help Baptist families.

Dr. Brandon stated that there will be a house to house survey made in Lefors, gathering information on the households and what is needed, how much insurance coverage was placed on the home, and what the family's most urgent need is.

These survey sheets will then be made available to the committee and studied. Priorities will be placed on those families whose need is most critical.

The committee has already secured one mobile home for a Lefors family, buying the home and moving it to Lefors Tuesday afternoon.

Those persons donating money to the "Lefors Relief Fund" should bring or mail

checks to any one of the places mentioned above. The Press will publish weekly totals of the fund and those persons donating money beginning next week.

### OTHER HELP NEEDED

Late Monday afternoon, all telephone and utility service had again been made available to those homes which were livable. Many people had moved in with neighbors or secured apartments in nearby Pampa until some type shelter could be provided in Lefors.

Only a small number of people were in need of clothing, most of this being in odd sizes of clothing or shoes. The emergency Red Cross unit had funds available for these people and most had been cared for.

Other relief units had also moved into the city to do what they could to help.

There was still a need for more people to volunteer labor and heavy moving equipment to level most of the building remnants and make way for new buildings to be erected in their place.

Dr. Brandon stated Tuesday that several Clarendon churches will help in the fund drive by taking special offerings at their regular Sunday morning worship services.

## Donley County Historical Edition Will Be Published Later This Month

The long awaited History of Donley County, almost two years in the making, will be published this month on the threshold of this country's Bi-Centennial celebration.

"Donley County: Land O' Promise," authored by Virginia Browder, member of a pioneer Donley County family, will be presented to the people of Donley County at an autograph party on Saturday, April 19.

The autograph party will be announced later in April. Mrs. Browder will be on hand to sign autographs especially for persons who have reserved copies of the limited edition history.

The Donley County History may still be reserved at the pre-publication price of \$12.00 from the Clarendon Press through Friday, April 18. However on the day of the autograph party, the book will be sold at its regular retail price of \$15.00.

This collector's first edition of the Donley County History will have a dark green and gold cloth hardback binding with a clear milar dust jacket. The 8 1/2 by 11 inch book will contain some 328 pages with scores of unpublished early-day photos, art sketches by the Harold Bugbees with chapter headings of art created for the book by Turkey artist Otho Stubbs.

This pioneer history of Donley County is as colorful as variegated brake land of this eastern Panhandle country. Such salty cattleman as Col. Charles Goodnight and Tom Bugbee along with men of the cloth

such as Henry Lewis Carhart helped to settle and civilize one of the nations last frontiers. Author Browder covers the days of the Comanche and Comanchero, the rancher and later the farmer and the settlements and towns and communities that made up Donley County.

Histories of pioneer ranch families, churches, schools, communities and businesses will make "Donley County: Land O' Promise" a welcome addition to Panhandle county histories.

The Donley County History is number 14 in a series of Texas county histories

published by Nortex Press of Quanah. The new history will contain a new Nortex Press emblem identifying it as a Bicentennial Publication.

Other area county histories published by Nortex Press include Childress, Motley, Dickens, Foard, Hardeman, Farmer and Potter.

## Firemen Answer Two Major Fires, Aid at Lefors Thursday

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department had busy night last Wednesday, March 26, being called out to fight two major fires and answering emergency calls from Lefors with two vehicles.

Although high winds and cold temperatures were a hindrance, about 15 firemen answered an alarm at 9:40 p.m. to fight a major fire at a vacant house in Lelia Lake owned by Kermit Hopper. The wood frame stucco building was completely destroyed with flames visible for several miles.

The Billie Castner family from Tahoka had planned to move into the home on Thursday. No household goods were in the building at the time of the fire. Clarendon firemen and units remained on the scene until about 11 p.m.

Units were again summoned about 1 a.m. Thursday during the height of a local storm warning to lend aid to tornado victims at Lefors. Two units, the fire department ambulance and the emergency unit, manned

by Clyde Price, Jerry Hawkins, Delbert Robertson and Frank Griffin, made the trip. They returned to Clarendon at approximately 4 a.m.

Even before these two vehicles could reach the fire station, another major fire broke out at the City Motel just east of downtown

Clarendon. Firemen worked for more than two hours dousing a fire in one of the motel's units near the office of the motel. Fire officials believed the fire began from faulty electrical wiring. Damage was not extensive to the motel unit.

Firemen finished up the night about 5 a.m.

## Local Elections Slated Saturday

Local elections will be held this Saturday, April 5, although the Howardwick city election is the only one in which races have developed.

In the Howardwick election, Mayor Glen Doty is running unopposed for his third term. In the running for Howardwick aldermen are: Oz Engles, Sue Melver, John Vickers and George Howard. Two of them will fill the expiring aldermen posts of Vernon Berry and Alton Hendrick. The polling place is the Howardwick City Hall,

with voting from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The Clarendon city election will be held at City Hall from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Running unopposed for reelection are Mayor H. M. (Flip) Breedlove and at large aldermen Glen Wallace and Cecil McAfee.

Running unopposed to fill three positions on the Donley County Hospital District board are incumbents Lucy Noble and E. W. Barbee, and Billy Ray Johnston filed for

## Burglars Rip-Off Two Businesses Early Monday

Two burglaries were reported to the Clarendon Police Department early Monday morning by Clarendon businessmen.

About \$1,500 in tools were reported stolen from Clarendon Auto Supply, 114 S. Kearney, by Glen H. Day when he came to work about 8 a.m. Monday. The theft was committed after someone bashed in the plate glass door in the front of the building and apparently reached in and unlocked the door.

Employees were still in the process of pinpointing the missing merchandise at mid-day Monday. Day reported to Gary Gerdes, Clarendon Chief of Police, that known merchandise taken included a one-half inch Husky drive with two break-overs, a speed handle, extension and ratchet, a three-eighths inch drive set with two break-overs, one extension, a speed handle and nine sockets, two 15-inch ridged crescents, two 12-inch crescents, one 10-inch crescent and two eight-inch crescents, one set of allen wrenches,

several pairs of pliers, one complete set of 13 Husky open end wrenches, about a dozen boxed end wrenches and big tool set.

Another burglary took place at Mills Motor Company, located on Hwy. 70 south of Clarendon sometime during the week-end. The only items known missing were an old model adding machine and an electric adding machine.

Gerdes reported entry was made by opening the door

with a pair of water pump pliers. Total value of the two machines was placed at about \$125.

A third possible break-in occurred sometime prior to Sunday after noon at the Clarendon Press building at the corner of Hwy. 287 and Jefferson Street. A Continental Trailways freight box at the front of the building was broken into by ripping a hasp out of the top of the box. It could not be determined immediately if anything was taken.

## Rainfall Ahead For Year Over 1974 Weather Reports

March, 1975, continued to show increases in moisture for the Clarendon area over 1974 reports, according to Tommie Saye's official reports.

Snowfall ending at 7 a.m. last Saturday totaled .04 inches of melt Saturday and .03 inches on Sunday, bringing total moisture for March to .72 inches. Total for the year now stands at 2.79 inches, slightly less than

one-half inch over the same period in 1974.

A low temperature of 20 degrees was recorded both Friday and Saturday, March 28 and 29.

Other March rainfall reported included .40 inches on March 27, .06 on March 18, .11 on March 16, .03 on March 10 and .05 on March 9. Rainfall in the same month last year amounted to one and a half inches, more than double the 1975 total.

Here are some agricultural terms you may have wondered about:

INDIGENOUS - a classification of plants which indicates they are native to the geographic area in which they are found.

EXOTIC - opposite of indigenous, plants being grown in areas where they were not previously found. Most crops in the United States are exotic.

FORAGE - fresh or preserved plant material used as feed for animals.

SILAGE - forage preserved by partial fermentation. Usually in a container such as a silo.

HAYLAGE - dry silage.

SOILAGE - sometimes called "green chop", it is a crop grown and then fed to animals immediately after harvesting.

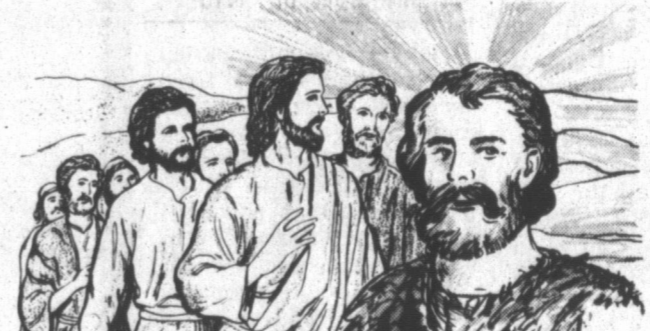
TRAP CROP - plants grown to attract particular parasites or insects.
