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# 'Lefors Week' Proclaimed, **Cash Donations Are Asked**

"Please don't send any more clothing or food!"

"Our facilities to store these articles are confined to only a few buildings which are already filled with more than we can possible use in the near future." These were comments of people in Lefors Monday afternoon who were busy trying to clean up the derbis left by an early morning tornado which almost completely wiped the small town off the map last Thursday morning.

People of the Panhandle responded to the emergency situation almost immediately after the first reports came out Thursday. At the present time, the Lefors School has been converted to an emergency center for those people who lost almost all of their personal possessions to the storm.

The gym has been filled to capacity with clothing which has been donated and shipped to the community of some 800 persons. Food, too, has inundated the community.

Mrs. Charles Lizenby, one of the few people whose home received only light damage, told The Press Monday afternoon that so much food had been shipped into Lefors that they were having a problem storing it all. She said she and other women had been keeping the school lunchroom open 24 hours a day since last Thursday morning, feeding anyone who came in. Sunday alone, more than 1,000 people ate at the school

facilities. Mrs. Lizenov said many clubs and organizations from outlying areas had made the trip to Lefors to cook meals and donate the foods used in preparing then. "We have an extremely good supply of canned foods and frozen beef on hand at the present time," she said.

**NEED FUNDS** 

The only thing lacking right now in Lefors is the funds with which to begin rebuilding homes and businesses. "Many of the residents are elderly living on small incomes. These people either had little or no insurance whatsoever on their homes and possessions," Rev. Rick Wadley, pastor of the First Baptist Church said.

### Lawmen **Stand Duty** At Lefors

Units from the Clarendon Police Department, Texas Game and Fish Commission, Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol responded to emergency duty at Lefors during the latter part of last week.

Police Chief Gary Gerdes. along with Daniel Archuleta and Homer Holman were the first Donley County lawmen called to duty, going to Lefors immediately following the tornado which almost completely destroyed the town of about 800 residents.

Gary Hunt, game officer for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, was also at the scene during the early morning hours Thursday. The officers helped Lefors law officers organize searches for victims of the storm and directed traffic away from the town.

Sheriff Frank Lindsey and Chief Deputy Clyde James aided in the emergency situation all day Thursday with other law enforcement

officers. Texas Highway Patrol State Troopers Duane Nickols and Ray Burch also were called out, taking a 12 hour shift from about 8 p.m. Thursday until 8 a.m. Friday morning.

In an effort to help the residents of Lefors, a fund drive has been established in Clarendon at the Farmers State Bank and Trust Company. Some \$125 has already been donated but more money is needed to aid in the estimated \$4 million disaster.

The week of April 13 through April 19 has been declared "Lefors Week" in Clarendon, along with most other towns and cities in the Panhandle. Donations are being accepted also at Osburn Furniture Company in downtown Clarendon and at the First Baptist Church.

An independent committee has been set up to help disburse the funds from any money raised locally. Those serving on the committee include Dr. James Brandon, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Clarendon; Rev. James Gillespie, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Groom; Charles Uzzie of the Follett First Baptist Church; Roy Canada of the Sunray First Baptist Church; David Campbell of the Wheeler

Connors of the Kelton First Baptist Church, and George Warren, Red Cross representative.

Dr. Brandon pointed out Tuesday that the funds secured in this drive will not be issued to the American Red Cross, but will be used according to priority needs of the people. All funds will be used in Lefors.

Although most of the people serving on the committee are affiliated with the area Baptist Churches there will be no requirement of any sort that the funds will be used to help Baptist

Dr. Brandon stated that there will be a house to house survey made in Lefors, gathering information on the households and what is needed, how much insurance coverage was placed on the home, and what the family's most urgent need is.

These survey sheets will then be made available to the committee and studied. Priorities will be placed on those families whose need is most critical.

The committee has already secured one mobile home for a Lefors family, buying the home and moving it to Lefors Tuesday afternoon.

Those persons donating money to the "Lefors Relief Fund" should bring or mail

First Baptist Church; James checks to any one of the places mentioned above. The Press will publish weekly totals of the fund and those persons donating money beginning next week.

OTHER HELP NEEDED

Late Monday afternoon, all telephone and utility service had again been made available to those homes which were livable. Many people had moved in with neighbors or secured apartments in nearby Pampa until some type shelter could be provided in Lefors.

Only a small number of people were in need of clothing, most of this being in odd sizes of clothing or shoes. The emergency Red Cross unit had funds available for these people and most had been cared for. Other relief units had also moved into the city to do

what they could to help. There was still a need for more people to volunteer labor and heavy moving equipment to level most of the building remnants and make was for new buildings be erected in their place.

## **Burglars Rip-Off Two Businesses Early Monday**

Two Burglaries were re ported to the Clarendon Police Department early Monday morning by Clarendon businessmen.

### Firemen Answer Two Major Fires, Aid at Lefors Thursday

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department had busy night last Wednesday, March 26, being called out to fight two major fires and answering emergency calls from Lefors with two vehicles.

Although high winds and cold temperatures were a hinderance, about 15 firemen answered an alarm at 9:40 p.m. to fight a major fire at a vacant house in Lelia Lake owned by Kermit Hopper. The wood frame stucco building was completely destroyed with flames visable for several miles.

The Billie Castner family from Tahoka had planned to move into the home on Thursday. No household goods were in the building at the time of the fire. Clarendon firemen and units remained on the scene until about 11 p.m.

Units were again sum moned about 1 a.m. Thursday during the height of a local storm warning to lend aid to tornado victims at Lefors. Two units, the fire department ambulance and the emergance unit, manned by Clyde Price, Jerry Hawkins, Delbert Robertson and Frank Griffin, made the trip. They returned to Clarendon at approximately

Even before these two vehicles could reach the fire station, another major fire broke out at the City Motel just east of down town dousing a fire in one of the motel's units near the office of the motel. Fire officials believed the fire began from faulty electrical wiring. Damage was not extensive to the motel unit.

### **Local Elections** Slated Saturday


Local elections will be held this Saturday, April 5, although the Howardwick city election is the only one in which races have developed.

As our readers will find in another part of this paper, Sunday, April 13, has been designated as "Lefors Day" not only in Clarendon, but in other Panhandle towns, cities and

The object of the special day is to take up a collection of cash donations which will be used to help the townspeople of Lefors get back in business and secure housing of some type until things can begin to operate normally.

Along with Butch Strickland, the youth director of the First Baptist Church of Clarendon, we made a short afternoon tour of Lefors Monday to get some sort of an idea of the devastation in last Thursday morning's tornado which ripped

Our first thought, as we approached the town, was why, out of all the rolling ranch land which surrounds Lefors, did a storm with such horrendous effects have to come directly through the town? Why couldn't it have veered just a little in one direction or another and simply by-passed the town

Such was not the case, however, for the tornado came in on the southwestern edge of Lefors and proceeded to literally rip the town to shreads with the exception of the far northwestern side of town which escaped with much less damage.

The winds had such force that the heavy iron poles around the town's ball park were bent at 90 degree angles about eight feet from the ground, two were bent to the east and two bent to the north. Trees were stripped of bark, leaving a white, ghostly appearance. In the center of all this devastation, only the town's water tower escaped damage and still stood although derbis surrounded it.

Almost all the businesses were completely wiped out as the funnel came into town. It continued in a north-northeasterly direction, taking with it what appeared to be about 75 per cent of the homes in Lefors.

We talked with several residents of the town to find out what, if anything, was sorely needed to help out. The school has been turned into an emergency relief center, furnishing residents and workers with meal facilities on a 24 hour a day

Many out of town service clubs and organizations have donated not only food, but have driven to Lefors and prepared meals to be served to the public. Everyone is welcome to the three time daily hot meals served there.

Mrs. Charles Lizenby, a Lefors resident who happened to be one of the lucky people whos home was not torn a part, told us that the lunchroom and the women working in it served more than a thousand people Easter Sunday. She also stated that they did not need any more food donated at the present time since so much had been donated that they (the town) had run out of storage places.

Beef has been donated by several businesses and individuals and is having to be stored in Pampa. Clothing is also in abundant supply, with the high school gymnasium literally packed with clothing which has been donated the residents there. Only a few special sizes of shoes and clothing are actually needed, and these needs are being met by the American Red Cross.

At a later date, when housing becomes available, additional furniture and appliances will be needed, but since there is no place to store these items, the public has been urged not to send it to Lefors. Instead, the townspeople would like for the iblic to contact a citizens committee and tell them that they have some of these articles on hand and where they can be

Only after people have a place to live will they be needed. In addition, other items will come in handy at a later date. These include kitchen utensils, dishes, pots, pans, etc.

Lefors has had many people volunteer their time and equipment to cleaning up the gigantic mess, but they can still use the talents and muscles of anyone who can use a hammer and saw or help clear out the huge piles of twisted rubble that still remains throughout the town. Heavy equipment, trucks and such are working early to late in moving the wreckage from lots so people may begin rebuilding.

Right now, the most urgent need is a source of money to enable Lefors' residents to rebuild their businesses and homes. Most have decided to remain in the small town, but many of the residents were elderly and retired who had little, if any, insurance on their property and personal effects.

Rick Wadley, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Lefors, told us that the utility companies have now restored all services to those homes which are in serviceable condition. Electricity was being furnished as early as Friday and Southwestern Bell had restored most of the telephone service by late Monday afternoon.

Various organizations and church groups have set up mobile headquarters at Lefors to help residents secure help in re-establishing the homes and businesses destroyed. These groups are co-ordinating their resources and trying not to duplicate on services or goods.

Lists are being compiled of needed items and where they can be located. When someone has need for a piece of furniture or appliance, the agencies will check their lists, pick up the telephone and call the person who has it on hand. Arrangements will then be made to transport the item to

The overall impression we got of the people who live (or did live) in Lefors was that despite their tragedy, their spirit is unusually high. Everyone who was capable of lending a hand in cleaning off city lots was hard at work. We saw few people frowning. Most weren't smiling, but they weren't frowning

Churches reported unusually large congregations at their Sunday morning services, and although some of the churches began their services earlier than usual, many ran over an hour longer than normal.

All in all, the residents of the town consider themselves very lucky indeed to have survived. There was no warning at all by the emergency sirens. One elderly gentleman who lived about two blocks from one of the warning sirens told us that the first indication his family had of bad weather was when windows in his home began popping out and the roof caved in, trapping two of his visiting grandsons.

Only the two-by-four framework of his home was left standing.

While we're on the subject of weather warning sirens, the warning sounded in Clarendon early Thursday morning--or at least we think it did. We were up, watching the weather and listening to the hail beat against the side of the house. Although Clarendon's warning system can be heard clearly on the far west side of town on a calm night, the sound was

very indistinct during the height of the storm. We cannot help but wonder if others failed to hear the

In Moyeen's home city of Chittagong, which is on the delta of the great Ganges River and the shore of the Bay of Bengal, flooding is a very real and frightening problem, and we shudder to think what cataclysmic visions the Houston newspapers may have conjured up in his mind with their reports of "heavy rainfall in the

We have been downstate on occasion when Houston newspapers have been reporting on Panhandle weather, and it tends to be frightening even when you know better. For a young and impressionable journalist from south Asia, unfamiliar either with our eography or the overwrought image of Panhandle weather cherished by the down-state press, it was obviously earth-shaking.

Unfurnished houses are renting for as much as \$1,000 a month and the hotels and motels will rent rooms by the day only, totaling up rents over \$1,000 a month for a room. The sad part about this rental boom is that the pipeline is not stirring up this much activity and jobs are hard to find in Alaska these days. People who are considering going to Alaska to seek their fortune had better have one before they go or else they are apt to spend it on rent alone.

### Periodic Interview Required For Supplemental Security Income

'People who are receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI)monthly checks will have to answer several questions which will be asked by the Social Security Administration. This is so a redetermination may be made as to their continuing eligibility," said Travis C. Briggs, social security manager in Amarillo, TX.

At this time, the social security office is sending letters to Supplemental Security Income recipients who were converted from Welfare on January 1, 1974. It is the recipient's responsibility to contact the Social Security Office so that all necessary information may be obtained. In most cases, there will be no change, and a person will continue to receive his checks in the usual manner without any interruptions.

However, there have been cases in which an SSI recipient was receiving the incorrect amount, and this had to be corrected. The person who gets the checks,

whether for himself or on behalf of someone else, is responsible for giving the Social Security Administration all information which would cause those checks to be increased, decreased, or even if there would be no change in the ammount payable

It is preferred that the person receiving the checks appear in person because at least once every two years a face-to-face interview is required. If a person cannot come into the office (or meet with our representative), he should contact the Social Security Office by telephone. If a person fails to contact us within a reasonable period of time, it may become

necessary to suspend that person's benefits. Therefore to avoid any interruption in checks, a person should contact the Social Security Office immediately when he receives a letter asking his to do so.

INDIGENOUS - a classification of plants which indicates they are native to the geographic area in which they are found.

**EXOTIC** - opposite of indigenous, plants being grown in areas where they were not previously found. Most crops in the United States are exotic.

FORAGE - fresh or preserved plant material used as feed for animals.

SILAGE - forage preserved by partial fermentation. Usually in a container such as a silo.

HAYLAGE - dry silage.

SOILAGE - sometimes called "green chop", it is a crop grown and then fed to animals immediately after harvesting.

TRAP CROP - plants grown to attract particular para-


