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BRONCHOS OPEN IN CHILDRESS FRIDAY

Coach Jerry Wilson's Broncho team with assistants Billy Crockett, Doug Keeney, and Jack Hall will kick-off their 1975 season at Hobcat stadium in Childress at 7:30 Friday night.

Coach Wilson said it would most definitely be a test for the Bronchos. However, he feels that if the team can avoid mistakes and play well together as a whole it will build the teams confidence which at this point is much needed.

The Junior Varsity will open its season at home against Memphis on Thursday, Sept. 4 then travel to White Deer the following week, Sept. 11.

The eighth grade opens on Sept. 4 in Valley then has its opener at home with White Deer on Sept. 11. The 7th grade plays in Shamrock on Sept. 18 for their season opener.

Varsity game time will be 8 p.m. while the junior varsity games begin at 7:30 p.m.; the 8th grade games at 6 p.m. and the 7th grade games at 4:30 and 5 p.m.

According to Top of Texas Football Magazine, the Bronchos are rated a toss-up with Wellington behind top seeded Memphis Cyclones. After dominating District

play for the past decade, the Bronchos under Coach Wilson are facing a rebuilding program.

Here is the way the Bronchos look from the Panhandle point of view: The three other starting backs are returning in quarterback David Lewis (5-9, 150, senior), halfback Lynn Floyd (5-10, 165, senior) and Larry Shields (5-8, 155, senior). Floyd is rated as an All-State candidate.

Two sophomores, John Hall (5-10, 160) and Howard Weatheron (5-9, 140) will push the above three for a starting position.

All-District Eddy Eads (5-10, 162, senior) will hold down an end spot. His counter partner at the other end will be Gary Jack (5-9, 150, senior) who was a starter at this position last fall.

You can bet that a lot of rushing yardage will be made behind tackle Ricky Mooring (6-0, 195, senior) who was a two-way starter last fall.

The other returning starters are Mark Boothe (5-11, 165, senior) center.

Paul Hermesmeyer (5-9, 160, junior) guard who was a two-way starter last fall.

Paul Hermesmeyer (5-9, 160, junior) guard, Walter Riggs (5-11, 165, senior) guard and tackles Ralph McGarity (6-2, 200, senior), and Daryl Rives (5-10, 175, senior) can all be counted on as possible first stringers.

Clarendon's major strength lies in the experience (7 starters) and overall team quickness. Their major weakness lies in the depth chart. A few injuries, especially in the line could get them in trouble in a hurry.

Clarendon will line up in Slot-1 on offense and defense their opponents with a basic 6-1.

The annual showdown for the District 2-A trophy will probably be October 24th at Clarendon when the Memphis Cyclones come visiting.

The Clarendon Bronchos hosted the powerpacked Groom Tigers in Thursday night's hard-hitting scrimmage.

Broncho defense was highly effective once again, as they held Grooms offensive attack to no touchdowns, while the Broncho offense managed to scramble past the Tigers rugged line for three touchdowns.

Clarendon's senior quarterback David Lewis connected with senior end Walter Riggs for a 70 yard touchdown pass. Later in the action Lewis was again spot lighted in a 22 yard run for Clarendon's second touchdown.

Tony Wallace, Broncho secondary half-back also aided in scoring with a 19 yard run for Clarendon's final touchdown of the night.

When asked to compare Thursday night's scrimmage with Groom and the previous outing with Sanford-Fritch, Coach Jerry Wilson commented by saying, "I was highly pleased with the hitting of our defensive line in both scrimmages; however I feel that the offense was more effective against Sanford-Fritch than with Groom."

Richard Tunnell celebrated his 14th year in July as owner of Tunnell Pharmacy.

"Get ready for the game and then drop by for a delicious pre-game supper," Lion Boss Jerry Hawkins said. Members of the club will prepare the supper, serve and clean up. The 7 o'clock time was set to allow members to get to the game on time.

Truck Fire

An early morning truck fire caused local firemen to be roused from sleep at approximately 5:30 Monday morning.

About one and a half miles east of Lelia Lake a Semi-tractor trailer rig caught fire and the Clarendon Fire Department was called. The exact cause of the fire was not known and the cab was completely gutted. No injuries were reported.

Money or lack of it is a problem with most people these days.

And Donley County is no exception—especially thanks to unseasonable flooding rains in July that wiped out half of the cotton crop and wrecked havoc with county roads, bridges and even county road equipment.

County Judge Billy Christal said the rains—as glad as everyone was to see moisture in July—will cost Donley County taxpayers at least \$30,000.

The bridges and roads that are used by school buses and mail routes have been repaired for use but a lot of the roads will just have to wait until over-taxed county workmen can get around to them.

But it's not the work that is the problem—it's the money. Judge Christal admits that the "Act of Providence" as insurance agents are wont to call the floods out a wide swath in the county budget.

And frankly, nobody knows yet where the money is going to come from, although some taxpayers suspect they have a pretty good idea who will get the final bill.

In the meantime, the County Commissioners Court is making application for a federal disaster grant. Facts and figures are being put together and hopefully at least some of the funds will come from that source.

Since no one really knows what the 1976 budget will look like, the regular September final budget hearing has been postponed at least until October. Last year the county allocated a budget of around \$250,000 which will not fit in the shoe the county will have to wear next year.

So it appears the county has several alternatives—none of which are good from the viewpoint of the people footing the bill.

One—which apparently the county is not going to do, at least for the present—would be to increase the county's tax evaluation from the current \$9 million. By comparison the school and hospital districts show tax evaluations of around \$15 million each.

Two—Cut costs, and probably services down to the bone and try to skimp by for the present with the current budget. Three—Issue time warrants from the county's depository which would add interest to other inflationary costs that are facing the county already.

Four—the best one yet, get enough federal disaster grants to take care of finances until another crisis comes along. Some taxpayers, especially those whose tax bills amount to a considerable sum, have expressed opposition to any kind of increase in county taxes.

While it is small consolation, other counties in Texas—along with rural school districts—are also facing the cost of operation crunch. Sooner or later somebody will have to pay the fiddler—the question is, who, when and how much.

Judge Christal and commissioners Gene White, and Olace Hicks of Clarendon and Finley of Alanreed and John Hill Jr. of Hedley will have some tough decisions to make next month. It's almost like having a wildcat by the tail—you can't hold on, but then you can't turn loose either.

They're hoping someone will come along with a sack—a sack of money, maybe!

"Time To Run," a film that is a mixture of problems and solutions, will be shown at the First Baptist Church at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 7th.

Filmed on location in the Southern California area, "Time To Run" stars Ed Nelson, Randall Carver, Barbara Sigel, Joan Winmill and Gordon Rigby. Nelson plays Warren Cole, a hard driving success-oriented industrial and scientific engineer who, because of over-involvement with his work, has failed to communicate with his wife Fran, played by Joan Winmill, or their son Jeff, played by screen newcomer Randall Carver.

"Time To Run" allows the viewer to become involved on any one or more of the three different levels. Viewed purely as entertainment, it's the suspenseful story of Jeff's attempts at sabotage in the nuclear generating plant conceived, designed and managed by his father. Jeff strongly feels that the plant is a threat to the environment, and he puts his feelings in action.

Viewed on an emotional level, "Time To Run" is the deeply moving drama of the conflicts that are tearing a family apart—conflicts that develop between husband and wife, and between father and son. In an attempt to find freedom from the ever-growing hostilities, Jeff takes to the road, hoping to discover some meaning in his confused life.

Approached from a religious perspective, "Time To Run" is also a story of friction between Jeff and his girlfriend, Michelle, played by Barbara Sigel, who is a familiar face to television viewers. Michelle has discovered a spiritual dimension in her life, and this aspect is a very confusing to Jeff, who has little time for "a God who would allow war, hatred, and suffering on earth." But his life is shattered by an avalanche of personal problems, and he finds himself at a Jesus people gathering with Michelle, where he glimpses the possibility of a new life-style based on love and understanding.

"Time To Run" is a film that can help strengthen love relationships between people. It's a film that was made for families to attend-together.

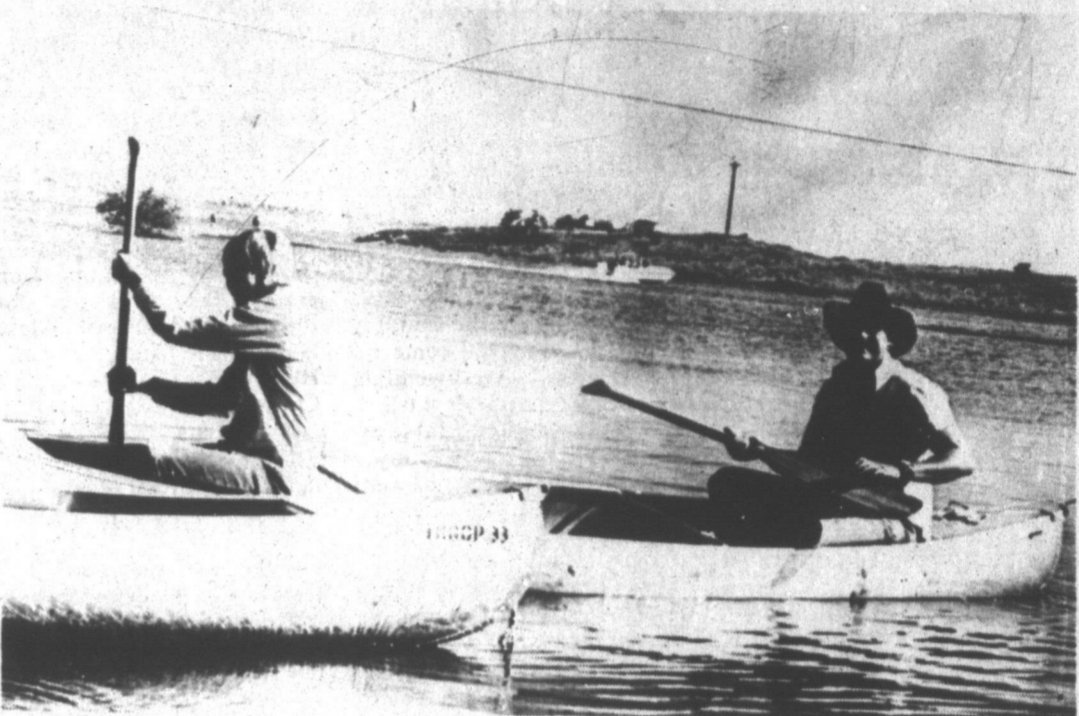

Small Grain Planting Time

Farmers in Donley County who are getting ready to plant small grains should give close attention to proper fertilization, points out Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Fertilization of small grains is essential for profitable production, with nitrogen especially playing a key role, says Gooch. Phosphorus is also a key element in small grain production while potassium is needed in only a few areas.

Gooch recommends applying phosphorus at or before planting since it is essential for seedling development, early vegetative growth and root formation. He suggests a range of application rates from 15 to 60 pounds per acre, with the higher rate to be used in soils quite low in phosphorus.

How much nitrogen to be used depends on several factors, notes Gooch, such as type of crop, yield potential and whether or not the crop is to be grazed. A range of rates would be from 40 to 120 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Since plants should not be

allowed to become severely nitrogen deficient, some nitrogen should be applied in the fall, with about 30 pounds per acre a minimum rate. The remainder of the nitrogen may be put down in one to two additional applications through the season.

If a soil test shows a need for potassium, this element should be applied along with the phosphorus at or before planting.

Both forage and grain production were reduced last year because a few producers skimped on fertilizer, points out Gooch. With fertilizer supplies increasing, he advises producers to take a close look at their fertilization program and to base fertilizer use on the need of the crop and on the production potential they hope to reach.

There will be ample room for the library in the new office building. At present it is housed in the basement and is used that it is inconvenient is an understatement.

the paneling, vinyl wall covering and other interior items himself. Of special interest to him is the shadowbox ceiling to be installed. "It gives a feeling of depth," he explained.
