Richard Tunnell celebrated his 14th year in July as owner of Tunnell Pharmacy. Experience in retail business goes back to Richard's with Groom and the previous

My parents owned a grocery store and I began working in the store when I was five years old." he explained.

The grocery store was largely responsible for his decision to enter Texas University as a pharmacy student, he confided. At that time the grocer stayed open until 11:00 o'clock evenings and the drugstore closed about seven. Four hours of working time difference made an impression on

Richard. After completing high school at Silverton, Tunnell entered the University and received his Bachlor of Science Degree in Pharmacy in 1957. He went to work as a hospital pharmacist in High Plains Hospital in Hale Center, where he worked 5 years. It was here he met Vonna Davis, also employed by the hospital, and later married her.

Vonna and Richard have both worked in the store here since the business started in 1961. As the business grew, more space was needed and it has been remodeled twice. The walls were moved in 1974, and today the inventor

consists of some 3,000 items. A full line of Reed and Barton sterling, super silver and stainless is carried as well as Bolova, Accutron and Caravelle watches, and Boluva wall and desk clocks.

'Time To Run'' stars Ed Nelson, Randall Carver, Barbara Sigel, Joan Winmill and Gordon Rigsby. Nelson plays warren Cole, a hard driving success-oriented industrial and scientific engineer who, because of over-involvement with his work, has failed to communicate with his wife Fran. played by Joan Winmill, or their son Jeff, played by screen newcomer Randall

"Time To Run" allows the viewer to become involved on any one or more of the three different levels. Viewed purely as entertainment, it's the suspenseful story of Jeff's attempts at sabotage in the nuclear generating plant conceived, designed and managed by his father. Jeff strongly feels that the plant is a threat to the environment, and he puts his feelings in action.

Viewed on an emotional level, "Time To Run" is the deeply moving drama of the conflicts that are tearing a family apart-conflicts that develop between husband and wife, and between father and son. In an attempt to find freedom from the evergrowing hostilities, Jeff takes to the road, hoping to discover some meaning in his confused life.



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


