DEROGATORY STATEMENTS OF GOVERNMENT BEING MADE IN COUNTY PIERCE SAYS

Declaring that fifth columnist propaganda was astonishingly prevalent in Donley County, sheriff Guy Pierce this week asked cooperation in subduing any derogatory statements concerning the United States government.

Pierce said, besides his own observance, persistent rumors were reaching him of widespread action by local radicals.

"These reports," the sheriff stated, "may be more or less voiced by that element of discontent of which no one, including the government, could do enough. However, in the light of the present European situation, my office feels it best to endeavor to curb all propaganda detrimental to the safety of local citizens."

WASHINGTON, D. C .- The Connally - Smith anti-alien bill rapidly sped toward passage by the Senate and House, is meeting with acclaim throughout the United States as a measure expected to aid materially in the control of "fifth column" activities in America.

Offered by Senator Tom Connally of Texas on behalf of the Senate Judiciary Committee, the fingerprinting of aliens seeking to enter the United States.

"In addition," states Senator Connally, "the bill forbids tampering with military or naval forces of the country, or advocating overthrowing or destroying the government by force or vio-

"Aliens subject to deportation alien to enter the United States in violation of law, any carrying a gun designed to shoot more than one shot without reloading, and those violating the Alien Registration Act," Senator Connally explained.

"No visas are allowed any alien entering the United States who has not been registered and fingerprinted and all those without visa, re-entry permit or registration card shall be excluded, Senator Connally continued, adding:

"Every alien in the United States over 14 years of age must be fingerprinted and registered. Applications for registration are to be made at designated postof-

### War Increases Greater Demand For Live Stock

AUSTIN, June 18 .- Proof that the livestock industry of Texas is fully awake to the possibilities and future demands, resulting from the European war and this nation's own defense program, was cited today by J. E. McDonald, State Commissioner of Agriculture, in revealing an unprecedented number of requests for leasing of state owned jacks and stallions.

"Texas bred mules and horses have always ranked at the top in both peace time and in war, and as a result of the present domestic and foreign conditions, this demand is increasing rapidly.

"With July 1 as the deadline for new annual leasing contracts. the list of available jacks, state owned, has already been exhausted, while there are only approximately 50 stallions remaining unleased for next year. 
