### 1967 LONG RANGE PROGRAM

We will begin signing up Thursday, December 1, 1966, for the 1967 Cropland Adjustment Program. This sign-up will be conducted on a first-come first-serve basis. The county is limited on the number of acres that can be put in the program and there is also a limit on the amount of money that is available for the program.

You may sign up in the program for a period of 5 to 10 years. To be eligible, you must put in all of one allotment or base crop or you may contract the entire farm.

For additional information, come by the ASCS Office and talk with us.

### COTTON REFERENDUM

Ballots will be mailed Friday, December 2, 1966, to all producers who had an interest in the production of cotton in 1966. Voters will be voting on two things this year — (1) Upland Cotton Marketing Quotas and (2) Cotton Research and Promotion Order. Don't confuse the two votes being held at the same time—one is on marketing quotas and for the 1967 crop of cotton, and the other is whether to finance and carry out a cotton research and promotion program.

Pamphlets explaining the Cotton Research and Promotion Order and also voting instructions will be enclosed with the ballots. Please read them carefully as the outcome of this referendum is very important.

Regardless of how you vote—be sure to vote! Mail your ballots, or return them in person to the ASCS office not later than Dec. 9.

### 1966 ACP

The County Committee still has plenty of funds to help you carry out needed conservation practices on your farm. Those of you who are now stripping your cotton may want to make application for listing or chiseling to keep the land from blowing. Cost-share assistance for this practice is offered at 75c per acre.

### PUBLIC MEETINGS SET FOR PANHANDLE ECONOMIC PROGRAM

Four public meetings are scheduled throughout the area beginning Monday, December 5 and continuing through Thursday, December 8 concerning the future of the Panhandle stressing a program aimed primarily at improving income from our agricultural industry through improved use of area resources.

The Cotton referendum will be up for vote with the issue turned squarely to the farmer during the period from December 5-9. Ballots have been mailed out by the ASCS and are to be returned by mail or brought to the local ASCS office for the count.

Various groups have endorsed the measure while other groups oppose the measure. It is realized by all that synthetics are taking over the market. There has been a carry-over of cotton even with the low acreage allotment but will this continue to be the case. Take this year for example. The yield is far below par for this area. It is definitely established that to keep growing cotton there must be an increased market.

Those opposed to the Cotton Research and Promotion Act base their objections on the fact that too much power is vested in the Secretary of Agriculture. Many laws have been passed that seem to be basically good but the interpretation of those laws take the issue far beyond the fields intended.

This issue is up to you, MR. FARMER. Read and study the law and as you do, think not of just the present but of the various interpretations that may be made in the future. It is an admitted fact that Cotton is in trouble. Shall the government help you solve your problem or will you work together as a group to establish a sound program for promotion and research. VOTE!

### NOW IS THE TIME! TOYS FOR TOTS

### COTTON MARKET NEWS

During the past week 15,000 samples were classed at the USDA Cotton Classing offices in Memphis. Grade, staple and mike readings dropped sharply. Low yields are being experienced in most counties of the area.

The quality of cotton classed showed 63% Light Spotted and the predominant grade Middling Light Spotted. Bark reduced the grade 3% Staple length averaged 15/16. Mike readings ranged from 4.9 to 2.6.

Most of the production has been held for various reasons but the average price paid for that on the market ranged from 18.95 to 17.50. Cottonseed brought the farmers from \$63 to \$67 per ton at gin points.

### INCREASED TAXES MAY BE AVOIDED

Dear Fellow Texan

A balanced budget is possible in this fiscal year. That's the view of a private organization with a reputation for making accurate evaluations of budget problems of the Federal Government—the Council of State Chambers of Commerce. The Council notes that spending is likely to be \$116 billion in the current fiscal year, compared to \$112.3 billion President Johnson estimated when he submitted the FY '67 budget in January. But the council also notes that Federal revenues will total about \$5 billion higher than the \$111 billion the president had forecast. If so, the budget would be balanced at \$116 billion.

Obviously, if prospects increase for a balanced budget, much of the pressure will be alleviated for a tax increase next year. One argument advanced for a tax increase is that deficit spending by the Federal Government intensifies inflationary pressures. If there is no appreciable deficit, that argument loses its point.

As I have said many times before, I am opposed to a tax increase. And I believe Federal spending can be held in check so that the powerful energies of our booming economy can bring Federal revenues into balance with expenditures without higher taxes being necessary.

President Johnson is about to begin his annual review of appropriations bills approved by the 89th Congress. He said re-

cently, "We are going to withhold as many of these appropriations as we feel we can in the national interest" and that he would soon have further things to say on the subject. It seems obvious that the President means to attempt to achieve the objective his economic advisors and, now, the non-governmental and conservative-oriented Council of State Chambers of Commerce says is possible—a balanced budget in this fiscal year.

The President has said any tax increase will be determined by cuts made in appropriations approved by Congress, by the amount of money the President can keep from being spent from totals approved for spending by Congress. It is within the President's authority to so act. In the appropriation process, Congress sets the limits of government spending but the President through orders to subordinates in the Executive Branch, can hold spending to lower levels. He can, if he chooses order that nothing be spent to fund a program he wishes to eliminate. From time to time, the exercise of this power has brought Presidents into bitter conflict with Congress, whose Members commonly believe that funds voted by them to fund a program should be spent without question by the President. A good case can be made for both sides of the question, but the fact is that the President does have the power to withhold spending of

appropriated funds.

With the possibility that a deficit can be avoided this year—that the United States may attain a balanced budget in this fiscal year—the President may make sharp cuts in some programs. He is further pressed to do this because he would like to avoid having to ask Congress to pass legislation increasing taxes. No Congress likes to raise taxes. It is possible that the 90th Congress might balk at a tax increase request and counter by slashing funds for programs the President thinks are essential. If the President does have to come to Congress to ask for higher taxes, you can be sure a fight will ensue.

Making predictions is a risky business because there is always someone to remind forecasters of their past errors. But I predict that President Johnson will delay asking for any tax increase. He will count on spending and budget cuts and added revenues from the rising economy to meet such added costs as are forced by the war to bring sufficient balance to make a tax increase unnecessary.

In any event, economic pointers and resultant White House decisions are going to make most interesting reading in the coming weeks.

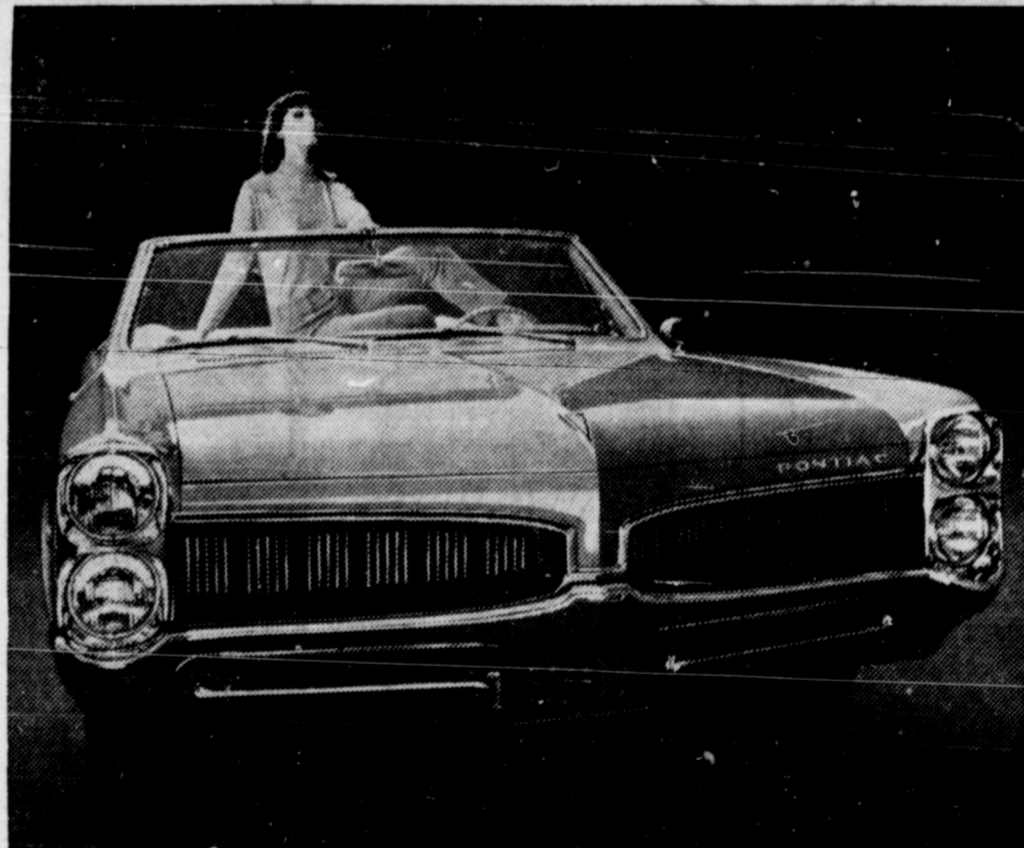

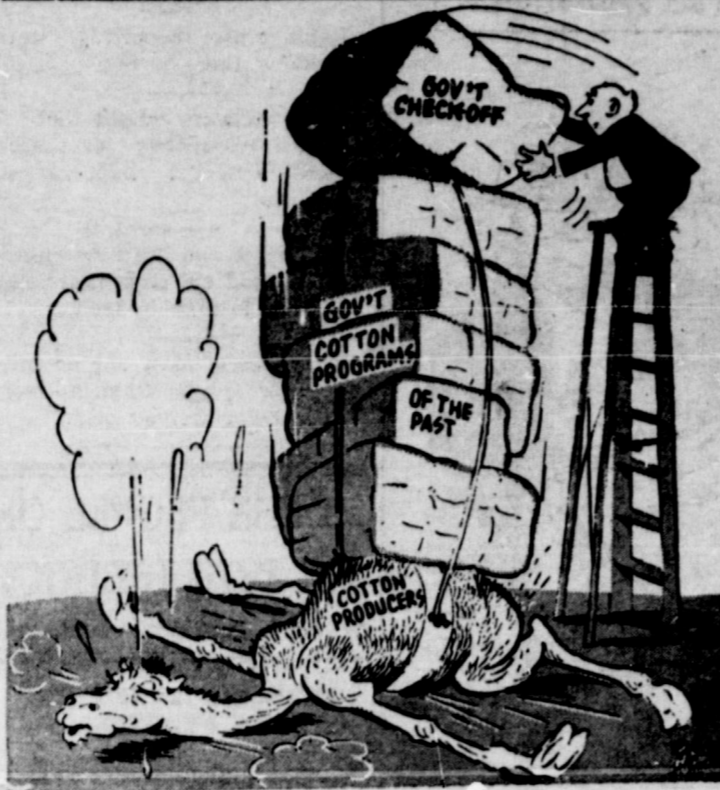

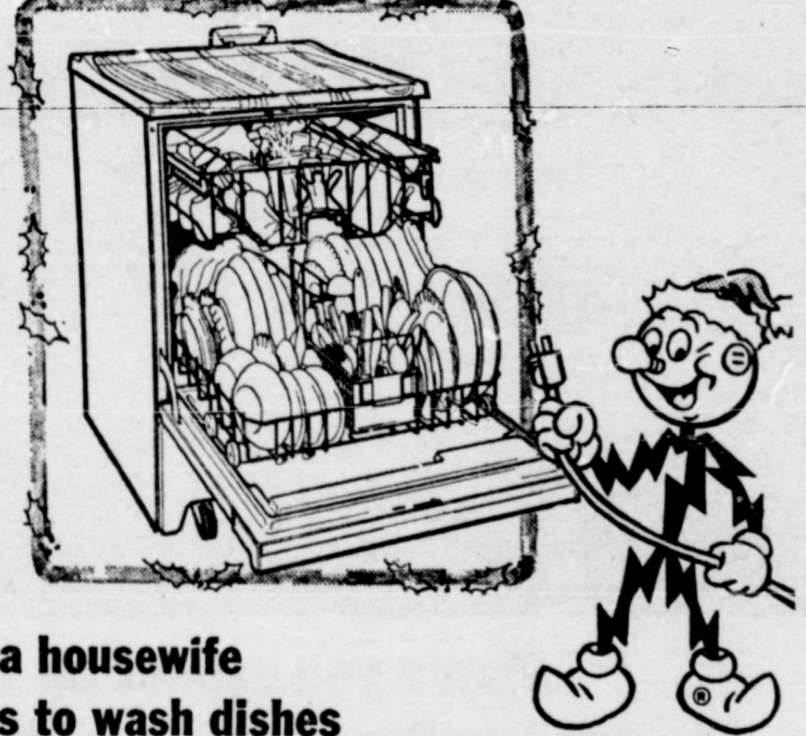

**CONG. POAGE COMMENTS ON COTTON RESEARCH & PROMOTION PROGRAM**

Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, described the need for the Cotton Research and Promotion Program in his speech at the recent convention of Texas Farmers Union in Mineral Wells.

Congressman Poage said that "of all major crops cotton is in

the deepest trouble." He pointed out that the surplus is at an all time high and that synthetics, although higher priced, have moved into the cotton markets. Today, according to the Waco congressman, cotton supplies only a little more than one-half of our textiles because of the inroads of synthetics. "If all textiles were made of cotton, we would have no surplus at all."

While the synthetic industry finances its research and promotion at a level of \$200 million annually, cotton producers are only spending \$4 or \$5 million.

Poage went on to say, "I think it is perfectly clear that unless we, as cotton producers, are willing to make some substantial effort to promote our own product, that we are going to continue to lose more and more markets to synthetic fibers—and I greatly fear that if farmers should show, by rejecting the referendum, that they are unwilling to finance any serious efforts in behalf of their own product, that we may well lose the government help we are getting in connection with our cotton prices."
