Bronchos Share District Honors By Defeating Wheeler Mustangs Friday

by Adele Barnhill Over 2,000 fans, the largest crowd this season, were in Broncho Stadium Friday night to watch the most important single game on the Bronchos schedule. Both teams gave the fans their money's worth, but when the game ended, the Bronchos had defeated the Mustangs 7-6, to throw the District 2-A championship into a three-way tie. In the first quarter of play, Wheeler tried to get on the scoreboard first with a field goal, but the Mustang attempt was wide. Neither team was able to score during the period. However, in the second quarter, Broncho senior Larnce Gardner broke through the Wheeler secondary and ran 53 yards on a left sweep play to cross the goal line and score the initial points of the game. Senior Archie Smith split the uprights for the conversion to give the Bronchos a 7-0 half-time lead. The entire third stanza was a show of outstanding defensive maneuvers by the two teams. During the last quarter, Wheeler finally got in the scoring column when Mustang quarterback David Jamison pushed over the goal line to put the Mustangs one point behind the Bronchos. Instead of kicking for one point and a tie, Wheeler chose to run the conversion for two points, but Broncho Junior Pat Perkins was in there to stop the Mustangs short of the goal. Once again Wheeler tried to move ahead on a field goal. This time Clarendon senior Pete Campbell blocked the ball and the Bronchos stayed out front to the finish. By virtue of their 7-6 victory over Wheeler, Clarendon ended district play in a three-way tie for the championship. Clarendon, McLean and Wheeler each had 3 wins and one loss in district play. The Bronchos had an 8-2 season record. Saturday morning at nine o'clock in McLean, the coaches and administrators from the three championship teams met and flipped a coin to decide which team would represent District 2-A in the play-offs. McLean won the toss and will be representing the other teams in Pampa Friday night against White Deer for bi-district honors. Eventhough the Bronchos are not playing Friday night, they are still the champs in the eyes of Clarendon fans.

REFERENDUM FOR UPLAND COTTON

December 5 through 9 is the announced period for voting in the 1967 cotton referendum. This year you will be voting on two things—marketing quotas and cotton research and promotion order. The referendum will be held by mail. Voting material and instructions will be mailed to all eligible voters on December 2. Ballots must be returned to the ASCS County Office on or before December 9, 1966. 1967 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM Basic changes of the program are as follows: 1. Barley will not be a part of the farm's feed grain base. 2. There will be no diversion payment and no additional diversion except for small farms of 25 acres or less, and larger farms that plant no feed grains and divert at least 25 acres. 3. Price support loan for grain sorghum is increased from \$1.52 to \$1.61 per CWT national average. Price support payment will remain the same. The sign-up period for the feed grain program will be early 1967. Wheat and cotton sign-up will be held concurrently with the feed grain program. CAP PROGRAM The 1967 CAP Program has been announced. Sign-up for this program will probably begin in late November. The rate for grain sorghum has been raised from 34c per bushel to 41c. The rate for cotton remains at 6c per pound. Wheat and barley will be at the non-allotment and tame hay rate. The county average for Donley County has been raised to \$7.00 per acre. Individual farm rates will be based on the average productivity of the farm. 4-H AWARD PRESENTED TO JOHN HERMESMEYER John Hermesmeier, Donley County 4-H Club member, was honored at the District 4-H Gold Star Banquet in Amarillo Saturday night according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. County 4-H Gold Star winners from 22 Panhandle counties were honored at this banquet sponsored by the rural electric cooperatives in the area. The Gold Star award is given each year to a 4-H club member in recognition of outstanding achievement, leadership and contribution to the county 4-H program. Young Hermesmeier has been active in 4-H club work for the past six years. Livestock projects have been his main interest. He has exhibited top placing steers at most of the major livestock shows in Texas. He is a sophomore in Clarendon High School. Mr. and Mrs. Bud Hermesmeier of Clarendon are his parents.

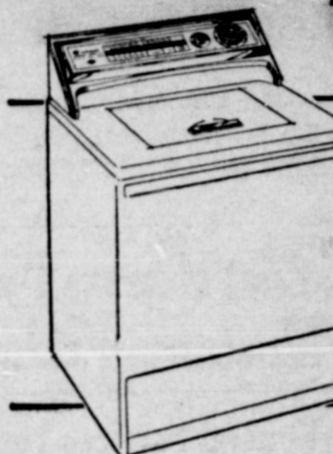

THE DELICATE BALANCE OF FEDERAL POWER

Dear Fellow Texan:

The *Marbury v. Madison* decision of 1803 is probably the most important single U. S. Supreme Court decision in American history. In the decision, Chief Justice John Marshall set forth the so-called "doctrine of judicial review," the power of the Supreme Court to declare acts of the Congress or state legislatures unconstitutional. Chief Justice Marshall summed up the doctrine in one sentence, in words that have had sweeping impact ever since; "Certainly all those who have framed written constitutions contemplate them as forming the fundamental and paramount law of the nation, and consequently, the theory of every such government must be that an act of the legislature, repugnant to the Constitution, is void."

Nowhere does the Constitution

specifically assign to the judiciary the power to decide whether or not legislative acts are invalid. But Marshall reasoned that the Constitution is superior to any statute and that it is the function of the Supreme Court, when confronted with a test, to determine constitutionality. "It is emphatically the province and duty of the judicial department to say what the law is," Marshall wrote.

But the catch is this: The Constitution is open to the interpretation of lawmakers and the courts. Over the years a succession of court decisions has given changing meaning to such words and phrases as "freedom of speech," "due process," and "commerce." Evolving interpretations of "commerce" provide a good example. The commerce clause of the Constitution empowers Congress "to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian tribes." But what constitutes "commerce?" In 1824, the Court decided commerce included navigation. Later, railroad transportation and the telegraph were included. In 1903, commerce also meant "lottery tickets." In 1910, correspondence schools. In 1914, pipelines and oil. In 1926, air

transportation. In the 1930's, the Court ruled that the clause was broad enough to provide a basis for the Fair Labor Standards Act which set minimum wages and maximum hours and outlawed interstate commerce in goods produced by oppressive child labor. In 1964, the clause was interpreted so broadly that "public

accommodations" were included under the scope of Federal jurisdiction in the Civil Rights Act. I have always advocated that as strict as possible an interpretation be placed on the Constitution's provisions. In my view, the commerce clause and other provisions of the Constitution have been stretched by Court interpretation beyond any point envisioned by those who framed it.

Further, while the Supreme Court can rule on the constitutionality of legislative acts — possessing thereby the power to nullify acts of Congress or state legislatures — Congress presently has no similar power in relation to the Supreme Court. I continue to urge that Congress should be empowered to overturn decisions of the Supreme Court if finds to be against the interests of the people, and an amendment I have proposed to the Constitution would permit the House and Senate, by two-thirds majorities, to nullify Supreme Court decisions. Congress does possess the power to override Presidential vetoes; it should have the same power to set aside unwise decisions of the judiciary.

Chief Justice Marshall's decision in *Marbury v. Madison* was, if you will, a "power grab". It marked the first major shift in the balance of power between the three "separate but equal" branches (Executive, Legislative, and Judicial) in our Federal structure. The struggle among the branches will continue, and it is the continuing responsibility to each generation of Americans to see that a proper balance of power is maintained. In my view, the people's branch, the Congress, is due for an inning.

If, however, when I first strike it on the anvil, I think that it will not take temper, I throw it into the scrap heap and sell it for a half penny per pound.

I believe that my God, and Father has been testing me to see if I will take temper. He has put me into the fire and into the water. I have tried to bear it as patiently as I could, and my daily prayer has been... "Lord put me into the fire if You will; put me into the water if You think I need it; do anything You please Dear Lord, only don't throw me into the scrap heap.

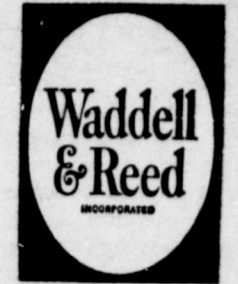

Postmaster's Corner

Along about this time of year we always begin to hear these familiar phrases like "Shop Early and Mail Early"; however, they never seem to impress anyone until about December 20th. Mail service is steadily improving all the time, but it still hasn't quite reached instant delivery. The period for mailing Christmas parcels and greeting cards by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas was October 21 to November 10. It would be very questionable now if you would get delivery by Christmas, if you mail by surface transportation. Let me point out this one thing about parcels going to our armed forces in Viet Nam. Parcels weighing more than five (5) pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be provided air lift service from San Francisco eventhough prepaid at the surface rate. For regular airmail parcels the period is from December 1st to December 10th.

Let me further offer the following mailing tips that will help you do a better job for you:
Use ZIP Codes on all mail. "If there are some ZIP Codes you don't have, come to the Post Office and look them up in our ZIP Code Directory or give us a call. ZIP Codes are more important than ever this year.
Prepare your gift list right away. The earlier you do your shipping, the better chance you have to get exactly what you want while the stores are still full of merchandise. That way, you

can mail earlier too.

Be sure to have enough boxes, tape, string and wrapping paper on hand.

Wrap your packages well. Include sufficient padding. Remember your parcels may be shipped in a mail sack with a set of the encyclopedia riding on top.

Include a card or piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person you are sending the parcel to in case the wrapping should be loose and come off. That way, you can be assured your gift will not wind up in the dead parcel office. Also, insert a list of the package's contents.

Address your gifts and greetings clearly so that postal workers will have no difficulty in reading the destination. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved. Cards that are undeliverable will be returned when you include a return address on the envelope. The Post Office has issued a special 5c Christmas stamp which

will help decorate holiday mail.

If your gifts are valuable, buy postal insurance because that is the only way we can pay you for them if they are damaged or fail to reach their destination. You should also consider air mail for the long haul because you get a lot for the little additional postage you pay.

Some time ago you received a card for you to list addresses you frequently use so that we could give you the correct ZIP Code. We have several of these cards in the office with no return address on them. If your card has not been returned, kindly call the office. Also, we have to have a specific address for all cities that are zoned because each zone has a different ZIP Code.

Mendes-Bones Nuptials Solemnized In Home Ceremony

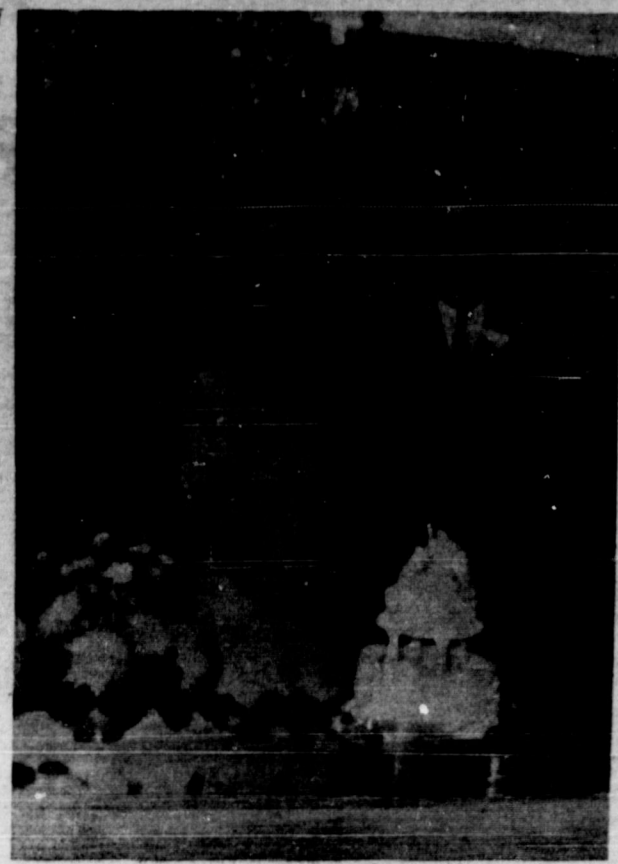

Faster Mail Service To Men In Viet Nam

Postmaster Mike McCully of Clarendon today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 891725 —The Lulski Military Mail Act— which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the Armed Forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster McCully explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster McCully also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given air-lift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other military post offices by surface means is November 10.

USDA REPORTS COTTON HARVEST SLOW

K. E. Voelkel of the USDA Cotton Classing Office, Memphis, Texas reports cotton harvest slow. The freeze damaged late planted cotton. The lateness has been reflected in the 5500 samples classed through November 10 as compared with 16,000 at the same date last year.

Classes this week showed 11% white grades, 81% light spotted, and 8% spotted. There was a 2% reduction in grade this week due to bark. Predominant staple length was 15/16. Mike readings indicated 67% premium range 3.5-4.9. Weaker fiber was reported the past week with 22% testing 80,000 pounds per square inch and above.

Little cotton is being sold. Average prices paid ranged from 17.10 to 18.50. Cottonseed brought the farmers \$65 per ton at most gins points.
