FIRST LOAD SOYBEANS BOUGHT HERE TUESDAY

The first load of Soybeans was bought Tuesday by Clarendon Grain Company from James load was a mixture of the Hill and 1965. If you feel your yield is McAnear who farms at Brice. The and Hinn varieties and had a test weight of 55 pounds per bushel. The moisture content was 8.1 per cent and the sale price was \$2.60 per bushel. McAnear said that the Hill variety was making 35 bushels per acre and the Hinn variety was making around 25 to 30 bushels. The beans were planted on land that is a low cotton prorucer because of a verticillium wilt disease in the soil. Soybeans are not affected by the disease. Soybeans are a potential cash

crop for Donley County Farmers as they have an income potential that compares favorably with irrigated milo. The farmer does not have to have an allotment to plant soybeans.







CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTING SERVICE CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF CONTINUOUS REPORTS

Cary D. Palmer, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin, reads a proclamation from Governor John Connally, designating 1866 as Crop Reporting Centennial Year in Texas. Accurate and timely statistics of agriculture help Texas farmers and agri-businessmen make intelligent production and marketing decisions.

Over a century ago, farmers began to realize that they were at a disadvantage when bargaining because they knew little about crop and livestock supplies outside their area. They asked the government for help and a system of crop reporting was begun to fill this need. This year marks the 100th anniversary of continuous reporting of acreage, yield and production for the United States.

Cary Palmer says that the crop reporting system of collecting agricultural statistics relies heavily on some 40,000 farmers and agri-businessmen. Their voluntary reports month after month and year after year have an important role in providing Texas agricultural statistics and make the American farmer the best informed of any in the world.

One hundred years of voluntary reports is an achievement from which all America has benefitted.

Donley County Terraces Take On New Look

The R. O. Ranch has just finshed building 44,000 feet or about 3 miles of parallel terraces on their ranch. There are several others who have built parallel terraces including Hall Hardin. Emmett Brown and J. C. Shields according to Dorman D. Bush of the Soil Conservation Service in Clarendon. Nearly half the terraces built in Texas last year were this new kind.

Cooperators with local conservation districts built more than 5,000 miles of all kinds of cropland terraces last year, 2,265 miles were parallel as compared to 984 in 1965, 440 in 1964. "This isn't just another Texas brag," says H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple, Texas. "It just shows how popular these modern terraces are becoming. The amount has doubled two years in a row.
