And the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Council of Safety Supervisors are working with members of the trucking industry to promote safe driving practices and alertness during the holiday period.



AIDS IN CATTLE BREEDING

Breeding heifers should not be allowed to get too fat, cautions County Agent Ronald Gooch. This will help avoid calving difficulties.

Excess weight has a harmful effect on fertility and calf production. Research shows heifers unanimously on a proposed new that are excessively fat have a high percentage of dead calves. They also have more calving difficulties.

It is sometimes a good idea to breed heifers to a smaller type bull rather than one that is extremely large for his age. This means smaller calves can be dropped without difficulty.

After a heifer has dropped her first calf, the size or breed of bull does not seem to be an important cause of calving diffi-


