BULLDOG BASKETBALL SEASON TICKETS ON SALE

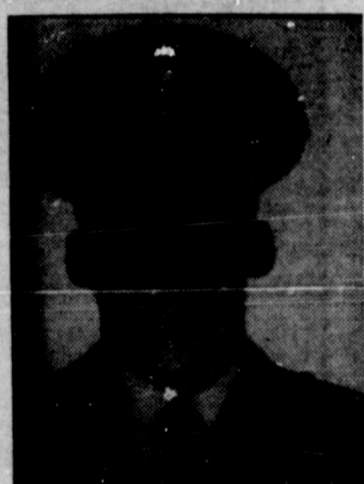

COTTON ALLOTMENT TRANSFERS

The Upland Cotton Program for 1967 provides that cotton allotments may be sold or leased for transfer to another farm within the county or may be transferred by a farm owner to another farm owned by him in another county. Donley County producers disapproved the transfer of cotton by sale or lease outside the county. Farmers in Donley County can transfer cotton acreage under the following conditions:

1. Transfer by sale or lease from one farm to another within Donley County.

2. Transfer by sale or lease from farms in other counties to farms in Donley County.

3. Transfer by a farm owner to another farm owned or controlled by him within the State.

If you are interested in buying, selling or leasing a cotton allotment and need more information, stop by this office and we will try to help you.

DIVERTED ACRES MAY NOW BE GRAZED

Farmers who diverted acreage under the 1966 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs now may graze these acreages. The starting date for such grazing was November 1, marking the end of the 6 month period during which the no-grazing provision was in effect under the diversion programs.

The use of these acreages applies only to grazing. Harvesting in any manner will be a program violation.

This release is for diverted acres only. Soil bank land cannot be grazed or harvested.

Hunting Season Opens Saturday On Deer, Quail And Turkey

Hunters over the area will be polishing up their guns and getting their hunting gear in readiness for the earliest hunting season in recent years with Deer, Turkey and Quail as targets Saturday, November 12th.

The season on deer is November 12 thru November 19; bag limit—1 deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only. The season on Turkey is the same.

The Quail season, most popular of all, opens Saturday, November 12 also and continues through January 31 in all Panhandle counties for the exception of Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Hall and Motley counties where the season will be Dec. 1 thru January 31. Bag and possession limit, 1 and 36.

Hunters are especially reminded to have definite permission to hunt on any property before going out as the Game Department is placing more emphasis on game law enforcement over the entire area this year. It is much easier and cheaper to be right than wrong and please remember to observe all safety rules as your loved ones would much rather you return home safe and sound rather than have a bag of wild birds or other game.

RECEIVES FARM BUREAU HONOR RECENTLY

An Awards Day Program on the final day of the Texas Farmers Union convention was held last week at Mineral Wells honoring outstanding members over the state. Among those receiving special recognition was W. H. Cooke III of Quail. This award was made on the basis of membership achievement.

The Clarendon Bronchos face the Wheeler Mustangs Friday night at 7:30 in Broncho Stadium and this game could hold a bearing on the district championship. This game is the last on the regular season schedule for both teams.

If Wheeler wins, the Mustangs will be the undisputed champions of District 2-A, however, if Clarendon comes out on top, the district championship will be shared by Clarendon, McLean and Wheeler.

Both teams boast 7-2 season records, but Wheeler is 3-0 in conference play, while Clarendon is 2-1. Comparing scores of mutual opponents seems to indicate that the two teams will be well matched. One of Wheeler's losses was to Wellington 13-12, and the Bronchos defeated Wellington 13-12. Wheeler beat McLean 16-14 and McLean beat Clarendon 6-0.

According to Bronc coach Jeff Walker Wheeler's strength is their speed. He stated that they have returned several kick-offs and punts for touchdowns. "Goode, a Mustang back, is one of the better backs we will have faced this year," he said. "In fact," continued Walker, "Wheeler fields a good, strong, well-balanced team. Although not large, they have good uniform size and ability to match," he said.

"Physically, the Bronchos are as strong as we've ever been," stated Walker. "We've had good work-outs this week and we believe our boys are ready."

"In the Silvertown game, our offense looked good, but there were times when we were not completely satisfied with our defense," the coach said. "We hope to have this problem eliminated by Friday night."

"The Bronchos have had a good year," stated Walker. "They've worked hard, and we believe the boys deserve to win Friday night," he concluded.

Probable starters for the Broncos offense Friday night will be David Easterling, left end; Everett Monroe, left tackle; Larry Green, left guard; Barry Tyler, center; Pete Campbell, right guard; Gale Gray, right tackle; Larry Kidd, right end. In the backfield will be Larnce Gardner at wingback; Archie Smith at fullback; Mac McClellan at tailback; and Donnie Mooring, QB.

Probable Broncho defensive starters will be linemen Pat Perkins, Larry Green, Gale Gray, and Barry Tyler; linebackers Everett Monroe, Archie Smith, and Pete Campbell; corner backs, Steve Land and Larnce Gardner and halfbacks Mac McClellan and Monte Land.

Tower And Price Win; Lead In County

A majority of Donley County voters voted Republican as far as the two main contested political races were concerned with John Tower and Bob Price receiving a majority of votes which assisted in the election of both.

Here in Donley County, Tower received an unofficial total of 598 votes to Carr's 517 and Bob Price polled a total of 628 votes to Miller's 470.

Over the state, Tower had built up a substantial lead which assured his re-election as a Republican Senator and in the Congressional race, Miller conceded to Bob Price late Tuesday night as Price built up a substantial unofficial lead over the entire district.

All other state officials in the Democratic column won their races with very little opposition. On the local level, county voters approved Amendments 1, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15 and 16.

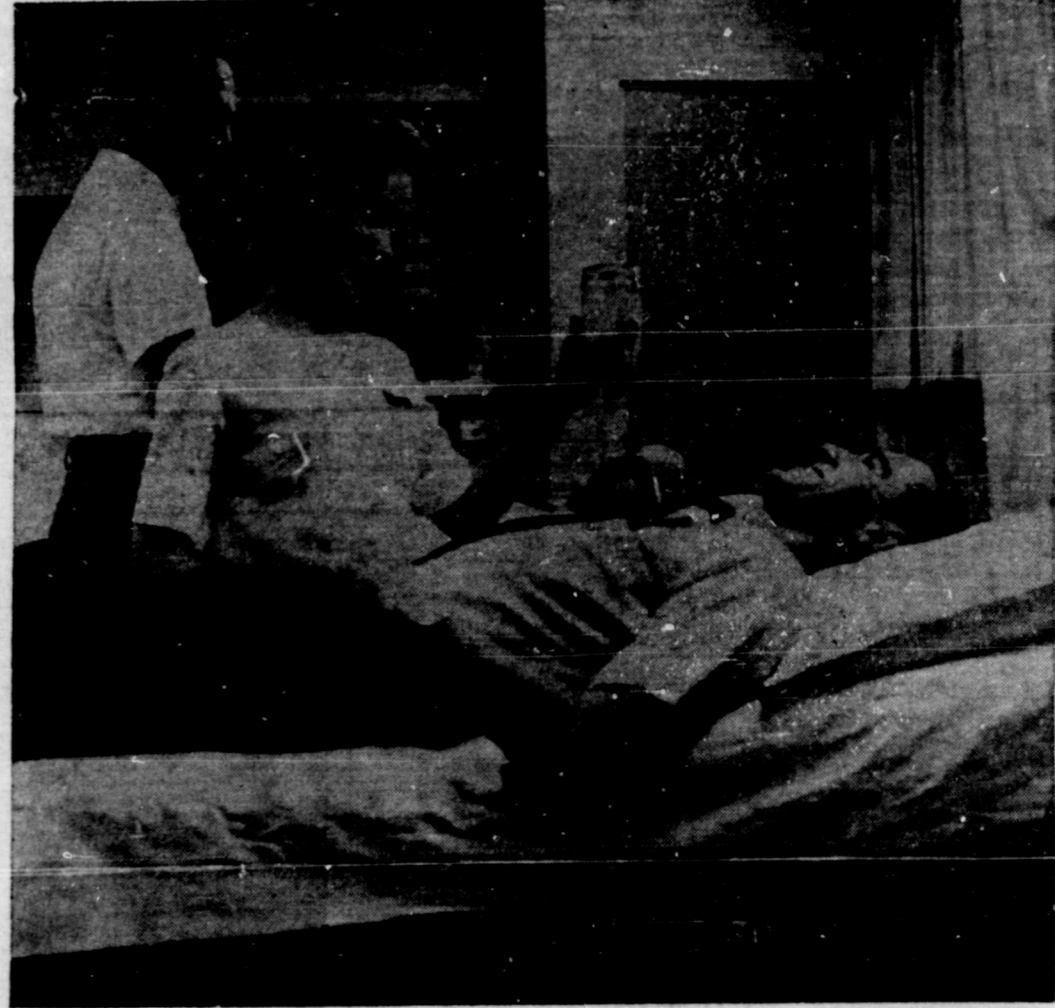

THE RESPONSIBILITY OF CONGRESS: REPRESENTATION

Dear Fellow Texan: The collective judgement of the Congress is more reflective of the national mood than any evaluation made by pundit, pollster or even President. The 435 Members of the House of Representatives and 100 Senators speak for the people in deciding issues. Whether or not we as individuals do so because we believe in the rule of law, that under the Constitution the people themselves are the true leaders of government, that the people's will is best expressed through a responsive, representative Congress.

Congress is frequently criticized because, in the view of some, it is too slow to act. There is nothing new about this kind of criticism; it has been heard throughout our history, through the administration of both political parties. Critics seem to concentrate especially on the time Congress takes to dispose of legislative recommendations sent to Capitol Hill by the President, who, under the Constitution, is empowered to recommend to the Congress "such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient." From time to time resolutions have been introduced in Congress to set deadlines for decisions on Presidential recommendations. In my view, it is well that all such proposals have been pigeon-holed. To assent to Presidential priorities in legislating would be to further intrude upon the independence and prerogatives of the legislative branch—the people's branch—and to threaten uncontrolled domination of Congress.

When Congress is slow to act on legislation it is usually because there is no clear view as to how the people of the nation feel about the proposal. When opinion is divided, Congress does not act swiftly. When the people are obviously united behind a proposal, action by Congress quickly follows.

As we have seen in recent years and again in this Second Session of the 89th Congress, the extent and very serious nature of legislation before Congress is such as to require lengthy sessions. In the early days of the Republic, Congress could dispose of such matters as were placed before it in the winter and spring and then adjourn. But as the country has grown and the facets of problems facing it have become more complex—and as governmental power has shifted from the State legislatures to the national Congress—the responsibilities facing the House and Senate have be-

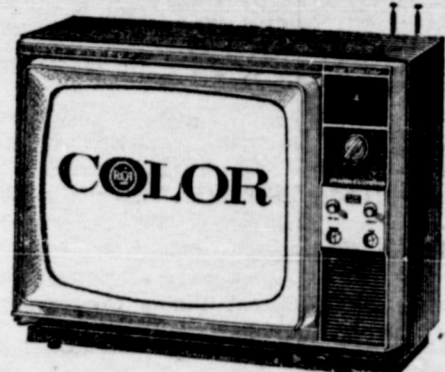
come enormous. A lengthy study of congressional procedures has been made by a joint House-Senate committee and legislative recommendations may be forthcoming. However, I very much doubt that any substantial steps can be taken to "streamline" the consideration of bills. Further, I believe it would not necessarily be in the country's interest to promote speedy decision making. Proposed laws must be examined carefully, with full deliberation as to their consequences. Congress should be judged by the wisdom of its actions, not by a stopwatch.

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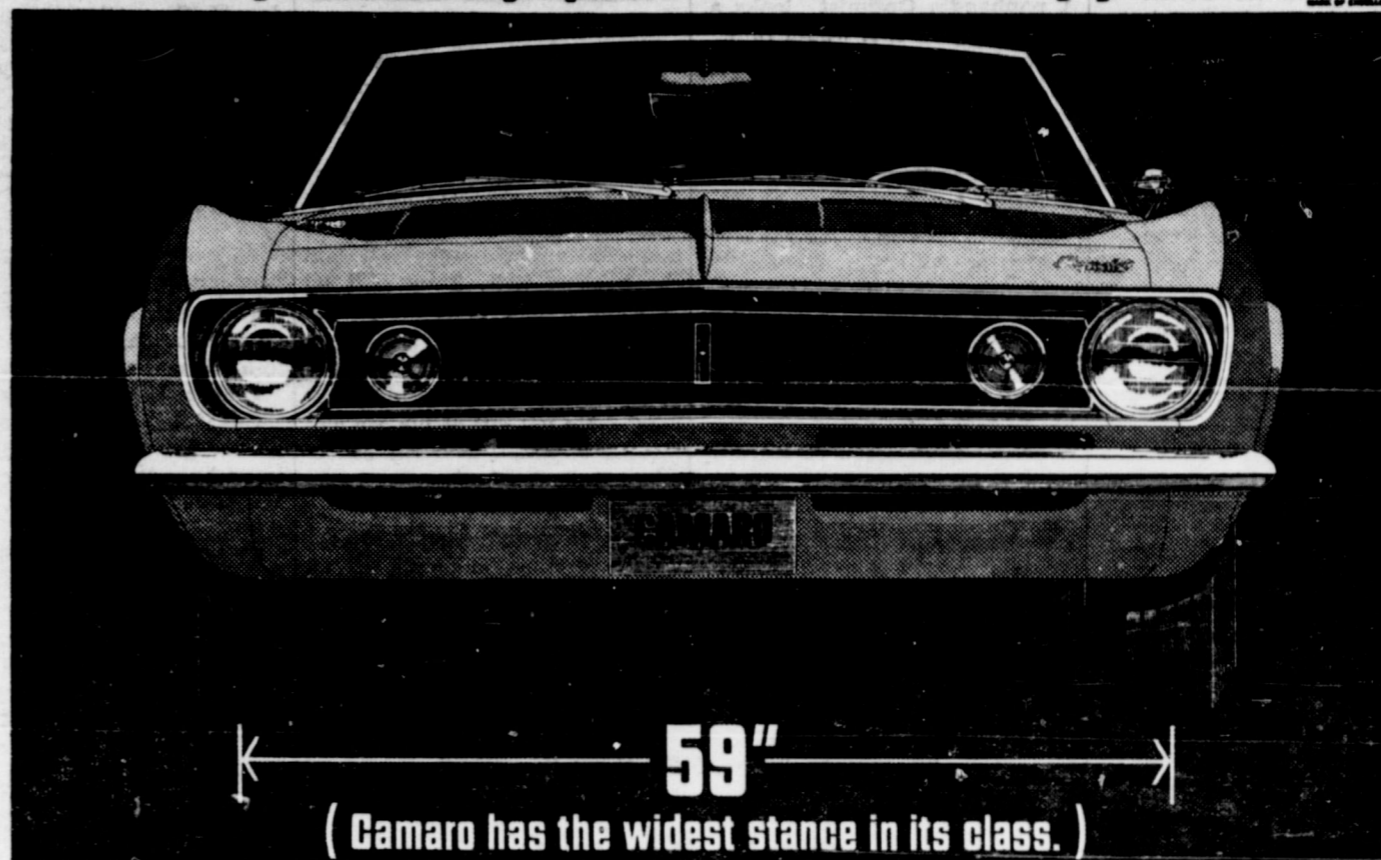

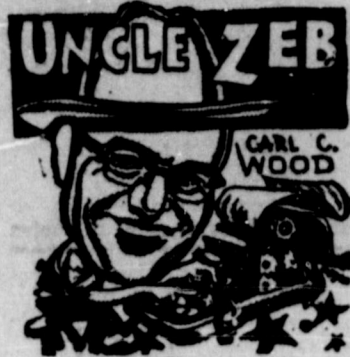

SEEP PONDS

Mr. Robert H. Couch, Mr. Hill, Mr. W. H. Cooke III, Mr. Castner, Mrs. Louella S. Hall, Thomas E. Trostle, Col. Shields, James G. Gould, E. Eanes, and Rhode and Co. have built seep ponds on places recently.

These ponds are constructed to encourage better distribution grazing on Rangeland. Seep ponds are constructed by excavating a pit where the underground water is sufficient and close enough to the surface of the ground to maintain an adequate supply of water in the pond. The minimum depth of these ponds should be at least six feet below the static water level. Surface runoff must be prevented from entering pond.

Others who have built seep ponds recently are Doyle Littlefield, Dave Browder, Ernest E. Sawyer, Robert Jones, and J. D. Riley.

For recommendations as to engineering design, consult your local SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE. Financial assistance also available at the ASCS office in Clarendon, and from the Soil Conservation Service through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

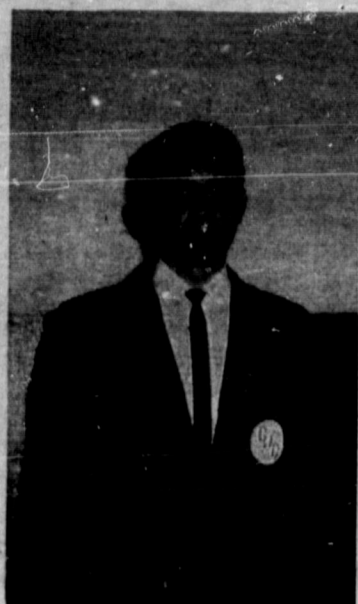

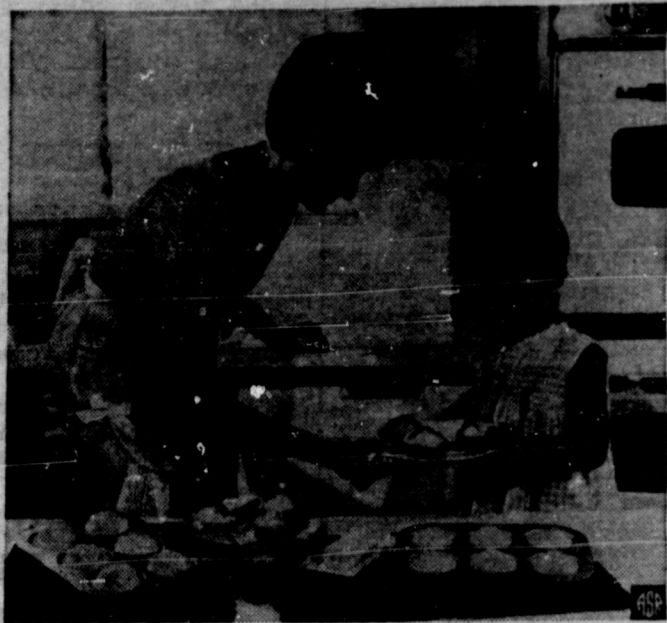

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights
by Vern Sanford

Gov. John Connally has given three of Texas' leading universities a hurry-up research assignment—a detailed analysis of food costs in the state and of the causes of recent price increases.

Connally set December 1 as target date for reports by the University of Texas, Texas A & M University and Texas Tech College. He gave the assignment to the heads of the three schools and left it up to them how to conduct the study.

"I share the concern of Texans with the dangers of inflation," Connally said in announcing the study. "And I am particularly disturbed about mounting food prices, and their effects on the homemakers of our state."

Connally said, "While rash judgments and emotionally based opinions as to blame are inevitable, they contribute little toward determining cause, or a sensible course of action for improvement of the situation."

Detailing his request, the governor asked for a determination of what part of the consumer's food dollar goes to the producer or grower, to the retailer, and how much goes for things such as transportation, advertising, sales incentives, added services and whatever other costs are involved.

He asked for that determination both on long and short-term bases, expressed both in absolute dollars and in percentages.

He also suggested that the food cost study be related to other consumer costs.

GAS TRANSMISSION—Texas big gas pipeline operators disagree with their smaller colleagues over whether the state should assume regulation of the pipelines so the Federal Power commission will not.

Major interstate gas transmission companies contend that they are doing well under the present regulations of the USA Standards Institute under sponsorship of the American Society of Mechanical

Engineers. But the companies which transmit gas on a part-time basis want state regulation.

Both sides are to file written statements with the Texas Railroad Commission by November 25. Commission will then consider all arguments and reach a decision.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court rejected City of San Antonio's appeal for supplemental water supply from Canyon Dam reservoir on the Guadalupe River. Decision backed a 1958 award by the predecessors to the Texas Water Rights Commission (and affirmed lower court decisions) providing 50,000-acre-feet of water a year to Guadalupe Blanco River Authority for municipal use.

Cities of New Braunfels, Seguin, Gonzales, Cuero and Victoria, along with Calhoun and Refugio Counties, joined GBRA in fighting the San Antonio application during the prolonged, historic water fight.

High Court reversed the lower courts and ordered a retrial of the Lubbock land condemnation case where the jury awarded \$48,000 to owners without holding a hearing.

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals set November 9 for hearing on whether it should uphold, rather than reverse, the death penalty for Jack Ruby in the slaying of presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald. On October 5 the court held that Ruby should get a new trial.

ROAD REVENUE HIGH — Texas Highway Department has been informed that Texas is expected to reap \$456,000,000 in State highway-user tax revenues this year.

This would make Texas third among the 50 states in road revenue. California is expected to take in \$941,000,000 in 1966. New York's income will hit \$497,000,000.

Road-user taxes include state fuel and vehicle registration tax-

es, but not toll fees or parking-meter money.

BOLLWORM DEADLINE EXTENDED — Agriculture Commissioner John White extended until October 30 the cotton harvest and plow-up deadline for 17 Zone 4 counties under the pink bollworm control law.

Counties affected are Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fayette, Fort Bend, Galveston, Gonzales, Harris, Jefferson, Lavaca, Liberty, Matagorda, Orange, Waller, Washington and Wharton.

INDUSTRIAL \$\$\$ — Texas is one of four states still without some type of statewide industrial financing.

Texas Industrial Commission is pushing hard for the Legislature to submit a Constitutional amendment to allow municipalities to issue revenue bonds to build facilities and lure industry. Bonds would be retired by rent from the industry.

Commission decided to recommend the program largely because of the tight money market.

HIGHWAY RECORDS SET — October contract lettings will set two highway department records.

Bids totaling some \$50,000,000 will be the largest in the department's history. And the \$12,000,000 Dallas Interstate Highway 635 project will be the largest single project, moneywise, let by the department.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Connally announced appointment of Arthur R. Marroquin of Austin as chief of the migrant division of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity. He replaces Al Ramirez of Edinburg.

J. Curtiss Brown of Houston has been named to the Board of Directors of the Texas State Bar. He will complete the unexpired term of U. S. District Judge John V. Singleton Jr. of Houston, who resigned to accept appointment to the federal bench.

SHORT SNORTS

At a hearing on loan problems a consumer finance industry spokesman suggested higher legal ceiling on "small loans" (now \$1,500 in Texas).

Arroyo Colorado in Cameron County is one of 82 areas selected for possible inclusion in National Wilderness System.
