Family Code. GOOD BULL MAY BE WORTH MORE INCOME A beef herd bull that increases the weaning weight of your calves by 15 pounds may be worth much more in increased income than you realize. Over a 7-year period, with calves selling at 24 cents per pound, he could up income by \$445. With calves selling at 21 cents, a select sire could add \$389 to the beef income, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. Let's assume that 20 offspring from the selected sire are sold each year and that five daughters are kept for replacements each of the three years the bull is used. Each of the 15 daughters produce five offspring before they are in turn replaced. The average weaning weight of the daughter's offspring, beginning when they are three years of age and producing for five more years, should average about 12 3/4 pounds. Add to this the increased weight of the calves sold and you come up with the \$389 or \$445 increase for the 7-year period, explains the county agent. 





Unfortunately, the export market for cotton-another crop in which Panhandle farmers have a vital interest-continued to decline. Cotton exports totaled 3,065,000 bales, with a value of \$386 million. The volume was one-third less than in the previous fiscal year and the lowest total since the fiscal year of 1955-56. According to the Agriculture Department, the decline. reflects primarily a reduction of foreign Free World stocks in anticipation of lower world prices next season. Man-made fibers continue to give cotton severe competition in developed countries. Japan, again, was the largest dollar buyer of U.S. cotton, but the total declined to \$92 million from \$123 million a year earlier

It is obvious that the export market is of major importance to U. S. farmers, who now supply
