Funeral Services Held For George L. Green

Funeral services for George Leander Green, age 79, City Fire Marshall and a retired Railway Express Agent, were held at 3 p.m. Friday, December 2, at the First Presbyterian Church with Rev. Baldwin Stribling, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Ferris, Texas at 3 p.m. Saturday with Murphy Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Green died Thursday afternoon, December 1, at Adair Hospital following a lengthy illness. He was born December 6, 1886 at Ferris, Texas and was married to Miss Maggie L. Ewing December 19, 1907. The family came to Donley County in 1919 and he served as local Railway Express Agent for 32 years here before his retirement in 1951 after 40 years of service. Mr. Green was appointed Clarendon City Fire Marshall in 1953 and

served in that capacity until his death. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife of the home; two daughters, Mrs. Fred N. Bentley of Amarillo, Miss Helen Green of Dallas; one son, Robert L. Green of Temple; seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren. One son, William Green, preceded him in death in August of 1964. Pallbearers were Bill Ray, Lee Bell, Otto Beach, Fred Bourland, Clyde I. Price, Jr., and Glenn Churchman.

Solve the gift problem—give The Leader

Another step forward in the conservation of water for the plains area took place this past week end when the authority started impounding water in the Greenbelt Reservoir on December 4, 1966.

A temporary dam was constructed above the original dam to hold the water back so the closure around the "Morning Glory" spillway could be filled. This closure is being made on a seven day schedule.

Original completion of the project was set for April, 1968 and according to R. C. Alexander, resident engineer with Freese, Nichols and Endress, Consulting Engineers of Ft. Worth, the anticipated date now is June 15, 1967.

The dam as of Dec. 1, 1966, is 83 percent complete, the filter plant is 35 percent complete and the 110 miles of supply line is 90 percent complete, Mr. Alexander stated.

When completed, the dam will be 20 feet wide at the top and 700 feet wide at the widest point of the bottom. It will be 6,000 feet long and will be 110 feet high from the bottom of the river to the top of the dam. Capacity of the dam will be 60,000 acre feet and the reservoir will be supplied from a 423 mile drainage area.

The filter plant was started several months later than the dam and will have a capacity of 6 million gallons treated water daily with facilities for enlarging with very small cost.

Any of you avid fishermen should contact James L. Kuhn, general manager of the project for that nice cabin site and good fishing hole, Mr. Alexander concluded.

The water now being backed up is being supplied from springs along Salt Fork of Red River, Kelly and Carrol Creeks. There is already enough water to support a large number of fish.

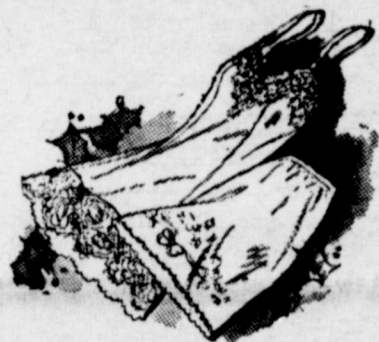

EDITORIAL

Even if you get a good night's sleep every night and wake up refreshed each morning, keep in mind that you've done a lot of exercise, asleep though you were.

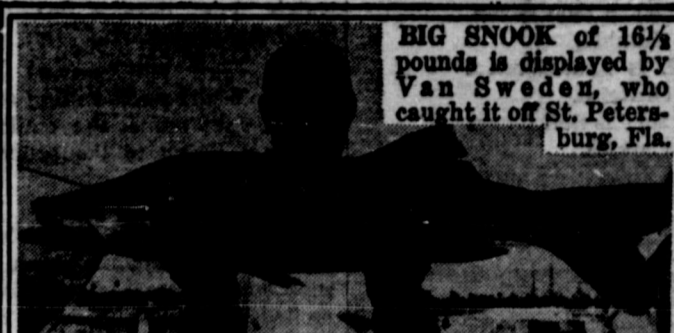

DECEMBER 11 IS SAFETY SUNDAY

The Governor also called attention to the fact that 3,029 persons were killed and 186,062 injured on Texas streets and highways in 1965, "despite an intensive and continuing campaign by both official State agencies and citizen-support groups."

"Safety Sunday" is sponsored each year by the Texas Safety Association. S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President, said purpose of the observance is to focus public attention on the moral obligations and responsibilities of vehicle drivers to protect their own lives and the lives of others. It is observed each year during one Sunday in December to give further emphasis to the need for accident prevention during the Christmas-New Year's holiday season.

In his proclamation, Governor Connally said: "It is essential that every Texas driver realize that safety for himself, his loved ones and his friends, as well as other drivers and passengers is a matter of moral responsibility, and that useless infliction of human injury is an abuse of God's most precious gift—life itself."

He urged all citizens to join in a united effort to awaken the conscience of every driver and further urged the pastors of all churches to remind their members of the personal and moral responsibility "to drive carefully."

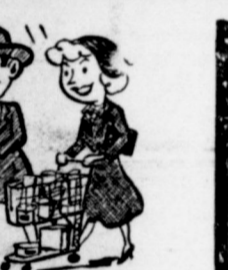

The Donley County State Bank presented a premium check for each Grand Champion Bull as he came into the sale ring. The overall average of the 73 bulls was \$370 each.

H. A. Green, president of the association said that every one was well pleased with the sale and all officers and directors want to thank everyone for their wonderful cooperation. The Chamber of Commerce meal tickets promoted a feeling of good will among the prospective bull buyers and all thought Clarendon gave them a warm welcome.

Ranchers attending the sale felt that the quality of the bulls offered in the sale was exceptionally good and would fit into any beef cattle improvement program. The ninth annual sale of the association will be held November 30th, 1967.

COTTON REFERENDUM

The Cotton Marketing Quota is now in progress. A yes vote by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting will mean a cotton program next year which includes allotments and quotas, marketing penalties on excess cotton, diversion payments, price-support loans and payments. A no vote by more than a third of those voting would mean price support loans at 50 percent of parity to growers who keep within their farm allotments and no cotton program. The choice will be made by those who vote.

If you're a cotton farmer, you should have received a ballot from the ASCS county office along with other information explaining the vote. This year a second referendum is being held at the same time to decide whether farmers want to finance a new research and promotion program for cotton.

Be sure to mark both ballots, and mail them to this office—return them in person—not later than December 9.

CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

At the end of last week, fifty farmers had been signed up for participation in the long-range cropland adjustment program. However, it is not anticipated that all these will enter into the final agreement. Last year, only 27 farms participated in the program.

Cottonseed prices continued to range from \$63 to \$67 per ton at gin points.
