A temporary dam was constructed above the original dam closure around the "Morning Glory" spillway could be filled. This closure is being made on a

seven day schedule. Original completion of the project was set for April, 1968 and according to R. C. Alexander. resident engineer with Freese. Engineers of Ft. Worth, the anticipated date now is June 15.

The dam as of Dec. 1, 1966, is 83 percent complete, the filter plant is 35 per cent complete and the 110 miles of supply line is 90 per cent complete, Mr. Alexander stated

SOMETHING TO WATCH FOR

A noninfectious disease which attacks the cerebral cortex of the brain of affected areas has been tabbed by veterinarians as "polio-

encephalomalacia." So far, it has not been reported in Texas but has been described n Colorado , Wyoming, South Dakota and Michigan, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, Texas A&M University Extension veterinarian. He adds that a severe type and a mild type of the disease have been found.

The severe type is usually seen in feedlot cattle. In early stages there is marked muscular tremors and twitching of ears, eyelids and facial muscles. Vision is impaired.

The milder type is observed in pastured cattle in the summer. Affected animals separtte from the herd, push against solid objects and become blind. 
