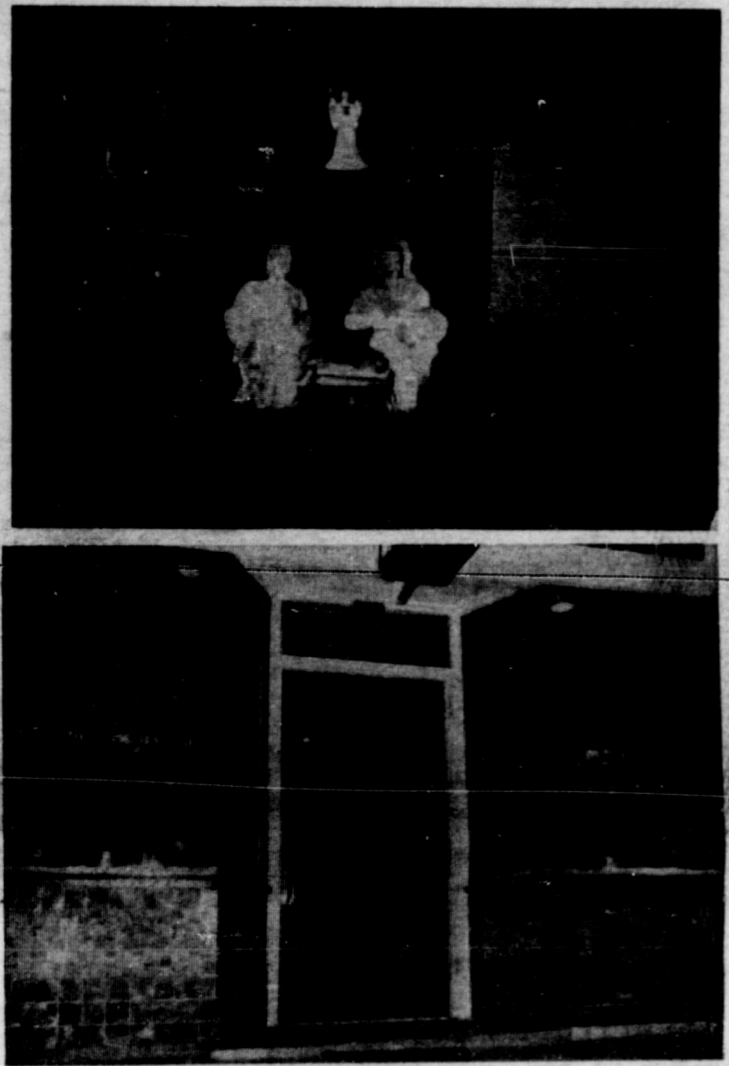

City Financial Statement Published This Week

A financial statement of the City of Clarendon appears in this issue of the Leader. The statement shows a combined balance sheet of all funds as of September 30, 1966 which is the close of the fiscal year.

The statement also shows the combined receipts and disbursements of all funds for the period of April 1, 1965 to September 30, 1965 and Oct. 1, 1965 to Sept. 30, 1966. The fiscal year was changed from March 31, to September 30th last year and this brought about a period from April to October which had to be included in the audit this year.

The total receipts from April 1, 1965 to Sept. 30, 1965 was \$73,205.57 and the disbursements for the same period of time was \$79,441.37. This shows a deficit of \$6,235.80 for that period of time. The total receipts for Oct. 1, 1965 to Sept. 30, 1966 was \$184,506.34 and the disbursements for the same period of time was \$202,533.66. This shows a deficit of \$18,027.32.

City Secretary Walter B. Knorrp stated that the City was now operating under a definite budget and if followed, the deficit column should improve considerably.

Inspection For Scabies In Cattle To Start Soon In Donley County

Personnel with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be in Donley County very soon to inspect all cattle for Psoroptic cattle scabies, according to Ronald Gooch, County Agent. At the present time some eight Texas counties are under a federal quarantine for the parasitic disease. The main purpose of the program is to find if scabies does exist in the area and if it does, to eradicate it, says Dr. G. D. Lindsey, state veterinarian at Levelland, who will be in charge of the inspections.

Inspections are now being completed in Collingworth and Armstrong Counties and they should start in Donley County soon, Gooch said.

CITY POLICE DEPT. REPORT FOR 1966

According to information compiled by Police Chief Gary Gerdes, the Police Department report for 1966 is as follows:

67 accidents were worked within the city limits. These accidents amounted to a total damage of \$27,290 and this figure does not include personal injuries resulting in hospital expense.

There were 3 burglaries and 2 attempted burglaries worked. I was cleared by arrest. The police dept. recovered 5 stolen autos and answered 25 prowler calls with an unlimited amount of calls to pick up dogs and cats.

237 cases were filed in City court for drunks, speeding, disturbing the peace, etc. A total of \$2,043 in fines was collected.

1966 Building Permits Total Only \$66,700

Building permits for 1966 in Clarendon totaled \$66,700 according to information released Wednesday by the City of Clarendon. This is \$16,099 under the permits issued last year and \$108,000 under the 1964 figure.

The permits included two new homes for \$37,500, remodeling \$5,450, and commercial at \$23,750. If money loosens up this coming year, the permit total should rise again with the completion of the Greenbelt Dam not far away.

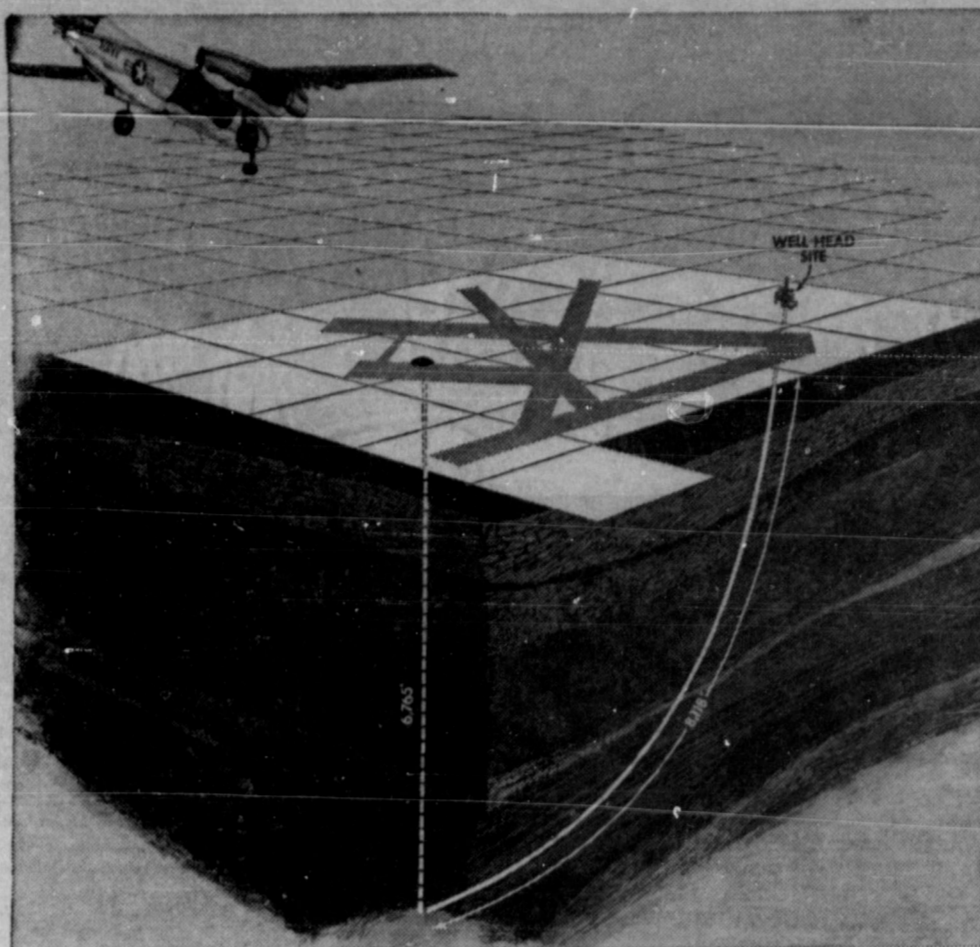

OIL UNDER THE RUNWAYS—An oil-bearing formation below the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station presented an unusual drilling problem for Humble Oil & Refining Company. Wells had to be completed without interfering with any flights or other base operations. Humble, which obtained federal leases to drill for the oil, completed approximately 30 wells by directional drilling. This illustration shows how a typical well was angled away from the well head site to a completion point three-fourths of a mile away. The black dot on one of the runways indicates where the well would have been drilled in the normal vertical fashion if the surface had not been restricted.

It has been said that 10 per cent of the fishermen catch 90 per cent of the fish. Have you ever wondered why so few are in the select circle of successful anglers?

Of course there are many reasons. The successful fisherman is studious. He learns all he can about the sport. He is tenacious. He goes fishing regularly. He is curious and observant. And he's also versatile. He is not married to one idea or system. He's always trying something new.

Recently the Austin-Statesman staged a free fishing clinic in the Capital City. This clinic featured expert fishermen who spoke on various phases of the sport. Everything was covered from catching bass to catching crappies, catfish and whites. Also, many of the salt-water species. Every panelist, regardless of the kind of fish he was discussing, stressed the importance of experimentation for successful fishing.

For example, if a man fishes assiduously for a couple of hours and doesn't catch anything, chances are he is doing something wrong. So the panelists suggested he do something different.

They reason that since the present system is not producing—then anything else that he tried could not be worse. It was their contention that if you keep moving about fishing different spots, and changing your techniques, you just might stumble onto the secret that will put fish on your stringer at this particular time.

It still amazes me how many casual fishermen go onto a lake pick out a likely looking area, stop there and fish for a couple of hours, then head in dejectedly and proclaim that the fish are not biting. Many of these anglers are amazed when other people bring in fish. They can't understand why they too did not succeed.

In deer hunting, for example, it is recognized that deer are found in some places but not others at different times of the day. During the heat of the day you'd look for deer in brushy, cool areas, not out on open exposed prairies.

Just as deer are not found in every place in a pasture, fish are not spread over an entire lake. There are just a few places where the fish are concentrated. The angler who discovers such a spot and finds the fish cooperating will catch fish. It is as simple as this. Thus the wise fisherman moves about. He tries one area for a

spell and if there is no action, he moves on. On the other hand, if he is drifting a shoreline and picks up a bass in one spot, he should reverse himself and hit that place again. Very likely there are many fish in this one limited locale.

This is a good practice to follow when fishing for crappie, bass, bream, catfish or white bass. Where you catch one of them you'll usually take several.

Maybe you are plugging for bass and are trying a topwater lure. Nothing is tempted by your offerings. Then try a shallow-running bait. If this doesn't produce, try a deep-running plug or plastic worm which operates near the bottom. Also try different colors!

If the shoreline shallows are not producing, move into deeper waters. Fish the sloughs and coves. Then try the points sticking out into the lake. Work your bait slow, then medium-speed, then fast. Maybe a change in motion might prompt fish into biting.

Be thinking all the time. Be observant. If you catch one fish, remember what you were doing at the time. Keep trying this technique. Probably it will produce again.

But if not, don't stick with it endlessly just because it paid off once. Don't be afraid to change, to try new ideas, different techniques.

Fish change their habits all the time. The smart fisherman changes his to keep pace with them.

Major National Organizations Spur March of Dimes Prenatal Care Drive

When a congressional committee asked U.S. Surgeon General William H. Stewart in 1965 why the infant mortality rate in the United States is higher than in many other countries, he replied, "We need to do a better job in prenatal care and the care of premature infants."

About the same time, The National Foundation—March of Dimes, which has been fighting birth defects since the conquest of polio, was launching pilot efforts in an ambitious program to encourage every pregnant woman to seek prenatal care.

In just two years, with the help of the medical profession, public health agencies, and major religious and service groups, March of Dimes "PNC" (PreNatal Care) programs have mushroomed across the nation.

Prenatal care can lessen the risks of many birth defects, premature births and infant deaths. Yet each year an increasing number of mothers receive no medical attention until delivery of their babies. In many cities, one-third to one-half of the mothers delivered in tax-supported hospitals see a doctor for the first time only when they are in labor.

To combat this trend, March of Dimes Prenatal Care programs emphasize public education and community service. The educational aspects focus on informing prospective parents of the importance of medical supervision throughout pregnancy. Community service includes efforts to overcome obstacles which prevent many women from getting this care. Volunteers often solve the two most common needs—for baby-sitters and transportation. Other volunteers assist in local prenatal clinics.



PRENATAL CARE VOLUNTEERS assist in many public health clinics across the nation as part of March of Dimes effort to encourage expectant mothers to seek medical attention during pregnancy.

A number of the nation's major service organizations have entered into the effort, providing manpower, national impetus and local action.

The National Congress of Parents and Teachers urges members to help "promote good prenatal care to reduce the incidence of birth defects and prematurity." PTA leaders also urge distribution of March of Dimes materials to inform young families and prospective parents about the need for prenatal care.

"Be Good to Your Baby Before It Is Born," a booklet prepared by The National Foundation—March of Dimes, is given to couples who attend Pre-Cana Conferences before marriage—at least a dozen Roman Catholic dioceses throughout the country.

The booklet was brought to the attention of the National Catholic Welfare Conference's Family Life Bureau by the National Council of Catholic Women.

B'nai B'rith Women, after a successful pilot program—called "Operation Stork"—carried out in cooperation with the Metropolitan Chicago Chapter of the March of Dimes and the Chicago Board of Health, has expanded its activities in the Prenatal Care program to other large cities.

The Junior Division of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, now entering the third year of participation in the March of Dimes program, recently voted to place special emphasis on expanding prenatal care and birth defects education, with particular focus on young people.

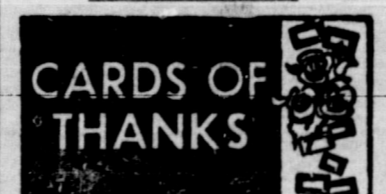

USDA COTTON CLASSING OFFICE RELEASES LAST REPORT FOR SEASON

K. E. Voelkel of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Memphis has released his final report for the current season.

For the week ending December 21, 14,500 samples were classed for a seasonal total of 103,000. This compares with 102,000 samples classed last season. The difference in the 2 seasons is that last year at this time approximately 50 percent of the total had been classed compared to 94 percent to date of the 1966 expected crop.

Only one percent of the cotton classed the past week was in white grades. Spotted grades showed 37 percent against 51 percent and Tinged grades made up 37 percent compared with 22 percent last week. Predominant grade was Strict Low Middling Spotted. The predominant staple length remained at 15/16 with 63 percent. Mike readings continued to reflect the effects of the hard freeze with 49 percent of the cotton classed falling to 2.6 and below or Wasty.

Low Middling Light Spotted and lower grades with mike readings of 3.2 and below were still selling freely at a price of 50 points over the CCC loan values. Some within grade cotton was selling for as low as 8 cents per pound. Below grade cotton prices ranged from 7.25 to 10 cents per pound. A number of producers were holding their production until after January 1. Cottonseed prices at gin points ranged from \$63 to \$70 per ton at gin points.

1967 COTTON, FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT SIGNUP

Sign-up for the 1967 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs will begin February 6, 1967, and continue through March 3. This means that sign-up period will last only four weeks. Notices of yield, payment rates, bases, allotments, and conserving bases will be mailed to you in January.

COTTON TRANSFERS

Applications will be accepted through January 3, 1967 to sell or lease 1967 cotton acreage.

NEW GROWERS COTTON ALLOTMENT

January 17, 1967, is the final date for applying for a "new Grower's" cotton allotment. Neither the operator or the owner of the farm covered by the application can own or operate any other farm in the United States for which a cotton allotment is established for the current year. Land must be suitable for production of cotton, and the operator must expect more than 50% of his income from agricultural commodities, excluding cotton production from the farm.

1966 WOOL APPLICATIONS

The 1966 wool marketing year ends December 31, 1966, and application for payment must be made in the office by no later than January 31, 1967.

ACP

Those of you who have ACP cost-share approvals for listing or chiseling your cotton land, please remember that the work must be done by December 31, 1966. If you cannot finish your field, please report the amount you do complete. You may then make application to list or chisel the remainder of the land under the 1967 ACP program.

Several weeks ago the county committee asked approval of the State Committee to have the cotton burr practice put in the list of ACP practices for 1967. This has been approved for dry land only. We will begin accepting applications for this practice after
