Banks of Donley Co. Show Increase With Over 12 Million In Deposits

At the close of business on December 31, 1966, the two banks here in Clarendon and the bank at Hedley, show a total in Deposits of \$12,592,440.36. This is an increase of \$2,103,764.40 over the total at the close of business December 31, 1965. All of the three banks showed a substantial increase in their deposits and more money from the sale of cotton is still coming in. In the loan department, there is an increase also with all three banks showing a total of \$6,823,576.38 in loans. This is an increase of \$702,580.93 over the figure at the same time in 1965. Donley County residents are fortunate in having three progressive banks to serve them.

Tractor Maintenance Course To Be Offered Farmers Here

A Tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held Monday, January 9, through January 12 at the High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to K. D. Vaughan, superintendent and Milton Mann and Ronald Bailey, teachers of vocational agriculture. Classes will be held at 7 p.m. each evening with Harold T. Wiedeman, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Dept. of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, on hand to give the instruction. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Wiedeman will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction. Farmers interested in attending the short course are asked to write or call K. D. Vaughan, Milton Mann, or Ronald Bailey. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged and Tractor Maintenance Short course Certificates will be presented each individual who attends all of the training sessions. The course will include knowledge on the fundamentals of an engine; application of proper maintenance skills such as lubrications, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, etc; proper adjustments; and safety operation. Local Residents To Register At No Cost The big push is on for voter registration in Donley County as well as the entire State of Texas. Here in Donley County, less than 150 have registered to date and the deadline is Tuesday, January 31. Donley County, along with the rest of the state, had a voter registration period during the past year, but this was a fill-in registration after most Texans had already paid their poll tax, and applied only to federal elections. The registration period opened on October 1 and will continue through January 31, and there is nothing to pay in order to become a qualified voter, not even a registration fee as had sometimes been discussed. Unlike past years with poll tax payment, however, those who become eligible to vote during the year are not permitted to get a late exemption, but must register during the regular time period. This applies especially to those who will become 21 during the year, and those who complete a year's residence after that time must secure their registration receipt, which will be marked as to the date that it becomes effective. The over-age exemption is similar to the poll tax regulations in that a registration receipt is not necessary for those who are 60 or over if they live in a town of less than 10,000 population. Unlike the poll tax, though, the person need only reach the age requirement by election day, not on the previous January 1. A person who will become 60 during this year would probably want to go ahead and get a registration receipt so that he would be eligible to vote should any elections be scheduled or called prior to the time he reaches 60. Registration receipts must be written out by the tax assessor-collector's office staff. 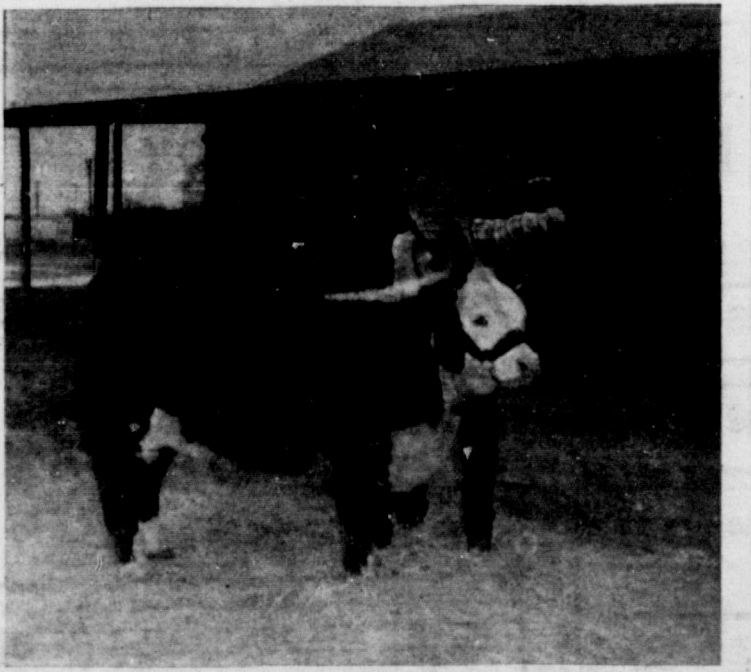

We began accepting applications for the 1967 ACP program on January 3. Signup for the 1967 Cotton, Wheat and CAP programs ends on March 3. CAP signup is now in progress, and the signup on the other programs will begin on February 6. Notices of allotments, bases, yields and payment rates will be mailed to you sometime in January. If you plan to prove your grain sorghum yield, you will have 15 days from the date on the notice in which to make an appeal. You should have your records together so that you can bring in proof of production so that appeals can be processed without delay.

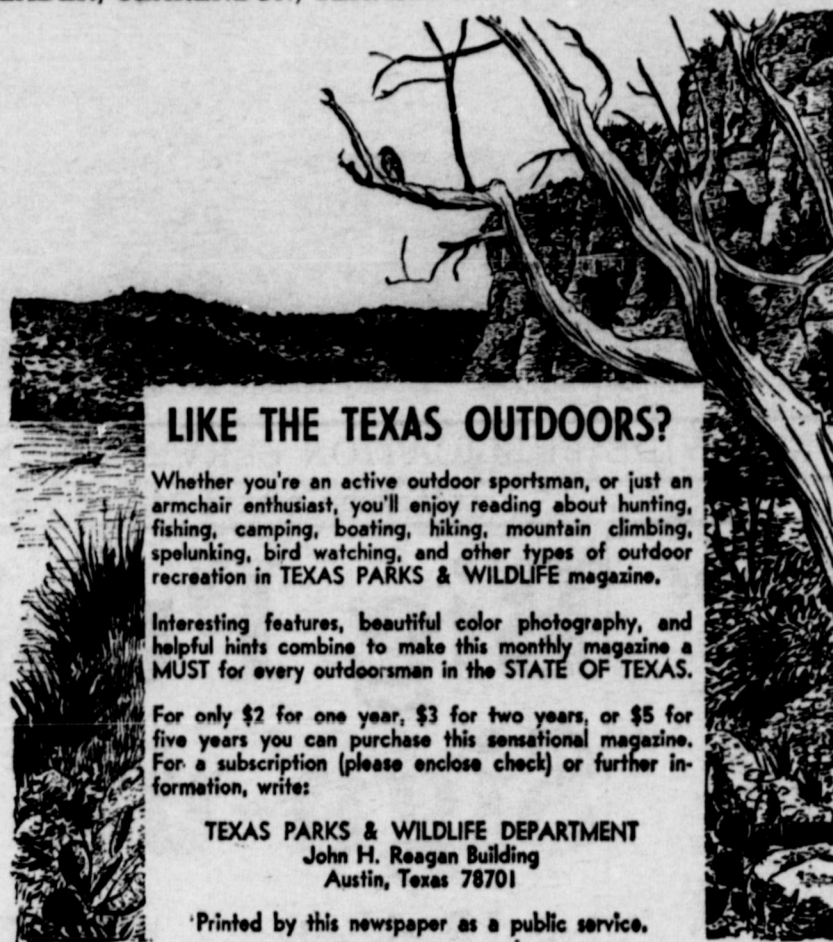

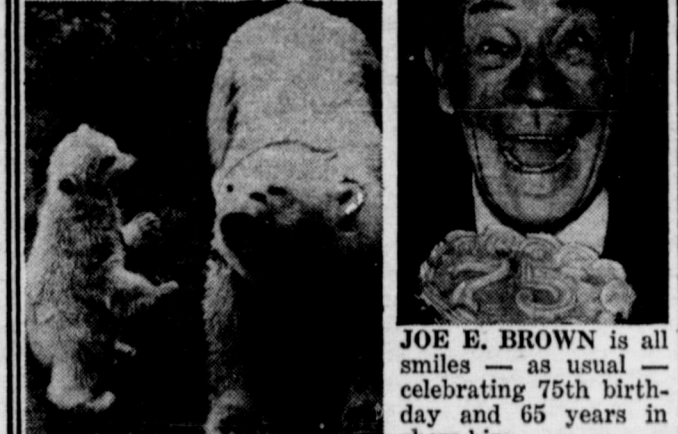

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Marksmen in a competitive pistol-shoot make the sport look ridiculously easy.

But a person who has never fired a handgun can't seem to hit the side of a barn even when all doors are shut!

Handgunning is one of the most demanding of all outdoor sports. But it also is one of the most fascinating.

Tin-can plinking with a pistol is a relaxing way to spend an idle afternoon in the wide-open spaces. But precision pistol shooting requires the utmost in concentration.

One of the best pistol shots in the business is Billie R. McElroy. He's the special firearms instructor who teaches every Texas peace officer to shoot.

Here's his step-by-step guide to learning to shoot a handgun: Grasp the gun firmly in the shooting hand with the grip seated against the heel of the hand.

Remember, if you see the target clearly you are not looking at the front sight. Therefore, you cannot ascertain whether or not you have correct sight alignment.

You will not be able to hold the handgun on target, which is sight picture. But with proper grip and stance you will be able to keep proper alignment while firing.

Shooting hand should be fully extended toward the target, wrist and elbow locked. Other hand should be placed in your pocket in a relaxed position.

Your body should be erect, but not stiff. Muscles should be relaxed with the weight of your abdomen falling solidly on your lower trunk.

Sighting itself consists of two distinct phases: sight alignment and sight picture.

Sight alignment is when the front sight is centered in and level with the top of the rear sight. This is accomplished by looking at the front sight.

Remember, if you see the target clearly you are not looking at the front sight. Therefore, you cannot ascertain whether or not you have correct sight alignment.

You will not be able to hold the handgun on target, which is sight picture. But with proper grip and stance you will be able to keep proper alignment while firing.

Release of the hammer to fire the handgun should be accomplished by a steady, even pressure on the trigger.

As the sights return to target, the pressure should be maintained. Add pressure is applied until the hammer is tripped.

Don't expect any miracles in the beginning. Accurate pistol shooting requires concentration and practice.

Perfection comes only after hours of dry firing, followed by actual blasting at a target.

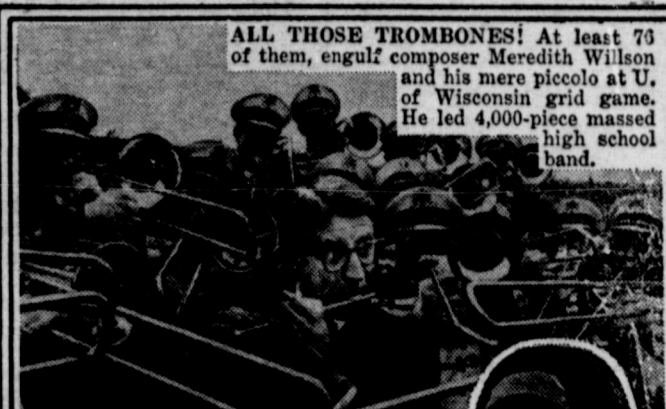

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Massive state governmental spending proposals — each ranging around the \$4,500,000,000 mark overall for the next fiscal period — are on their way to the Texas legislators.

Legislative Budget Board unveiled its 1968-69 budget recommendations last week, followed a few days later by the somewhat larger appropriations requests of Gov. John Connally.

LBB calculated spending approved by board members would come to some \$4,400,000,000 — \$334,800,000 from general revenue over which the Legislature has direct control.

Connally's Budget suggestions topped \$4,600,000,000 — \$911,400,000 in general revenue.

Present all-funds spending (including federal aid and earmarked categories such as for highways, schools and welfare) is \$3,900,000,000 — \$621,500,000 in general revenue.

Board's proposals could be financed easily without resort to new taxes.

Connally would require some \$64,400,000 in additional revenue, according to his projections of \$347,000,000 income — \$76,600,000 more according to the LBB income estimate. But the governor almost certainly will recommend some additional spending in his message to the Legislature.

Here's a capsule comparison of the general revenue budget:

- Education: (Present) \$342,200,000; (LBB) \$469,400,000; (Connally) \$496,300,000.
- Public Health, hospitals and

youth institutions: (Present) \$149,500,000; (LBB) \$206,500,000; (Connally) \$214,700,000.

● Departments and agencies: (Present) \$111,000,000; (LBB) \$139,300,000; (Connally) \$176,300,000.

● Judiciary: (Present) \$12,400,000; (Connally) \$13,100,000.

● Legislative expense: (Present) \$6,400,000; (LBB) \$6,900,000; (Connally) \$7,400,000.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED — Burton G. Hackney, 59, Brownfield attorney and chairman of the State Board of Public Welfare for eight years, was chosen by the board to succeed the late John H. Winters as Welfare commissioner.

Herbert C. Wilson, assistant commissioner, will head the department pending Hackney's move to Austin.

Joe D. Carter, Texas Water Rights Commission chairman and former Sherman legislator, was named chairman of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems at a meeting in Phoenix.

E. G. Morrison, Austin, was appointed to the University of Texas Development Board.

Governor Connally's top aide, Larry Temple, announced at the freshman legislator's orientation school that the governor soon will name a new press secretary. Past has been vacant since George Christian joined President Johnson's staff.

HOOD BID REJECTED — After a stormy hearing Texas Aeronautics Commission rejected Hood Airlines' request for authority to use DC-3 type planes

on it's Killen-to-Dallas run. Trans-Texas and Braniff Airways opposed Hood's request.

TAC said no new facts were developed to warrant changing its policy limiting commuter airlines to planes under 12,500 pounds.

Hood serves Fort Worth and also has flights to McGregor, Mineral Wells, Breckenridge, Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth.

OYSTERS UNHARMED — Live oyster reefs in Galveston Bay have suffered practically no damage since shell dredgers were allowed to operate closer to them three years ago, according to J. R. Singleton, director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Singleton said dredging has remained stable during the last decade, while live oyster harvests have increased.

No changes in the controversial dredging regulations are contemplated, although P&W field procedures on oysters may be altered.

PIT BAN ARGUED — Oil associations clashed at the Railway Commission hearing over a proposed statewide ban on salt water disposal pits.

Some expressed fear that federal government might enact such an order if the state doesn't. Others called the proposal arbitrary and of questionable legality.

Commission has banned salt water pits in oil fields in 43 counties on grounds they endanger fresh water supplies.

SHORT SNORTS
Federal highway program cutback will cost Texas \$57,000,000, according to State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer.

Leon Jones, personnel consultant of Dallas, has been retained on a part-time basis by the Texas Hospital Association to meet the growing needs in the field of personnel and employer-employee relations in hospitals.

State Democratic Executive is busy planning a gala Democratic victory dinner here next month at inauguration time.

STEER ISN'T ALL STEAK!

A steer isn't all steak. When a 1,000 pound steer of high quality is marketed from a feedlot, about 400 pounds will be removed before the retailer buys its carcass, explains County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Thus the retail outlet receives only about 60 percent of the steer's original weight. By the time the meat is prepared for display, another one-fourth of the carcass weight is accounted for in waste, such as bone, fat and trimmings. Much of this waste comes as a result of changing consumer preference for closely trimmed and boneless cuts, says Gooch.

Finally, explains the county agent, from the original 1,000 pound steer, only about 444 pounds of saleable retail cuts are available. The various cuts are then priced according to demand.

The more desirable and high-priced cuts represent a small portion, while the medium priced roasts, hamburger, and stew meat constitute a much higher percentage of the saleable carcass.

Thus, the retail price must more than double the liveweight price just to equal the price paid to the producer for the live animal. This is before marketing costs are added. Therefore, says the county agent, because by demands by consumers some cuts sell at prices much less than the carcass while others bring prices more than twice that of the carcass in order for the retailer to recover his costs and make a small margin on his investment.
