County Agent Ronald Gooch Reports On PEP Meeting Held Friday

The Panhandle Economic Program was discussed at a meeting of the Donley County Program Building Committee last Friday, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

James Murphrey, coordinator of PEP was the speaker. Some of the possibilities for increasing income in Donley County include the following, Murphrey said: 1. More efficient beef cattle production by using research proven practices such as cross-breeding programs, pregnancy and fertility testing, controlling cattle grubs with systemic insecticides, etc. 2. Increasing stocker cattle production through the use of hybrid sudan-sorghum crosses and more use of silage. 3. Taking advantage of the wild-life potential of the county thru the use of game leases, etc. 4. Increasing our swine production. 5. Community improvement and youth programs.

There are other potentials but the ones named above probably offer the greatest opportunities at the present, Murphrey said.

Officers were re-elected for the county program building committee and include: Eldon Lyles, chairman; E. W. Barbee, vice-chairman; Harold White, secretary; and Emmitt Simmons, treasurer.

The 21 Donley County leaders present at the meeting decided that various subcommittees be set up to look into some of the possibilities that Murphrey discussed and see what could be done along these lines, Gooch said.

INTEREST BUILDING IN GREENBELT WOODS & WATERS CLUB

Twenty-seven quite interested persons were present Monday night for the second meeting of the proposed Greenbelt Woods and Waters Club which is being organized here.

This club includes the counties embracing the Greenbelt Water Authority which takes in Donley, Hall, Childress, Hardeman and Foard counties.

By-Laws of the organization were read and approved at the meeting and the group voted to proceed with the necessary paper work to apply for a charter so the club may be incorporated.

1967 COTTON, FEED GRAIN, AND WHEAT PROGRAMS

Notices showing the 1967 cotton allotments, conserving bases, yields, and payment rates have been mailed. If you have any questions concerning these notices, please feel free to come by the office and talk with us.

The wheat and feed grain notices will be mailed next week. If you wish to appeal the yield or the base on feed grain or the yield on wheat, you will have 15 days from the date shown on the notice in which to do so.

Signups for these programs will begin February 6 and end March 3. This is only a four week period within which to sign to participate and is a shorter signup period than we have had in the past years. There is no automatic participation so don't forget to sign up.

ACP

We hope to be able to make all outstanding payments very soon to producers who carried out ACP practices in 1966. Please keep in mind that payments to producers for practices carried out in 1967 will not be made until after July 1. This will include the listing and chiseling practices completed after January 3.

MEASUREMENT

The measurement service is available again in 1967 as in 1966. If you wish to have someone from this office measure your wheat for you, come by and talk with us.

1966 Cotton Crop Is Near Completion With 7,627 Bales Ginned To Date

Voter Registration Deadline Is Nearing

A lot of potential Donley County voters are going to discover that they are unable to cast ballots in 1967 elections unless they register before the end of January.

Donley County is running behind at this time with only 385 persons who have registered thru Wednesday morning and right now time is beginning to run out with January 31 as the deadline.

Last year, a total of 1176 paid their poll tax so they could vote in Donley County and this year it is all free and the figure to date is deplorably low. A total of 934 paid their poll tax in 1965 which was an off-election year and business will be brisk at the county tax office between now and January 31 if even this figure is attained.

Some confusion arises concerning registration of persons over 60 years of age, and in Donley County it is not necessary for these people to register since they live in an area under 10,000 population.

Remember there is no charge to register—just a bit of effort on your part. Be sure to register this week.

At Amarillo Show

County 4-H club members are putting the finishing touches on their steers and barrows in preparation for the Amarillo Stock Show which begins Friday according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Ten steers and two barrows will be shown by 4-H members at the stock show which runs from January 20 through the 25th. The barrows will be judged Sunday at 8:00 a.m. and the steers will be weighed and sifted at the same time. The steer judging will be held Monday at 8:00 a.m.

The auction sale for the barrows will be held Tuesday at 11 a.m. and the steers will sell at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday in the Gouldy Sales Arena.

Considering all aspects, the Donley County 1966 Cotton Crop did right well in the number of bales ginned. A check with county gins yesterday revealed that a total of 7,627 bales had been ginned with approximately six or seven more to go.

The Paymaster Gin here ginned a total of 3,033 bales and hope to finish up this week. The West Texas Gin at Hedley and the Paymaster Gin at Lelia Lake shut down last week for the season and both of these gins turned out the exact number of bales with a total of 2,297 each.

The total ginned last year by these gins and the Ashtola gin was 12,831. Approximately one-third of the allotted acreage in 1966 was diverted which will account for a large portion of the decrease in number of bales. Add another third to the total this year and we would have had around 11,440 bales which would have been approximately 1400 bales less than the crop last year.

The total production would have been much higher had we escaped the hard freeze that practically wiped out the cotton crop west of Clarendon. In other areas to the east, the turn-out was good and better than usual in spots.

There has been a lot of swearing going on at the Capitol. Seems like almost everyone has been sworn in to an office of one type or another. We haven't made an official count but the number will approach the 200 mark.

First it was the judges. Then the top elective officials. Then the 31 State Senators and 150 members of the House.

There's no doubt about it, there's a lot of swearing going on in the Texas capital. And there's more to come.

With what's upcoming in the legislative halls, there's likely to be a lot of unofficial swearing, too—a bit stronger in nature. This is bound to happen when so many people get together—and especially when arguments, pro and con, get underway for this and that bill.

It's expected that some 2,500 measures will hit the hopper before the lawmaking session ends. SHOW IS ON THE ROAD — The 60th session of the Legislature now is underway. How long it will last is anybody's guess.

Three officials in a position to be among the state's best guessers are predicting it will not continue beyond the 140-day deadline for a regular session. This despite a mountain of problems to be resolved.

"We can finish on time," commented Speaker of the House Ben Barnes, as the representatives began to assemble. And he emphasized "I want no special sessions."

Gov. John Connally has voiced a similar view. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith even more strongly convinced that special sessions are out of the question.

"It is not only possible to complete our work in 140 days... there ought to be no other

thought than finishing them by then—and probably before," commented Smith.

Lieutenant Governor Smith suggested that legislators could speed up their work if they abandoned the usual practice of four-day weeks and stayed in sessions Fridays and Saturdays once the bills start coming out of committees. Asked if he felt that the lawmakers would do that the lieutenant governor acknowledged that chances of them doing so are slim.

Smith feels the 60th Legislature faces no more problems than previous ones.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court agreed with the lower courts that West Texas State University could indefinitely suspend a student for violating conditions of disciplinary probation for traffic offenses.

High Court also, in effect, upheld tax values of the City of Port Lavaca which had been attacked by property owners who claimed land assessments were discriminatory since bank deposits were left off tax roll.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones heard arguments in the AFL-CIO suit to invalidate the constitutional amendment which would require annual voter registration. Labor leaders claim that the ballot stated only that it would repeal the poll tax as a voting requirement, thus failing to describe its full purpose.

Secretary of State John L. Hill has been enjoined from canvassing the November 8 vote on the amendment pending outcome of the suit. AFL-CIO seeks summary judgement. Union officials want permanent registration.

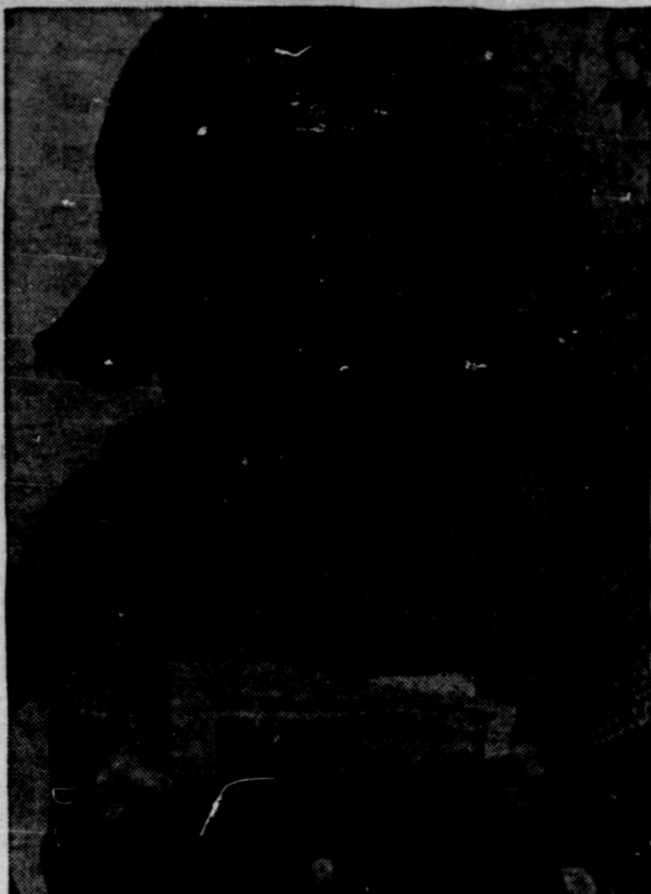

Vaughan pointed out the fact that the basis for payment of state per capita funds to the Clarendon Public Schools and the listing of each pupil will mean approximately \$85 to the school district. In addition, the census figures will be used in planning for the 1967-68 school year.

GI INSURANCE PAY DIVIDENDS THIS YEAR

About \$9,561,500 will be distributed to Texas veterans in GI insurance dividends during 1967, Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said today.

The dividends are payable on the anniversary dates of National Service and U. S. Government Life Insurance held by veterans, the VA Manager added.

Common Income Tax Questions-Answers

Q-If my wife and I file separately instead of jointly, can one itemize while the other uses the standard deduction?

A-No. Married couples filing separate returns must handle their expenses the same way. If one itemizes the other must too.

Married couples filing separately must also take the same type of standard deduction. If one takes the minimum standard deduction they both must take it.

Q-Does the law now require me to file my return with an IRS service center?

A-A new law authorizes the Secretary of Treasury to make such a request but it will not be required for 1968 returns. Check your 1040 instructions for the address of the office to which tax returns are to be sent.

Note that in some states, taxpayers are offered the option of mailing returns calling for a refund direct to a service center. Even in these states this is not a requirement but offered as a means to help speed up refunds and reduce processing costs.

Q-How does the minimum standard deduction work?

A-The deduction amounts to \$200 plus \$100 for each exemption on the return including those for age and blindness. For married couples filing separately, the deduction is \$100 plus \$100 for each exemption. The maximum that may be claimed by those using this deduction is \$1,000 but it is limited to \$500 when a married taxpayer files a separate return.

A married couple with two children as dependents would be entitled to a \$600 deduction when this method is used. If the income reported on the return was under \$6,000 then this method would be more to the couple's advantage than the standard deduction.

Q-I've heard that one of the tax benefits for older people is to be able to sell your home at a

profit and not be taxed on that money. Is that true?

A-Yes it is if certain conditions are met. You will not have to pay tax on the profit if you were 65 or older before the date of the sale, the adjusted sales price was \$20,000 or less, and you owned and occupied the house as your principal residence for at least 5 of the 8 years before the sale.

If you sold the house for over \$20,000 and the other conditions are met, then only a portion of the profit will be taxable.

Gain excluded under this provision of law can be elected only once.
