Clarendon Can Now Boast Newest, Modern Dental Offices In Entire Area

After almost a year, Dr. Keith Hudson's new dental offices and furnishings in the Tunnell Building are complete. Workmen started complete remodeling of the upstairs section of the building to house the new dental offices the first Monday following Easter in 1966. The final pieces of furniture for the reception room were moved in place last week and other minor work was completed.

Dr. and Mrs. Hudson planned the arrangement and interior design of the dental suite themselves and professional architects have acclaimed it one of the nicest and most modern in this entire area. The offices consist of nine rooms including the reception room which is furnished with hand carved pieces from Old Mexico. The walls are done in split cork. Other rooms feature beautiful paneling and burlap paper. Dr. Hudson has his private office, a business office, snack bar, laboratory room, X-ray room, and three chair rooms, two of which have the newest version of operatories (dental chairs) with vibrators built in to relax the patient. All rooms are carpeted for the exception of the laboratory.

Leading to the dental offices is a red carpet which extends from the ground level, up the stairway and throughout the halls of the Tunnell building. Construction of the dental offices was handled by Homer Taylor, Ralph Decker and Willard Hudson, father of Dr. Hudson.

After deciding to come back to Clarendon to open Dental Offices, Dr. Hudson still had a long hard seige ahead, two years of study and dental internship at the Dental Branch of the University of Texas at Houston.

Before his offices were anywhere near completion, Dr. Hudson started his general practice in August on a temporary basis, dodging around the carpenters, painters etc. He began his full time practice in September and has had very few hours of leisure time since.

Dr. Hudson was raised in Clarendon and is a graduate of Clarendon High School, where he received the Wesley Knorrp Outstanding student award at the conclusion of his senior year. After attending Clarendon Junior College for one year, he started the study of dentistry and eight years later received his degree from the University of Texas Dental Branch.

He was a member of Psi Omega Dental Fraternity and served as president of the fraternity in 1965. He also received the Fraternal Achievement Award as the outstanding member of the fraternity.

Mrs. Hudson, the former Jamie Ross, was raised at Quail, Texas but attended Clarendon High School and lived with her grand-

mother, Mrs. Frank Bourland. While Keith was attending Dental School, Mrs. Hudson had the opportunity of training as a dental assistant with several of the noted Dentists in Houston. She serves as both receptionist and dental assistant at Dr. Hudson's offices. Mrs. Mary Ann Riley is also an assistant for Dr. Hurson.

Dr. and Mrs. Hudson have one son, Ross Taylor (Hud).

TOTAL OF 1201 SIGN UP TO VOTE

According to a final count Wednesday morning, a total of 1201 Donley County residents had signed up in the voter registration.

This figure along with those over 60 who did not have to register will give us good voting strength for the county.

COTTON ALLOTMENT TO BE INCREASED IN TEXAS

It has been announced that a total of 20,503,296 additional pounds of cotton have been granted to Texas to take care of various inequities in projected yields in 1967.

The Texas ASC committee will determine how the pounds will be distributed. Further information will be released when specific action is taken.

The 1966 allotment for Donley County was 28,387 pounds representing a loss of 85,161 for the county.

CHS Cagers Split Wins And Losses In Games The Past Week

Clarendon High School Basketball teams played conference games both Friday night and Tuesday night on the road winning both games Friday night but losing Tuesday night.

Friday night Clarendon boys defeated McLean by a score of 61-47. Larnce Gardner was high point man for the game with 19. Archie Smith, Everett Monroe, and Irvin Mears each racked up 14 points for Clarendon. This indicated that Clarendon was holding a pretty good average for the night. Brad Dalton and Eddie Finley hit 13 points each for McLean.

Clarendon girls fared well also score-wise totaling 59 points to McLean's 36. Judy McAnear and Carol Chamberlain tipped the basket for 20 points each and Tina Moore followed close behind with 17. Pam Bailey tallied 16 for McLean.

Clarendon boys tasted defeat at the hands of Wheeler Tuesday night by a score of 62-53. This placed Clarendon in a tie for District play thus far. The game was a hard one as many factors seemed to be against the local team. For example Clarendon received 24 fouls to Wheeler's 6 and 5 free throws to their 30. This is discouraging to any team when they are putting forth good effort. Archie Smith hit 18 and Monroe 13 to pace Clarendon. Donald Reeves was high point man for Wheeler with 30 points. Timing was an element in the total for this game.

Clarendon girls took the lead in the first quarter but trailed the remainder of the game. The final score was Clarendon 34 to Wheeler's 45. Judy McAnear hit the basket for 23 points. Sue Richerson paced the Wheeler team with 25. The Clarendon team missed Carol Chamberlain who was ill and unable to play.

CHS teams will play Claude here Friday night, and Tuesday night will travel to Silvertown. Games each night are conference and will begin at 6:30 p.m. Come out and give these young people your support. Coach Iribek, in commenting this week, still feels confident that chances are good for Clarendon boys to win District though it may take a play off game to do it.

College Bulldogs Take Two More Conference Wins

The Clarendon College Bulldogs stepped out of the low bracket group this past week end by picking up two more conference wins to give them a 3-3 record at the present time with two of the big guns in their sights this week end.

Last Friday night the Bulldogs defeated New Mexico Military Institute in the local fieldhouse 87-75. Five Bulldogs were in the two digit scoring bracket with Harry Cannon hitting 19 points, Claude Maldonado 20, Mike Barrera 18, Roy Holloway 15 and Tom Byrd 10. New Mexico had three boys in the 2 digit bracket with Ron Pennington high with 18 points.

Several new marks were set in the game with South Plains Tuesday night. The Bulldogs came out on top 116 to 107. This was a new high total for the Bulldogs and an overall scoring total in one game of 223 points.

High scorers for the Bulldogs were Harry Cannon with 33, Tom Byrd 17, Roy Holloway 19, Claude Maldonado 17 and Mike Barrera 19.

Bob Fullerton of South Plains broke an all time individual scoring record here with 45 points. This also exceeded his previous records at home.

With their 3-3 record, the best in recent years, the Bulldogs will take on Amarillo College in the local gym tonight, Thursday. Amarillo is sitting on top with a 6-0 conference record.

Saturday night they will take on the second place Odessa in the local gym. Odessa holds a 5-1 record, losing only to Amarillo. The Bulldogs have three players placing in the top ten in individual scorers and Harry Cannon is in the top three with an average of 20 points per game. Roy Holloway has an 18 point average and Claude Maldonado has a 17.5 point average per game.

Topper Named To Clarendon Post

John E. Topper, 36, of Shamrock, Texas, has been named Field Inspector for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. In making the announcement, Don C. King, secretary-general manager of the Association said that Topper will be stationed at Clarendon, Texas, which is headquarters for District 2.

The counties in District 2, formerly headed by John Little, who retired Jan. 1, 1967, are Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Collingsworth, Donley, Armstrong, Briscoe, Hall, and Childress in Texas, and Beckham, Greer, and Harmon in Oklahoma.

Topper, a former TSCRA Market Inspector has been a Deputy Sheriff in Wheeler County for the past 14 years. He has attended many law enforcement schools and crime seminars on criminal investigation. Included in the schools are the Texas Department of Public Safety's sheriff's schools and crime seminars sponsored by the F.B.I. Topper has had a lifetime of experience and interest in the livestock industry.

King said he felt the Association was fortunate to have a man with Topper's previous market inspection experience, cattle savvy, and law enforcement training join the Field Inspector force.

The new inspector will continue to live in Shamrock until school is out, at which time he and his wife, June, and their four children will move to the Clarendon area.

ANNUAL COUNTY REPORT IN THIS ISSUE

The annual account of the County Clerk of Donley County is being published in this issue of the Leader. If you are interested in the finances of our county, look it over and you can get a pretty good idea of what is taking place in county affairs.

The Leader received the following telegram Wednesday morning from U. S. Senator Ralph W. Yarborough:

Washington, D. C. Jan. 31
Am notified that Department of Health, Education and Welfare has approved a loan of \$270,000 to Clarendon Junior College for construction of an academic facility to house library, classroom, laboratories, physical education and administrative areas.

Ralph W. Yarborough, Some time ago, a government grant for the college was announced in the amount of \$235,000. Whether this latter amount has actually been funded is not definitely known at the present time but with the loan approved, it is presumed that it will be forthcoming.

With the \$270,000 loan, \$235,000 grant and matching funds locally, the college building program should be under way before too many weeks pass. Architects are rushing plans at the present time on the academic facilities along with the dormitory complex and cafeteria. The dormitory and cafeteria are to be built separately under another funding program.

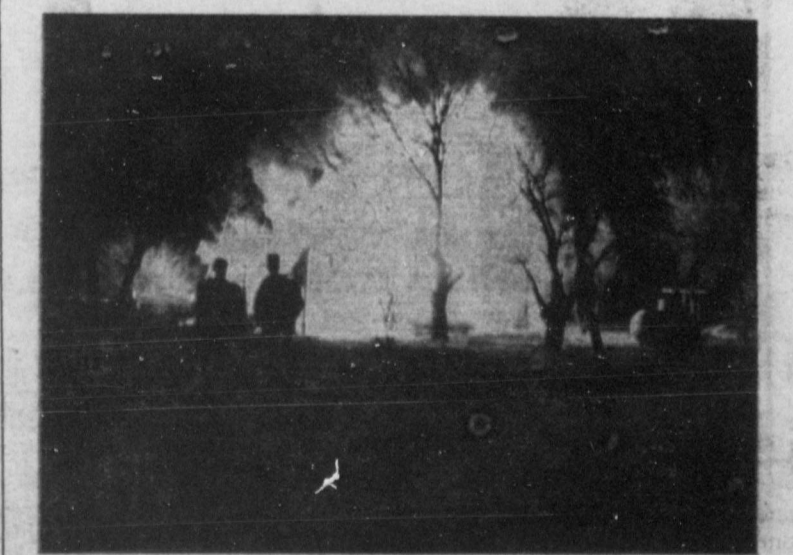
The overall college building program is expected to total near the million dollar mark when it all gets underway.

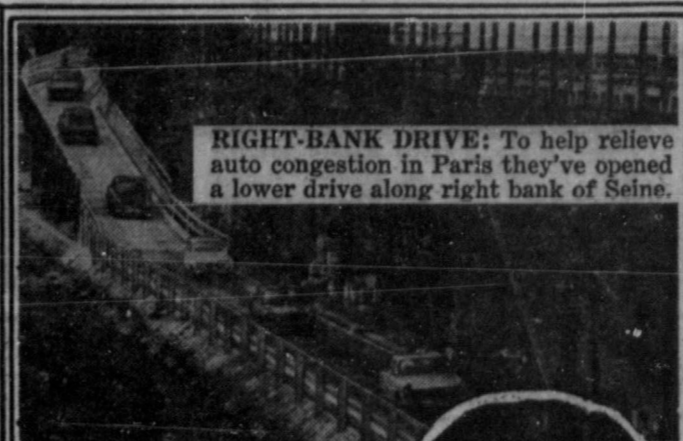

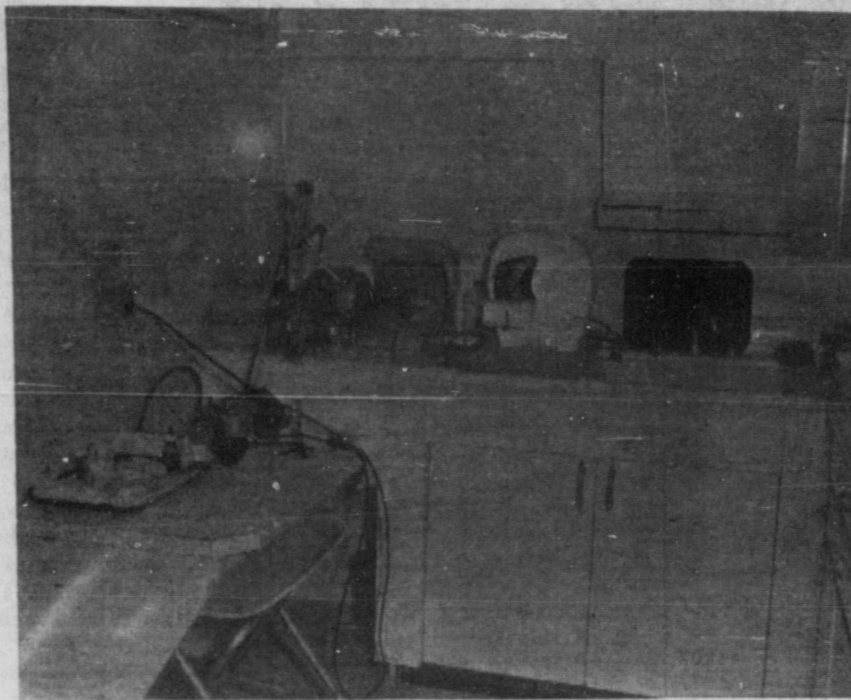

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WHERE ARE WE HEADED?

As the last sheet was torn from the calendar the pundits, commentators, financial and editorial writers paused with pen in hand to take a retrospective look at the year 1966. The blatant evidence of this affluence has bothered those who find it diffi-

cult to reconcile the tragedy that men are facing in Viet Nam with a persistent demand at home for a life of greater ease and comfort. The truth is that while the output of United States industry poured a flood of material well-being across the land, there was no stinting on military requirements. The productive capacity of this country has become so great that it can sustain a major war effort without interrupting our peacetime lives, and judging by reports

at the end of the year, there is growing evidence that the communist world is not a monolithic force after all. Serious as it is, the war in Viet Nam and the threat of world wide communism may have less of a bearing on the shaping of the American future than events that have been taking place right here at home. In the midst of prosperity, there has been a rising discontent that is difficult to explain. At a time when major industries and

His fall calves weighed 462 pounds each at seven months, according to Anderson County Agent W. T. LaRue. Spring calves weighed only 416 pounds at seven months, said LaRue.

Part of the reason for increased weights of the fall calves, said Carroll, is fall calves are large enough by spring to take advantage of increased milk production of the mothers. The lush spring grass makes for the better milk production of the cows.

Carroll said the spring calves ate more creep feed than the fall calves. Also, cows having fall calves gained more weight dur-

ing the spring and summer.

Another advantage of fall calving, says Carroll, is less udder trouble with the cows.

His cows are bred to drop calves in October and November so the calves will be ready for the May market. He has Hereford-Angus crossbred cows on common bermuda-crimson clover pastures.

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business leaders are devoting a large part of their energies to helping solve broad social and economic problems, a deep-rooted movement is sweeping across the country that could well undermine the private enterprise, free market economic system. During 1966, extensive investi-

gations into the motives and the performances of many basic industries reached a new high. The maladjustments of inflation have been blamed on industry. Toward the end of the past summer, consumers turned their wrath on retail distribution. Housewives picketed stores and demanded price reductions. Simultaneously striking unions made a shambles of the governments' wage guidelines. Wage increases threatened to outstrip productivity increases. All of these things promise to raise a fundamental issue to which most citizens have given no thought.

The issue that is being raised by the striking housewives investigative government bodies, involves the question of whether or not our private enterprise, capitalistic system, which functions on the profit motive, is to be retained? The growing discontent, if it runs deep enough, will result in legislative action that will alter irrevocably the system under which we have lived since the founding of the nation.

Since any fair examination of the record will reveal the great benefits that have been derived from competitive capitalism, we must assume that the present discontent is based on misunderstanding — a misunderstanding that have been encouraged by irresponsible political actions that have led to the depreciation of the dollar. The rise of discontent among U. S. citizens, if not resolved, may well lead to the crippling of productivity and the erosion of liberty, as controls are substituted for the laws of supply and demand in a free market — a market that is incomparably the best in the world. Life magazine describes its accomplishments in a few sentences: "American housewives, many of whom are engaged in supermarket boycotts to protest the high cost of food, spend an average 18.2 per cent of their families' take-home pay to buy that food. In 1960 they were spending 20 percent and in 1946, 24.6 percent. In France, housewives dedicate 30 percent of their family budget to food. In Japan the rate is 43 percent, and in the Soviet Union — something between 50 and 60 percent."

As the new year opens, we should all vow to try a little harder to understand what makes the wheels go around in the United States. That is the biggest task we face in 1967. Only through understanding of bread and butter facts of our economic system can we hope to retain the good and abundant life that systems demonstrate that we have enjoyed in the past — to say nothing of freedom and our stature as a world power.

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


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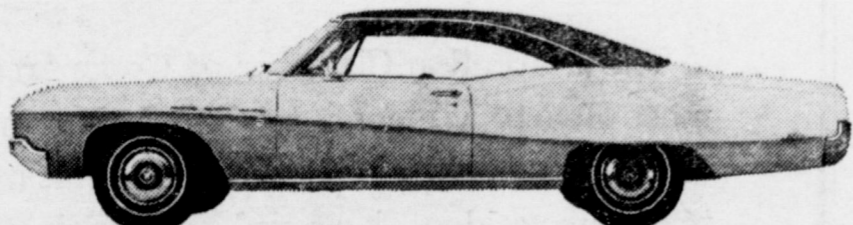

Common Income Tax Questions-Answers

Q—I have a disability pension from Social Security. Is this taxable income?

A—No. Social Security benefits are not taxable.

Q—I thought there was supposed to be a box to check on the 1040 if you wanted to have \$1 of the tax go to a presidential campaign fund? I can't find it.

A—The provision in the law you refer to goes into effect for taxable years beginning December 31, 1966. Instructions will be issued at a future date on how to do this.

Q—Where can I get the form I need to claim the sick pay exclusion?

A—Form 2440, "Statement to Support Exclusion of Sick Pay," is available at IRS offices.

Q—My wife and I are filing separate 1040's this year. Which tax table or rate schedule should we use?

A—Schedule 1 on page 11 of the 1040 instruction booklet if separate income is \$5,000 or more or deductions are itemized. Otherwise, use Tax Table C on page 14.

Q—I am a widow with children, how much can I deduct on my return for child care expenses?

A—You may deduct up to \$900 of this expense when there are two or more children under the age of 13 for which this expense is incurred in order to work or seek a job. If there is only one child the maximum deduction is \$600.

March of Dimes Physician Opposes Institutions for Birth Defect Victims

The human stampede is under way the moment the tall doctor strides into the waiting room.

With a flying tackle, a five-year-old, born with nine birth defects, catches him around one thigh, and refuses to let go. A little girl, who's only four and has been blind since birth, knows instinctively he's arrived and gleefully latches on to his belt.

"A typical day," Dr. Paul H. LaMarche says cheerfully to a visitor as he peels off the children and sidesteps a phalanx of advancing mothers.

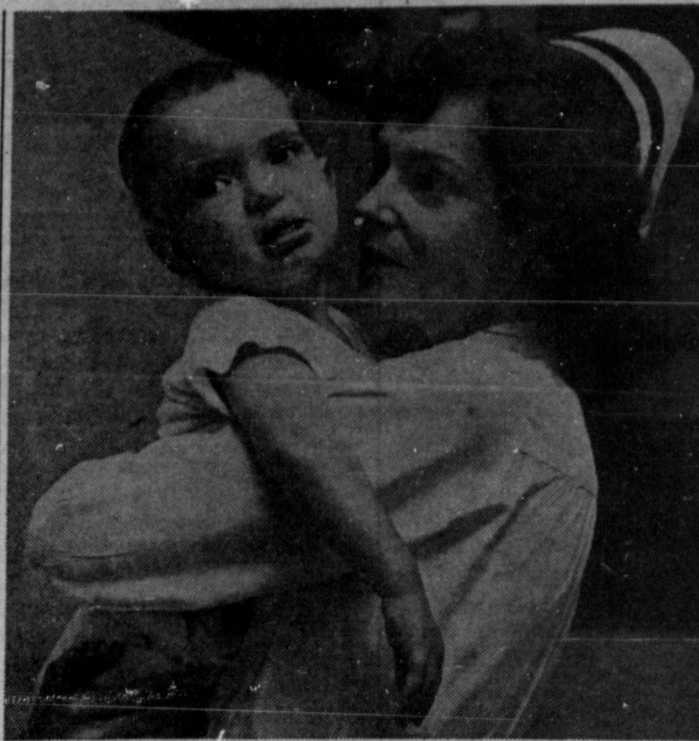
The embattled doctor is director of the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center at Rhode Island Hospital, Providence. He is a pediatrician who feels strongly that the last place for a defective child, with few exceptions, is an institution for the handicapped.

"We regard it here as part of the Bill of Rights that all of these children with birth defects are entitled to the best diagnosis and treatment, regardless of race, finances or superstitions of the past," Dr. LaMarche says.

"A decade ago, even five years ago, almost every one of these children would have been sent to some institution. There they would have been forgotten as they wasted away and sometimes died. These tragedies still happen. But more and more of these afflicted children are with their parents in their own homes, where they belong, learning to become useful citizens."

A tousel five-year-old yells "Hi, Doc!" and buries a small fist in the pediatrician's midriff.

"Craig here thinks he's another Jack Dempsey. Maybe some day he will be. He was born with a good part of his spinal cord, membranes and

nerve sticking out of his back. We repaired the opening and today he swings by his knees from the monkey bars at school and climbs his neighbor's trees to swipe apples. But most medical thinking at the time of Craig's birth was that a meningomyelocoele always meant you had a paraplegic on your hands—total paralysis below the waist."

Another five-year-old named Tommy is a classic case in the annals of children who have survived despite multiple congenital malformations.

"Tommy has known just about every severe birth defect in the book," the pediatrician says, "from dislocated hips and elbows to cleft palate and curvature of the spine."

"Despite all this, Tommy's life now is pretty much that of normal kids. He plays ball and

gets into the usual small-boy mischief. He's in the stream of life where he belongs."

Gilda, born without eyes, has a radiant smile although in her sightless world there would seem little to smile about. "The basic aim," Dr. LaMarche says, "is to get Gilda into nursery school as soon as possible. Artificial eyes will improve her appearance, minimize comment from the unthinking, and help eliminate the stigma that cruelly but inevitably attaches to the blind."

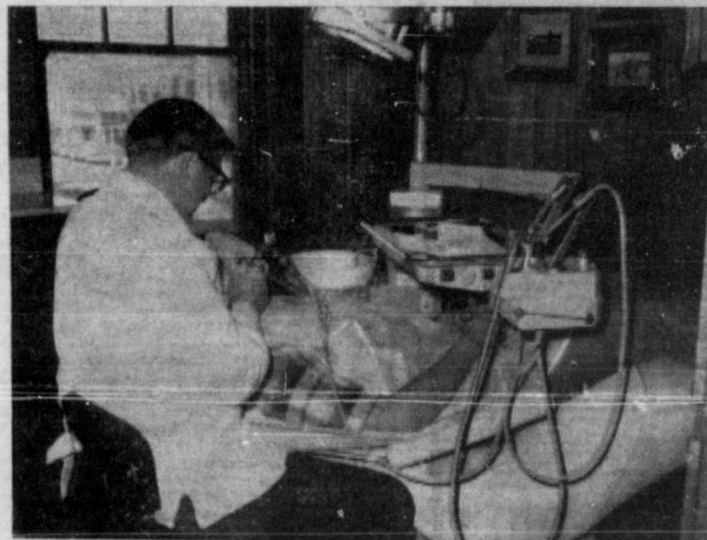
Thus the mending of these small defective bodies progresses each week at the Birth Defects Center in Providence, just as it does in San Francisco and Denver and Chicago and at more than 70 other March of Dimes Centers across the nation.

I am proud to begin my second report from Washington by announcing that I will introduce a proposed school prayer amendment on January 26. This is in the form of a joint resolution which states:

"Nothing contained in this Constitution shall abridge the right of persons lawfully assembled, in any public building which is supported in whole or in part through the expenditure of public funds, to participate in non-denominational prayer..."

In order to become part of our Constitution this resolution must be approved by two-thirds of the members of each house of Congress and then must be ratified by three-fourths of our state legislatures.

I do not believe the nine men of the Supreme Court should be allowed to tell 190 million people, including the children, where and when they can utter their prayers. I greatly appreciate all the mail I have received in regard to this proposal and hope we can reverse the decision of the last Congress when the resolution failed to gain the necessary votes to be submitted to the states.

At the time of this writing I have learned that the Executive Committee of the Committee on Committees has approved my request for assignment to the House Agriculture Committee. I am con-

fident the full committee will approve this recommendation, and I will be in a position to help the farmers and ranchers of the Panhandle with their problems as well as trying to help the agricultural industry across the nation.

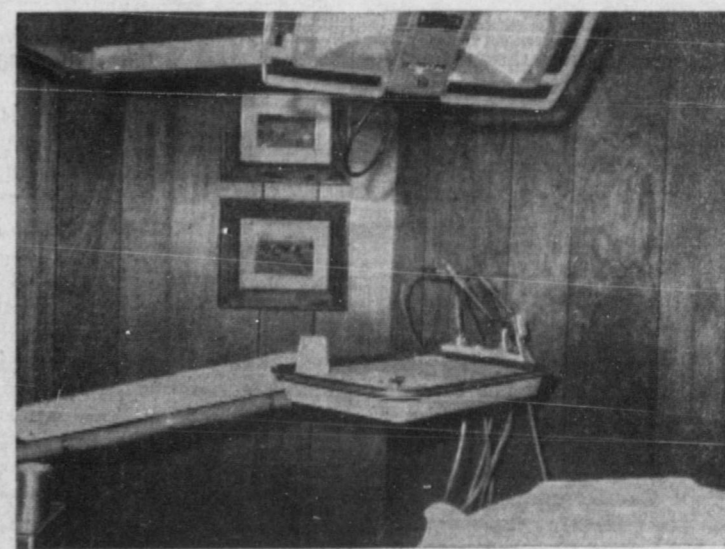

The goal of the Congressional Committee is to maintain the Constitutional balance of power between the Congress and the President by keeping a strong two-party system.

Quivira Council Girl Scouts Hold Annual Banquet At Pampa

The Quivira Council, Girl Scouts of America held its annual banquet at the First Methodist Church, Pampa, Texas, Friday evening, January 27. Mrs. Earl Shields, Mr. and Mrs. Tommie Saye, and Mrs. Bright Newhouse of Clarendon were among the near three hundred in attendance.

Quivira Council is composed of three districts: Clarendon, Pampa and Borger encompassing several towns in each district. Board members were elected at this meeting, constitutional amendments reviewed, and electives to the nominating committee made. Mrs. T. M. Caldwell, Jr. was elected to the Nominating Committee from District 3.

Recognition was given various groups and organizations. The Donley County Leader, Clarendon, received a certificate in appreciation for the support given the Girl Scouts. Mrs. Bright Newhouse made the presentation to Mr. Estlack Saturday morning and the certificate is now hanging in the Leader Office. Testing Of Herds Will Increase Cattle Profits, Reports Gooch

"Guesstimates" are that about 15 percent of the bulls in Texas are either sterile or low in fertility, says County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Fertility of bulls can be determined by using an electroejaculator to collect the semen and having a qualified person evaluate it. Cost of this process ranges from about \$2 to \$10 per bull, depending on the number to be checked.

That's pretty cheap insurance against having a calf crop 3 to 6 months late, after finding out a bull is sterile. Or if a bull is low in fertility, the calf crop may be only 35 to 65 percent.

For example, if a rancher has 20 bulls and spends \$5 a head to check them and finds one sterile bull, it would cost \$100 to identify and cull the bull, but it would have cost well over the \$100 to maintain the bull for a year and he wouldn't have sired a single calf.

Another profitable practice is palpating cows to determine pregnancy. The national average is 80 percent conception of the total cows bred. This indicates that 20 percent of the cows bred will be nonproductive during the breeding season. Culling by palpation eliminates the cost of keeping the cows until calving time and then being disappointed. Pregnancy testing allows a cattleman to decide early on disposal of open cows.

Both fertility testing of bulls and pregnancy testing of cows can be profitable for ranchers if they are wisely and regularly used, concludes Gooch.

Miss Cooke will attend a meeting in Lubbock to discuss objectives and activities and the methods to be used in successfully completing the program.

Rolling Plains Cotton Producers Discuss Problems At Meeting

The directors of the Rolling Plains Cotton Producers, Inc. met in a called meeting recently and voted to send appropriate letters of protest to the proper governmental authorities requesting a revision in the penalty system now in effect on the micronaire readings for cotton placed in the government loan. Directors felt the penalties have resulted in unfair and discriminatory price reductions at a time when prices are at a low level.

The Board also voted to make application for certification for eligibility as an approved producer organization which if approved would establish eligibility to nominate members and participate in the election of trustees in the formation of a Cotton Board and Board of Trustees under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act voted by the nation's cotton producers last month.

Since membership of the Rolling Plains Cotton Producers Ass'n is made up of cotton producers in the eastern tier of Panhandle counties who have their cotton classed at the Memphis Cotton Classing office, and only Cotton producers can be members, directors felt the organization should qualify as an approved producer organization.

A. J. Garland of Clarendon is secretary, and H. S. Mahaffey a director in the Rolling Plains Cotton Producers, Inc. organization.

Stockmen Advised To Watch For Lice

Donley County stockmen are being advised to be on the lookout for lice on their livestock. These pests can reduce profits and increase feeding costs for the winter unless they are controlled. Research indicates that heavy infestations of lice can increase the winter weight loss in weaner heifers by 300 percent and nearly double the weight loss in mature cattle, if the lice are not controlled.

Livestock producers are reminded that copies of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" are available at your County Agent's office.

The publication contains information on insecticides formulations on how to use them for controlling external livestock and poultry parasites. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for all kinds of livestock.

Lice infestations spread more rapidly when livestock are confined to smaller areas, and if allowed to multiply, can materially affect the general well-being of the herd, points out the county agent.

Attendance is by reservation only. Reservations are to be made through the local Southern Baptist Churches. All reservations should be made by February 8.

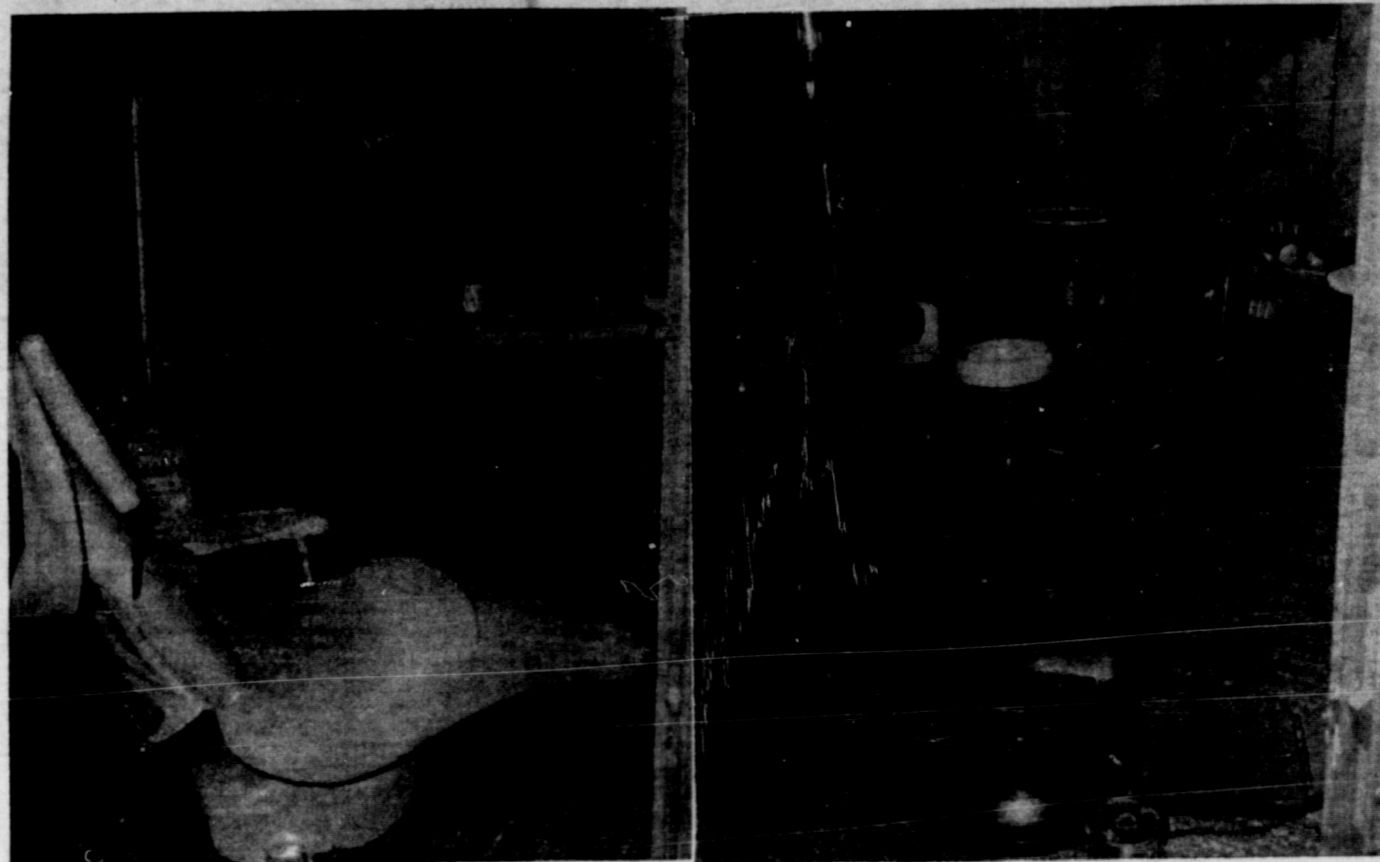

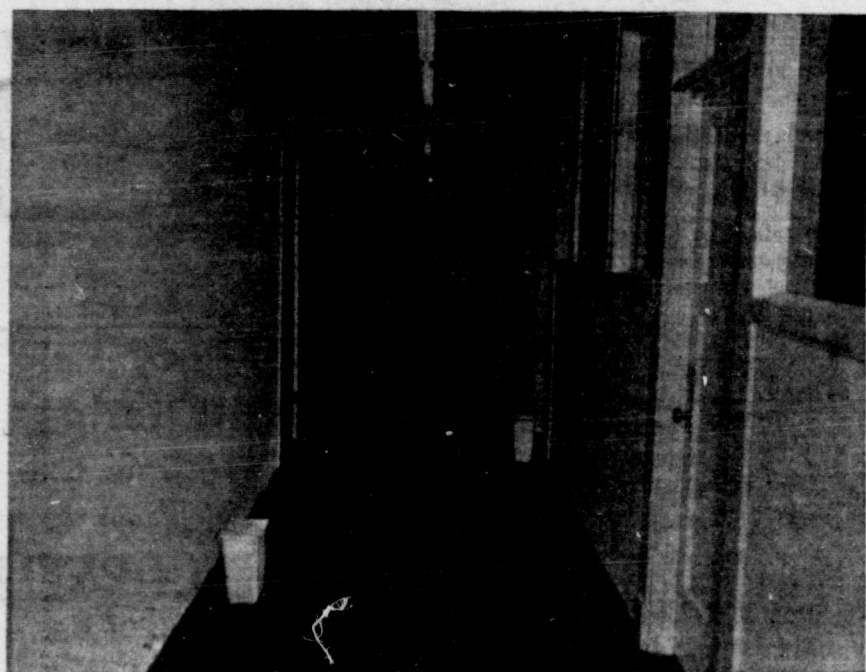

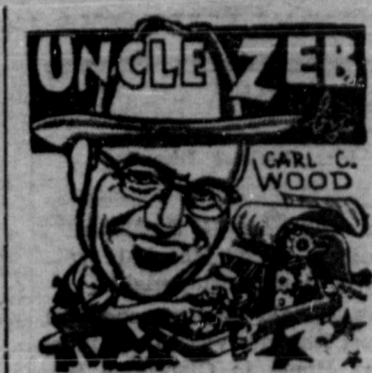
