Billy G. started his calf on feed Sept. 7th and finished 203 days later! The calf weighed 280 pound at the start, and finished at 379 or a gain of 1.86 pounds per day. Bill fed a rationofoats barley, corn, cotton seed meal, steer fatine, and as roughage, John song grass, hegair and alfalfa hay The calf sold for \$10.50 at Fort Worth. Hatchett realized a total gain of \$33.11 profit on his calf. Gene Finley, cattle feeder par excellent by all rights, made \$52.46 profit on his two calves. Gene placed his calves on feed May 1st and sold Feb. 27th. One calf was sold to E. L. Thornton at the local FFA 4-H Stock Show for 11 cents per pound, top price. The other animal was bought by Larmer Henry for \$10.75. Finley's calves started feed at a weight of 350 lbs, and when sold tipped the scales at 1660 a gain of 1310 pounds, or 2.17 pounds per day.
