Bulldogs Host Cameron Aggies At Hedley

The Clarendon College Bulldogs will host the perennially powerful Cameron College Aggies from Lawton in Hedley fieldhouse Thursday, February 9, at 7:30. The choice of the Hedley court will make available a more central location for fans, enabling parents and students from the Wellington, Memphis, Hedley, Quail, and Samnorwood areas to attend the games with greater convenience. The new gymnasium at Hedley is also a fine drawing card.

The Bulldogs, snarling triumphantly after enjoying an impressive winning streak in conference games, are determined to battle the Aggies to a standstill. A victory over Coach "Red" Miller's strong team is their aim, strengthened by the fact that the Bulldogs have fallen to the Aggies in previous contests. Whatever the final score may be, fans will be assured of an exciting, fast-moving exhibition of basketball showmanship. Price of admission will be \$1 for adults and 50c for students. Fans will need to arrive early to insure a seat, according to Kenneth Sams, Hedley Superintendent of Schools, who is expecting a sell-out crowd.

The probable starting line-up for Coach Lawrence Overcast's Bulldogs will be Harry Cannon, 5'11" cannonball who is averaging 20 points per game; Roy Holloway, the little 5'8" speed demon who is currently racking up 18 points per game; Claude Maldonado, a steady, consistent boy who stands 6'3" and is scoring 17 points per game; big and formidable 6'7" Tom Byrd who is currently shooting 12.6 per game; and either Mike Barerra, 6'4" with 13 point average or Rick Vidaurri, 6'5" with a 12 point average.

The starting Aggie line-up will be Sammy Hill, 6'8" (a prep All American) who is shooting 25 points; Bill Bullock, 6'2" with a 19 point average; Joe Hayes, 6'3" with a 13 point average; Roger Harper, 5'9" averaging 12 points; and either Mo Savage, 6'9" with 10 points or Terry Colson, 6'7" with 10 points.

FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

We hope to have the opportunity to visit each of you during the sign-up period, February 6 thru March 3. The few changes in the 1967 program need to be discussed and understood by those participating. We are here to assist you with the farm programs administered by the County Committee. Please feel free to call on us at any time.

CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM — No additional information has been received on this program. Applicants will be notified individually as soon as information is received.

Producers with CAP applications pending may want to consider filing a request to participate in the annual cotton, feed grain and/or wheat programs. These requests can be withdrawn should the CAP application be approved. You will not be able to sign up the annual programs after March 3 if the CAP agreement cannot be approved.

1967 WHEAT PROGRAMS

No diverted acres will be required under the 1967 wheat program. However, it will be necessary for you to sign up in order to draw your certificate payments based on 35% of the allotment. This payment for 1966 was \$1.32 per bushel and should be about the same for 1967. You will also need to comply with cross compliance and other provisions of the program.

Funeral services were held in the Memphis Church of Christ Saturday afternoon, February 4, for E. F. Lemons, 78, father of Mrs. Herman Cross of Clarendon. Tom Anderson, minister, officiated. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

Mr. Lemons died Thursday at Vivian's Rest Home in Amarillo where he had been a patient for the past nine months. A retired farmer and service station operator, Mr. Lemons was born April 24, 1888 in Rock Hill, S. C. He came to Texas in 1890 and to Brice in 1912. He married Vernon Reed February 21, 1914 at Clarendon. She preceded him in death September 18, 1963. The family moved to Lakeview in 1935 and to Memphis in 1946. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Surviving other than Mrs. Cross are sons: Scott of Costa Mesa, Calif., M. H. (Bud) of Amarillo, and Zeno of Memphis; sisters, Mrs. Iva Womack of Lubbock, Mrs. Belle Bolton of Hamilton; ten grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Courage is a good cure for cold feet, and getting busy will warm

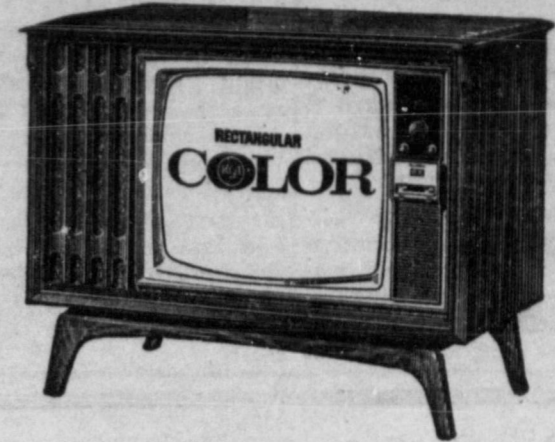

### NEWS FROM

#### Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

The office has been very busy since my last report. I introduced two pieces of legislation on January 26 and have been preparing other bills for introduction in the near future.

My House Joint Resolution 224 proposes an amendment to our Constitution which would put the American people on record in favor of allowing prayer in schools and other public buildings. Contrary to the belief of many people the Supreme Court decision of several years ago did not outlaw prayer in schools. The justices stated that school officials could not give the students a prepared prayer to recite.

As I stated in my last newsletter, however, I will fight for passage of this amendment to make sure that some future court does not prohibit it all prayer in public buildings.

The other resolution was introduced in connection with my assignment to the House Agriculture Committee on January 25. House Concurrent Resolution 105, "expresses the sense of Congress that in the public interest the administration should (1) cease and desist in its efforts to enforce selective economic discrimination against American farmers and ranchers by deliberately depressing farm prices, and (2) use the various legislative authorities

at its disposal to improve and enhance farm prices."

In regard to my appointment to the Agriculture Committee, I have requested assignment to three subcommittees. The subcommittee on Livestock and Grain, which handles legislation involving meat production and wheat, maize, and soybeans, was my first choice.

My other choices included: Cotton, which is a major crop in the 18th District. There are more than 600,000 bales annually produced in our area. My other choice is Conservation and Credit which involves small watershed programs as well as dealing with Farmers Home Administration and Federal Land Bank problems.

I will be announcing the members of my advisory committee on agriculture in the near future. I expect to have about 60 Panhandle farmers, ranchers, and businessmen on several committees.

I have received numerous letters in regard to the war in Viet Nam and the United Nations economic sanctions against Rhodesia.

I am still in favor of blockading the Port of Haiphong and industrial plants in North Viet Nam in order to bring this conflict to a speedy and successful conclusion. Also, I am opposed to the United States' honoring any economic sanctions against Rhodesia as long as our so-called allies continue to trade with North Viet Nam.

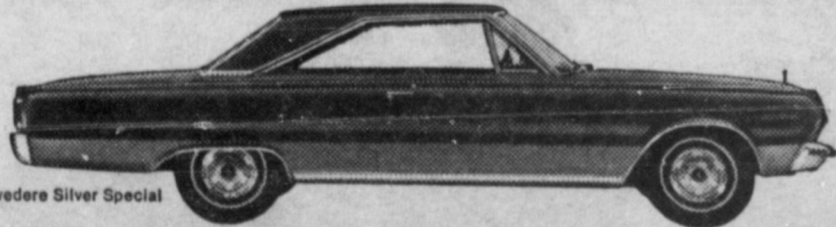

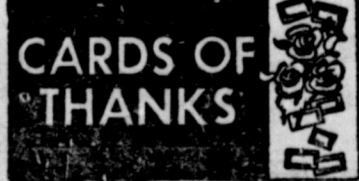
JAYCEES ELECT DIRECTORS THIS WEEK

## May Treat Birth Defects in Womb, March of Dimes Leaders Are Told

Progress during 1966 in diagnosing and treating the medical problems of babies before they are even born raised doctors' hopes for the prevention of many birth defects in the future.

"The womb is not the safe, secure haven psychiatrists would have us believe," says Dr. Jerold Lucey, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Vermont College of Medicine.

Dr. Lucey, in reporting research progress to a recent meeting of National Foundation-March of Dimes volunteer leaders in the fight against birth defects, said:

"Obviously, hazards exist within the womb—otherwise we would not have 250,000 babies born with birth defects each year in the United States.

"It is a myth that we cannot study babies still in the womb," he says. "It is possible—and indeed, is already being done in some medical centers—to diagnose and treat some conditions of unborn babies. This can be done without prohibitive risks to either mother or child."

Dr. Lucey, who specializes in fetology, the study of the unborn infant, believes that increasing research will reveal many now-unknown facts about what is normal and what is abnormal in the environment of a baby during the nine months before birth.

Detection of some birth defects in the early months of pregnancy was described to March of Dimes volunteers by Dr. M. Neil Macintyre, associate professor of anatomy at Western Reserve University School of Medicine, Cleveland, Ohio. He said doctors are now able to test a mother's amniotic fluid, the liquid contained in the so-called "bag of waters" surrounding the unborn baby.

In this fluid are cells shed by the fetus. From cell cultures, scientists can study the infant's chromosomes—the tiny bundles of hereditary material in the cells of all living things. When abnormalities are detected in the chromosomes, diagnosis of certain defects such as mongolism is possible.

However, this technique is not yet entirely safe and should be used only under special circumstances," Dr. Macintyre pointed out. Such a circumstance might be when a family history arouses suspicion of a hereditary condition.



Using a microphoto enlargement, technicians point out chromosomal irregularities which are often associated with serious birth defects. The accompanying story tells how this procedure can be used to detect some birth defects in early months of pregnancy.

As an example of successful treatment of a condition known before birth, Dr. Lucey cited techniques which are saving many "Rh babies." Rh blood incompatibility between mother and child can cause a form of anemia which may be fatal or can cause serious mental or physical defects. A few years ago more than 2,000 babies were lost annually because of an Rh condition.

Today, when Rh problems are detected before birth, doctors can often give life-saving blood transfusions directly to the fetus through the mother's abdomen. Dr. Lucey estimates that approximately 80 to 90 per cent of the infants who would have died because of this one condition can now be saved.

Physicians believe that the time will come when those practicing fetal medicine will be able to treat many other dangerous conditions. In the near future a doctor may, for example, give

an unborn baby digitalis to strengthen a weak heartbeat.

When it is discovered that an unborn baby has an infection, it may be possible to identify the cause and treat it. Fetologists are already seriously studying the potentials of fetal surgery whereby specialists operate directly on the unborn child to correct a serious condition, then return it to the womb to await natural birth. This has been done successfully with animals for several years.

In many ways, the problems of birth defects have been likened to the problems of penetrating outer space. What seemed "way out" 10 years ago now seems very possible within the next decade. Through research such as that supported by The National Foundation—March of Dimes, scientists feel it may be possible to solve many problems of birth defects which now strike one American baby in 16.

**Bulldogs Take Win Over Amarillo**

The Bulldogs continued their winning streak when they upset Amarillo College, the top team in the conference, last Thursday night 97-89. It was a good game, but not our best one. The Bulldogs shot poorly, their defense and board play were only good, but their floor play was excellent. The boys are getting balanced scoring now, which is what we've been trying for. We are placing five boys in two digit scoring, which keeps the pressure off any one man, stated Coach Overcast.

The Bulldogs are showing continued improvement and beginning to reflect the scoring potential of isolation offense. We have gone from a fast offense to a slow deliberate one which has netted us an average of 100 points per game for the last three games, the Coach stated.

In the Amarillo game, Cannon and Holoway each scored 25 points. Vidaurri scored 23, Barrera 13, and Byrd scored 9 points. Outstanding players in every area were Holloway, Cannon, Barrera, and Vidaurri.

"Sickening" is the word for the Odessa game Saturday night. We were all sick over the outcome and the 93-89 score. Despite the fact that this year's Wranglers are the best boys whom Coach McCullough has fielded in his sixteen years at Odessa, we were in the process of blowing them off the floor on several occasions.

The fact that they finally took us could be expected, since they have beaten people with whom we couldn't even stay in the gym. But it was still a bitter defeat, Overcast added.

An overtime game can hardly be called a defeat, since we had them tied when the initial period of play ended. This would indicate that our game was evenly matched with theirs. But the score book cannot show a tie in basketball. Someone has to lose.

The game Saturday night was a hard one to evaluate. The boys were not hitting as well as they have in the past. Losing our post man was disastrous. Byrd only played about ten minutes of the

entire period. Probably the biggest hurdle for the boys was the psychological and physical strain of three top games in one week. This is a difficult feat for a seasoned team, Coach Overcast concluded.

Vidaurri was high scorer with 29 points. Cannon was second with 18 and Byrd was third with 12.

Three more home games will be played before the Bulldogs hit the road again for our final contests: Cameron at Hedley on Thursday; Howard County in Bulldog Fieldhouse on Saturday, and Lubbock Christian College at Clarendon on Monday.

Our poor performance continued with the game at Tishomingo when we played Murray State, a non-conference game, Monday night. We were ahead one point at the halftime but closed with a 92-76 loss. Our defense was not functioning well enough to hold them.

The only bright spot in the picture was Harry Cannon's outstanding game. He shot 38 points, half our total score, to break all previous school records for an individual performance.

**County School Supt. Reports Truancy Problem Here**

It has been called to the attention of the County School Superintendent that we are having a truancy problem with a few children. It is his feeling that if students and parents understood the seriousness of unexcused absence that there would be a greater effort made in the home to take care of this problem.

Texas has a Compulsory School Attendance Law that requires all children to attend school until they are seventeen. There are exceptions for health and mental reason, but any excuse must be cleared with the child's Principal or an order from the County Judge. PARENTS CANNOT EXCUSE A CHILD FROM SCHOOL.

It is the parent's duty to write an explanation to the Principal and the Principal's responsibility to determine if it is an acceptable excuse, County Supt. Maurice Risley stated.

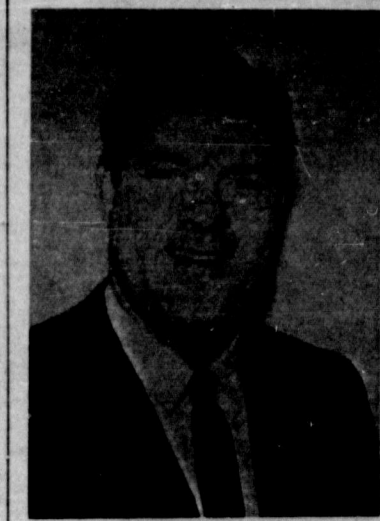
Violation of this law can result in the parents being fined in County Court five to twenty-five dollars per day or in the child being declared an habitual truant by the Court and being placed in a State Juvenile Training School, Risley added.

Pupils who persistently violate school rules and regulations of the school or persistently misbehave can also be reported to the attendance officer who will proceed against the pupil in County Court the same as he would a truant. The Compulsory School Attendance Law does not deprive local authorities power to suspend pupils for persistent violation of school rules.

There is also a Federal Child Labor Law that is very strict and makes anyone who employs a child, under age sixteen during regular school hours, subject to a stiff fine.

If this is not clear to anyone, come by the County School Superintendent's Office and we will be glad to show it to you in the Handbook of Texas School Law, stated Risley.
