May Treat Birth Defects in Womb, March of Dimes Leaders Are Told

Progress during 1966 in diagnosing and treating the medical problems of babies before they are even born raised doctors' hopes for the prevention of many birth defects in the future.

"The womb is not the safe, secure haven psychiatrists would have us believe," says Dr. Jerold Lucey, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Vermont College of Medicine. Dr. Lucey, in reporting re-search progress to a recent meet-ing of National Foundation-March of Dimes volunteer leaders in the fight against birth defects, said:


