Mrs. Richards is a niece of Mrs. Mary Dozier of Clarendon.

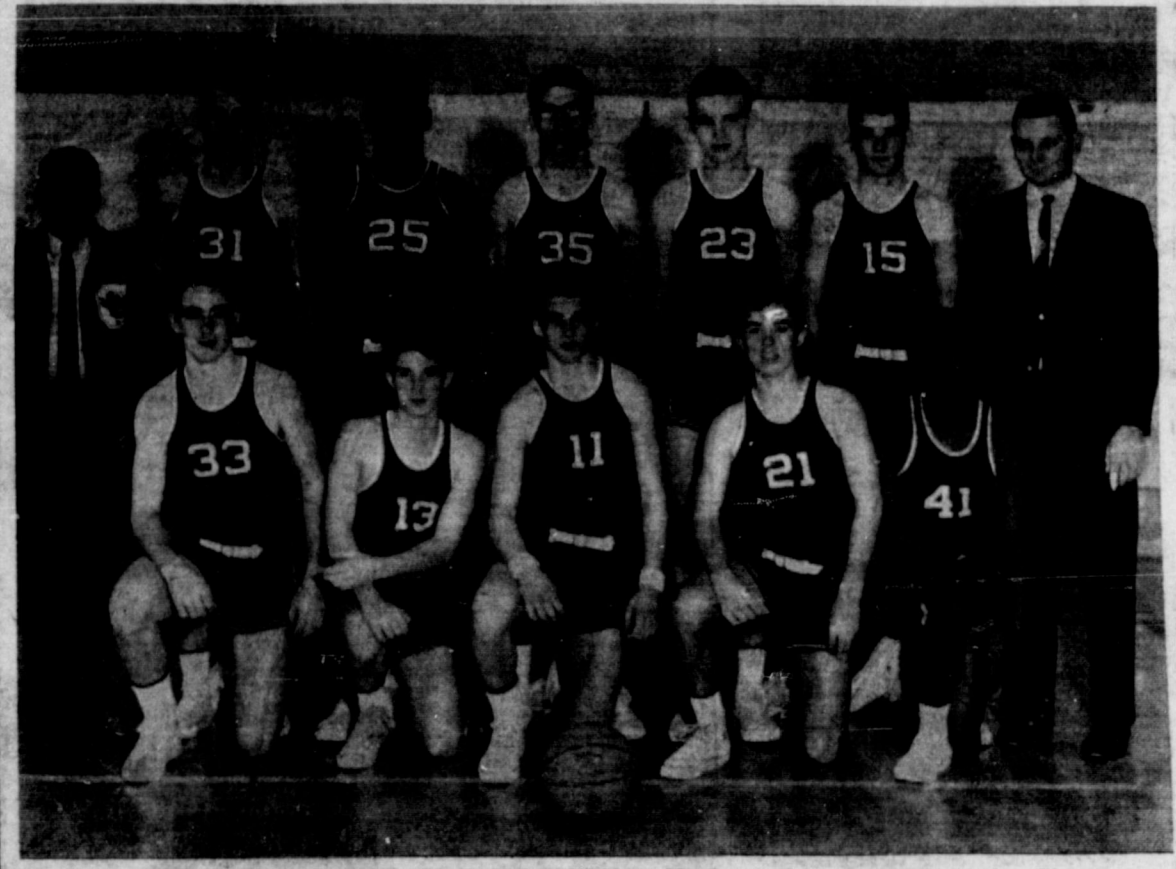
FORMER STUDENT RECEIVES HONOR AT A&M

Peoples Natural Gas Open House Feb. 25

An open house for all Rolling Plains irrigation farmers and interested friends will be held Saturday, February 25th at the new Clarendon offices of Peoples Natural Gas, 113 W. 3rd. Free coffee and donuts will be served between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Peoples Natural, a division of Northern Natural Gas Company of Omaha, Nebraska, recently purchased a distribution system from Rimrock Gas Company. The purchase serves natural gas fuel to 27 irrigation wells in Northern Donley County.

Peoples' new full-time field man and office manager in Clarendon is Harold Autry, formerly of Tulla, Autry, and other Peoples representatives will be on hand during the open house to meet with farmers from the Rolling Plains irrigation district around Clarendon.

Peoples will begin construction February 27th of an additional natural gas distribution system to serve irrigation wells in Armstrong, Briscoe, Childress, Donley and Hall Counties, if a minimum number of wells are signed before that date.

The company is providing well-side gas with construction, line leakage and maintenance costs included in the cost of the gas.

Expansion plans for the Rimrock purchase include additional capacity to serve another 325 wells in Briscoe, Donley and Hall Counties.

CHANGE IN 1967 WHEAT

Any acreage of wheat grazed after May 1 will be considered wheat. This is a change that could affect your cattle grazing program.

SUBSTITUTION

The substitution provision is the same for 1967 as it was for 1966. Wheat may be substituted for feed grains or feed grains for wheat if you sign up for both programs.

WHEAT CERTIFICATION

Individual aerial photoprints will be mailed soon to all wheat producers. These prints will be identical to the ones used last year and will be for your use in measuring and certifying the acreages on your farm. We will accept your report of acreages at any time before May 1.

SIGNUP DATE EXTENDED

The signup date for the 1967 cotton, feed grain and wheat annual programs has been extended until March 17. The final date to release extra cotton or to request extra cotton is still March 3rd.

MEASUREMENT SERVICES

The measurement service for wheat is available. The staking service for cotton, feed grain, and diverted acreages is also available. Charges for these services will vary for individual farms, so if you're interested, come in and talk with us.

CATTLE KILLED IN TRUCK MISHAP SAT.

Sixteen head of cattle were killed about 6 o'clock Saturday evening when the truck in which they were being transported overturned on U. S. Highway 287 some six miles west of Clarendon. Curtis N. Messer Jr. of Austin was driver of the truck. He was treated for a cut head and released from Adair Hospital.

The truck carried 54 head of cattle. Highway Patrolman C. W. Vaughn of Clarendon, who investigated the accident, reported the truck overturned after either blowing a tire or losing a front wheel. The truck was owned by Capital Cattle Trucks, Inc. and was a complete loss.

Mac McClellan was high for Clarendon and the game tipping the basket for 50 points. Archie Smith racked up 15, Larnce Gardner hit 17, and Irvin Mears scored 12. High point man for Wheeler was Donald Reeves with 13.

All of the boys did a fine job. They worked the boards well, exerted good team effort and the coach was especially pleased with their fine defense, a new tactic which they had not used in previous games.

The game with Gruver for Bi-District which was played at Borger Tuesday night was a thriller to the very end of the game and the tally of 58-53 recorded. Clarendon took the lead early in the first quarter and held a 10 point margin throughout most of the first half. After the halftime period Gruver came back to tie the game several times. The Clarendon team did a fine job defensively. Several key steals of the ball by Mac McClellan came at opportune times. From the rebounds started Clarendon took Gruver 2 to 1 and controlled the ball much of the time.

The scoring record showed Archie Smith with 18 points, Larnce Gardner with 15, Everett Monroe with 11, and Irvin Mears with 10. Ronnie Laxton paced the scoring for Gruver with 18 points.

Though the first Saturday game at Lubbock will be at an early hour many Clarendon fans are planning to be there. We have a fine, well-coached team. The boys play a clean, fast game. The team and Coach Irlbeck can expect a solid backing all the way. Both Clarendon and Wheeler had good representation at the game Friday night. An even greater number of local fans were on hand to cheer the Bronchos to victory at Borger. Gruver was equally well represented at Borger to back their fine team. Both cheering sections were filled to capacity.

Congratulations to both the Clarendon team and their coach, Carl Irlbeck.

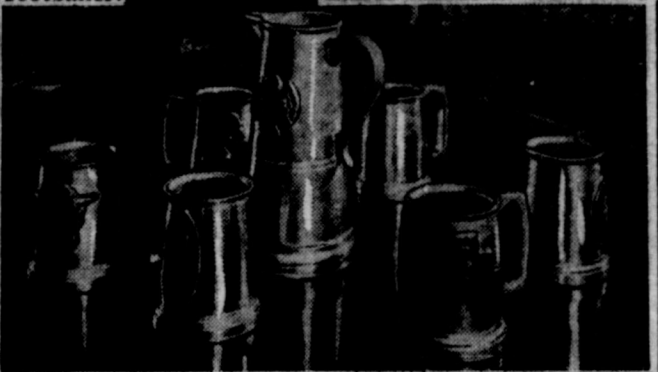

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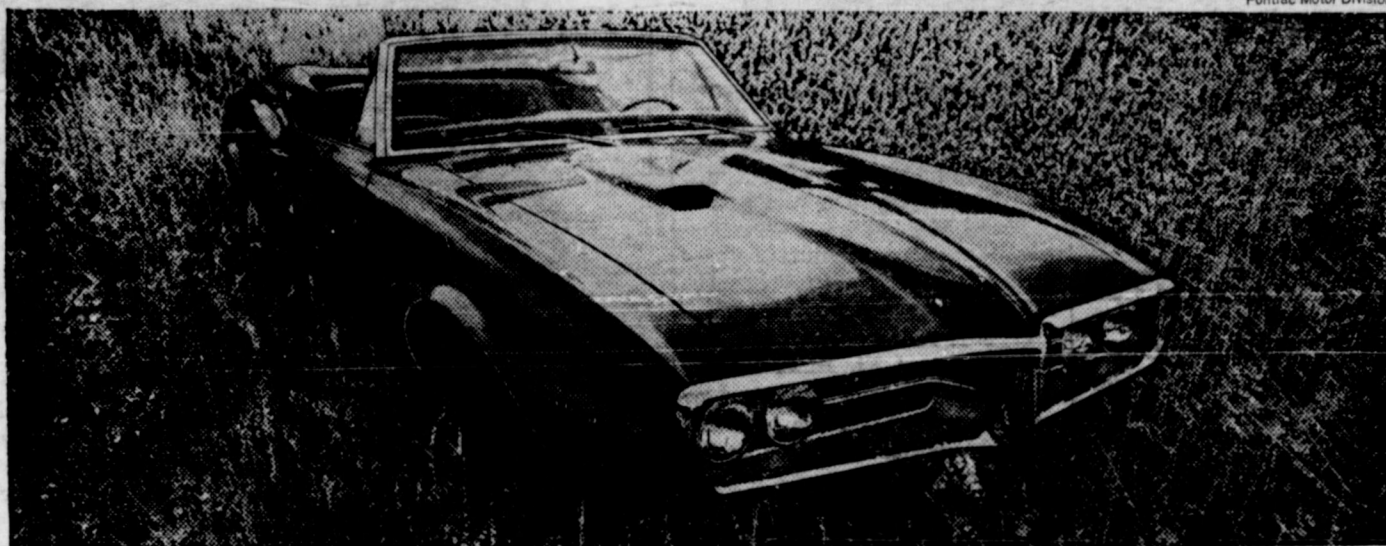
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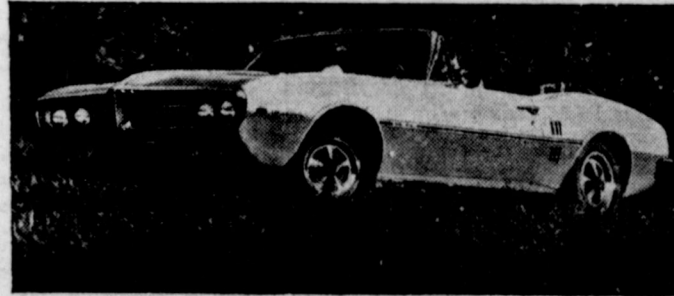

Congressman

18th District, Texas

On February 7 the House of Representatives approved the President's request for an increase of the national debt limit to 336 billion dollars. Also, on that day I introduced my fourth bill of the session. These two items go hand in hand.

I voted against the bill to raise the debt ceiling because of my belief that the time is long overdue for this government to stop its deficit spending.

The bill I introduced in House Resolution 5093 to repeal the Participation Sales Act of 1966. This act, passed during the last session

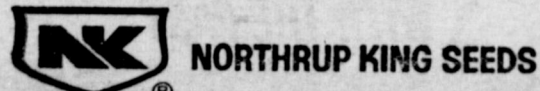
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of Congress allows the government to sale certain financial assets at exorbitant interest rates. Under the participation sales procedure, however, the Congressional appropriations process is eliminated. As a result, the money spent does not show in the formal budget as expenditures, nor are the obligations counted in the national debt, which the House voted to raise the limit on.

With the majority of members in the House, Democrats defeated an attempt to require that Participation Certificate's (P. C.'s) be counted as part of the national debt. As I stated at the time: "If this Administration is going to spend the American people into bankruptcy they should at least know what is happening."

The President felt it necessary to sale these P. C.'s because the current high interest rates hampered the sale of regular long-term government securities. The maximum interest rate the government can pay on these securities is 4.25 percent. Rather than be known as a high-interest Administration, however, and ask Congress to raise the maximum interest on these long-term bonds, President Johnson resorted

to the trickery of P.C.'s and cost the American taxpayer an un-called for 1.5 billion dollars of interest.

In a speech on February 13 I suggested a way to cutback on deficit spending and stabilize our economy. This would require the holding of non-defense expenditures for the remainder of Fiscal Year 1967 and all of 1968 to the 1966 level. If such an effort were undertaken it is reasonable to expect that three billion dollars could be saved in the remaining months of 1967 fiscal year which ends in June. Combined with the proposed increase of 7.3 billion dollars for 1968 ten billion dollars could be saved.

At the present rate, the interest on the national debt in the next 23½ years will be an amount equal to the total debt, yet, we would still owe every dime of the principal.

On the better side of the ledger for the week I received two top choices for subcommittees on the House Agriculture Committee. Membership on the Livestock and Grains Subcommittee means I will be dealing with legislation concerning livestock, wheat, maize, and other feed grains. This

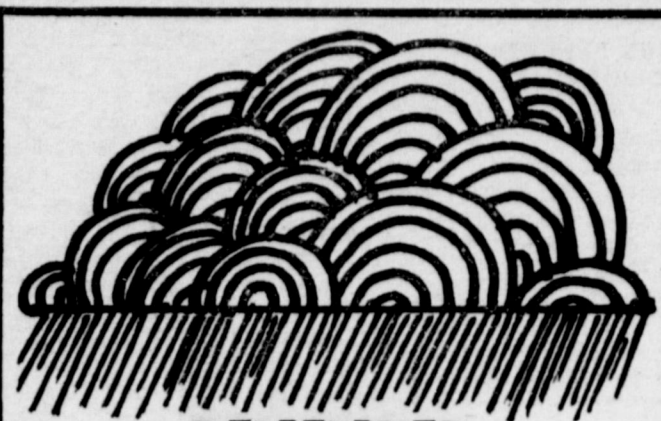
combined with my duties as a member of the Cotton Subcommittee means I will be dealing directly with a majority of the legislation affecting our Pan-handle agricultural interests.

My third subcommittee is Departmental Oversight. With other members of his group I will be

trying to determine if the Department of Agriculture is administering the laws as Congress intended.

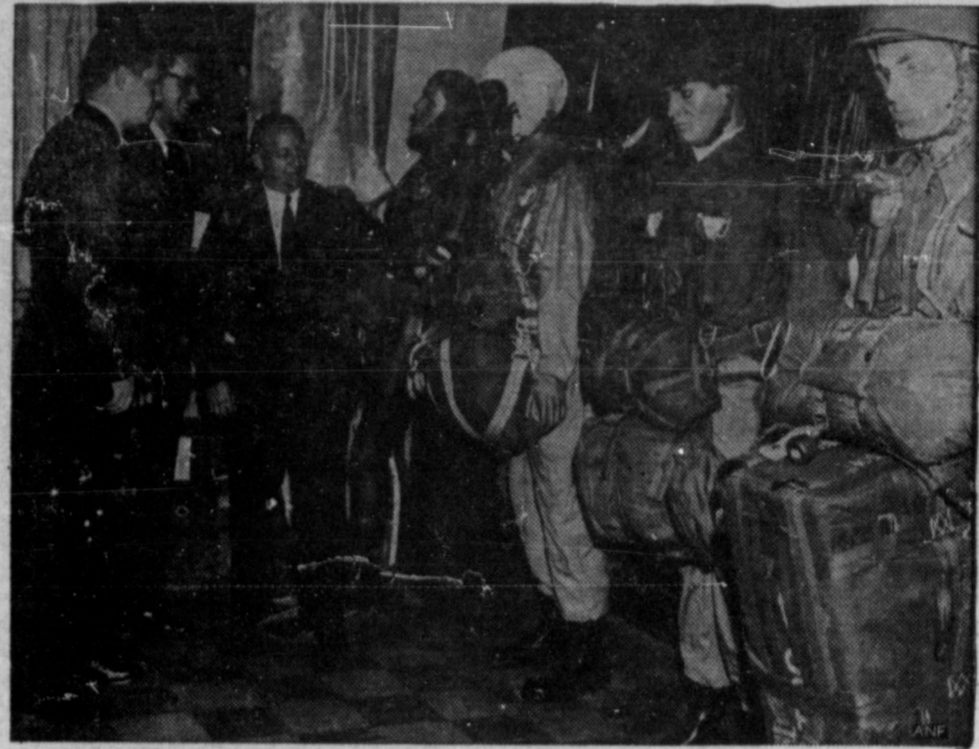

SCS Explains The GPC Program

There have been numerous articles written about the Plains Conservation since its beginning in many people still ask, "is this program?"

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a program operated by the Soil Conservation Service to help Farmers apply needed practices on their land. Conservation Service both technical and financial assistance according to Dorman B. Claerndon office. The assistance consists of 50-80% of the cost of needed practices. Some practices are range seed control, cross fences, wind lines and troughs for tanks, diversions, terraced waterways, and other.

Many people are taking advantage of the program. The Soil Conservation Service pays 80% of the cost. The Donley County Conservation District has drills available for farmers to use for 50¢. Ronald Gooch, County 4-H boys are making these drills. Anyone who uses a grass drill should contact Ronald Gooch.

The reason for this program is to speed up the rate of these practices. This help is available on 11 states. Only half of Texas is eligible for assistance. There are 9 and ranchers in Donley participating in the Great Plains Conservation at this time.

SCS Explains The GPC Program

There have been numerous articles written about the Great Plains Conservation Program since its beginning in 1957. Yet, many people still ask, "Just what is this program?"

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a program administered by the Soil Conservation Service to help Farmers and Ranchers apply needed conservation practices on their land. The Soil Conservation Service provides both technical and financial help according to Dorman Bush of the Clarendon office. The financial assistance consists of paying from 50-80% of the cost of applying need practices. Some of these practices are range seeding, brush control, cross fences, wells, pipelines and troughs for livestock, tanks, diversions, terraces, grassed waterways, and others.

Many people are taking advantage of the program to seed rangeland and old fields back to grass. The Soil Conservation Service pays 80% of the cost of this. The Donley County Soil Conservation District has some grass drills available for farmers and ranchers to use for 50¢ per acre. Ronald Gooch, County Agent, and the 4-H boys are maintaining these drills. Anyone needing to use a grass drill should contact Ronald Gooch.

The reason for this payment is to speed up the rate of applying these practices. This high rate of payment is available only in parts of 11 states. Only the western half of Texas is eligible for this assistance. There are 90 farmers and ranchers in Donley County participating in the Great Plains Conservation at this time.

L. Duane Bartee, Area Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Pampa, Texas, has been promoted to Assistant State Conservationist for the state of New Mexico. He is to assume his new duties in Albuquerque on March 27, 1967. Bartee has been Area Conservationist for the Pampa area, which includes Clarendon, since 1958.

FIVE RURAL ACCIDENTS IN DONLEY COUNTY IN JAN.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of January, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,930.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months 130,000 or 33% of the approximately 700,000 registered vehicles in this region have been

inspected. This leaves 470,000 vehicles to be inspected between now and the April 15 deadline. If this number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 700 official inspection stations in this region, each would have approximately 672 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or about 17 vehicles per day. The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average to inspect. In areas where there are only a few inspection stations you may have many miles to travel to get your vehicle inspected.

The Sergeant urges motorists

to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines.

Remember—no extension of the safety inspection deadline, April 15, 1967.

Mother of March of Dimes Patient Teaches Child Braille as Precaution

"When the doctors told me my daughter was probably going blind, I determined to learn Braille and be her teacher. I wanted to cushion the shock of knowing she might lose her sight, and to try to share the experience with her."

Speaking is Mrs. Mary A. Fennell of Archer, Fla., mother of five-year-old Lucille, who has congenital glaucoma (hardening of the eyeballs). The attractive blonde and blue-eyed child is also the victim of another birth defect which consists of malformations of the lymph vessels throughout her body.

"I've been warned," Lucille's mother explains, "that if I make a mistake in her diet—such as using the wrong kind of flour in my pies—Lucille won't be with us very long."

Mrs. Fennell told of her efforts to learn Braille, and why, at the Birth Defects Center at the University of Florida School of Medicine at Gainesville. The Center is one of 77 supported by the March of Dimes across the nation.

At the suggestion of the Florida State Council for the Blind, Mrs. Fennell wrote to the Library of Congress for a book of Braille and teaching instructions. (Available at no cost for anyone declared legally blind.)

"I thought that was all there was to it," Mrs. Fennell says. "I figured I'd just do a little studying and soon I'd be teaching Lucille how to spell by 'feeling' the raised dots. How mistaken I was!"

A person who has normal sight encounters far more difficulty learning Braille than the non-sighted. The reason is that the sighted individual relies on the faculty of sight rather than that of touch.

Lucille will not wrestle with

anywhere near as much of a Braille problem as does her mother. The child's print vision is limited to letters one inch high, so that she will never read book and newspaper type and be confused by memories and associations of the printed letter or word.

Mrs. Fennell is helping Lucille memorize the "feel" of a few letters of the alphabet in raised-dot language, and to recognize how the "feel" sounds when spoken. Mother and child make a game of it. School authorities were so impressed with the child's progress that they permitted Lucille to enter regular kindergarten.

When she enters first grade and moves into a textbook-oriented world, such classic readers as "Dick and Jane" will be unintelligible to her in

conventional type. But her mother will translate such books onto sheets of "raised pinpricks," using a special Braille typewriter.

At the March of Dimes-supported Birth Defects Center, to which Lucille is taken for check-ups every few months, the specialists avoid an unqualified prediction. But if pressure against her optic nerves increases, total blindness is almost certain to result.

Understandably, this is the kind of tragedy that many fathers and mothers find intolerable to face. But Mary Fennell is facing it, the doctors say, courageously and with intelligent compassion. They wish more parents, in similar unhappy circumstances, could summon the same fortitude and sense of realism.

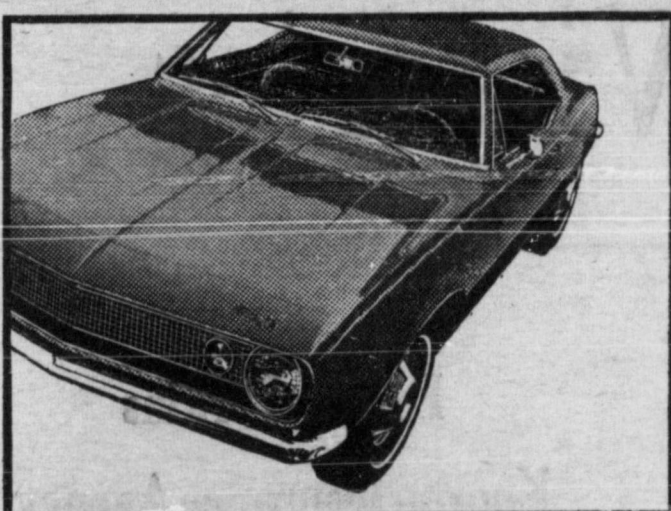

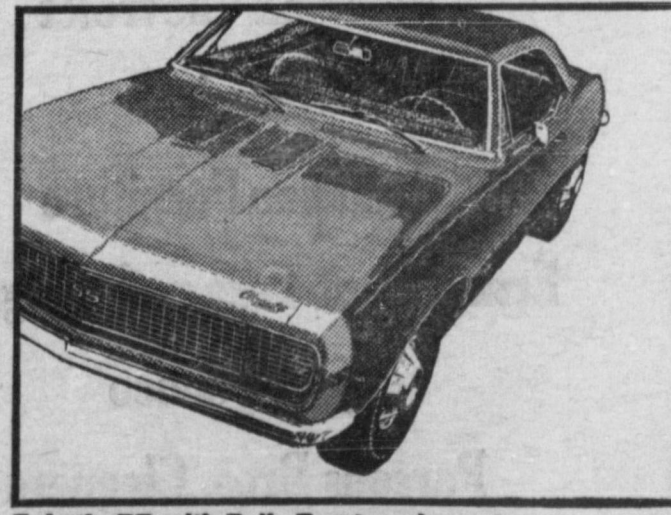
