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

The County Treasurer occupies an important role in the fiscal operations of the county government. An elected county treasurer is required to qualify for office by posting a security bond in the amount determined by the Commissioners Court guaranteeing faithful performance of duties. Each County Treasurer must be certified for competency at least once in a 24 month period. The County Treasurer as chief custodian

of county finance, shall receive all monies belonging to the county from whatever source derived; keep an account for the same in a designated depository; pay and apply all disbursements the same, in such a manner as the Commissioners Court may direct. The Treasurer makes all payroll, files quarterly state tax reports, files all state and federal reports.

This is not, by any means, the Treasurers only duties. There is a 21 page duty manual the treasurer must be capable of performing each of the required tasks.

The Howells have five children and eight grandchildren. Three of their children live in Donley County.



Sales tax receipts increase

State Comptroleir Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$53.2 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one percent sales tax. "Statewide payments are up 3 percent over last January's checks. However, a short holiday shopping period since Thanksgiving and an early cut off in processing tax returns may account for some cities showing lower payments," Bullock said.

January checks represent taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to Bullock by December

The city of Clarendon received \$4,587.45 for this period. This was up from \$4,075.93 last year. This gave Clarendon a 12.55 percent increase. Neither Hedley or Howardwick sent in their sales tax report.

Collingsworth County had a decline of 28.69 percent. Armstrong County reported a 21.50 percent increase. Hall County received a 39.33 percent decline. The city of Memphis was down 47.57 over the same period last year.

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



Gns report increase in cotton ginned

Thehree Donley County gins have reportd they have ginned 13,804 bales f cotton as of the second week in Japary of the 1985 cotton crop. This ompares to about 10,000 bales they inned about the same period of last yar. They are still expecting 2,500 o 3,000 bales to be ginned in the ext two weeks before the ginnig will be finished for this year.

Asa whole, the cotton crop has beenmuch better than it was last year Some dryland farmers around the bunty have averaged one-half bale er acre or more, while irrigated cotto has made up to a bale.

Tere have been reports of dryland farrers making as much as a bale to two ales per acre in the Quail and

Weington area. le Farmers Coop Gin reported the have ginned 4,900 bales so far thisyear and the same period last yes, they had only ginned 2,800 bals. They estimate they will have as nuch as 1,200 bales left to be

ginned this season.

Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake estimated they will gin some 7,000 bales this year. They have already ginned 5,870 bales and this compares to only 4,700 for the same period last

West Texas Gin in Hedley has ginned 3,034 bales so far this year. This compares to only 2,800 bales last year for the same period. They expect they will gin 3,500 bales before they are finished with the

All three gins report they are stacked up in the yards and expect by the end of the week most of the farmers will be finished with their 1985 cotton crop.

The price this year has been averaging between 42 and 50 cents per pound. They also report there is very little market for this years crop, and most of the cotton will be going into the government loan.
