Nathan, a member of Clarendon Troop 433, has completed a year of work, study, and service to the church. He has been faithful in attendance, cheerful in service and diligent in required studies.

God and Country is a program of the church. Many organized bodies of the church were represented in designing and testing this program. The church, with its concern for youth, finds aims and purposes which are consistent with its own in many youth-serving agencies. Through the God and Country program, the church offers a series of religious studies designed to help youth grow spiritually with guidance from their own parents, religious teachers, and religious leaders. These studies are adaptable to meet local, regional, and denominational needs. However, the program is of such significance that it is recognized by several national youth-serving agencies as being worthy of recognition and merit. Each of the three units of study composing the total God and Country program has been written by persons with experience in religious education, reviewed by others representing many stances within the Christian faith, and field-tested in a variety of situations.

A conscious effort has been made to develop each unit of the program without a theological bias; yet each program is designed to permit the

introduction of particular theological and denominational viewpoints in the material being studied. It is the task of the counselor to provide this input wherever it is needed.

Educationally, God and Country is built on the premise that young persons need to grow in their understanding of what Christians believe; to see how others have translated belief into action; and to discover how they may translate their own beliefs into action in the home, in the local church, and in the world. The objective is to fill those needs. In addition, each unit strives to provide materials which can be mastered by each learner at his own level.

God and Country is a supplement to the regular religious education program of the church offering a plan of concentrated study and action centering on the discovery of self in relation to God's seeking to relate the learner's life in action involving others as an expression of faith.

February 3 last day to file for county offices

The filing date for candidates to file for one of the seven county offices is drawing near. February 3 is the last day to file for one of the offices slated for the Democratic Primary Election May 3, 1986.

The positions of Commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, as well as County Clerk, Justice of the Peace in Precincts 2 and 4, County Treasurer and County Judge will be up for election. Incumbents Will Chamberlain of Precinct 4 and C.W. (Dude) Cornell, Precinct 2, have filed again for their precincts.

P.C. Messer, who has been County Clerk since January 1, 1955, will not be filing for another term. He will be retiring at the end of his term, which will be December 31, 1986. His co-worker Hazel Guy who has worked

in the County Clerks office since February 1955 also will be retiring at the end of the year. Denise Grady and Lisa Winsor have filed for the County Clerks office. Incumbent Freida Gray has filed for the County Treasurers office, while incumbent W.R. (Billie) Christal and Mrs. Dikki Howell have filed for the County Judge position.

Incumbent M.O. Weatherly, Precinct 4, and Incumbent W.W. (Bud) Lovelady, Precinct 2, have filed for Justice of the Peace of their precincts.

Anyone wishing to run for one of these seven offices should go to the County Clerks office to register then go see Democratic Chairman Billy Ray Johnston at the medical Center and pay their filing fees.

The Clarendon School Board will have three trustees terms expiring. They will be Darrell Leffew, Donald White, and James A. McAnear, Jr.

The City of Howardwick has four places up for election. Positions to be filled are 3-2 year terms for aldermen and 1-1 year term for alderman.

The City of Hedley will be electing a mayor, a position now held by Jon Leggett. Three councilmen's terms will expire. They are C.R. DeBord, V.C. Waddell and Murrell Whitaker. No filing fees are required for any of the city, school, college or hospital boards.

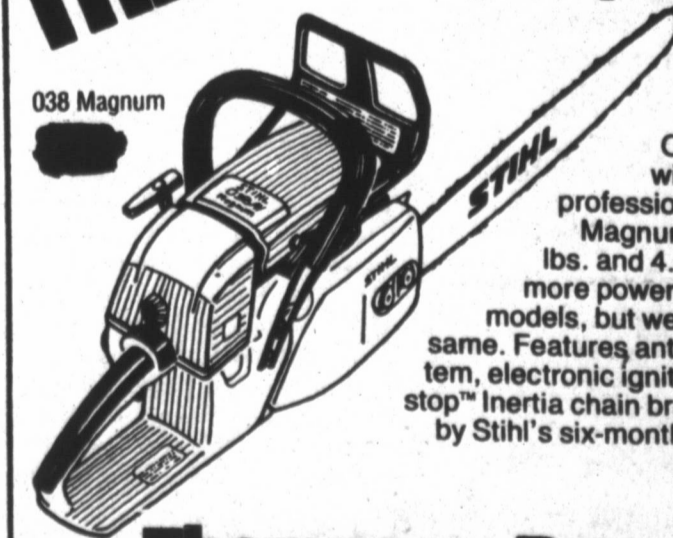

Chamber giving away Sesquicentennial Carbine

The Clarendon Donley County Chamber of Commerce will be taking \$1.00 donations on this Texas Sesquicentennial Winchester Carbine. The carbine is to be given away May 22, 1986 when the Texas Wagon Train arrives in Clarendon. You do not have to be present to win. The carbine is presently on display in the lobby of the First Bank & Trust of Clarendon. Please go by and see this beautiful rifle. The display case was designed and handcrafted by Mike McCully, Lelia Lake, and will be given away with the gun. Donation tickets are available at the Chamber of Commerce office in The Clarendon Press building, phone 874-2421.

This Model 94 Winchester Carbine in 38-55 caliber has an 18 1/2" barrel with gold plated barrel bands and receiver. The receiver is roll engraved with scenes from Texas history and from the present with original engraving done by Genovelli of Italy, master engraver known worldwide for his unique skill. The rear-sight is patridge and the front sight is post. The Carbine style stock and fore-end are satin finished select walnut checkered with a unique spade pattern.

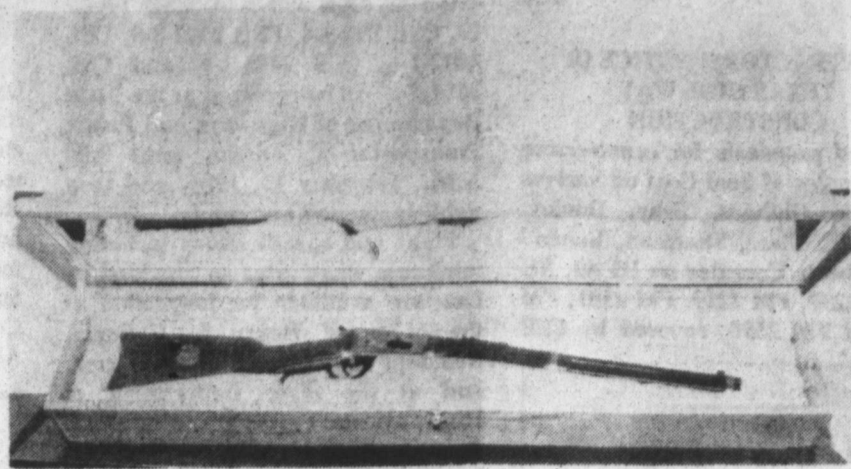
This Texas Sesquicentennial Winchester Commemorative Carbine is

the first ever made in this caliber and barrel length even though the 38-55 was one of the original 94 calibers. The gold plated medallion embedded in the butstock shows the Winchester Wagon being pulled four-up by mules and has 1836-TEXAS-1986 and SESQUICENTENNIAL outlined along with the Texas Sesquicentennial and The Texas Wagon Train logos.

Etched in gold on the barrel near the receiver is "1936-TEXAS-1986" adding to the collectability and value of this rifle.

The Texas Sesquicentennial Winchester Commemorative Carbine comes packaged in an art "sleeve" surrounding protective styrofoam. The art "sleeve" is reproduced from an original oil painting by Mr. B. Herd of Dallas, Texas and depicts events from Texas rich history and heritage.

Serial Numbers of the Texas Sesquicentennial Carbine are TEX-1 through TEX-15,000. A number of this issue have been reserved for presentation to various mayors, museums and public officials as part of the Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration. Serial Number for this carbine is TEX-1547.

Agriculture joins in food and fitness campaign

For a second year the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is sponsoring a "Food and Fitness" campaign which extends clear into Donley County.

"Some people have trouble seeing the connection between agriculture and diet and fitness," says county Extension Agent Terry Floyd.

"But health and well-being of the American public is largely determined by the nutrition provided from our agricultural products," she explains.

Without agriculture, consumers couldn't survive and without consumers, agriculture would be out of business, Floyd says.

What people choose to eat - or not to eat - has an important influence on the market for various commodities. And their food choices are often influenced by fad diets and misinformation about the nutritional value, health effects or safety of particular foods, says the home economist.

Also, the more scientists have studied nutrition and weight problems, the clearer it becomes that food is only half the story, remarks Floyd. Maintaining a healthful weight is a matter of balancing the calories you take in from food against the energy expended through exer-

cise. Floyd notes that Agriculture Secretary John Block recently announced the theme of the 1986 USDA campaign as "Food and Fitness: An Every Day Event."

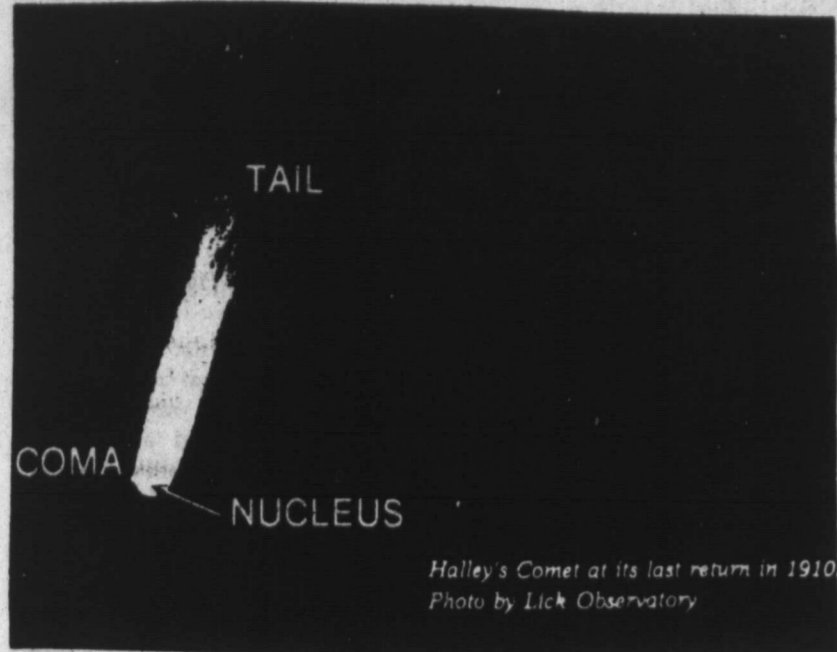

Halley's Comet can be seen until May

The patterns of the stars, such as the Big Dipper, stays the same year after year. But every once in a while something new would appear among them: a dim, fuzzy ball of light, often with a long tail. These objects were named comets, from the Latin word for "Hairy Star." When one appeared, it usually stayed visible for weeks as it moved slowly among the stars.

In ancient times, people believed comets were evil omens. Their presence in the sky caused fear and panic.

In 1682, a bright comet appeared in the sky and was seen by millions of people. A young man named Edmond Halley predicted that the same comet would return to our skies about every 76 years. Halley predicted that the comet would arrive again in the year 1758 - and it did. Therefore, the comet was named "Halley's Comet" after Edmond Halley.

Comets are great clouds of gas and dust, containing pretty much the same kind of stuff we find on earth. But in a comet, this material is very thin, much thinner than the air we breathe. Comets, in fact, are mostly empty space. There's practically nothing to them at all! The only solid part of a comet is its nucleus, a cold lump of ice, dust, and stones mixed together with some frozen gases like carbon monoxide and ammonia. The nucleus has been described as a dirty snowball. It is no more than a few miles across - the size of a flying mountain. This is tiny by astronomical standards. But the nucleus creates all the parts of a comet that we see.

Once in a while one of these dirty snowballs arrives from deep space, where it's very cold and dark. As the snowball approaches the sun, it begins to warm up. Its outer parts start to evaporate, and the resulting gas drifts away. Dust that was frozen into the snow is carried along too. As a result, the snowball becomes surrounded by a hazy cloud perhaps a hundred thousand miles across - more than 10 times the size of the earth. Sunlight makes this cloud shine, and we see it as the comet's head or coma. The tail is formed by the wind of thin gas that always blows outward from the sun and by the pressure of sunlight itself. These forces push the dust and gas away from the comet's head to form the tail, like wind-blown smoke. Most comets pass out way only once in thousands or millions of years. They swing by the sun for their few weeks of glory and then fly back out into the cold and dark, far beyond even the most distant planets. Others return again and again, coming back every few years or every few centuries. Of all such periodic comets, Halley is the brightest. The main reason Halley's Comet is so special is that it has such a long history. It's been seen for thousands of years and has left its mark on human cultures the world over. The first really clear record of it is from 240 B.C., and it has never missed on any of its 29 returns since then.

People believed Halley's Comet foretold the death of the Roman ruler Agrippa in 11 B.C., the destruction of Jerusalem in 66 A.D., and the defeat of Attila the Hun in 451. When the comet appeared in 1066, it was

regarded as an omen of the Norman invasion of England later that year. Its last appearance, in 1910, aroused enormous public interest. Unfortunately, the 1985-86 return of Halley is not once of the best. The comet will not come very close to earth this time, so it will not appear as big as in the past. And when it's brightest, in April 1986, it will be best seen from the tropics and the Southern Hemisphere. So in the United States, we'll just have to make the most of the view we've got.

If you want to view the comet, you should pick a sky that is clear! Even thin clouds will blot out such a dim, wispy thing as the comet. Don't expect much on nights around a full moon. Find a good, dark location with a wide-open view of the part of the sky you want to see. Give your eyes time to adapt to the dark.

January - The comet brightens slowly, but each night after dusk it is lower and lower in the western sky. By the end of the month, it sets before the sky becomes dark, and so it's lost to view.

February - Halley can't be seen most of this month; it's behind the sun as seen from the earth. But during the last week it reappears in the morning twilight in the east, with a bright, starlike head and possibly a long tail.

March - The view gets better at last. By the 20th, before moonlight becomes a problem, Halley should sport an excellent long tail in the southeastern sky just before the first light of dawn.

April - Halley is at its best! Toward the end of the week of April, when moonlight ceases to be a problem, the comet appears as bright as it will get. Unfortunately, it's low in the southern sky before dawn.

State to enforce litter laws

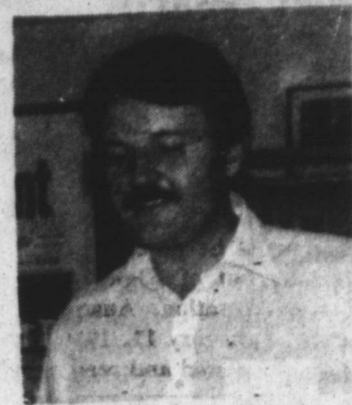
Better think twice next time you start to trash the highways.

The enforcement effort is part of the department's \$4 million antilitter "Don't Mess With Texas" campaign that was launched last fall to reduce litter along Texas highways by 20 percent. Litter cleanup cost taxpayers \$24 million in 1985.

"There is nothing more effective than to have a police officer stop you and give you a ticket," said Steffens. "We especially want to ticket persons who create illegal dump sites by the side of the highway."

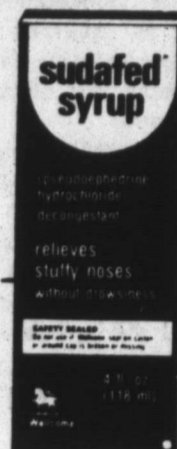
