



Social Security Questions & Answers

I got a Form SSA-1099, Social Security Benefit Statement, in the mail. What am I supposed to do with

You should use Form SSA-1099 just as you would use any other form 1099 you get from a financial institution when you prepare your federal income tax return. Keep it with your tax records. Do not return it to Social Security or send it to the

Internal Revenue Service. How can I tell if I owe any income tax on my Social Security benefits?

The first thing you should do is fill out IRS Notice 703 that came with the Social Security Benefit Statement (Form SSA-1099). The answer you get on that worksheet should tell you if you have to include any Social Security benefits in your taxable income. Then, if you need more acquainted with the newspaper as a sur plementary tool in reading edu-

Comptroller to report

interest on tax refunds

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said new Internal Revenue Service regulations will require his office to report interest payments on tax refunds

Bullock said the new IRS rules require the Comptroller to issue 1099-INT forms to any taxpayer who received more than \$600 in interest on tax refunds in 1985.

The Comptroller's office must also file a report with the IRS showing who received interest payments of more than \$600 on tax refunds.

Bullock said about 500 taxpayers will be receiving the IRS forms.

The state pays interest at a rate of 10 percent a year on the refunds. Taxpayers earn interest when a contested refund is decided in the taxpayer's favor and the refund has been held by the Comptroller's office pending a decision.

The IRS rules will require taxpayers to include the 10998 forms with returns filed for the 1985 tax year.

Bullock said that taxpayers who were paid \$600 or more in interest will recieve a report before the end of







Agriculture joins in food and fitness campaign

For a second year the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is sponsoring a "Food and Fitness" campaign which extends clear into Donley County.

"Some people have trouble seeing the connection between agriculture and diet and fitness," says county Extension Agent Terry Floyd.

"But health and well-being of the American public is largely determined by the nutrition provided from our agricultural products," she explains.

Without agriculture, consumers couldn't survive and without consumers, agriculture would be out of business, Floyd says.

What people choose to eat - or not to eat- has an important influence on the market for various commodities. And their food choices are often influenced by fad diets and misinformation about the nutritional value, health effects or safety of particular foods, says the home economist.

Also, the more scientists have studied nutrition and weight problems, the clearer it becomes that food is only half the story, remarks Floyd. Maintaining a healthful weight is a matter of balancing the calories you take in from food against the energy expended through exer-



Halley's Comet can be seen until May

The patterns of the stars, such as the Big Dipper, stays the same year after year. But every once in a while something new would appear among them: a dim, fuzzy ball of light, often with a long tail. These objects were named comets, from the Latin word for "Hairy Star." When one appeared, it usually stayed visible for weeks as it moved slowly among the

In ancient times, people believed comets were evil omens. Their presence in the sky caused fear and

In 1682, a bright comet appeared in the sky and was seen by millions of people. A young man named Edmond Halley predicted that the same comet would return to our skies about every 76 years. Halley predicted that the comet would arrive again in the year 1758 - and it did. Therefore, the comet was named "Halley's Comet" after Edmond Halley.

Comets are great clouds of gas and dust, containing pretty much the same kind of stuff we find on earth. But in a comet, this material is very thin, much thinner than the air we breathe. Comets, in fact, are mostly empty space. There's practically nothing to them at all! The only solid part of a comet is its nucleus, a cold lump of ice, dust, and stones mixed together with some frozen gases like carbon monoxide and ammonia. snowballs arrives from deep space. where it's very cold and dark. As the snowball approaches the sun, it begins to warm up. Its outer parts start to evaporate, and the resulting gas drifts away. Dust that was frozen into the snow is carried along too. As a result, the snowball becomes surrounded by a hazy cloud perhaps a hundred thousand miles across more than 10 times the size of the earth. Sunlight makes this cloud shine, and we see it as the comet's head or coma. The tail is formed by the wind of thin gas that always blows outward from the sun and by the pressure of sunlight itself. These forces push the dust and gas away from the comet's head to form the tail, like wind-blown smoke. Most comets pass out way only once in thousands or millions of years. They swing by the sun for their few weeks of glory and then fly back out into the cold and dark, far beyond even the most distant planets. Others return again and again, coming back every few years or every few centuries. Of all such periodic comets, Halley is the brightest. The main reason Halley's Comet is so special is that it has such a long history. It's been seen for thousands of years and has left its mark on human cultures the

And when it's brightest, in April 1986, it will be best seen from the tropics and the Southern Hemisphere. So in the United States. we'll just have to make the most of the view we've got.
