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

## Farm program meeting to be held at Lelia Lake

#### **FARM PROGRAM MEETING**

A county wide meeting will be held in the Lelia Lake Community Center, Friday, February 14th at 9:00 a.m. The following agencies will be represented: ASCS, SCS, Extension Service. Dr. Stephen H. Amosson, Area Extension Economist-Management representative will be there.

**1986 FARM PROGRAM** gn-up March 3 through April 11 odity Bases: [computed using planted or considered to have been planted) Wheat-the smaller of the 5 year average of the 84/85 average. Feed Grains [sorghum and corn, barley and oats] - the smaller of the combined 5 year average or the 84/85 average. Cotton - the smaller of the 5 year average or the 84/85 average excluding zero planted or considered planted years during 81, 82, or 83 base period. If you failed to report acreages during the base period, late filed reports will be accepted. A fee will be charged and certain requirements must be met. Zero certifications will not be accepted for P & CP protection.

Nonprogram crops are all crops except wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and soybeans. Conservation uses are any uses on cropland except program crops, nonprogram crops, Acreage Conservation Reserve [ACR], Conservation Reserve Program [CRP] acreage, and prevented planted acreages. This acreage earning deficiency will be referred to as Conservation Use Acreage [CUA] and is completely different from Acreage Conservation Reserve [ACR]. ACR is the lay out acreage for each crop.

At this time, cross compliance is a program requirement. This means if you participate on one program commodity you cannot harvest more than the base on any other commodity on that farm.

**CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM (CRP)** 

CPR is intended to protect this nation's natural resource base by removing highly erodible and eroding cropland from production.

Eligible land is highly erodible cropland that:

Has been planted or considered to have been planted to produce an agricultural commodity in 2 of the 5 crop years from 1981 through 1985. Must be in physical condition for

continued crop production. Must be one of the following:

Eroding in excess of 3 T if land is capability class II, III, IV, or V. Be land capability class VI, VII, or VIII.

Farmers may sign a 10 year contract with USDA under which they agree to take eligible land out of annual crop production and put into perennial grasses. USDA's role will be to provide annual rental payments, based on a bid, in cash or commodities. ASCS will assist with half the expense of establishing permanent cover on the land.

Further information concerning sign-up [10 day period] and bidding procedure will be furnished at a later date.

If you're interested in this program, you must come up with the lowest dollar amount that you would be satisfied with to lease this to the USDA for a 10 year period.

**1985 FINAL COTTON DEFICIENCY** PAYMENT

We do not expect to know the final cotton deficiency payment rate until the last week in January. Payments will not begin to be issued until mid-February. We are aware that you need them and they will be a priority work item for this office.

Our second sign-up for costsharing on conservation practices will be from February 10, 1986 through February 21, 1986. Funds are limited and approvals will be based on National priorities as well as amount of conservation received per dollar spent. Please remember that all practices must be approved before you start the work or it will not be eligible for cost-sharing.

#### **BRR! IT'S COLD OUTSIDE**


With winter upon us it is time to take a few extra precautions when working outdoors. Even people in good physical condition should be careful to avoid exerting themselves in the cold, freezing winds or blowing snow. If your vehicle is stuck, work slowly and remain calm.

Your safest bet is to remain with your vehicle. Don't leave and seek help. You may become quickly disoriented and lose your sense of direction. By remaining in the vehicle, the chances of being seen by other travellers or by highway maintenance crews is much greater.

Make sure you have fresh air. Open the down wind window for ventilation. Run the motor and heater sparingly to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Try to stay awake and move your arms and legs for circulation and to generate body heat.

The safest rule of the road is what if the weather looks bad and you do not have to go out, stay home or any warm safe location.
